Seek To Amend 8. P. C. A. Act

Humane Organization Asking the Legislature For Larger

Desired Amendment Will Permit of Prompt Assistance in Urgent Cases.

The Victoria branch of the British Columbia Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals, has forwarded the following to the city members of the legislature:

Dear Sir,—At the last annual meeting of this society it was proposed and carried unaximously:

That the members of the city of Victoria be desired to give their support to an amendment to this bill, which will be brought before the legislative assembly at the next session.

I have much pleasure in drawing your attention to this resolution, and to have this opportunity of thanking you for the last session of the legislative assembly.

How Surtax Will Be Applied

Circular Which Deals Fully With **Matter Received From** Ottawa.

Act in Force till Repealed --How Germany Is Affected.

Hon. A. R. Milne, C. M. G., is in receipt of a circular from the Department of Customs relating to the surtax on German goods, and resolutions for the amendment of the Canadian Customs Tariff in other particulars. Under the caption "Re Surtax," the circular says:

says:
"The Minister of Customs has decided that the goods of Germany are subject to surtax in Canada under the terms of the tariff resolutions.

"Observe also that the tariff resolutions contain the following proviso retions contain the following proviso regarding the surtax, viz.:

"Such surtax shall not apply to any goods actually purchased on or before the 16th day of April, 1903, by any corporation, firm or person in Canada for immediate transportation to Canada."

"Goods claiming exemption from surtax under the above proviso should be imported or taken out of warehouses and entered for duty on or before 30th June, 1903.


