



CANADIAN DAIRY EXPORTS.

Recent reports issued by the departtain complaints regarding the quality of Canadian shipments to Britain and defective packing. A Wolverhampton firm intimates that they had not imported any Canadian butter during 1911 because the last shipment they received was very badly packed. The kegs were not over clean and the color of the wood was of a dark character, which gave the butter a bad appearance. They suggest that if it were possible for Canadian packers to procure a similar wood to that used by the Danish, Swedish and Finnish dairies It would be a vast improvement on Canadian methods and would considerably stimulate business relationships between the Dominion and the mother

country in this commedity. mark, according to this authority, is now setting the standard for butter imports. Owing to its high ish butter is regarded by the British public as perfection in quality and the class dairy product. Canadian dairies. it is suggested, might, with benefit to nselves, copy the continental packing for butter as regards size, shape and color of wood. Another large Birmingham importer complains of the unsatisfactory manner of marking the weights on Canadian boxes of cheese. and what is more serious, objects that the marking is sometimes heavier than the actual contents. It is only fair to say, however, that other firms express satisfaction, particularly as regards cheese shipments.





BOSTON. Feb. 22—(Staff Correspondence).—Boston has also placed her aurels on the head of Dr. Vogt and entrined the Mendelssehn Chotr on the oll of those whom the City of Culture lelights to honor. There was certainly to coldness in the magnificent audience which filled the Symphony Hall to-night. All seats were gone two days ago, and printed sign at the big office window onlight announced. Oxygen from the air not being necessary for decomposition, water and ordinary chemical extinguishers have little effect on celluloid fires. Decomposition takes place at temperatures between 220 decrees and 365 degrees F., and may be started by an open fiame, or even a hot stove.

When slowly heated the celluloid first softens, then blisters and finally decomposes suddenly, sometimes bursting into fiame. The products are gases, liquide and carbon.

The white fumes from combustion form an explosive mixture with air, and the colorless gases contain poisonous carbon monoxide and nitrogen oxides. As these gases, explosive and irrespirable, are intensely hot, moreover, it is almost impossible for firemen to get near a celluloid blaze in a building.



### Wall Street Awaits Result **Odd Amount** Of British Labor Difficulty

Stock Market Moves in Narrow Range and Records No Material Change-Sentiment Is Variable,

NEW YORK, Feb. 29.-Irregularity and dulness were again the dominant features of the stock market to-day until well into the afternoon, when prices of the speculative favorités moyed upward decisively under the lead of Amalgamated Copper, which reached a new high level for the present movement. Such changes as occurred, however, were largley technical, being doubtless based on the sold-out condition of the market, which induced further covering of short contracts.


