FIRE LAST NIGHT

ENCOURAGING REPORTS FROM ALL COUNTY PARISHES

The Town of Newcastle is going strong for Hickey. Many local liberals concede him a large majority out of the shire town. Chatham also reports a big majority for Hickey and residents of Rogersville say that village will split 50-50 and possibly give him a majority. Nelson is extremely strong for Hickey, as is also Barnaby Kiver and Alnwick will roll up a big majority for the Conservatives. In Hardwick, Hickey will get the best of it and in Glenelg will hold his own. ISN'T THIS PLAIN?

It is a mighty easy matter for anyone to save \$3,000,000 when it is possible to float a \$200,000,000 loan, at 4% to retire a like amount bearing interest at 5½%. Anyone could do that and we fail to see why a man holding the position of Prime Minister of Canada should want to take the credit of making the saving for his government. When the loan was made at 5½%, we were engaged at war, money was scarce and hard to get, and it was necessary to pay this high rate of interest. Now the war is over, money is plentiful and possibilities to loan money are at a minimum, hence the reason for obtaining money at a lower rate of interest. Why is money plentiful? Not because of anything the King Government has done to make it so, but because during the past few years, the banks and other large financial institutions have been gathering in all the money they previously had loaned and were not re-lending it for industrial purposes, because of the present depression. These financial institutions have now more money than they know what to do with, and knowing that under the present government, business conditions are not liable to improve, take the first opportunity of investing their money in a government loan. Isn't that plain?

Liberals Upset

By This Letter

At the Nomination Day speeches here in the Opera House, C.P. Hickey, the Conservative candidate threw a bomb in the Liberal camp that created a tremendous sensation. Mr. Hickey first referred to the inconsistency of some of the men in Chatham supporting Mr. Snowball, the Liberal candidate, in this election. He first told of Kerr Loggie, who was supporting the Liberal candidate, approaching him (Hickey) recently with an offer that if he (Hickey) would lead a ticket against the Veniot Liberal government he (Loggie) would support the ticket. This created a mild sensation and amid applause and interruptions it was a little time before Mr. Hickey could proceed. This statement was only the fuse to the bomb. Mr. Hickey next produced and read the following letter, written by Mr. Kerr Loggie now supporting Mr. Snowball so strongly, to the Dept of Marine and Fisheries:

Chatham, N.B., Feb 14, 1923
Dept of Marine and Fisheries,
Ottawa.

Dear Sirs,—We understand that the fishing season has been extended until the 25th of February. We wish to state that in our opinion your department does not carry on its affairs in a very business-like manner or in the interests of the country. You establish a legal fishing season and then you change the season from year to year. You might as well have no legal fishing season. You make us very tired. The sooner the Department of Marine and Fisheries is managed on business lines, the better for all concerned.

I have the fortune or misfortune to be a Liberal. I think it must be a misfortune. Your politicians, we presume, are endeavoring to save the government by granting such unwarranted concessions as the extension of the smelt fishing season, but they are attempting an impossible task, for your government is doomed to destruction and deservedly so. It lacks backbone.

The reading of this letter was the sensation of the day and for a time the Liberals were in a panic and the house was in an uproar. The excitement was intense when Mr. Kerr Loggie, who had apparently been sent for, appeared in the hall and asked Mr. Hickey to re-

peat what he had been saying in reference to him. Mr. Hickey repeated what he had been saying with regard to the local ticket against the Veniot Government and also re-read the letter of Mr Kerr Loggie, as given above. Mr. Loggie asked to be heard in reply but the Chairman and Mr Snowball both intervened to say that it had been expressly agreed that there should be no speakers at the meeting other than the candidates. Mr. Snowball especially urged that this gentleman's agreement be carried out, and informed Mr. Loggie that he would be given an opportunity at another time to answer Mr. Hickey's statement and make his explanation in regard to the letter. This closed the incident so far as the debate was concerned, but the matter was the topic of much discussion in both Newcastle and Chatham.

POLITICAL JOINT MEETING TO BE HELD AT NEGUAC

We sometimes hear people saying that they would not bother to attend a political meeting, because it is always one-sided. It is either a Conservative meeting or a Liberal meeting and it is pretty dull music to listen to several speakers who all pound one or the other party.

These people seem to think that it would be more spicy if joint meetings were held, at which both sides of the argument could be heard from the same platform. Possibly they are correct and to give these people an opportunity to attend a meeting of this kind, we are glad to be in a position to announce that such a meeting will be held in Neguac tomorrow evening.

The roads are in excellent condition and Neguac is not so very far away that the electors of a large portion of this county will be unable to attend.

The speakers will be two members of the Federal Parliament of Canada, both of whom are young, full of pep well versed in politics and very fluent in speech, both in English and French. They are Mr. A.J. Doucet, M.P., Conservative member for Kent and Mr. John Robichaud, M.P., Liberal member for Gloucester.

Both these gentlemen spoke on the floors of the House during the debate on the budget, and since that time they have been awaiting a favorable opportunity to discuss their positions on the budget on a common platform.

Last week Messrs Doucet and Robichaud met in Chatham and made arrangements to hold a joint meeting in Neguac tomorrow night, Wednesday, October 1st to which one and all, regardless of party affiliations, are cordially invited. It is a golden opportunity for the electors of Northumberland, who at present are deeply interested in this matter, to hear the arguments of both sides. No doubt some interesting disclosures will be made. Try to be present. It will be interesting.

ALLEGED CAUSE OF MACLAREN'S FAILURE

Ill-fortune which attended the attempt of A. Stuart MacLaren British round-the-world aviator, and his companions to fly across the remainder of the globe after leaving Japan is attributed by the natives of Urup Island, one of the bleak Kuriles to the airman's own indifference to evil spirits.

When Major MacLaren's big Vickers amphibian hopped off from Toshioy, Yetorefu Island, one day in July, with Paramushiru Island at the north of Kurile chan, as his goal, fogs and wind compelled him to land at Totokan Bay, on the southwest coast of Urup Island. The bay is exposed and when the wind rose Major MacLaren's how his plane a short distance inland alighting on a body of blackish water known as Totokan Bog. In so doing, according to the sparse population of Urup Island, he courted the malevolence of evil spirits.

Totokan Bog is an ill-omened water. The natives say it is bottomless, and that no man has ever entered its waters and come out alive. MARITIME RIGHTS

Mr. McKenna a Liberal speaker said "that the Maritime Provinces are geographically cut off from Upper Canada and for this reason the people of the Maritimes have no right to complain" but Mr. McKenna omits to mention the fact that at the time of Confederation this drawback was known and provisions were made to rectify this isolation by giving the Maritime Provinces the Intercolonial Railway and other provisions that, would enable the maritime manufacturers and industrial concerns to be on equal footing as those of Upper Canada. All of which rights have been ignored and neglected. The Maritime Provinces beg and plead for reduction in freight rates to transport their goods to the central market, but this is denied. Northumberland County sent delegation after delegation beseeching for a fifty mile of railway from Newcastle to Tracadie that would pass through the richest part of its forests and thickly populated area. A railway that would pay for itself in freight and traffic within a few years and this is pigeon holed without recognition. Twelve stations in the province of Nova Scotia are closed on the plea of economy. The ports of St. John and Halifax are crying for more export freight. The offices at Moncton have been removed to Upper Canada. Newcastle and Chatham have been deprived of many workers and train service has been curtailed. The Maritime Provinces can suffer but the government would spend millions for buying property in Paris, France. This is what Mr. McKenna wants; however this gentleman's "ambition is to live and die in the Maritime Provinces". WAIT AND SEE

The number of prominent Liberals from all over Canada, including Premier King, to address the electors of Northumberland in the interest of Mr. W.B. THE "ADVOCATE" AND POLITICS

The "Union Advocate" just loves politics. It can't help it. Politics are its life blood. Ever since inception, over 57 years ago it has always been "consistently Conservative." In 1867, the year of the Confederation of the Provinces of the Dominion of Canada, the "Union Advocate" was founded and derived its name from the fact that it was a follower and supporter of Sir John A. PROOF OF THE PUDDING IS THE EATING THEREOF

Premier King and Mr. W.B. Snowball say it is folly for Northumberland to elect a candidate in opposition to the government but fail to give reasons for such a statement. The Conservatives hold that such is not the fact and have proof to substantiate their denial. Here it is.

The late Hon. John Morrissey, M.P. who was elected in 1921, attended the three sessions of the present Federal Parliament under Premier King and his government. HIS OWN FAULT

The Prime Minister of Canada, Rt Hon. MacKenzie King, has been here and gone. He addressed large meetings in Newcastle and Chatham and was given good hearings at both places. He is a fluent, clean-cut and intelligent speaker and friends and opponents enjoyed his meetings. It would be nonsense to say that his address here, had no effect on the political opinions of some people. Undoubtedly it had, but whatever good his remarks did for the Liberal candidate, Mr. W.B. Snowball: that gentleman offset that good a hundred fold by the few brief remarks, which he himself made after the Premier had finished.

Mr. Snowball had spoken to the electors of the county at Newcastle in the afternoon and at Chatham in the earlier part of the evening, but nothing would dissuade him from making a few more explanations at the Newcastle meeting again in the evening.

Apparently he finds that it is necessary for him to make a lot of explanations, but he would be well advised if he made fewer. After the Premier had spoken here in the evening, finishing his remarks about 10:30 o'clock, the audience many of whom had yet to drive a long distance to their homes, felt that they had better be on their way, but Mr. Snowball wanted to further detain them a while longer, and started to make some more explanations. A "heckler" in the audience immediately "got" his goat and away he went "into the air," as usual and did himself more harm than good. He has nobody but himself to blame, and he in consequence, lost all the good that Premier King might have done for him.

Because of this he will get very little sympathy from either his supporters or his opponents. It is his own fault. Northumberland does not want a representative who, like the cow that fills the pail with milk, in the next minute, kicks it over. Northumberland wants stability.


KING AND PARTY BADLY SCARED IN NORTHUMBERLAND

With him will come his brother, the Duke of Beranaba, and his father-in-law, the Marquis of Viana, this was the statement made by His Royal Highness on his arrival in Calgary on Friday evening aboard two Canadian Pacific Railway special cars.

The Duke, who has hunted extensively in Africa, Russia, India and Europe, wishes to add to his collection of specimens of the American elks, Rocky Mountain sheep and caribou. The Marquis of Viana may leave the royal party on the present trip to Banff for a short hunt in the mountains, catching up with the special later on somewhere on the Pacific coast. The young Duchesses expressed their intention of returning with their husbands and spending their time visiting the various bungalow camps in the vicinity of Banff and Lake Louise. In the meantime, they said they must have their maids and butlers instructed in the art of horseback riding for they will make all their journeys mounted.

WHEAT CUTTING IS NEARLY COMPLETED

Excellent harvest weather during the first portion of the week enabled rapid advancement of all farm work according to the weekly crop report of the agricultural department of the Canadian Pacific Railway. Heavy rains towards the latter end, however, necessitated almost the entire suspension of operations throughout the west. The weather at present is more settled. Wheat cutting is practically completed and coarser grains are just approaching that stage. Comparatively little threshing has been accomplished so far, but returns available reveal yields and grades generally exceeding earlier expectations. In some districts where crops were late, farmers fearing frost cut the wheat too green, which will of course, hurt the sample.

Except for some local shortages harvest help situation is satisfactory and available supply adequate for demand.

HON. J. A. ROBB WILL SUCCEED MR. FIELDING?

Montreal, Sept 21—The Financial Times publishes the following from its Ottawa bureau:

"It has been decided that Hon. J.A. Robb is to become permanent financial Minister. Mr. Fielding's resignation, it is understood, is in the hands of the Prime Minister and its acceptance together with Mr. Robb's promotion will be announced shortly, probably before Mr. King leaves for the West.

"Mr. Robb's appointment will be fairly popular. He is not a great parliamentarian nor a strong debater, but he is one of those men not too plentiful in politics who have common sense to an uncommon degree, combined with a sense of fairness and a detachment from mere partisanship which makes him both popular and respected."

DISILLUSION

At the end of the present by-election campaign, Mr. W.B. Snowball the Liberal candidate will return to the President of the party and seek a divorce. THE TRUTH ABOUT
THE EXODUS

Driven to find some material to
offset the figures showing the
exodus to the United States, the
King Government though it says
it cannot count those who leave
the country has—since April—been
announcing figures for those who
have returned. It says that during
the four months ending July 19,
870 Canadians have come back.
Everyone is glad to know that
Canadians are returning, for Can-
ada cannot become the country she
should be unless she retains her
native born.

The inference drawn from these
figures is that the movement of
population from north to south has
been completely stopped and that
a movement from south to north
has begun. It has never been cor-
roborated by those who have criticized
the government on this matter
that there was not a movement of
population from the United States
into Canada; but they have said
that the King tariff policy is
crippling the industries of the
country to such an extent that
our people have to go south to get
work.

Since the Government will not
supply the figures showing the em-
igration from Canada, we have to
rely on Washington. And what
does it say? The figures for July
are not available but it says that
during the months of April, May
and June when the King govern-
ment says that 13,700 Canadians
actually 54,000 persons went south.
In June alone, when the King gov-
ernment said that 5,127 persons
came back 19,177 went to the
United States. Washington also
says that during the first six
months of the year 96,825 went
south as compared with 77,925 dur-
ing the first six months of 1923
and 24,579 during the same months
in 1922.

No wonder industry is languish-
ing in this country. No wonder that
merchants talk of reduced sales.
What else can be expected in the
face of figures such as these? Busi-
ness cannot thrive if the bottom
is shaken out of it, every Brit
while by mischief your tariff changes.
In those days when the cost of
living is high, men, and women out
of jobs will not stay around wait-
ing for one in this country. Can-
ada needs a policy which by insist-
ing on the retention of our own
market for our own people, and the
working up of our own raw mate-
rials into finished products, will
create jobs.

WHAT IS YOUR ANSWER?

In the past three years, what has
the King Government done for Nor-
thumberland or the Maritime Pro-
vinces? While here last week the
Prime Minister talked about reduc-
ing taxation and about all the
good his government has done for
labor. Well we will have it to
ejectors to decide whether or
not there is more taxation now,
than there ever was before, and
we doubt very much if there has
not been more trouble about labor
in the past three years than there
ever was before. There have
been reduced wages each year;
and more strikes, until at present
it is almost impossible for a family
to live on the prevailing wages now
paid, and there is less work in the
country now than there ever was be-
fore. Is W.B. Snowball responsi-
ble and is the King Government
responsible for the present state
of affairs? Your answer will be
recorded on Oct. 7th at the polling
booth.
