CHINESE MASSACRE.

Details of the Murder of the Missionaries.

CRUEL CHINESE FANATICISM.

Neither Age Nor Sex Involved—Tribes Trouble Anticipated—Great Britain Urged to Take a Firm Stand.

A Hecceing Party—Diplomatic Interview.

Constantinople, Aug. 10.—A dispatch received here from Taurus, Asia Minor, says that a mob attacked the American mission school at that place, maltreated several of the students, and threatened the missionaries. No details of the affair have yet reached here.

Missions Attacked.

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Boston, Mass., Aug. 10.—A representative of the Associated Press walked upon the Rev. James D. Burton, one of the Secretaries of the American Board of Commissioners for Foreign Missions. He said: "The St. Paul's American Institute at Taurus was instituted five or six years ago by Col. Shepherd of New York. The president on the Institute at the present time is the Rev. D. Christie, D.D. The Institute does not belong to the American Board, but has been a considerable trouble among the students, and during the past year and last winter several of them were arrested and taken out of the school for being implicated in some revolutionary movement. There are about 15 students at present."

Shanghai, Aug. 10.—The Americans here have sent a cable dispatch to President Cleveland protesting against the United States Minister Denby's action in denouncing the British Consul in Shanghai. They also recommend that a marine escort accompany the commissioner.

CANADA'S TRADE.

Increase in the Volume of Trade Especially with Great Britain.

Washington, Aug. 11.—The extent of the competition of Canada with the United States in foreign markets is pointed out in a bulletin to be issued by the Secretary of Agriculture in a few days.

The bulletin is the fourth of the "World's Markets" series in course of publication by the department, and contains reports of thirty of our countries in the Dominion. It shows that the total exports of Canada increased from \$90,000,000 in 1885 to \$116,000,000 in 1894. The total imports from \$109,000,000 to \$123,000,000, or thirteen per cent, and the total trade from \$199,000,000 to \$241,000,000, or 21 per cent, during the same period. The largest proportional annual increase was in 1894, when the value of the trade exceeded that of the preceding year about eleven per cent. During the years 1885 to 1894, the value of the trade with the United States exceeded that with any other country, but since then the United Kingdom has been the largest market for Canadian goods.

An important fact is that a large share of the agricultural products of Canada are sent to the United States. In 1894, the value of the exports to
