Editorial—A Staring Revelation.

We have before us the Annual Report of the Superintendent of Education, on the common and academic schools for the past year.

We would not have our readers infer that we complain, or have any reason to complain, of the results of the teaching, or of the ability of our teachers, though, if the quality of the education furnished by them should be measured by the paltry salaries paid them, we should expect a falling off in that particular, for there is no use denying the fact, they are, as a class, most wretchedly paid for their services.

We have been led to make these remarks from reading the minutes of a very short session which commenced at Annapolis a few weeks ago, on a Bill to remedy these injustices, introduced by Mr. Morrison, one of the members for Victoria—himself a teacher.

He urged upon the house the facts we have stated, and earnestly besought us to pass his Bill into a law. He said "there was not a class in this province so poorly paid as they were, our first class teachers seldom getting more than \$300 a year, a sum altogether inadequate to support a family.

The exodus question is really assuming great proportions. It is apparently too large to grapple with successfully. Warnings and lectures have no effect. Time and time again we have shown that wages in the United States are nothing like what they are represented to be, while the cost of living is very much higher than it is here.

There is no reason to doubt the accuracy of the statements above made; they are apparent from the statistics furnished by the school returns made by the trustees of the various sections; they are as authentic as they are exact, and make a very startling disclosure. No blame however attached to our school system, it provides education, and the teachers at fault, for they are ready to teach all who assemble in the school rooms; in fact, the blame rests entirely on the parents.

The grievance may be placed in a nutshell thus. School houses have been built, teachers employed for a full term, and parents send their children about half the term, on an average, deriving only half the benefits they would gain by punctual attendance, and that at no increased cost to themselves. From all sources Nova Scotia spends over \$500,000 for education yearly, and through the criminal neglect of parents, a large proportion of this sum is paid for no services whatever. Let the clergy make these facts a text for a lively sermon in every school session, and they will do a great public service, and above all let the press not be silent on this shameful waste and cruel neglect.

It was thought advisable by the legislature of old times, in order to manage education, to exempt teachers from certain duties and the performance of certain duties made incumbent upon others. Miscellaneous.

At the Department of Railways and Canals there were received yesterday several pieces of lumber from the docks both at Digby, N. S., and in New Brunswick, which were forwarded to the Department to show the destruction to the docks in those localities caused by the bore wind, the specimens being entirely perforated with holes.

Canadian publishers have begun an agitation for a Canadian Copyright. Mr. Charlton of the Dominion House has a bill in charge which we hope shall become law. It is a measure of redress in the view of 'dabbling' with the rights of others against virtue and domestic peace. Adultery is to be punished by a fine not exceeding \$1000, imprisonment and prison. Persons living together 'lewdly' are to be fined and imprisoned—fine \$300—imprisonment not exceeding one year. The penalty for deceiving any chaste female, or enticing her to a house of prostitution is the penalty for a term not exceeding three years or a fine not over \$5000. Power is given to search for any female so inveigled, and her delivery to her parents or guardian. A justly severe penalty is provided in case a teacher tampered with a pupil, reduction under the promise of marriage incurs the penalty for not more than three years and a fine not more than \$5000. If a married man should be guilty of this crime the penalty is largely increased. Legislation in this direction is certainly required. The present condition of the law is a disgraceful one. The vilest of the deepest dye may escape without anything like adequate legal punishment.

London, March 7.—In the House of Lords to-day bill introduced by the Earl of Rosebery, excluding aliens from both Houses of Parliament, was read for the first time.

Washington Letter. From our Regular Correspondent. RESOLUTION BY LOBBY, MASSIVE RAILROAD CONVENTION. WASHINGTON, D. C., March 17, 1882.

This Congress was evidently not prepared to tinker the tariff or reform the revenue laws, and if the reform was anything done in this line they will have to elect a Congress, two years hence, pledged to do the work, and what is important, make that Congress keep its pledge. This is not easy to do, for the moment Congress comes to Washington, it no longer inherits the name of the district, but sticks the rich history of the Capital. This is a metaphor, but it means that a representative is no longer entirely under the influence of his constituency or the sentiment that elected him, but under the influence of the lobby.

In order to remove the false impression arising through failure to recover unpaid money and estates in England, viz., that the English Government and Bank of England refuse to give information in relation to estates, and also that if once these estates are transferred to the National Debt Commissioners they cannot be recovered, Mr. Henry W. Walker, of New York, furnishes the following letter from the Bank of England authorities:

Bank of England, London, E. C., December 31, 1881. In reply of your letter of the 13th inst., I beg to inform you that an amount of fourteen millions of pounds, formerly standing in the name of Richard Acland Harrison, was transferred to the National Debt Commissioners in 1821, in consequence of the dividends (two pence each) having remained unpaid for ten years. This small sum can be restored only on the application of the present legal personal representative after indication of the account I may add that nothing can be traced in the other names you mention.
