

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

Wheat From India.

TWO MILLION TONS FOR GREAT BRITAIN.

A big scheme, involving an outlay of at least £20,000,000 by the Indian Government, has been completed, whereby all wheat not needed for indian consumption and sold at normal prices in the United Kingdom. Some of the wheat is already on its way.

It is confidently believed that the step will avert a further rise in the price of bread. The scheme is the utcome of the Indian Government's ecision, announced some time ago, to control all wheat exports till March,

1916. •
It is officially estimated that with 32,148,000 acres under cultivation the yield—a record one—will be 10,293,000 tons. Last year it was 8,427,000 tons.

After allowing for ordinary Indian requirements, a surplus of 2,000,000 tons will be available for export.

The price of wheat to the Indian sellers will not be regulated by the price ruling in London! it will be determined by the Indian Government As the season progresses the maximum price will graudally be reduced. "If the Government had not taken the matter in hand," said an official of the India Office, "the price of bread in India would have risen because of the export demands.'

Teaching Men to be Brutes.

Germans Carefully Train Their Sol-

(By a retired British Officer.) Brutality is, in many respects, the eynote to the training of the German soldier in times of peace. How thoroughly he has learned his lesson the world has recently seen-to its hor-

In Germany, however, the people frankly recognise that the Kaiser's army is maintained and trained solely with the idea of ruthless warfare.

"Rob! Burn! Kill!" is its motto, and the treatment meted out to the luckless recruit by his sergeant has the aim of impelling him to go and prac

ice similar "frightfulness." The part played by the German ser geant is, indeed, a very pernicious one. He is a professional soldier drawn largely from the lowest classes and ill-paid. When you consider that this low-caste, underpaid man has al most the power of life and death over his men, you can understand what

abuses he is responsible for. He can make the life of the conscript under him a veritable inferno; and he usually does, unless the unhappy man is prepared to purchase his leniency. There is no form of persecution and brutality which he will not practice until his victim often driven to self-mutilation or suicide as a way of escape, or until, provoked beyond endurance, he strikes the sergeant, and as the result is le out to be shot.

Stories of Fiendish Punishments.

I could tell you some terrible stories heard in Germany of their fiendish ingenuity in devising punishments for recruits who decline, or are too poo o "oil their palms." One man, for nstance, was made to march for ours round the barrack square, carying heavy weights, until he fell rom exhaustion, then he was brutaly kicked until he got up. Staggering a few steps more, he fell again and again until, finally, unconscious and mass of bruises, he was carried off to the hospital. The very cadets, boys of twelve, are often cruelly bullied by their seniors-until it is their turn to play the bully, when they do it to

For the slightest offence I have known these boys to be thrashed or kicked mercilessly. One lad I knew well was made to stand for half an nour on tiptoe with a heavy weight on his head, and was slashed across the face with a dog-whip every time his heels touched the ground.



A City's Garbage Products.

Since 1907, Barmen, Germany, a city of 172,000 inhabitants, has used an incinerator for disposing of its garbage including not only kitchen waste, but rags, paper, old clothing, and other refuse of a great city. An account by Vice-Consul Julius Festner states that the plant has given excellent satisfaction, and has not only removed the useless material in a sanitary way, but has yielded two products of value-a good quality of sand for bricks and building purposes, and a supply of electricity. After burning for an hour in the furnaces, the re fuse is reduced to slag, which is bro ken and ground into the sand of various grades. The gases from the burning, with a temperature of 1200 deg. to 1500 deg. C, pass to two boilers, and generate steam for a 600 h.p turbine, with an axle directly con nected to that of a 400 kilowatt dynamo. The electric current is sold for less than one cent per kilowatt hour to the municipal electric works, by which it is retailed to the public at two and three-fourth cents. The furnaces dispose of about 22,000 tons of garbage annually, and this supplies 11,000 tons of slag or clinkers and 1,700,000 kilowatt hours of electricity.





is fighting for civilization." To another priest, a chaplain, Bissolati said: "At the front you will dispense comfort to the wounded, but also (pointing to the chaplain's re volver) dispense some of those pills among the Austrians."
