Redmond, chairman of the Irish parliamentary party, setting the fate of the bill, was adopted.

MONTREAL, May 21--(Special)--There are signs that the end of the longshoremen's strike is not far off. The shipping companies claim that the men are coming back rapidly. The Alliance claim to have gangs and the C. P. R. six, while expecting more this afternoon. This phase is confirmed by the police officers on the docks but the longshoremen's officers have given out a positive denial. The men who are returning, it is stated, are being paid an advance of 2 1/2 cents an hour.
