EASTERN THEATRE, Sept. 28. During the course of the day the left wing of the Allied armies in the east continued their advance toward Kichev. The enemy rear guards have etreated to the heights north of Resna and the village of Ochridt. The Serbian army has gained ground to the north and to the northeast of Veles and Kochana.
