PARISH NOTES.

The services during Lent have been, on the whole, well attended. The addresses of Mr. Kenrick on "Aspects of the Holy Eucharist," and Mr. Seager on "God's Dealings with His People" have been listened to with marked attention and undiminished interest throughout. Now that these two series of addresses are finished, it is time to say that their hearers are very thankful for the help and instruction afforded, and for the kind trouble of the preachers on their behalf.

The fruit of Lenten prayers and instruction will be manifested in a devout use of Holy Week and in crowded altars on Easter Day—and, not least, in our Easter offerings.

During Holy Week morning service will be at 10 o'clock, and evening service, with short address, at 8 o'clock each night.

Holy Communion on Tuesday at 7.30 a. m., and on Maundy-Thurs day at 8 a. m. and 12.0.

On Good Friday morning service at 11. Litany with meditation on the Passion at 2 p. m.; evening service at 8 o'clock.

Holy Saturday, Matins and Ante-Communion, 10 a. m.

Parishioners are reminded of the Easter Vestry meeting on Monday, 13th inst., at 8 p. m. It ought to be a great meeting of all who are interested in the welfare of their parish church.

Mr. Weller reports that a good many pew-rents have been paid during the last two weeks, as well as arrears of offertory. He hopes to be able to report at the Easter Vestry, "All church dues paid in full."

WOMAN'S AUXILIARY.

St. George's Branch of the Auxiliary had their annual meeting on Monday, 30th March. Mrs. Wyatt, the President, took the chair at 3 o'clock. After prayers by the Rector, Miss Boulton read the 17th annual report as follows:

This branch was organized in 1885 and was one of the first in the diocese of Toronto. We are happy in being able to count among us today two or three of the original members. This year's work has been very pleasant and encouraging. Several new members have been added; the weekly work meetings have been well attended; the finances show a good balance on the right side after the payment of all pledges. The only new feature in our work has been the adoption of Miss Tilley's suggestion made at our last annual meeting of distributing mite-boxes among the members in which each was asked to put, at least, one cent a week. From 50 boxes taken, over \$33 has been sent in, another proof of the value of united, systematic effort in small matters. The membership is 101 against 112 last year, but several have left Toronto, and death has removed a member of many years' standing, Mrs. A. M. Browne.

Mrs. Gosling, a former Vice-President of our branch, having undertaken other work in the parish, has been much missed at the weekly meetings which she attended regularly for many years.

Twenty-four meetings have been held since the annual meeting of last year, the average attendance being 17. As a result, the usual bales have been sent, two to the Gordon Indian School in the diocese of Qu'Appelle, and both the Christmas bales this year went to mission stations in our own diocese, at Young's Point and Hall's Bridge.

Contributions of material and clothing and gifts for the Christmas parcels were gratefully received by the officers, and two members, Mrs. Harrison and Miss Acton, each sent many articles of their own work.

The Corresponding Secretary having been obliged to resign, Miss Cayley kindly undertook her duties, on the request of other officers. The Branch was entertained at tea at the Rectory early in the autumn, and at all other meetings tea has been served by the two members, Mrs. Moore and Mrs. Bancks Baines, who have kindly undertaken this treat for the last three seasons.

The Rector has asked the Branch to join in the new scheme of collections for Missions and all money given through the Auxiliary will help to make up the annual sum of \$1,200, promised by St. George's Parish to the Mission Fund, etc.

The annual meeting of the W.A. of this diocese will be held in St. James' Schoolhouse on April 21-23. Anyone willing to entertain country delegates is asked to notify Mrs. Baines, 211 Beverley St.

LOUIS S. McMURRAY.

Mrs. McMurray then added the following statement to her report:

The balance this year is larger than usual, owing principally to the liberal amount, \$33.45, collected in the Emergency Fund boxes. This fund is intended to cover any unusual expenses, without calling upon the members for contributions. The first call upon the fund was for a cross of flowers for our late beloved President, Mrs. Williamson.

This Branch has invited the W.A. Board, consisting of about 250 members, to hold their meeting in St. George's Schoolhouse in October next. The expenses of the luncheon which our Branch will provide will be taken from the Emergency Fund.

I wish to thank Mrs. Hamilton Moore for her valuable assistance in receiving the members' fees at the Weekly Sewing Meeting.

ST. AGATHA'S GUILD.

Miss Winsor read the report of the Guild as follows:—St. Agatha's Guild now consists of two branches, one meeting on Monday evenings at 8 o'clock, the other on Thursday morning at 10 o'clock, each member paying a fee of one cent. per week. These fees go to create a little fund for the purchase of material for work—which is augmented during the summer months by the members taking money boxes.

Last December a large bale, consisting of clothing for boys and girls was sent to the Rev. H. T. Bourne, Missionary at Essonville, who returned his most grateful thanks for the help given to his Mission. Besides, 72 presents were sent for a Christmas tree.

In November the Guild spent a very pleasant evening in the school-room entertaining their friends—among whom were many members of the W.A.—with music, recitations, and refreshments.

The members of the Guild have in contemplation a treat for the Sunday scholars. It is our old friend Bo-Peep—who, it is hoped, will appear soon after Easter. A special invitation to be present is extended to the members of the Auxiliary.

The annual meeting of the Guild was held on Monday, the 23rd March, when the following officers were elected:—

President, Miss Cayley; Vice-President, Miss Ella Winsor; Dorcas Manager, Miss Dye; Recording Secretary, Miss How; Corresponding Secretary, Miss Cable; Treasurer, Miss Lowe.

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
