In Armitage v. Day, the defendant's apneal from a Divisional Court was allowed with costs, and in doing so the court re marked upon the impropriety of putting in depositions at a trial without reading them tended to be relied upon and giving oppor-tunity for explanation.

In Armstrong v. Lye, the defendant's ap-peal from a Divisional Court was allowed in part, without costs, and defendant Lye was declared not personally liable.

In Ostrom v. Silis, the defendant's ap-peal from a Divisional Court was allowed with costs.

In Ostrom v. Sills, the defendant's appeal from a Divisional Court was allowed with costs.
In re Ruby, Trusts Corporation v. Ruby, the appeal of the assignee for the benefit of creditors, allowed with costs, and the report of the Master-in-Ordinary restored.
In Armstrong v. Trusts Corporation of Ontario, it will be remembered that the plaintiff, who is Clerk of the Peace of the County of Grey, after his marriage some years ago, placed all his property in his wife's name, thinking, as he alleged, that she could take care of it for him. She died intestate and without issue, and he brought this action to have it declared that her assets were his, and should not be divided between him and her next of kin. The Trusts Corporation of Ontario are administrators of the deceased wife's estate. The trial judge found against the plaintiff, and he appealed and his appeal was dismissed with costs.
