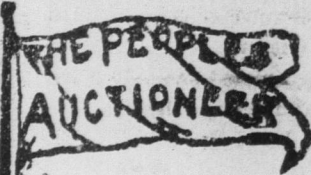

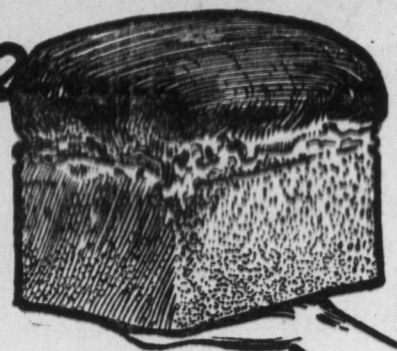

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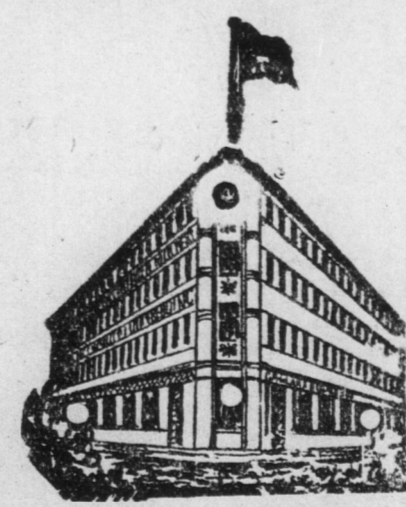

Of all the brilliant characters which Arnold Bennett has delighted us, I think I like best his description of the "hostile love" which existed between Hilda Lessways and her mother.

These two women, as you remember, lived alone together for many years. They loved each other tenderly and yet at times they irritated and wore on each other to the verge of desperation. In short, there existed between them that peculiar hostile love which made them antagonize and criticize each other constantly despite the fact that each loved the other more than anyone else in the world.

It seems to me that this phrase is a perfect description of the feeling that so often exists between housemates. We love the father or mother, son or daughter, sister or brother, husband or wife, with all our hearts. The mere thought of death in connection with them fills us with a sickness of heart that is physical in its intensity. We would be capable of almost any heroic sacrifice for their sake, and yet we aren't capable of the simple sacrifice of tolerance and patience. Their peculiarities wear on us, their little ways get on our nerves and we are filled with that hostile love that makes us continually cavil and carp and criticize even though all the time they are very dear to us.

Someone has said:

"We've a kindly word for the stranger And a smile for the sometime guest. But for our own the angry tone. Though we love our own the best. And so it is in all too many homes."

I know a conscientious, sensitive and dignified girl who loves her mother with an unusual love and tenderness. And yet even into this great love the element of hostility creeps; and again and again she finds herself nagging and criticizing the dear mother. "I'm so ashamed of myself," she told me once, "when I find myself scolding mother for some of her funny little ways. It makes her unhappy, but not half so unhappy as it makes me afterwards."

We are queer, solitary self-assertive creatures, we human beings. They talk about the agreeableness of man meaning that man was meant to live in families; but sometimes I wonder if we wouldn't be happier if it were possible for each of us to live a separate existence in a separate house.

I think there are a great many homes in which the inability to keep from nagging the genuinely loved housemates is really a tragedy.

Furthermore, I think in a great many cases the cause is that the people concerned see too much of each other. It is one of the bad tendencies of the age that most of us are afraid of being alone. I think we need more aloneness. We can't have a separate cell in which to live, but we can have a separate room, and that room our castle. No member of the family should enter another's room without knocking. There should be less familiarity and even intimacy even between housemates, more respect for the desire for occasional privacy and aloneness.

But any two objects together very hard and you get what? Friction. Well, isn't it the same with souls? The more freedom and respect of privacy and personality that you find in a home, the less you will find of hostile love.

## HAVANA.

Author of "At Good Old Swash." Havana is the capital of Cuba and the middle name of all good cigars. Nowadays Havana does not over-balance the globe by its size and importance, but a hundred years ago it was as big as anything on this hemisphere. Havana people put on airs when they visited New York and Rio Janeiro and said "Nice little city you have here" with impunity, and the harbor of the city was filled with ships from all the world. Havana has grown ever since, but has gotten off the main line. It now has 300,000 people, and tourists visit it for its quaintness, not to see its skyscrapers.

Havana is situated on the north side of Cuba within 100 miles of freedom and progress until 1898, when both the above mentioned moved down and scooped it in. It is a beautiful one-story city, decorated with tropical plants, colored stone and plaster homes and bright costumes. It has drives and alamedas around its harbor instead of wooden wharves and its cathedrals, palaces and castles are large enough to strike the tourist from this country with considerable awe. For years the most prominent resident of Havana was Christopher Columbus, whose remains lay in the cathedral, but he recently succeeded in getting home to Spain after almost 400 years of exile.

Havana was founded just 400 years ago by the Spanish and has had as much excitement as a rabbit in hunting season. For two centuries the favorite amusement of wretched parties was to come over and shoot up Havana. It was besieged by the bucaniers and French and threatened by Drake. In 1589 Spain built Morro Castle and these amusements ceased for a while.

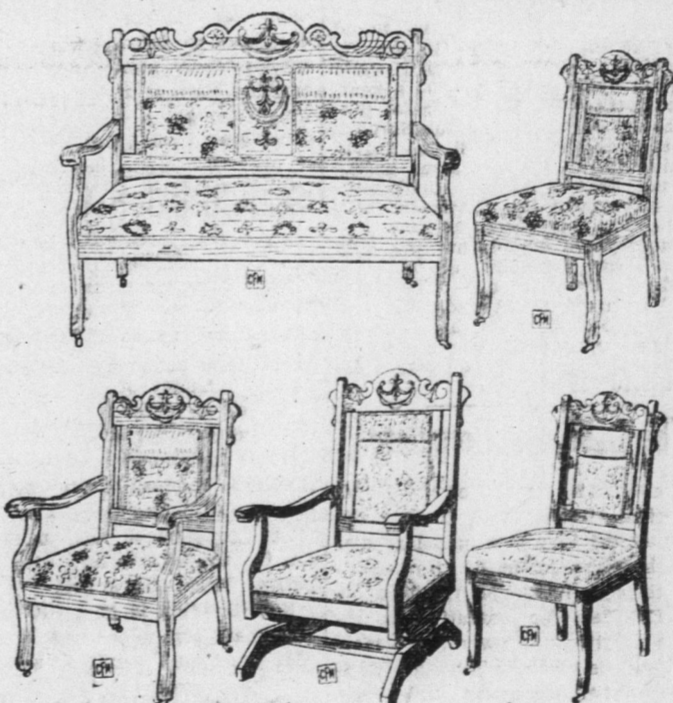

### A Sudden Sharp Shock.

The city has not yet recovered from the shock of surprise given the country by the Minister of Finance on Tuesday. It was generally expected that extra taxes would be placed on tobacco and alcoholic beverages. But nobody anticipated there would be a re-imposition of mititious tax per cent, nor that mill-men would be called upon to pay \$25,000 a year. No doubt there is justification for taking the \$17,000 a year off the Sulphur used at Grand Falls, but it was surely impolitic to do it in the same breath that put \$25,000 on the small mill-man, just above the fishermen mill-owners, with his cut of 10,000.

Yesterday we stated that the duty on cigars had been changed. That the new duties were \$10 a lb. This was according to the typed resolution supplied by the Minister to the members, but it appears that is an error. There is no change in the tax on cigars except the 10 per cent.

### The Labrador Boundary.

In reply to a question of Mr. Lloyd, the Prime Minister said that in the matter of the Labrador boundary dispute, the Government of Newfoundland, through its solicitors, have offered Canada's representatives to refer the question as to what, as a matter of fact, is and has been the boundary between Newfoundland and Canada in Labrador, but the representatives of Canada will agree only to refer the question of what ought to be such boundary.

We consider the Government has taken the proper course. The issues raised by Canada should only be entertained if the Privy Council adjudge that there has not been and is not now a legal boundary between Quebec and Newfoundland Labrador.

**CLEMENTINE FINISHED LOADING.**—The brig Clementine, Capt. Parsons, has finished loading at A. Goodridge & Sons, and sails for Oporto to the first opportunity, taking 3,300 quintals of codfish.

## Had Stormy Passage.

The s.s. Durango, Capt. Chambers, docked at 2.30 p.m. yesterday. As already stated in the Telegram, the ship was 19 days in the passage from Liverpool to this port, leaving there at 9 p.m. on the 7th inst. On the run across the ship met heavy westerly winds, during which she was heavily tossed about, and on last Friday morning shipped a heavy sea, which broke the cabin skylight and deluged the compartment. The steering gear was also put out of business by the heavy sea and the ship had to be headed eastward while repairs were being made. Running before the gale for twelve hours, she covered a distance that took three days to recover when again headed westward on Saturday last. At 4.30 a.m. Monday, when about 140 miles off this coast, the Durango ran into the ice, and after pushing her way for some hours, was forced to retreat, and running south of the Virginas made into Cape Race at 6.45 p.m. Wednesday. She hoisted for the night and at 4 a.m. yesterday started down the shore arriving here at 2.30 p.m. The Durango brought a large freight and a considerable mail, but no passengers.

CAPE RACE, To-day.

### The Government Lost.

LONDON, To-day.  
Labor party has once again deprived the Government of a safe seat by forcing a triangular contest in Leith Burgs which in 1910 returned, Right Hon. R. C. Munroe, Ferguson, now Governor General of Australia by a majority of 1785, yesterday elected C. W. Currie, Unionist candidate by a majority of sixteen. The seat was undoubtedly regarded as safe for the Government until the last few days, when it became evident that recent industrial troubles at the local port, combined with the South African deportations were militating against the Government. The women's suffrage societies also supported Bill, the labor candidate, the successful Unionist candidate made Home Rule the chief issue, but as the labor candidate was like a liberal candidate Home Rule, the result can scarcely be claimed as a victory on the Irish issue. Nevertheless coming on the heels of the Bethnal Green and South Bucks elections, it strikes another severe blow at the Government in the early stage of a critical session.

## Star of the Sea Lecture.

Rev. Dr. Kitchin, of St. Joseph's, lectured on Napoleon last evening, in the Star Club Rooms, to a very appreciative audience of members and their lady friends. In introducing the lecturer, the Chairman, Mr. J. J. Lacey, commented upon the great work being done by the Rev. gentleman at the Parish of St. Joseph's, and as well intimated, that only for the sake of a formal custom, was any introduction necessary, as Dr. Kitchin's name as a lecturer was already very well known.

The Rev. gentleman then addressed the audience, and for an hour and a half dealt in a masterly manner with the great life of that hero of history—Napoleon Bonaparte. On the screen were pictured splendid photographs of scenes in Napoleon's life, including the Retreat from Moscow, crossing the Alps, receiving the Emperor's crown, a prisoner at St. Helena, his defeat at Waterloo and his death-bed, while in beautiful and classic language, Dr. Kitchin described the different scenes.

A vote of thanks moved by Mr. J. H. Farrell, and seconded by Mr. D. M. Dempsey was tendered in a few appropriate words by the Chairman, after which the President, Mr. E. M. Jackman and the Spiritual Director, Rev. Dr. Greene, addressed the gathering, and made stirring appeals to the rising young men of the day, to develop the literary taste more, and not waste too much precious time in amusements. A vote of thanks was also passed to Mr. Armstrong and Mr. Murphy, who attended to the lantern and contributed greatly to the success of the lecture, after which a song from Mr. Dugan terminated a very enjoyable evening.

## HEALTHY AND UNHEALTHY LIGHTING.

Gas, it may be said, vitiates the atmosphere. True. But it also helps to purify it. Its purifying power is greater than its vitiating power. Electricity does not vitalize, nor does it purify. Hear what three eminent men have said:—

"Much evidence has lately been adduced to show that gas is more useful than the electric light in promoting efficient ventilation of air. It is for this amongst other reasons, that gas is being frequently substituted for the electric light. The latest example is, perhaps, the Society of Medical Officers of Health, which has recently installed gas in its premises, a first experience with the electric light.—Dr. Jamieson B. Hurry.

"He would merely add that no member who had experience of their meeting room under the old conditions could deny the improvement that had taken place since gas had been substituted for the electric light and the new system of heating and ventilation had been installed.—Dr. Reginald Duffield, before the Society of Medical Officers of Health.

"I have in my mind's eye, at the moment, a hall which, in the old days was lighted by gas, and in which a large audience could, with comfort, sit through an hour's lecture, or with pleasure through a three hours' dinner, but which, with the march of civilization, had its illumination changed from gas to electricity, the latter being employed with all the latest refinements to effect the lighting under the best conditions, with the result that any large gathering within its walls leads to a state little short of asphyxiation.—T. B. Lewis, Professor of Chemistry at the Royal Naval College, Greenwich.—nov8, ff

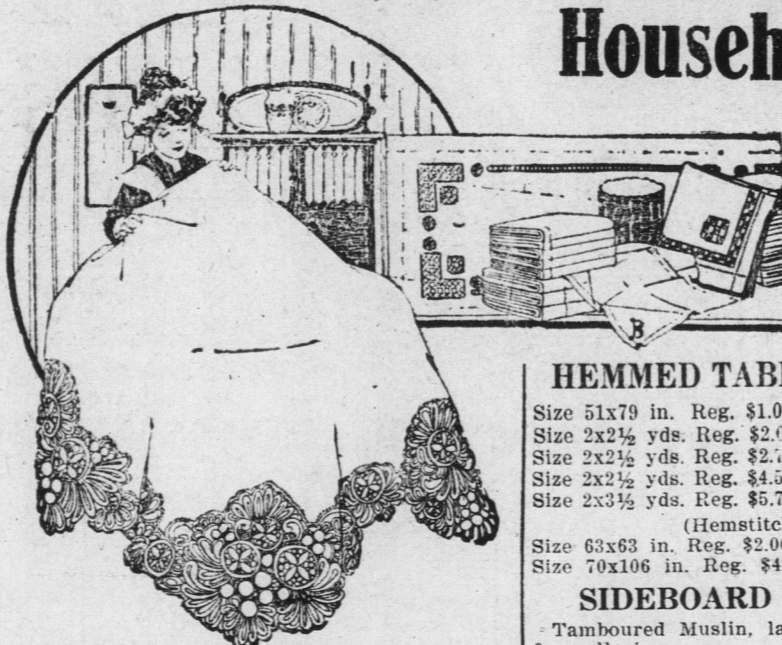

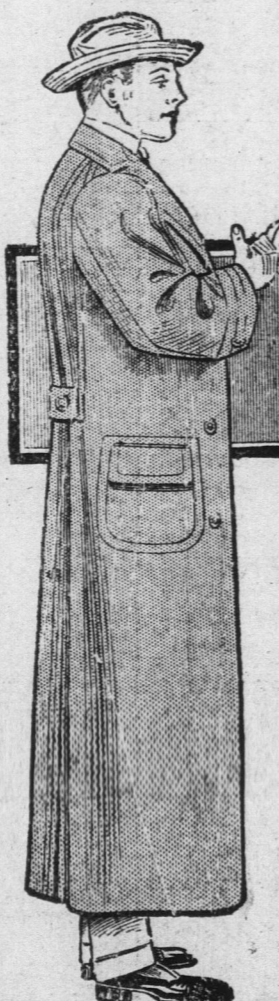

**SYDNEY, Feb. 26.**  
Frank W. Haynes has been found guilty of the murder of Benjamin Atkinson in August last, and was sentenced this morning by Judge Drysdale to be hanged on May 8th.

**DUBLIN, Feb. 26.**  
Redmond and Carson are united in a protest against the desertion of Queenstown by the mail steamers, and will form part of a deputation to present Ireland's claims in this connection to Premier Asquith and the Postmaster General.

**ALBANY, N.Y., Feb. 26.**  
Gyp the Blood, Lefty Louie, Whitey Lewis and Dago Frank, the four gunmen jointly convicted with former police lieutenant Becker, for the murder of Herman Rosenthal, will be electrocuted during the week beginning April 13th.

**WASHINGTON, Feb. 26.**  
The possibility that Britain, Germany, France and other Powers may follow the lead of the United States and warn their subjects to leave Mexico is discussed in official circles here to-day, as a probable outcome of the execution of Benton.

**CHIHUAHUA, Feb. 26.**  
General Villa to-day reiterated that he would permit the examination, but not the removal of the body of Benton, which, he asserts, is buried here. He said that representatives of the British and American Governments, and the widow would alone be permitted to view the body.

**METZ, Feb. 26.**  
Lieut. Haage, of the 98th Infantry, stationed here, was killed to-day in a duel with Lieut. Von La Valette St. George, a comrade in the same regiment. The encounter was brought about owing to a gross insult, according to the official report, which does not say who was the insulted, nor does it give any other details.

**EL PASO, Feb. 26.**  
It is believed that Bauch, the German-American, was executed in Juarez on Friday last. Witnesses, who saw him being led to the place of execution, have been found by U. S. Secret Service men. Bauch's sister declared that she believes him to be dead, and that she will avenge his death, if she has to do it herself.

**DUNBAR, Feb. 26.**  
The arson squad to-day burned to the ground the historic Parish Church at White Kirk, near here. Usual placards. The church was erected in the 16th century, and contains many relics of the battle of Dunbar in which the Scots were routed by Oliver Cromwell's forces in 1650. Many priceless scriptural relics from the Holy Land were destroyed by fire.

**MEXICO CITY, Feb. 26.**  
President Huerta to-day refused permission to the United States Government to send 2,000 American marines as guard for the location here. This information came direct from Huerta himself. Huerta says he was asked by Washington to agree to the despatch in addition to the American one of 1,000 men made up of Americans, English and French. To all this he had returned a negative reply on the grounds that there was no need for such precautions. The States' charge d'affaires refuses either to confirm or deny the information.

**BELFAST, Feb. 26.**  
The launch to-day of the Britannic, the 50,000 ton White Star Liner marks an important development in constructional safety, so far as engineering ingenuity can ensure it. The Britannic is intended for trans-Atlantic service, and had only just been laid down when the Titanic disaster occurred. As the result of that disaster the plans for the Britannic were almost completely remodelled, which accounts for her long stay on the stocks. She is a triple screw steamer, 900 feet long. There has been introduced into her construction almost every device for ensuring safety. A complete inner skin extends to a considerable height above the load line, the most vulnerable portion of a vessel. The number of bulkheads are increased. It is claimed that the Britannic will be able to float with any six compartments flooded.

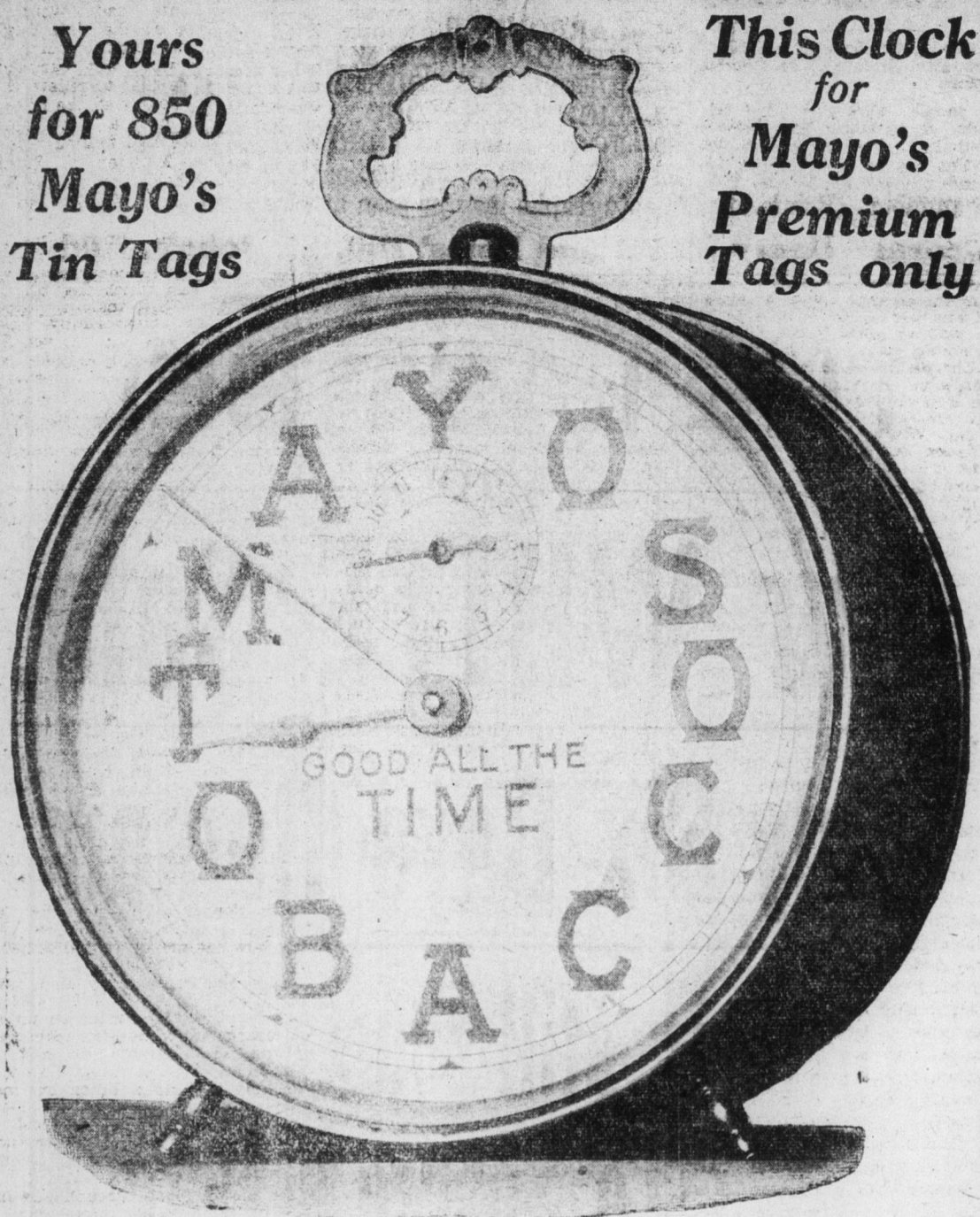

Just now it seems that Protestantism is having an old time revival as witness the stand taken at Kilmuir and Washington, D.C., U. S. A. It is their purpose to have a clean temple and High Churchism must go before the broom.  
Seeing that C. A. gives the XXXIX Articles a lot of thought, I wonder what he thinks of Article VI. It reads thus:—"Holy Scripture containeth all things necessary to Salvation so that whatsoever is not read therein, nor may be proved thereby is not to be required of any man that it should be believed as an article of faith, or be thought requisite or necessary to salvation." Read also Article XX. Book of Common Prayer.  
Will he stand for these principles? In his letter of the 17th inst. he says, "we are told that so far was it from the Church of England to reject and forsake the Churches of Italy, France, Spain, Germany, etc." Well, now, in the light of such history and with C. A.'s brilliant education it should cause him to forsake the non de plume of "C. A."—for surely it is a mis-nomery—and become a "Catholicus" in verity.

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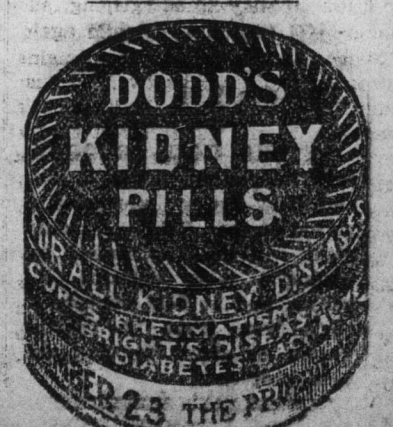

**"C. A.'s"  
Final Letter.**

Editor Evening Telegram.  
Dear Sir,—Your correspondent "Shimri" in your issue of the 24th contributes a rather lengthy epistle as a sort of supplementary reply to my letter of Feb. 17th, in which I stated that Article 25 of the Thirty-nine Articles was the authority for Confirmation, and Penance being designated Sacraments by the Church of England. This was all I wished to emphasize at that time when "Shimri" called into question the use of the word Sacrament by another correspondent. This is followed up by the opinion of Archbishop Secker, as to there being two Sacraments only as being "generally necessary and valid," which is altogether irrelevant to the question at issue. My contention being that the Church of England is Catholic and the Catholic Sacraments are part of her heritage as such and does not claim the right to dispense with any or either of the Sacraments by the greater or lesser enumerated in Article XXV. In proof of this I once again refer "Shimri" to the XIII Canon of the Constitutions and Canons Ecclesiae 1604, which says that "it was not the purpose of the Church of England to reject or forsake the Churches of Italy, France, Spain and Germany and such like churches, if all things which they held and practiced; that it doth with reverence retain those ceremonies which do not neither endanger the Church of God nor offend the minds of sober men and only departed from them (the aforesaid Churches) in those particulars wherein they were fallen out from themselves in their ancient integrity and from the Apostolic Churches which were their first founders." This justification of the Church of England's position in respect to the Sacraments of the Eucharist, Baptism, Confirmation, Penance, Matrimony, Orders and Holy Anointing; each and all can be established by Scriptural proof is sufficient to retain the allegiance of an and every reasonable Catholic with its fold without going to the trouble of purchasing pamphlets from the S.P.C.K. in order to ascertain what views an Archbishop of Canterbury held as to the number of Sacraments.

We all know that an evil crew of foreign and heretical Englishmen tried to rush the defences in the early years of Elizabeth, and of these Bucer (the gentleman who tried to give us golygamy as a gospel privilege) is the most favorable specimen. When all is said that can be truly said about the Reformation it remains a solid fact that when the work was over in 1662 we had left us a Catholic Liturgy, the full deposit of the Faith an unbroken succession, and nothing in all our formula which comes from heretical Luther or heretical Calvin, so that Bishop Tomline of Lincoln, is merely ventilating his own defective views of the Church's Sacramental teaching in the same way that "Shimri" does, but in a much lesser degree. In addition to Article XXV. for justification of the word Sacrament being applied to Confirmation, Penance, etc., I would refer your correspondent to the King's Book issued in 1543 with full authority of the Convocation of both provinces (Canterbury and York) and never has been repealed, teaches the Seven Sacraments and this being an authorized oratory taken in conjunction with the Scriptures Prayer Book, and Canons Ecclesiastic "proves to the hilt" to use a phrase of a well known local publicist, that the Sacraments in question are still retained and in use in what is known as the Church of England as has been shown by the authorities I have produced, so that the continued correspondence of "Shimri" with the "profound" opinions of individual theologians representing a traditionally hostile school of thought is neither edifying nor interesting and as the time at my disposal is becoming limited, I have no desire to continue the controversy further, as the contention I set out to demonstrate has been fully established viz. that the Church of England is Catholic and that Protestantism under any shape or form has no legal place within her. I thank you, Mr. Editor for the use of your valuable medium in publishing this correspondence when your space could be utilized for a much better purpose.

Yesterday was the busiest day since the House opened. A feature of the session was the criticisms of Messrs. Kent, Lloyd, Clift and Coaker on the Loans asked for by the Government. After several petitions were presented the Prime Minister gave notice that he would, on to-morrow, move the House into Committee to consider Resolutions re the construction of a railway across the Isthmus of Avalon; also for the construction of a railroad from Humbermouth, Bay of Islands, to S. W. Arm, Notre Dame Bay. On Supply and the Additional Estimates for 1914-15 asking for \$94,400 were dealt with. This amount included: Interest on Railway Loan, \$70,000; Interest on Local Loan, 14,400; Amount in aid of Game and Inland Fisheries, 10,000.

Mr. Kent asked if there was any further supply for the current year as he pointed out that there were items such as increases to salaries, covered in the Auditor General's report that were not accounted for in the supplementary supply vote. He cited an instance of this in the Marine and Fisheries Department. He was informed by the Finance Minister that this increase was paid out of contingencies despite the fact that the contingencies in this department had been all exhausted and allocated and that there was no balance left to pay for increased salaries from now until the 30th of June, besides contingencies only intended for the unforeseen payments that accrued in an office during the year and any increase in salaries should be provided for by specific grant. He referred to the large an extraordinary supplementary supply of the past few years and smelted should be made to reduce it and more care should be exercised in preparing the estimates. He gave statistics showing the abnormal supplementary supply for the past four years, the average of which was \$340,000 against an average of \$90,000 for the four years previous. Last year particularly there was an unusual expenditure in salaries and in other items on Executive Responsibility. Except in some emergency cases, there was no justification for Supplementary Supply in regard to salaries. If it was the intention to increase salaries, increase them in the proper way in the House. He was of the opinion that our public servants were not adequately paid for their work. He gave an example of this in the man who is now in prison for defalcations committed, but who was only half paid for his services, namely \$650 a year despite the fact that a million and a half of dollars passes through his hands annually and he was engaged in this position for the last quarter of a century. The responsibility that was on the man's shoulders warranted better payment and in consequence the official was led into temptation.

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
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
