Mining in Ontario. In Dr. Selwyn's report for the year 1883 of the work of the dominion geological survey, published in the blue book, containing the annual reports of the department of the interior, the following references are made to mines in this province:

My own work during the past summer, from July 2 to November 1, consisted in a further examination of the northern shore of Lake Superior from Port Arthur to the Province, including a visit to the State Islands, etc., also an examination of the Rabbit Mountain silver mine. The Jack Fish Lake, now called the Huronian mine, was also visited, and I have much to report on being able to see and consider the most promising mining venture I have yet seen in this region.

Some days ago I required to journey from Ottawa to Toronto, and started from the former place by the morning train on the Canadian Pacific railway. The accommodation from there to Brockville was first-class. The cars were well ventilated, well furnished and clean, the road bed first-class, the servants of the road civil and obliging to passengers; the train arrived sharp on time at Brockville where a change had to be made to the Grand Trunk. The train on that road was crowded, at least fifty, and was timed to leave Brockville at 2:05 p.m., and was numbered as No. 2 on the time bill. On a blackboard conspicuously exhibited on the station platform the said train was announced to be on time, and several of the Grand Trunk officials informed me in answer to enquiries that such was the fact had been known that time for dinner was possible many passengers would have taken advantage of the delay to visit the town for that purpose. They were however kept waiting on the platform in momentary expectation of the arrival of the train from the East till four o'clock, when it arrived, and I lengthened my crawl into the station every seat was occupied, and myself and many other passengers, at least fifty, had to stand all the way to Toronto where we arrived at 12:30 a.m., two hours late. Among the passengers were many ladies and children who were very tired and hungry. I was concerned I found standing room in a compartment of a second-class emigrant car, the door of which was labelled "smoking compartment." Had it been called a traveling pig pen it would not have been misnamed, and the other cars forming the train were equally poor, and I doubt if any other road on this continent would dare to ask even second-class passengers to occupy such packing cases on wheels.
