

It con-sists of a running board placed on each ear, so adapted as to closely approach a similar hoard on an opposing car, thereby affording safe passage from one to another. The board, at each end of the car, has pro-jecting extremities wider than the body portion, to afford an easy and safe footing, these ends being stayed or strengthened by


