Centre Riding Conservative Meeting.

We see by the Fergus papers that a meeting for the purpose of selecting a candidate for the representation of Centre Wellington, in the Dominion Parliament, will be held at the North American Hotel, Fergus, on Saturday the 15th inst.

We hear that this for the present nameless party is at present much exercised in spirit over the recent change in the riding, proposed in the Re-distribution Bill.

Grant's Nomination.

The Philadelphia Republican Convention on Thursday nominated Gen. Grant as President by a unanimous vote.

Mr. JOHN HILLYARD CAMERON has brought in a bill providing that every bill of exchange and promissory note which bears date on the last day of any month, and is payable at one or more months from and after such date, shall become payable on the last day of the month or months expressed in the bill or note, with the addition of the legal days grace.

At a meeting held in Cornwall comprising the constituency of the late Hon. J. S. Macdonald, the determination was arrived at to ask Mr. Henry Sandfield Macdonald, eldest son of the late member, to accept a nomination for Parliament.

The Wentworth County Council have granted 30 cents a day to every non-commissioned officer and private belonging to the 7th (Wentworth) Battalion, during their encampment at Niagara.

Mr. and Mrs. Howe left Ottawa on Wednesday for Philadelphia, and thence will go to the Southern States. Mr. Howe's health is failing, and serious apprehensions are entertained as to his recovery.

Wellington County Council.

The Council met this morning at 9 o'clock. The Warden in the chair. All the members present.

Mr. Leslie moved, seconded by Mr. Nicol, that the By-law to extend the time for the sale of lands for taxes in this County be now read a third time and passed.

The Warden read an account from the North Riding Registrar for rent of office from the 1st January to 1st of July, 1872, 72-00. Referred to the Finance Committee.

Moved by Mr. Johnston, seconded by Mr. McMillan, that leave be given to introduce a By-law for the establishment of a fair at Hillsburg—Carried, and the By-law read a first and second time, and the first fair was fixed for the first Tuesday before the second Thursday in July, September, November, January, March and May.

The Warden read an account from Mr. J. W. Hall for gas consumed in his office, amounting to \$4.50. The amount was disputed by Mr. Hall with the Gas Company as to correctness. Referred to the Finance Committee.

Mr. Massie remarked, amid much laughter, that he thought it was very unusual for a Master-in-Chancery to require gas.

On motion of Mr. McKelvie the By-law to assess equivalent to Government grant for Public Schools was read a third time and passed.

Moved by Mr. Sutherland, seconded by Mr. McManus, that a Special Committee consisting of Messrs. Leslie, Rea and Johnston be appointed to determine the amount that should be spent by Pilkington as a pro rata contribution for road and bridge purposes in connection with a County Grant made last year for that purpose.

The Re-Distribution Bill.

(From the Elora "Observer.")
Sir John A. Macdonald says truly, that the population of each constituency cannot be made equal, and that it is not advisable to take townships from different Counties and unite them for Parliamentary purposes. The latter is true, and had there been no changes proposed in other constituencies we might have allowed that his scruples had some weight, that his Conservative principles prevented his doing justice to the larger constituencies from his dislike of change. We would have almost excused his not consolidating Cornwall with Stormont, having a joint population of 18,987; or of Niagara with Lincoln having a joint population of 21,365, and then equalizing the same into two ridings. But when we see him removing the Township of Dunn from Haldimand to Monck professedly because the latter had only 15,130 and the former 21,091; when we notice his professed anxiety to more nearly equalize the Wellingtons, even at the cost of disturbing all the political associations, we know of no reason, and can imagine none, for letting such glaring inequalities continue as those of Niagara, Cornwall, Brockville, Renfrew, unless it be to secure more fully the return of his friends and supporters at the expense of consistency, honesty and principle. His plea that South Wellington was too small with 11,317 besides Centre Wellington with 21,000 would hold good had he applied the same rule to the constituencies just mentioned; but why a large manufacturing town like Guelph should have crowded on to her so large a population while little Elora stands alone, whilst Cornwall town and township number fewer people than Guelph alone, and yet retain a representative, whilst Brockville and Elizabethtown with 10,475 is not disturbed, and whilst Renfrew with 27,474 has two representatives; why these inequalities should be allowed to continue and such anxiety should be shown in reference to Guelph and Wellington can only be accounted for on the ground that they were determined to preserve North Wellington for Mr. Drew, and the latter dared not trust his constituents to return him again after a five years' knowledge of him. The Premier professed that a desire to equalize the constituencies alone actuated, but for months there has been schemes afoot here amongst their followers whereby it was to secure a majority in the North Riding, the most notable one being the introduction of Wallace into it; and the Foreign Conservatives had their own scheme, but both plans have been mysteriously suppressed.
