asking the reason for the many departures from the beaten path of Liberalism. He asked his questions as a friend would ask a friend. When it was all over, as he had before beginning his charge, he shook the Premier's hand and still remained his friend, but one who would rather do him good than please him. His Fidus Achates he would be. It was not his intent to play Brutus to the Premier's Caesar. But that is how it has worked out. And when the innocent old man becomes selzed with that situation there may be a direful mental tragedy enacted that will cloud the few remaining years of the sturdy man's life.

The new Liberals, as opposed to the old, are disposed to put Mr. Findiay's attack down to playe, but Premier Ross gave the lie to that suggestion by replying at length to the charges made. He showed the respect he bore his friend, and at the same time admitted that he considered the accuser and the accusation worthy of notice. But where does the matter of pique come in? This is the story that is told: In 1890 the Shrievalty of Renfrew fell vacant, and James Findlay, ex-M.P., having in mind the work he had done for the party, applied for the position. He wrote to the Hon. G. W. Ross, his old friend, asking for the appointment. Mr. Ross replied that the patronage of the riding was in the hands of Thomes Murray, M.L.A., and that he (Mr. Ross) could do nothing in the matter. Mr. Murray did not favor Mr. Findlay, and the latter did not get the appointment. Now, say the Liberals, Findlay's opposition to the Liberal party dates from that time. Since 1890 he has criticized the government harshly and has instituted inquiries into the audits of the township and the county councils. The charge made against him is that in all his efforts to effect reform he was but feeding fat the grudge he bore the provincial government for being turned down. This charge does not square with the character of the man. nor with the reputation he has made on the fields of political battle: It is not honest to besmirc

The worst that can be said of him truthfully is that he is honest in his protest against the government.

Entitled to Nothing.

But the would-be detractors of James Findlay further say that he was entitled to nothing from the Ontario government, and that his claim was only on the federal government. To this accusation a prominent Liberal, who respects Mr. Findlay highly, said to The World: "James Findlay for years fought losing fights in Renfrew for the House of Commons, and made the way clear for the election of a Liberal to the Ontario legislature. I attribute the ease with which Tom Murray held this riding for years for the Liberals of Ontario to the work done by Mr. Findlay in his federal campaigns." By such reason, Mr. Findlay would be creditor of the Ontario government.

There is more than a suggestion, if it be granted that pique is the motive for Mr. Findlay's conduct, that he is the victim of base ingratitude at the hands of both federal and provincial governments. 

# No Absolute Cure Yet, But Several

Cases Are Making Promising

RADIUM AS CANCER CURE

London, Dec. 13 .- Some of the more sational papers here reported during ne week that several patients at Charg Cross Hospital had been cured of cer by the use of radium. The acts are that continuous experiments n this direction are being carried on. and that several cases are making promising progress, but no absolute cure has yet been effected. Hopes are entertained that one female patient suffering from rhodent ulcer has been so much benefited that complete recovery will follow. Eleven cases are under treatment at the cancer hospital in

Too Early to Predict. Radium has effected changes in surface cancers, but specialists who have cases in hand say it is too early yet to give an opinion as to ultimate results, Medical men strongly deprecate premature announcements of cures, owing to the false hopes thus aroused. Much importance has been attached to a lecture delivered by Henry Morris, F.K.C.S., at the Royal College of Surgeons Wednesday.

Mr. Morris is the chairman of the Cancer Investigation Committee of

Mr. Morris is the chairman of the Cancer Investigation Committee of Middlesex Hospital and an acknowledged authority on the subject. In his lecture, which was entitled "Cancer and Its Origin," Mr. Morris asserted that during the last ten or fifteen years cancer research had been too exclusively directed to microbes and too little to cancer agencies, which were invariably unconditional. The cause of cancer had not yet been properly investigated.

He compared the arguments for the germ theory as against the microbe theory. The former, he said, was more consistent than any other which had been advocated to account for the cause of cancer. It was in reality the only hypothesis in accordance with known facts. Up to the present time the microbe theory had not advanced knowledge one lota.

Mr. Morris concluded with the significant statement that tumor germs had convinced those engaged in the research of the local origin of cancer and of its comparative curability when the disease was removed early and completely.


