

Kuroki Reports Details of Heavy Fight on July 31 on Liaoyang Road.

Gen. Kuroki's headquarters in the field, near Towan, Aug. 1.—(Delayed in transmission.)—Yesterday's battle consisted of a double attack for the purpose of driving the Russians from their strong defences commanding the Yangse Pass on the Liaoyang road, thru the first range of hills beyond Motien Pass, and also to drive them from Yushu Pass on the road to Mukden, The operations extended over a front of fifty miles in length. Both attacks were successful in respect to carrying local points, but the Japanese plans were not fulfilled for the reason that they contemplated partly surrounding the enemy, capturing many and possibly capturing the batteries. 




