Norge Flight Cuts Arctic Area In Two

NEW YORK, May 17-The flight of the Norge over the North Pole, added 100,000 square miles to the earth's explored area, but leaves between three million ret unseen by civilized man. The largest area is two million square miles in the Antarctic, which explorers consider uninter-

esting because the Antarctic continent is known to be covered with ice, 7,000 to 10,000 feet thick. The Amundsen-Ellsworth expedition cut the 1,000,000 mile Arctic area in two, leaving 600,000 square miles of unexplored territory toward Siberia and 300,000 toward the east. Although no land was discovered by the Norge, explorers point out that islands are found throughout the known Arctic regions and that birds have been



Fast Cruiser Bought To **Guard Miramichi** Bay

KEENER VIGILANCE

Excise Officers Also Paying More Attention To Motor

MONCTON, May 17-In consequence of alleged extensive smuggling

operations by land and sea during the last three years, the Departmeent of Customs and Excise is making preparations to guard the long coast line along the Northumberland strait more rigidly than usual during the remainder of the spring and during the summer and fall. Several extra coast guard boats are being put in readiness to patrol the waters of the strait and of the Gulf of St. Lawrence, with the object of preventing, or at least reducing, the smuggling

of contrabaand liquor. In 1924 and 1925 cargoes were landed in the night time at various points along the coast, including isolated places in Westmorland and kent counties, the officials say, the cruisers being unable to patrol the long coast line at all times successfully. Fast motor schooners and motor boats with con-traband are said to have out-manneuvred the government vessels. Or cargo of liquor is said to have been landed at the Shediac town wharf at three o'clock one morning last sum-mer, automobiles carrying the contraband to this city, only a 17 mile run. The operation was a bold one Preventive officers and patrol vesse. commanders did not anticipate that a smuggler would dare to take the chance of entering a shallow bay. Shedian

wharf is nearly two miles from the harbor entrance at Point du Chene.
