Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations.

Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties: Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homesteader.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$3 per acre.

Duties: Must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent), and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption mayenter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3 per acre. Duties: Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.



Juplex and packed plunger pump—for the boiler washout system, one 8 by 4 by 6 in. deplex end packed boiler feed pump, one air compressor unit supplemented by a small emergency compressor and one 60 k.w. 250 volt Crocker Wheeler a. c. generator directly driven by a Robb Eugineering Co.'s engine, for general lighting

A boiler washout system has been nstalled involving the use of a 12 by 7 by 12 duplex steam pump controlled by a pressure regulator, a piping sys-tem with outlets between each pair of pits, and a blowoff pipe system with similar outlets. The pump and blow off pipe are connected to a hot well ocated at the rear of the building, to which all exhausts and other drips are taken from all parts of the plant. 
