

During a gale at 9 p. m., June 22, five miles off Cape Sabine in Smith's Sound, the Thetis and Bear research a live Lieutenant A. W. Greely. rescued alive Lieutenant A. W. Greely, Sergt. Brainard, Sergt Fredericks, Sergt. Long, Hospital Steward Beiderbach, Private Connell and Sergeant Ellison, the only survivors of the Lady Franklin Bay expedition. Sergt. Ellison had lost both hands and feet by frost bite, and died July 6, at Godhaven three days after amputation, which had become imperative. 17 of 25 persons composing the expedition perished by starvation at the point where found. One was drowned while sealing to procure foed. Twelve bodies of the dead were rescued and are now on board the Thetis and Bear. One Eskimo Turnevik was buried at Disco in accordance with the desire of the inspector at Western Greenland. Nobody is in a hurry, nobody seems to have anything to do; yet every one is well clad, and looks happy and

contented. Perhaps there is poverty in Bermuda, but squalor and absolute want, if they exist, keep themselves strangely out of sight. The first thing, perhaps, that strikes the visitor, after the beauty of the water and the perfection of the flowers is the appearance of ease and well-to-do comfort that pervades the islands. There is no subbish, no dirt, no dast, no mud.

Instead of the tumble down shanties that deform and defile the rest of the world, here the humbiest citizen not only dreams of marble halls, but actually dwells in them—or seems to. All the houses are built of the snow-white stone; a coral formation that underlies every foot of soil. When first quarried, the stone is so soft that it can be cut with a knife. But it hardens on exposure to the air, and so durable is it that a house once built is good for at least a hundred years. That it readily lends itself to aschitectural purposes is shown by the interior of Trinty Church, and by the handsome and massive gateways with their arches and columns, that one meets at every turn. These, with the wellkept grounds, give an impression of affluence and elegance that is, perhaps, sometimes misleading. For we are told that there are not many large incomes in Bermuda, and that the style of living in these beautiful and picturesque hemes is very simple and unostentations.—[Atlantic Monthly,

New Orleans Centennial Expassition

The Director General of the World's Industrial and Cotton Centennial Exposition, to be opened at New Orleans on the first Monday in December, 1884, in a report which is before us gives interest-ing facts respecting the preparations for the event, which promises to be one of the most striking of the present century. From the report, for which we are indebted to R. S. Chilton, U. S. Consul

here, we extract the following:—
The main building is 1,375 feet in length and 905 feet in width, affording 1,300,000 square feet of floor space, with convenient apartments attached for police, fire department, public comfort, offices, meeting rooms for various nation al organizations, and with a central music hall capable of seating 11,000 persons, and a machinery hall 1,375 feet in length by 250 feet in width. Extensive accommodations have here been provided for the display of factories of all varieties in motion.

The horticultural hall is said to be the largest conservatory ever erected. It is 600 feet in length, 194 broad in the center, with glass roof, a glass tower 90 feet in height, with heating apparatus and cold storage attachment for preserving fruit. It is designed to have an international exhibition of plants and shrubbery around the sides of this building under cover, and an international display of fruits extending throughout the cen tral spaces of the building.

Mexico has consented to adorn the main center with royal palms and native plants, and will occupy 200,000 feet of space adjoining the hall for a garden. The Republics of Central America will adorn 250,000 feet of the garden, and an equal extent will be occupied by floral products of Florida and California.

An art gallery of native marble is to provided, and every effort will be made to accommodate the extensive collections of art treasures and antique relics now at the command of the associa One thousand feet of space in the main building has been designated for an agricultural hall.

Suitable arrangement have been made for a national display upon the enderse-ment of the National Educational convention and the cordial co-operation of the United States Commission of Education, and appropriate steps have been taken for the organization of a department of Woman's Work, under the high direction of those interested in opening to women independent positions in the economy and indrustries of the world. The exposition grounds will be embelltions of evergreens from the United States and the Latin American countries, presenting groves of the cedar, pine, pomegranate, magnolia, lemon, palm,

The Growth of the Orange Tree.

The orange tree is the longest lived fruit tree known. It is reputed to have attained the age of three hundred years, and it has been known to have flourish ed and borne fruit for more than a hundred years. No f.uit tree will grow and produce fruit se well under rough treatment. It commences to bear the third or fourth year after budding, and by the fifth year it will produce an abundant crop, but its yield will increase gradually under favorable circumstances, and as the years pass on it will become a very productive tree. The early growth of the orange is quite rapid, and by the tenth year it will have increased more than in the next fifty years, so far as its breadty and eight are concerned; but its age multiplies its fruit stems greatly, and an old tree will sometimes bear several thousand oranges.



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

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
