Tells Where Canada Would Be To-Day If Sir Richard's Views Had Been Carried Out—The Preferential Tariff Discussed.

Ottawa, March 27.—(Special.)—Before a magnanimous audience, both in the benches and in the galleries, Mr. Foster to-day delivered a masterly reply to the budget speech given by Mr. Fielding on Friday last.

He began by criticizing Mr. Fielding's speech as a poor and simple collection of bare statistics, presenting a confused and inconclusive picture of the financial condition of the country.

What Fielding's Speech Was. It was a glorification of generous expenditures and revenues, and an avoidance of the contrast between the government's promises and performance.

Some Pertinent Questions. The budget had failed to give information as to whether the immigrants had come in Canada in 1899 were actually settlers or not.

Conservatives Not Extravagant. He denied that the Conservatives had been extravagant, and in proof of his contention he cited the fact that the total head in 1898 was \$8,174, in 1897 \$8,228, in 1896 \$8,100, and in 1895 \$8,000.

HANSBROUGH WANTS TO OUST THEM

Proposes an Amendment Which Would Keep Out Aliens of Any and Every Nationality.

Washington, March 27.—The Alaskan Civil Code bill was under consideration during a greater part of the Senate session.

Mr. Hansbrough proposed the following amendment as a substitute for section 73 of the Alaskan bill:

"Aliens shall not be permitted to locate, hold or convey mining claims in said district of Alaska, nor shall any title to a mining claim acquired by location or purchase thru an alien be legal.

In any civil action, suit or proceeding to recover the possession of a mining claim or for the appointment of a receiver or for an injunction to restrain the working and operation of a mining claim, it shall be the duty of the court to inquire into and determine the question of the citizenship of the locator.

Laplenders Had an Eye to Business. In explanation of his amendment, Mr. Hansbrough said that in the Cape Nome district many mining claims had been located by aliens.

The expedition had been sent to relieve some whalers who were supposed to be suffering from the influenza epidemic.

Mr. Stewart opposed the amendment.

Mr. Carter, in charge of the bill, supported the amendment.



Correspondence in the Matter Between Lord Salisbury and Ambassador Choate.

FREE TRADE FOR EVERY NATION

Is the Policy Which the United States Asks Other Powers to Join in Securing.

Washington, March 27.—Secretary Hay submitted to Congress the correspondence had with the governments of other nations regarding the maintenance of an "open door" in China.

The nations addressed in this subject by the United States were Great Britain, Germany, Russia, Italy and Japan.

On Sept. 6 the State Department addressed to the American Ambassadors in London, Berlin and St. Petersburg copies of a "formal declaration," setting out the details of the American Government in the matter of the "open door."

The nations addressed to the matter of the "open door" and Italy and Japan were similarly addressed about a month later.

What Mr. Choate Sent. The form of conveyance chosen by Ambassador Choate in a note to the British Government was as follows:

My Lord, I am instructed by the Secretary of State to present to Your Lordship a matter which the President regards as of great and equal importance to Great Britain and the United States.
