At the last regular meeting of Wolfville Division the following resolution was unanimously passed:—Whereas, a circular has recently been issued by the Molto-Peptonized Co., of Truro, calling attention to a resolution of the division at Moncton, N. B., in which the opinion is expressed that "alcoholic beverages known as ale and beer, and peptonized ale and porter, are taking the place of common beverage "and" that members should do all in their power to stop the sale and use of such beverages; and

Whereas, according to the circular, "It must be remembered that Molto Peptonized Porer" is alcoholic, so should be prescribed with due attention to the quality" and all interested are requested to give it a fair and honest test; and

Whereas, a preparation like this has been used in this village as a beverage; therefore

Resolved, that this division is in full accord with said resolution, and it is our opinion that a preparation containing so large a quantity of alcohol that "it must be prescribed with a due attention to this quality" is a dangerous thing to be sold indiscriminately;

And it is further resolved that we will use all legal means in our power to prevent the sale of "M. P. P." and similar preparations.

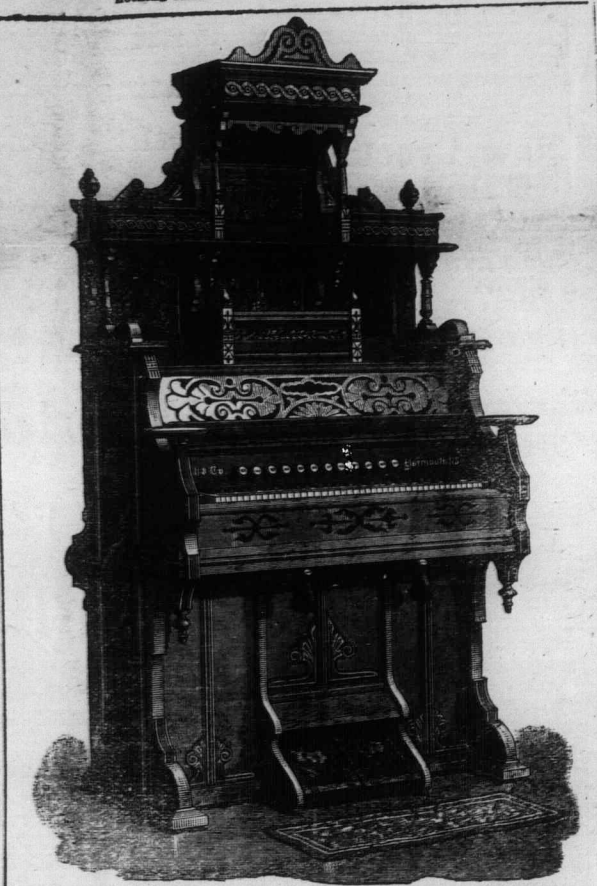
