In describing the child's condition when he first saw it he said that it had prominent abdomen, decidedly rale skin, enlarged tonsils, decayed teth and what to the most casual observer was the most striking condition, enlargement of the lower ends of the long bones, especially the forearms and legs, with very definite deformity of these bones, forward bowing.

WHAT RICKETS ARE.

Speaking of the characteristics of the disease Dr. Warwick said: "Rickets is an acquired disease of infancy and early childhood, very common, more frequent and severe among the poor of cities, though not by any means rare among the well-to-do. It is, in itself, rarely fatal, but produces much illness and many deformaties, often permanent; and it has an important bearing indirectly upon infant mortality, in that children with Rickets have a much lower resisting power to infection of various kinds.

"The early symptoms of rickets are

of various kinds.

"The early symptoms of rickets are not definite or distinctive, and it is only when marked changes take place in the bones that the disease is usualin the bones that the disease is usually detected. General symptoms may be fretfulness and restlessness, lack of desire to play, sweating around the head, the child is usually pale, the abdomen prominent and constipation is the rule. In some cases there is malnourishment, but in others the child appears very well nourished.

SUNLIGHT ESSENTIAL.

"While proper food is essential for the well being of the baby it is now known for certain that sunlight is the essential element that cures and prevents rickets, or more properly the ultra-violet rays of the sun are the important ones. These ultra violet rays are easily filtered from sunlight by glass, and certain kinds of clothing.

"The history obtained from the inother of the child referred to showed that it had not only been fed on a diet that it had not only been fed on a diet which was totally unsuited to an in-fant, but that it had also not been exposed to the direct rays of the sun to any appreciable extent. It has long been known that cod liver oil would prevent and cure rickets, but only re-rently has it been learned that the oil lowes these properties to a radiation of ultra violet rays, or in other words, to the stored energy of the sun in the

Lack of Home Port Services Promotes Trade Through U.S.

TORONTO, Oct. 28-The more the matter of Canadian trade through American ports is probed the clearer it is that lack of Canadian services accounts for a large volume of this business. For example, the William Davies Co., Ltd. are large shippers of packing house products through New York. They export largely to London. The London dealer wants supplies every Monday morning. There is no Canadian service, summer or winter, that guarantees such regular delivery. Moreover, the products are perishable, and time is a consideration, and the New York route is at least two days faster than via Saint John. R. B. A SIMILAR story of lack of service was told by H. W. Blahout, at the Dunlop Tire & Rubber Goods Co's, office. He showed me the invoices of six shipments just sent out via New York for Valparaiso. Rangoon, Johannesburg, Cape Town and Port Elizabeth. The African shipments might have gone through a Canadian port, but the steamer space was all taken and no more would be available till November. Here, again, lack of service accounted for the use of an American port. The assistant manager of the Dunlop Tire Co. is A. E. King, another Saint John man who had to leave the Maritimes to get his opportunity. He is a son of the late Arthur King, for many years with the Saint John Telegraph. I was assured by him that the company routed all possible trade through Canadian ports, and was in full sympathy with my mission. Their crude rubber is usually bought through brokers, much of it affoat, and it comes via New York for that reason. Mr. King offered to place a car at my disposal at any time to facilitate my work, and I am to be Mr. Blahout's guest at a joint luncheon of three Kiwanis clubs on Wednesday.

An illustration of how cheap tonnage often available at New York affects Canadian ports was given me by Mr. Brunditt, of the Canadian Flour Export The cabinet also contains a new portfolio, that of Minister of Budget, which will be filled by Georges Bonnett, former Under Secretary of State to the president of the council.

SAINT JOHN HARBOR GETS FINE BOOST IN LONDON PUBLICATION

Alex Gray, Federal Engineer, Writes Article That Is Profusely Illustrated, Taking Seven Pages of Issue—Editorial Gives Praise

THE port of Saint John is given much prominence in the October number of The Dock and Harbor Authority, a London, Eng., publication which has a wide circulation. It prints a profusely illustrated article from the pen of Alex. Gray, M. Inst., C. E., M. E. I. C., engineer in charge of the harbor of Saint John under the Federal Department of Public Works. The article and illustrations take up seven and a half pages of the publication.

At the outset Mr. Gray gives the location of the harbor and a resume of its history, telling of the discovery by Champlain. He refers to the hustling days of wooden shipbuilding when this port sent its clipper ships to all parts of the world and the name of Saint John was a familiar one on the seven seas. The relationship of the river to the harbor is also touched upon by Mr. Gray.

MANY ILLUSTRATIONS.

The tidal wave, passing up the bay to its innermost recesses, rises some 30 feet at Saint John and 60 feet and more at the head of Chignecto Bay. It is even said that a rise in the neighborhood of 100 feet has been observed. As a contrast to this, it may be added that in Bay Verte, on the other side of the narrow neck of land which separates the Bay of Fundy from the Gulf of St. Lawrence, a distance of only 14 or 15 miles, the tidal rise is little more than four or five feet.

Brunswick, one of the provinces of the Dominion of Canada, occupies an important strategical position. Situated on the western littoral of the Gulf of St. Lawrence, at the extremity of the mainland, and flanking the easternmost boundary of the United States, it is favorably endowed with a coast-line possessing many fine bays and natural harbors. Not the least among these is the Harbor of Saint John, the chief port and principal commercial city, which is described and illustrated in this issue. Amid the extremes of temperature which characterize the climate of the province, Saint John has the good fortune to be a winter port, and its rail connection with Montreal enables it to serve the Province of Quebec, when the great St. Lawrence port is sealed to navigation.

"The tidal conditions in the Bay of Fundy, of which the Harbor of Saint John forms a branch, are rather remarkable, and produce what are probably the highest tides in the world.






SEAMAN IS SLAIN

Some animals do not feel the effects of a journey by sea in the same way as others, and while some are ill during the whole of the trip, others quickly become used to their new home and flourish.

Horses are great sufferers at sea, as every cavalry man knows, and they frequently dir from the effects of seasickness.

Birds, reptiles, monkeys, and other small animals suffer in varying degree, but, in comparison with the bigger creatures, they are much better sailors. Thousands of these little travelers are brought to our shores each year, and on an average the casualties are fairly

Sometimes, of course, scores of birds will die off in the early stages of a

voyage, but that is not always actually caused by seasickness. More often it is a disease that is spread among them by one infected member of the batch; or it may be a complaint brought on by being confined in necessarily close

quarters.

When once a disease is established in a cargo of birds, numbering hundreds or perhaps thousands, there is little hope of many being landed alive.

All Mothers May Be Divided Into Six Groups: The Cannibal Mother, the Doormat Mother, the Goat Mother, the Press-Agent Mother, the Vampire Mother, the Real Mother, and the Greatest of These is the Last.

NOW, roughly speaking, mothers may be divided into these classes:

First, the cannibal mother. The cannibal mother devours her children alive. She never lets them have any life of their own.

She never lets them have a single thought of their own, or gratify a single personal taste or inclination, or have any individuality whatever.



WHEN they are small children she holds them by the hand whenever they go out for a walk, and she makes them sit at her knee and listen to improving stories instead of playing with other children. SHE never thinks of such a thing as making her children obey her or show her any respect. On the contrary, she minds them and lets them be as impudent and insulting to her as they like. When they criticize the food she has spent hours in preparing and find fault with the clothes that she has spent half the night making for them, she is humbly apologetic because she failed to please, and when they tell her that she is a fool and deride her opinions, she bows her head before their rebukes.

Th doormat mother sighs sadly as she tells you that she can do nothing with her 10-or-12-year-old children, and she weeps and wrings her hands because her flapper daughter stays out joyriding until 3 or 4 o'clock in the morning and her cake-eater son is running with a lot of booze hounds. Mercifully, it does not occur to her that children accept their parents at their own valuation, and that if a mother thinks she is nothing but a rag for her children to trample on they will do it.

Third, the goat mother. The goat mother is the one who considers that her chief duty in life is to make a living sacrifice of herself for her children.

SHE begins by giving up everything for baby as soon as baby is born.

Before that world shaking event she was pretty, and intelligent, and interesting, and well dressed, and liked to go about with her husband to places of amusement. But after baby's birth she goes dowdy because baby pulls at her chiffons. She never even takes time to comb her hair decently. Her conversation dwindles to a dribble about sterilized baby foods and she never goes anywhere because she has to stay at home and hold baby's hand while it sleeps.

When the children are older she makes a burnt offering of herself on the kitchen stove, making three kinds of different cake to humor the food fads of her youngsters. She never has a new hat so that Sally may have six at a time. She puts off the operation that means her very life so that Tom may join a swell fraternity. Her hands are rough and sodden with dish water so that her daughter's may be pink and manicured.

The goat mother develops all the selfishness and greediness there is in her children's characters, and she never understands why it is that she is unloved and unappreciated, and why her sacrifices are made in vain.

Fourth, the press-agent mother. The press-agent mother is one of the world's greatest bores and about as great a handicap as any boy or girl could have. For mother tries to sell her children to the general public at her own valuation, and she boasts her goods so high and so out of proportion to their real worth that she makes them ridiculous.

EVERYBODY with eyes in their heads can see that Mary is a nice, healthy, ordinarily good-looking girl, but mother raves over her as a beauty who would have knocked Lillian Russell for a goal. Mother calls her carroty hair "Titian," her pale blue eyes "violets drenched in dew"; she describes her scrawniness as "a willowy figure." And mother tells of mythical millionaires who are beseeching Mary to marry them.

Everybody knows Tom for the type of boy who is turned out by the yard from our public schools, but mother touts him as a genius who is going to set the world aftre and relates how big business men are just struggling to get him in their offices.

The result is that we all discount Mary and Tom and rate them far below their real worth. Chief among the obstacles that young people have to overcome are the prejudices that their press-agent mothers have raised against them in our minds. We are so thred of hearing about them that we are not willing to even give them a fair show.

Fifth, the vampire mother. The vampire mother is the mother who sacrifices her children to herself.

SHE is the mother who makes a brilliant daughter give up a great career to stay at home and nurse her, or who forces her son to promise not to marry as long as she lives, so that he can give her all of his time and attention and money.

She is the mother who persists in living with her married children, even though she knows that she is an element of discord in their homes and that she separates husbands and wives and orphans little children.

Sixth, the real mother. The real mother is the mother who loves her children wisely as well as tenderly.

SHE teaches them to obey her. She forces them to respect her. She develops their individuality and teaches them to stand on their own feet and walk alone, metaphorically as well as physically. She strengthens their backs by laying burdens on them and cultivates unselfishness in them by teaching them to consider others.

And because she has taught them obedience and self-control, they grow up into good citizens; and because she has been a shining example to them, they worship her.

Apple Sauce Cake—One cup sugar, one-half cup shortening, one and one-fourth cup unsweetened, strained apple sauce, two teaspoon soda, one teaspoon salt, one teaspoon cloves, two cups pastry flour, one-half cup seedless raisins, one-half cup seedless raisins, one-half cup chopped nut meats. Cream shortening and sugar, add apple sauce, into which soda has been beaten. Add flour sifted with salt and spices, reserving little to dust over reasins and nut meats to be added last. Beat well and bake in well greased and floured shallow pan for 40 minutes.





CANADA ESCAPES IN FAIR DEFICIT; LOSSES UP TO GUARANTORS

Wembley Backers Expected to Find 75 Per Cent. of Guarantees; Dominion Only Liable For Pavilion;

British Government Involved

LONDON, Oct. 28—While the guarantors of the British Empire exhibition at Wembley are expected to have to find 75 per cent. of their guarantee, that is 15 shillings for every £1 guarantee. teed, no liability will attach to Canada in the matter of any deficit in connection with the big show. Canada simply provided her own part of the exhibition and paid for it practically out of hand; at least, she has involved herself in no further liability than that connected with the Canadian pavilion at Wembley.

The guarantors are those who originally made the exhibition possible by guaranteeing various sums, chief among them being the Britsh Government, which guaranteed a total of £1,100,000. The Duke of Devonshire, former Governor-General of Canada, and others guaranteed smaller amounts than the Government, but still amounts of considerable magnitude. Manchester and other large centres contributed large sums towards the cost of the exhibition, Manchester's guarantee totalling £100,000.
