Report of Annual Meeting

The Annual Meeting of the McNab Street Presbyterian Church Congregation was held in the Sabbath School, on Wednesday evening, 17th January, 1900, at 8 o'clock, having been duly summoned from the pulpit.

The meeting was opened with devotional exercises conducted by the Pastor, who thereupon requested that a Chairman should be appointed, and vacated the chair.

Mr. Alexander Turner was, on motion of Mr. D. McPhie, seconded by Mr. W. H. Wardrope, elected Chairman; and Mr. Jas. Chisholm was appointed Secretary of the meeting.

The minutes of the last regular meeting were on motion duly carried, taken as read and confirmed.

Mr. J. G. McIlwraith, Session Clerk, presented the report of the Session, and moved, seconded by Rev. James Black, its adoption.—Carried.

The Chairman, on behalf of the Board of Trustees, presented their report concerning the arbitration proceedings instituted by them against the T. H. & B. Railway Co., and the report was, on motion duly made and seconded, received and adopted.

Mr. D. McPhie, Chairman of the Board of Managers, presented the report of the Board and moved, seconded by Mr. C. W. Graham, its adoption.—Carried.

Mr. Jas. Chisholm, the Treasurer, presented his report and moved, seconded by Mr. A. Ballentine, its adoption.—Carried.

Mr. A. W. Leitch, Superintendent of the Sunday School, presented his report and moved, seconded by Mr. W. Symington, its adoption.—Carried.

Mr. W. T. Miller, Treasurer of the Sabbath School, presented his report of the S. S. finances, and moved, seconded by Mr. Geo. H. Milne, its adoption.—Carried.

Mr. Storey presented the report of the Y. P. S. C. E., which was on his motion, duly seconded, received and adopted.

Mrs. McQuesten reported verbally for the Auxiliary of the W. F. M. S., the written report to be handed in to the Secretary; and Mrs. C. W. Graham reported verbally for the Ladies' Aid Society. Both Societies reported prosperous years and the reports were received with applause.

Miss Mary Cook presented the report of the Mission Band, which was, on motion duly made and seconded, adopted.

Rev. Dr. Fletcher reported verbally as to the Mission Schemes of the Church and the 20th Century Fund. The total contributions to the Mission Schemes were \$574, and with the sums collected by the W. F. M. S. and other organizations, amounted to over \$1,300 for the year.

The total subscriptions to date to the Century Fund were \$2,970, of which \$1,000 had already been paid in and no canvassing for the Fund had as yet been done.

Mr. E. Skedden, Choir Master, presented his report, which was, on motion duly made and seconded, received and adopted. Mr. Skedden pointed out certain improvements in connection with the accommodation for the Choir and Organist which he would like to see made and suggested to the Congregation ways and means of encouragement to the Choir.

The retiring Managers, viz.: Messrs. D. McPhie, Jas. Strous and Jas. Chisholm, were re-elected for another term.

On motion of Mr. D. McPhie, seconded by Mr. C. S. Murray, Mr. Adam H. Hope was elected a Trustee of the Church and Manse properties, to fill the vacancy created by the death of Mr. Alexander Davidson.

Moved by Mr. Alex. Leith, seconded by Mr. C. S. Murray, and resolved, that the following be elected Ushers for the year 1900: — From the Board of Managers—Messrs. Sutherland, Ballentine, Chisholm, Hossack, Murray, Graham, Symington and Leith; From the Congregation—Messrs. J. N. McDougall, Stewart T. McPhie, W. Ainslie, W. T. Miller, J. Y. Taylor, W. P. Graham, Wm. James and Reginald Glassco.

Messrs. R. A. Robertson and R. A. Ptolemy were duly elected Auditors for the ensuing year.

On motion duly made and seconded the Missionary Committee was re-appointed.

Votes of thanks were then passed and tendered to the Missionary Association and Collectors; the Organist, Leader and Choir; the officers and teachers of the Sabbath School, and the officers of the various organizations connected with the Church. A special vote of thanks was, on motion of Mr. Geo. H. Milne, seconded by Mr. D. McPhie,, passed in favor of and tendered by the Chairman to Mr. Jas. Chisholm for his services to the Congregation as Solicitor for the Church in the litigation with the T. H. & B. Ry., which Mr. Chisholm suitably acknowledged.

After the reporters for the city newspapers had been thanked for their attendance, the chair was vacated by Mr. Turner on motion of Mr. A. Sutherland, and taken by Rev. James Black. Mr. Sutherland then moved, seconded by Mr. J. M. Dingwall, that the thanks of the Congregation be tendered to Mr. Turner for his conduct in the chair. The vote was passed unanimously and tendered to Mr. Turner by Rev. Mr. Black, to which Mr. Turner replied in appropriate terms.

The meeting was then closed and the benediction pronounced.

Report of Session

The Session in presenting their Annual Report desire to express unfeigned gratitude to God for His continued goodness to the Congregation, and for all the tokens of Divine favor which the various organizations, connected with the Church, enjoyed during the year. The services of the Sanctuary on the Lord's day were carried on without interruption during the year. The Session desire to impress affectionately on the members and adherents of the Congregation the duty and benefit of waiting upon God regularly in the appointed services of the Sanctuary, and also of attendance at the weekly congregational Prayer Meeting; and would remind them also of the obligation to keep sacred the Lord's day by carefully abstaining from all unnecessary labor, and by devoting the day to the gracious purposes for which it was designed.

The Session, feeling deeply interested in the religious instruction of the young, would commend the Sabbath School to the warm sympathy and support of the members and adherents of the Congregation. They express thankfulness to God for the earnest and efficient labors of the teachers, and would urge the members of the Church, especially parents, to encourage these teachers by their sympathy and by taking a more practical interest in the work of the school.

The Society of Christian Endeavour held regularly a weekly meeting which was well attended. We believe that this meeting for prayer and study of God's word has been promotive of spiritual good among the young.

The plan of study prepared by the General Assembly's Committee was faithfully carried out.

The needs and claims of the Mission work of the Church, especially that of the ever expanding work in the great North-west are increasingly urgent. While some of the members are faithfully and generously contributing towards this work, it is a matter of regret that a considerable number fail to do so.

The Session commend the Century Thanksgiving Fund to the sympathy and liberal support of all connected with the Congregation. We believe that this scheme which the General Assembly has so heartily undertaken, is not only a fitting expression of gratitude to God who has so abundantly blessed us, but will largely meet the pressing needs of the Lord's word, and will revive and strengthen our faith in the great head of the Church, and thus lead us prayerfully to expect a great spiritual awakening and a mighty "forward movement" in all good works.

There were 15 meetings of Session held during the year.

The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper was dispensed 4 times.

The following members were removed by death:-

WALTER R. MACDONALD. ALEXANDER DAVIDSON. JAMES M. VINCENT. MRS. LEITCH. ROBERT CHISHOLM. WILLIAM FAIRLEY.

The death of these beloved friends is a solemn call to all to be ready, "for we know neither the day nor the hour when the Son of Man cometh." It is a call to earnestness and devotion in the Master's service, "while it is day for the night cometh, when no man can work."

The Session after due consideration of the needs of the Congregation, and of the fact that several of the brethren now in the eldership are advanced in life, beg to intimate that steps will be taken, in the near future, to make an addition to the eldership.

There were 29 names added to the Communion Roll during the year; removed by certificate 22, and by death 6. There were 9 baptisms. With thankfulness to God for all past mercies, the Session would impress on themselves, and upon all connected with the Congregation the duty of labouring by prayer and work to secure the promised blessing.

Trustees' Report

The Board of Trustees of the Church and Manse properties of McNab Street Presbyterian Church, beg to report as follows:

In accordance with the instructions of the Congregation your Board instituted arbitration proceedings to compel payment by the T. H. & B. Railway of the damage caused by the Railway to the Church property in consequence of the building of the Railway upon Hunter Street. The proceedings proved very tedious and expensive, and it was only on the 5th December last that we were informed by the Church Solicitors that the matter had been definitely settled. At a meeting of the Trustees held on that day at the office of Mr. Chisholm, a statement of receipts and disbursements in connection with the arbitration was submitted. From this statement, a copy of which is hereto annexed, it appears that out of the \$1000 damages eventually secured by the Church as the fruits of the arbitration, the net amount coming to the Trustees after repaying to the Church Treasurer all interest paid by him on moneys provided for taking up the first award and the disbursements of the Church Solicitors not recovered from the Railway Company is \$693.57.

The Trustees, while thankful that the Congregation have escaped the very heavy costs entailed by the arbitration, were unanimous in condemning the costly and tedious procedure provided for ascertaining damages in such cases, the manifestly unjust and harsh construction placed upon the law bearing on such cases as viewed from the property owners' standpoint, and lastly the vexatious conduct of the Railway Company in indulging in numerous, unnecessary and futile appeals, resulting only in delay and expense to both parties.

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Your Board desires to heartily thank those members of the congregation and others who voluntarily gave evidence in the arbitration on behalf of the Church, and in many ways assisted the Church in its fight against the Railway Company.

The Church Treasurer was instructed to refund all interest paid by him to the Bank of Hamilton upon the moneys borrowed to pay the arbitrators' fees and take up the first award, and out of the balance, namely—\$693.57, to repay such amount as the mortgagee of the Sabbath School may be willing to accept upon her mortgage, and to deposit the balance in a special account bearing interest.

In accordance with these instructions the Treasurer has repaid upon the Sabbath School mortgage the sum of \$250, and deposited the remainder, namely—\$443.57, in the Bank at 3% interest.

Managers' Report

The Board of Management begs to present the Forty-fifth Annual Report of the temporal affairs of the Congregation.

Your Board notices with pleasure that the weekly collections are about \$200.00 in excess of those of 1898, and greater than they have been any year since 1895. A special collection was taken up in December to prevent any possibility of a deficit, and the amount received in response to the call was \$142.20. For the first time in many years your Board has not been called on to make special efforts to meet their obligations. This is no doubt attributable to the marked revival of trade, and the general prosperity of the community after a season of prolonged depression.

Your Board further congratulates the Congregation on the final successful termination of the lengthy litigation with the T. H. & B. Railway, extending over a period of four and one-half years. While the net result in dollars and cents is small, and not worth the struggle it cost to secure it and the risk involved of having to pay heavy costs, we feel satisfied that the attempt to secure reasonable compensation from the Railway Company has been made, and we feel warranted in condemning unstintedly the costliness of the procedure by arbitration provided by the Railway Act, and the one-sidedness of the law applicable to such cases, which practically confiscates private property abutting on a street over which a railway gets right of way. But, under the existing law, individuals are made to suffer. Is it not reasonable to ask that the law be so changed as to secure justice to even the humblest citizen whose property is either taken or injured in the construction of works needed to further the public interest?

A report will be submitted showing the net amount received from the arbitration to be \$693.57, out of which \$250 has been repaid on the S. S. mortgage and \$443.57 is deposited in the bank bearing interest.

Your Board confidently anticipates that the Congregation will be able to pay off the S. S. mortgage by 1st March next, and the Manse mortgage by 1st June, 1901, the date fixed for the closing of the century fund. The start made in connection with this fund in our Congregation is very encouraging and justifies the sanguine expectations of the members of the Board.

The retiring managers are Messrs. Strous, McPhie and Chisholm, who are eligible for re-election.

You are also asked to appoint a new Trustee of the Church and Manse properties to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Alexander Davidson.

LADIES' AID SOCIETY TREASURER'S REPORT

REPORT OF THE

Auxiliary Women's Foreign Missionary Society

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We have just completed the 13th year of the McNab Street Church Auxiliary to the W. F. M. S., and in presenting the Annual Report we are sorry not to be able to claim an increase of membership over previous years. In 1887 this Auxiliary was inaugurated with a membership of 49, and an average attendance of 19, while the total offerings during the year amounted to \$202. In the past year the membership was 38, the average attendance 22, and the total offerings \$185.50.

It is with some regret, therefore, we find that after 13 years work we are not able to report more progress; still we feel we have much to be thankful for, and that any discouragements we may meet with will only call for more earnest prayer, and greater zeal and faithfulness.

During the 13 years we have contributed in all \$2,600 to the work. REPORT OF THE

Young People's Society of Christian Endeavor

In presenting this our annual report we would express our gratitude to our Heavenly Father for His guidance and help throughout the year. Early in the year we were saddened by the loss of one of our members, Miss Jury, who was called home on January 2nd. The thought of her life—patient and helpful even in the midst of suffering—has spurred us on to greater efforts in the Master's cause. "She being dead, yet speaketh."

We were pleased to receive eight new members into the Society during the year. We have now forty active members and fifteen associate members.

Our prayer meetings have been well attended and very helpful to us all. We conducted four prayer meetings at the Bethel Mission, and on the evening of January 2nd the Society entertained the men at the Mission.

The North-west Missions have interested us greatly throughout the year, and after hearing the powerful appeals of Dr. Robertson, Rev. Mr. Gandier and Rev. Mr. McQueen, last June, we decided to make a special effort to help in the North-west work. We have now \$41.00 to send to Dr. Robertson and hope to increase the amount next year.

We have spent \$5.80 in helping poor families in this city. Some of these we have helped with fuel, provisions and clothing, while for others we have obtained work instead. Nine well-filled "comfort bags" were sent to Mr. Bone for the sailors on the Welland Canal, and at Christmas time we sent cheer to several families in the city.

The work of collecting and distributing books and papers has been continued; 1,326 religious papers and magazines and 45 books have been sent to various lumber camps and Sunday Schools in Barrie Presbytery. The Sunday School of Stoke's Bay, Bruce County, received copies of the Children's Record for six months, and two copies of the "Ram's Horn" reached Mr. Bone weekly, for distribution among the canal men. A religious paper was also placed in one of the city hotels, and Sunday School and Christmas cards were sent to Mrs. Morton, one of our Trinidad missionaries.

We have all enjoyed the work of carrying flowers to the sick in the Congregation, and have received many grateful acknowledgments from them.
