### WOMAN'S AUXILIARY.

St. George's Branch of the Auxiliary had their annual meeting on Monday, 30th March. Mrs. Wyatt, the President, took the chair at 3 o'clock. After prayers by the Rector, Miss Boulton read the 17th annual report as follows :

This branch was organized in 1885 and was one of the first in the diocese of Toronto. We are happy in being able to count among us today two or three of the original members. This year's work has been very pleasant and encouraging. Several new members have been added; the weekly work meetings have been well attended; the finances show a good balance on the right side after the payment of all pledges. The only new feature in our work has been the , Joption of Miss Tilley's suggestion made at our last annual meeting of distributing mite-boxes among the members in which each was asked to put, at least, one cent a week. From 50 boxes taken, over \$33 has been sent in, another proof of the value of united, systematic effort in small matters. The membership is 101 against 112 last year, but several have left Toronto, and death has removed a member of many years' standing, Mrs. A. M. Browne.

Mrs. Gosling, a former Vice-President of our branch, having undertaken other work in the parish, has been much missed at the weekly meetings which she attended regularly for many years.

Twenty-four meetings have been held since the annual meeting of last year, the average attendance being 17. As a result, the usual bales have been sent, two to the Gordon Indian School in the diocese of Qu'Arpelle, and both the Christmas bales this year went to mission stations in our own diocese, at Young's Point and Hall's Bridge.

Contributions of material and clothing and gifts for the Christmas parcels were gratefully received by the officers, and two members, Mrs. Harrison and Miss Acton, each sent many articles of their own work.

The Corresponding Secretary having been obliged to resign, Miss Cayley kindly undertook her duties, on the request of other officers. The Branch was entertained at tea at the Rectory early in the autumn, and at all other meetings tea has been served by the two members, Mrs. Moore and Mrs. Bancks Baines, who have kindly undertaken this treat for the last three seasons. The Rector has asked the Branch to join in the new scheme of collections for Missions and all money given through the Auxiliary will help to make up the annual sum of \$1,200, promised by St. George's Parish to the Mission Fund, etc.

The annual meeting of the W.A. of this diocese will be held in St. James' Schoolhouse on April 21-23. Anyone willing to entertain country delegates is asked to notify Mrs. Baines, 211 Beverley St.

Last December a large bale, consisting of clothing for boys and girls was sent to the Rev. H. T. Bourne, Missionary at Essonville, who returned his most grateful thanks for the help given to his Mission. Besides, 72 presents were sent for a Christmas tree.

In November the Guild spent a very pleasant evening in the school-room entertaining their friends—among whom were many members of the W.A.—with music, recitations, and refreshments.

The members of the Guild have in contemplation a treat for the Sunday scholars. It is our old friend Bo-Peep- who, it is hoped, will appear soon after Easter. A special invitation to be present is extended to the members of the Auxiliary.
