The House of Lords read the Irish Crimes Bill to-day for the second time, without division, and the Royal Assent was afterwards given.

BRITISH BOLSHEVISTS PROTEST. LONDON, Aug. 9.

Premier Lloyd George presided over an all cabinet council on his return to the city to-night from his Hythe conference with Premier Millerand. He told his colleagues the result of the conference, and discussed its bearings in connection with the statement, which is to be made to Parliament by him to-morrow. The Independent Liberals held a meeting in the House of Commons to-night, and passed a resolution protesting against any intervention against Russia by way of blockade, men, money or nunitions.




