



Arguments for and Against an Advance in Stock Prices---Is the Outside Public Buying, and If So, Why Are Prices Not

stocks advance? One reason may be, that owners of capital believe higher rates on open market loans to be presently in store. Other investors possibly mistrust the permanency of the particularly high dividends on which this apparent advantage of stock investments is based. A third possibility is, that stocks are discredited by the fiasco of last autumn's "boom," and that the investing public is on general principles afraid of them.

When all this is admitted, however, the familiar question recurs, What is the investing public doing with its surplus money? Even people who persist in the theory that trade reaction is in sight for a later month of 1907, concede that the business community, as a whole, is making more money now than it ever made before. To people who apply the bargaining instinct, in their purchase of investment securities, as they would apply it in buying a bouse or a team of horses or a stock of dry goods, such a market as today's provides at least some inducement. Yet total sales on the Stock Exchange, this week, have been 60 per cent, below those of the same week a year ago. Even in the bond market, current transactions are hardly one-half last year's. Where, then, is the public?

COMMENT ON THE WHEAT SITUATION

(Montreal Witness.)

Whatever may be the 1907 outcome of United States and Canadian wheat production, it is now fairly well assured that prices will be well above the average of the past five years. This is all the more to be assumed when the crop and weather reports of other large wheat producers in Europe and elsewhere are taken into account. There are very few exceptions to the cry of 'late,' and therefore, more or less, unsuccessful sowing in the distant fields, and the probability is that the world's production will be much below the average. The effect of the short crops will, in a measure, be neutralized by the large supplies now on hand. Canadian farmers have a large quantity of wheat still unsold, and it is only natural to suppose that they will have the advantage of the higher prices for the old crop. The enhanced values will, in many cases, fully compensate for the loss of acreage and yield. But the latest information received from the west is not altogether convincing that there will be eventually a very great decrease in acreage under seed. Figures to hand indicate nothing in the nature of a fifty per cent decrease in the ures to hand indicate nothing in the nature of a fifty per cent decrease in the total wheat production of the country. A feature of the situation which is rather unique is the almost entire absence of crop advices from the Ontario winter wheat districts. It is true that a few premature reports came through two or three weeks ago, but the fact that there has been no depressing news from that quarter during the past few days, may be accepted, let us hope, on the basis that no news is good news. There is an average yield of winter wheat in the Ontario fields of about twenty million bushels, and it will be distinctly gratifying if few or none of the fields are seriously impaired.

THE CHEESE TRADE

The Canadian Grocer says:—Quite a few cheese men are complaining of the shipping of cheese from factories while it is too green. At a recent meeting of the dairymen of Quebec province it developed that on more than one occasion government inspectors had entered factories for inspection purposes only to find that there was not a box of cheese in the place. The whole make had been shipped just as soon as it was turned out. Inspectors declare that if the cheese is shipped before ten days have elapsed after the making it is accounted too green. The cheese is subject to loss of weight, the quality is likely to deteriorate and the appearance suffers. As a result, the cheese gets a bad reputation, and the whole Dominion is likely to suffer for the misdeeds of the factorymen in one district. The Canadian Grocer says: -Quite a few


