The report of the Foreign Relations Committee was yesterday laid before United States Senate. Mr. Turner accused President McKinley of delaring the presentation of his message to Congress to further the Pope's to bring about a peaceful solution of the situation. The President waiting, he said, to secure from the Pope's action what American diplomacy had failed to obtain. Mr. Turner declared himself in favor of recognizing the independence of the insurgent Government of Cuba.

The testimony taken before the Senate committe on Foreign Relations in connection with the investigation into the relations between the United States and 'Cuba/ was made public yesterday. It contains a statement made by General Lee, attesting that he was informed on very good authority that the Spaniards had placed two rows of torpedoes at the mouth of the Havana Harbor subsequent to the Maine disaster. The electrical switchoperating the torpedoes was placed in Morro Castle. General Lee had had no information of the placing of any torpedoes before the Maine was destroyed, and none in regard to the purchase abroad by the Spanish authorities. He stated it as his belief that the Maine was wrecked by an external explosion, and the mine must have been fired by some Spanish officer who understood the submarine batteries in Havana Harbor. He did not think General Blanco had anything to do with it, General Blanco had expressed genuine sorrow on hearing of the disaster.

The War and Navy Departments are making every preparation in case of war. Everything is in readiness for a mobilization of troops at Chickamauga Park. 





The last report of the Commissioner of Patents furnishes an excellent comparative statement showing the number of patents assued by the United States and foreign Governments from the earliest periods of this work to Dec. 31, 1897. In this, the total foreign product (from 53 countries) amounts to 1,122,724 patents, while the United States alone has 606,423, more than one-half of all the balance of the world's inventive product.

Of the foreign patents, France leads with 280,681; Great Britain has 252,990 to her credit, and Belgium with 139,742 and Germany with 113,254 come next in order of patent importance. The smallest issues were in Siberia and the Bahamas, each having 2 and in St. Helena 4.

It is stated that the number of applications for patents received during the year 1897 was the largest in the history of the office, and that there is a steady increase in this branch of the work.




