





The devout people of Oberama-gau made a vow that if they survived the plague they would perform the l'assion Play every ten years. They kept this vow religously ever sines. Practically the whole village takes part in the performance in the scene representing the entry into Jerusalem, the carrying of the cross requires over 500 people. They are all there, men, women and children. Up to the beginning of the 19th century the fame of the Passion Play did not extend far beyond the borders of Bavaria, and the peasants taking part in the play made no money out of it. The xpense in preparing costumes is very great, and no pains are spared in harng everything as perfect as can be. Selecting the men and women who are deemed worthy to take part in the play is an important matter, and is done by the old men of the village who meet in solemn conclave and exercise great care and make searching enquiry as to the lives and conduct of those who hope to be assigned the parts of the Apostles, Mary and the hristus. Two whole years are spent n prepartion and during all that time they allow their hair to grow. They also adapt their thoughts to the character, and are known henceforth amongst the peasants by the name of Peter or John. Judas or the Christus. They are people of a deeply religious emperament, and though they get their living by farming, wood carving, tc., they are highly educated, and nost of them famous musical composers and interpreters of the great masters. They have a special love for Wagner whose history is intimately connected with King Ludwig and the people of Oberamergau.

During the past century the Passion Flay, as its fame gradually reached the outside world, attracted tourists rom all parts of the Christian World. The railway companies, the hotels and the tourists agencies during this time have been making a good deal of money out of the Passion Play, but the peasants of Oberamergau applied all that they made out of the Play to the improvement of the village, to roads, education, colleges and schools. They have fine art schools and colleges, and are acknowledged masters

wood carving and music The Archbishop and Father St. John vent to see the Passion Play through the Cook Agency without which His Grace thinks it would be impossible for the ordinary tourist to travel there with comfort and convenience. The Agency has arranged before hand the houses at which the tourists are to stay. The Archbishop and Father St. John were assigned to the house Judas and Mary, father and daughter. When they arrived Mary, a trim, tidy, and virtuous girl, received them in the midst of her household work; while Judas, her father, was out putting in his hay. The play itself, occupies the whole day from 8 a.m. till sunset. There is a recess from noon to 2 p.m. The place where the audience sit is now roofed in, while the actors occupy the spacious stage in the open

cupy the spacious stage in the open ir with the beautiful mountains and blue sky for a background. The audiorium will hold about 5,000 people. Itwas filled every day. There were people there from the four corners the world. A few of the scenes were reviewed by the lecturer including the "Expulsion from Paradise," "Driving out the Money Changers," "Entry into Jerusalem," "Carrying the Cross," "The Crucifixion," and "The Ressurrection." Words, he said, could not do justice to

the subject. The deeply religious character of the play affected the most blase and callous. Strong men were seen to sob and weep, and there was not a disrespectful word heard.







When Tom Sayers retired from the championship in 1860, Mace was regarded as his legitimate successor, but his supremacy was soon challenged by Tom King. The two met in January, 1862, and after 43 rounds Mace was given the verdict. For the next 10 years he was practically invincible.

The Portuguese troops of the loca garrison and the crew of the Portu-guese gunboat Patria revolted last night and, taking possession of the city, proceeded to enforce changes in administration of the affairs of he dependency of Portugal. The revolt began with the landing of the sailors of the Pa tria, who marched to the public square, where they fired three volleys as a signal to the troops, who forced an entrance to the armoury and arming themselves joined the seamen. Several hundred strong rebels pro ceeded to Santa Clara Convent, from which they drove out the Nuns, or-dering them to leave the Islands, The Nuns fled to Hong Kong from the Convent. The rebels marched to Government House, before which they mounted a cannon.
