
The Island of Yap.

That is a small word and it repreents a small place but it is creating a big interest among the nations. In our English, Yap means "to bark, to yelp." Well, Yap, is making considerable noise. It is the name of the chief island in the western group of the Carolines and lies about a thousand niles east of the Philippines. It formerly belonged to Spain but after the spanish-American war it fell into the hands of the Germans. After the late great war it was agreed by the Council of the League that Japan, for her assistance, should have the former German islands north of the equator and Great Britain should have those on the south. The United States, refusing to ratify the Treaty of Versailles, was not represented in the League Council, and so was not consulted when these assignments were made. But Yap is a very important cable station and the United States is much interested in it because of the connections it makes with the Philippines sions. Naturally the United States is opposed to this island falling into the hands of any nations whose policies might be opposed to her own, and she has notified the Council of the League that she cannot consent to seeing Yap and its cable lines fall into the hands, of any single power. Of course it did belong to a single power, Germany, before the war but circumstances have changed and Japan and the United States have some other problems between them which are difficut to solve. This is a very delicate question. Japan does not seem inclined to yield anything from the mandate given her by the Council of the League, but recently the United States has renewed her protest and declared that she would not agree to any such disposition of the matter.

London Full of Troops.

Owing to the strike of the Triple Alliance, London is more filled with service men than at any time since the war. They are mobilized in Hyde Park and Kensington Gardens in such numbers that the gates have been closed and the public has no opportunity to see them. The Duke of York's house is used as headquarters and filled with officers, the home of the Prince of Wales is guarded and Buckingham Palace has been fortified against attack. The Cabinet has gathered forces ready to despatch them to any point in the British Isles on a moment's notice. This mobiliza tion of the military gives rise to the question where the troops are coming from. Some have arrived from Ireland and from the Rhine.





"Subscriber" states that the boat was handed over to me last June, to operate according to contract from July 1st, but did not appear until the 13th of that month. The fact is the boat was handed over to me July 2nd an utter wreck; the keel broken off at stern-post and also amidships, rudder broken off and gone, propeller blade turned in against the stern-post and lock nuts gone, all fittings of engine, tark, batteries, feed-pipe, gasoline cocks, etc., all gone and the boat barely able to float across the harbor. Salmonier is a big harbor, nine miles long and about three quarters wide. It is a kind of centre for outlying settlements of the Bay, having five Post and Way Offices, three Telegraph Offices, two churches, half a dozen schools and being a port of call for coastal steamers; so that it can be seen at a glance what a boon this ferry can be if properly utilized.

The boat, which is 35 ft. long by 8 eet wide, has been rebuilt the past winter and has been given 7 inches more draught amidships. The en gine has been removed to the forward part of the boat, requiring 17 feet of shaft. A cabin and engine room have een added, the cabin to acc to passengers. The cockpit also has een refitted and provides for 25 or 0 more passengers. The actual serrice this summer will be four roun rips daily touching at six points, each way over a three mile section of the arbor. 


