HEAVY POLLS EXPECTED IN TODAY'S CONTEST

WEATHER CLEAR IN ALL PARTS OF COUNTRY BUT MARITIME

Three and a Half Million Voters Expected to Mark Ballots Today - Party Leaders Will Hear Results at Ottawa - Reports From Many Places.

OTTAWA, Oct. 29.-Reports here indicate heavy polling today. Clear weather generally prevails, although rain and snow are reported from some points in the Maritimes.

Extraordinary interest is shown everywhere in the election. Here, in the capital, especially elaborate preparations have been made for announcing the results.

EARLY VOTE IN CITY IS LIGHT

At One Poll Only 35 Out of 255 at Noon

Workers Look for Spurt Towards Closing Hour - Good Many Women Vote.

With ominous clouds intermittently threatening and flurries of snow which tapered off in momentary showers, there a period of sunshine, the electors buffeted a high wind in casting their ballots in the city and in its environs this forenoon.

NAMES NOT ON LISTS

Errors of omission were frequently reported, it was said, in other wards as well. In fact, while some attendants would have the name of a person in his book it would not appear on the master-list, or vice versa.

THREE MINISTERS

Among the candidates contesting the Maritimes 29 seats, are three cabinet ministers, Hon. E. M. Macdonald, Minister of National Defence, in Antigonish-Guysborough; Hon. W. E. Foster, Secretary of State, in Saint John-Albert; and Hon. John E. Sinclair, Minister without portfolio, in Queens, Prince Edward Island.

LAST HOUSE STANDING

The standing of the parties in the Maritime Provinces at dissolution was: Nova Scotia, Liberals, 15; Conservatives, 1; New Brunswick, Liberals, 4; Conservatives, 5; Progressives, 1. In Cape Breton, where J. B. McLaughlin, the only Labor candidate offering, opposed the standard bearers of the Liberal and Conservative parties, and one in Victoria, where Mrs. Minnie Bell Adney, the only woman candidate in the Maritimes, opposed an Independent Liberal-Progressive, and a straight Conservative.

SNOW IN MONCTON

MONCTON, N. B., Oct. 29.-Election day dawned here, cold and dreary with a chilling rain and snow flurries, making conditions unpleasant alike for voters and workers. Local issues, it is believed, will result in a somewhat larger vote than was recorded in the last general election.

SLUSH AT FREDERICTON

FREDERICTON, N. B., Oct. 29.-Electors in central New Brunswick went to the polls in slush and mud today, to cast their ballots. This morning the ground was covered with an inch or so of snow, which soon turned to slush, however, making the roads slippery and treacherous in the country districts. Towards noon the sun came out, but the weather remained blustery and spate, with rain intermittently.

BRIGHT AND COLD IN P. Q.

MONTREAL, Oct. 29.-In cold bright weather, and with roads frozen, electors of the Province of Quebec began to vote in the general election this morning. The prospects were that the roads in the rural districts, would be magnificently, due to the large amount of rain, and snow which has fallen lately.

FINE IN HALIFAX

HALIFAX, N. S., Oct. 29.-Early voters went to the polls this morning amid ideal weather conditions. Following a severe wind and rain storm that swept Halifax and district before dawn, the morning broke clear and bright, with a temperature more like early June, than late October, and with prospects bright for a large vote. SARDINES LESS

Atlantic Reports Show Jump In Cod, Haddock, Hake And Pollock

OTTAWA, Ont., Oct. 29 - Fish valued at \$3,724,133, and weighing 153,606,500 pounds, were landed by Canadian fishermen in the Atlantic and Pacific coasts of the Dominion during the month of September, according to a report issued by the Department of Marine and Fisheries.

ON THE ATLANTIC

On the Atlantic coast the total quantity of cod, haddock, hake and pollock landed was 88,178,100 pounds, compared with 85,028,400 pounds in the same period of 1924. The catch of cod shows a large increase of 16,996,400 pounds, the quantity taken being 62,972,400 pounds. This increase is accounted for mainly by the success of the Lunenburg fishing fleet.

LESS MACKEREL

Mackerel were taken in smaller quantities, owing to the American market being well stocked. Only 678,800 pounds were taken and the greater part was pickled. In September, 1924, there were 1,880,200 pounds caught.

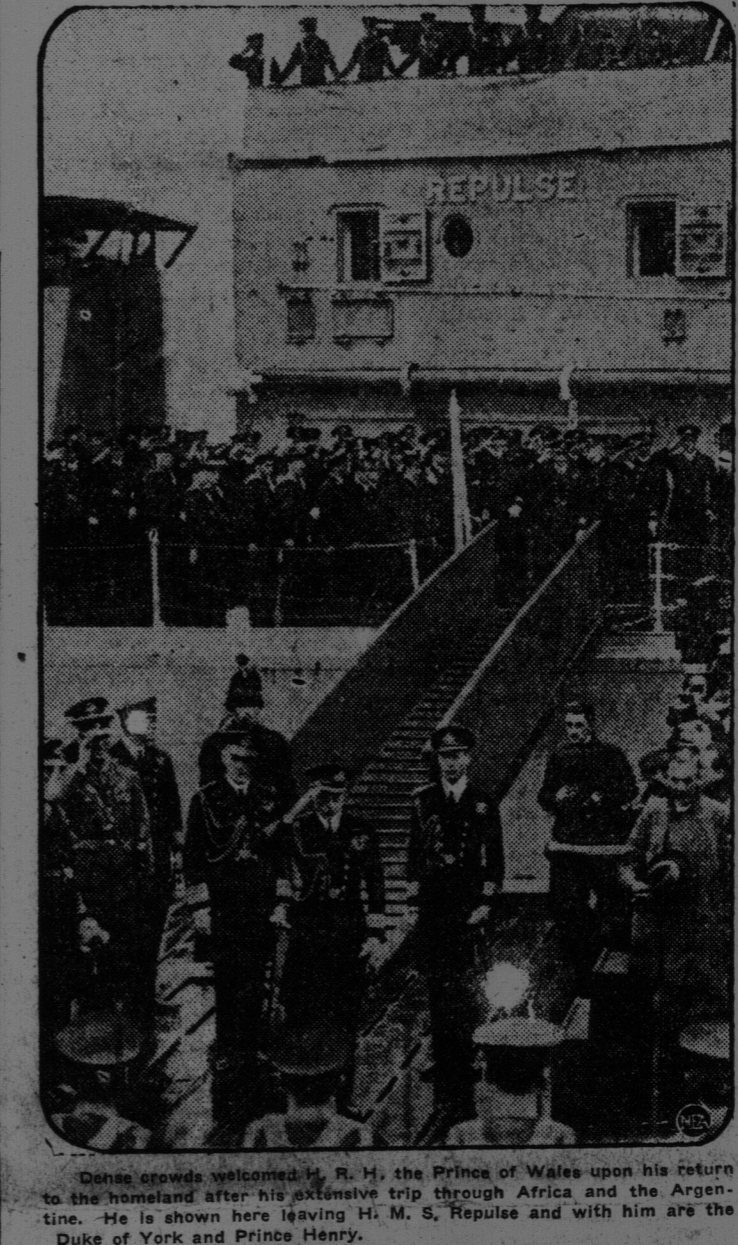
STORM DAMAGES LIGHT

OTTAWA, Oct. 29.-Right Hon. Arthur Meighen, in referring to a statement by Premier King, at Newmarket, in which the Premier is reported as criticizing an alleged declaration by Mr. Meighen, at Kitchener, to the effect that the "British preference was wrong in principle," has issued the following statement:

"What I said on this subject at Kitchener," said Mr. Meighen, was exactly what I said in parliament on June 2, last, and was in support of the clause in the British preference. I said that we should give British and Irish Dominion preference in return for preferences given us, and that no preference should put Canadian workmen out of employment."

FREDERICTON, Oct. 29.-The Fredericton branch G. W. V. A. has donated \$150 for the perpetual upkeep of the soldiers' plot in the Rural Cemetery annex which was donated by the trustees of the executive, Ashburnham branch of the Red Cross previously raised a like sum for the purpose. The intention is to have the ground prepared this autumn for seeding to people next spring. There is room for 99 graves. Four soldiers' bodies are to be removed from individual graves and re-interred there.

FRANCE'S NEW CABINET NAMED

Painleve Handles Finance Portfolio as Well as Premiership

Minister of Budget is Added to State—Georges Bonnet Fills It

PARIS, Oct. 29.—Premier Painleve, accompanied by the members of his new cabinet, arrived at the Elysee Palace, early this afternoon, for the customary presentation to the President of the Republic. The new cabinet is constituted as follows: Premier and Minister of Finance, M. Painleve. Minister of Foreign Affairs, A. Briand. Minister of Justice, Camille Chautemps. Minister of the Interior, A. Schramme. Minister of Works, Anatole Delecluse. Minister of War, Edouard Dauterive. Minister of Marine, Emile Borel. Minister of Commerce, Daniel Vincent. Minister of Agriculture, Jean Durand. Minister of Instruction, Yvon Delbos. Minister for the Colonies, Leon Perrier. Minister of Labor, Antoine Durand. Minister of Pensions, Louis Antoine. The cabinet also contains a new portfolio, that of Minister of Budget, which will be filled by Georges Bonnet, former Under Secretary of State to the President of the council. The portfolio of commerce in the new ministry was declined by both Charles Chaumet and Louis Touceur and the premier named M. Chaumet, Governor of the Bank of France.

CASE OF CHILD IS SUBJECT OF ADVICE

Medical Health Officer Speaks of Little One at Health Centre

At the Saint John Health Centre a school-age child a pitiable case was brought to the attention of Dr. William Warwick, medical health officer. It was a child of two and a half years of age who weighed 14 pounds less than it should have weighed and was unable to walk. The doctor made a diagnosis of rickets, and the mother was advised to give the child cod liver oil. The child has been back to the clinic several times and is doing stronger daily. Dr. Warwick, in speaking of this case yesterday, said that rickets were only too common and could very easily be prevented. The simple facts of child health were generally known. In describing the child's condition when he first saw it he said that the prominent abdomen, decidedly pale skin, enlarged tonsils, decayed teeth and what to the most casual observer was the most striking condition, enlargement of the lower ends of the long bones, especially the forearms and legs, with very definite deformity of these bones, were definite of rickets.

GREEK TROOPS ALL CLEAR OF BULGARIA

Official Report Issued—Crisis in League End on Receipt of Despatch

ATHENS, Oct. 29.—It is officially announced that the Greek troops have evacuated Bulgarian territory. PARIS, Oct. 29.—Apprehension in League of Nations quarters, over the reported renewal of fighting along the Greco-Bulgarian frontier, was relieved today by receipt of an official despatch from Athens stating that despite the "Bulgarian attack" the Greek government had issued definite orders hastening the evacuation of Bulgarian soil by its troops.

Lack of Home Port Services Promotes Trade Through U. S.

TORONTO, Oct. 28.—The more the matter of Canadian trade through American ports is probed the clearer it is that lack of Canadian services accounts for a large volume of this business. For example, the William Davies Co., Ltd. are large shippers of packing house products through New York. They export largely to London. The London dealer wants supplies every Monday morning. There is no Canadian service, summer or winter, that guarantees such regular delivery. Moreover, the products are perishable, and time is a consideration, and the New York route is at least two days faster than via Saint John. R. B. Mills carefully explained the situation, pointing out that the company's business is steady throughout the year, and that to hold its trade it must give regular and prompt delivery. More than fifty per cent. of their business is done through Canadian ports, and they would be very glad if regularly of service and the necessary refrigerator space were available so that they could use our own ports far more extensively.

A SIMILAR story of lack of service was told by H. W. Blahout, at the Dunlop Tire & Rubber Goods Co.'s office. He showed me the invoices of six shipments just sent out via New York for Valparaiso, Rangoon, Johannesburg, Cape Town and Port Elizabeth. The African shipments might have gone through a Canadian port, but the steamer space was all taken and no more would be available till November. Here, again, lack of service accounted for the use of an American port. The assistant manager of the Dunlop Tire Co. is A. E. King, another Saint John man who had to leave the Maritimes to get his opportunity. He is a son of the late Arthur King, for many years with the Saint John Telegraph. It was asserted by him that the company routed all possible trade through Canadian ports, and was in full sympathy with our mission. Their crude rubber is usually bought through brokers, much of it afloat, and it comes via New York for that reason. Mr. King offered to place a car at my disposal at any time to facilitate my work, and I am to be Mr. Blahout's guest at a joint luncheon of three Kiwanis clubs on Wednesday.

An illustration of how cheap tonnage often available at New York affects Canadian ports was given me by Mr. Brundit, of the Canadian Flour Export Co., Ltd. He had been able to send a shipment of flour to Amsterdam via New York about eight cents per barrel cheaper than by way of Montreal. It was a direct service, and wanted the business badly enough to make the low rate. In all cases where it is possible the company uses Canadian ports.

AT the offices of Lever Bros. I was told of palm oil from Nigeria that comes via New York, and other oils that come via Seattle, which has a strong grip on that business. The company does not use American ports when Canadian service is available.

I was accompanied on my rounds today by Mr. Fullerton of the Canadian Pacific foreign freight staff.

WITH THE CONSERVATIVES

Commissioner R. W. Wigmore, chairman of the Conservative committee, said last night that everything was keyed up to a high pitch and that the Opposition candidates, Dr. Murray McLaren and Thomas Bell, were confident that they would be returned. He declared his belief that the Conservative majority in the constituency would be at least 2,000.

LIBERALS CONFIDENT

J. J. Henneberry said last night that the Liberal candidates, Hon. Dr. W. B. Foster, Secretary of State, and R. T. Hayes, were spending the last evening previous to the contest in visiting the ward workers and completing advance details. He declared that the candidates were confident of the result of the balloting and that the workers were right on their toes ready to make every minute of the day count.

WOMEN PLAY BIG PART IN ELECTION

MONTREAL, Oct. 29.—Women played a larger part in the election campaign which closed with the voting today, than ever before in the province of Quebec. Each party has had aggressive women's committees which have conducted a thorough canvass of the women voters. At most of the important meetings a woman speaker has been a feature of the program. In the city of Montreal, in the early stages of the campaign, a woman candidate appeared likely, but it was ultimately decided that the time was yet ripe for her appearance.

BULGARIA PREMIER'S BROTHER MURDERED

VIENNA, Oct. 29.—Danco Tzankoff, brother of Premier Alexander Tzankoff of Bulgaria, has been shot and killed, in Sofia, while walking on the street. Dispatches from Sofia describe the motive for the crime as unestablished. The slayer escaped. Tzankoff was walking with his wife and sister-in-law, when shot.

Educational Opportunities Given to 70 Families at Grenfell Mission. CANADIAN PRESS. NEW HAVEN, Conn., Oct. 29.—As the culmination of the long standing interest of Yale students in the work of Dr. Wilfred T. Grenfell, in the North, the Yale school in Labrador has been established at the Grenfell Mission. Gifts by Yale undergraduates have made this possible. The new Yale school will stand at Northwest River, the gateway to the vast undeveloped interior of Labrador, where more than 70 families now residing near that point had no means of educating their children. Dr. Grenfell hopes to provide at the Yale school, opportunities for vocational training.

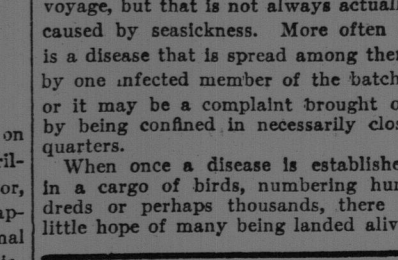

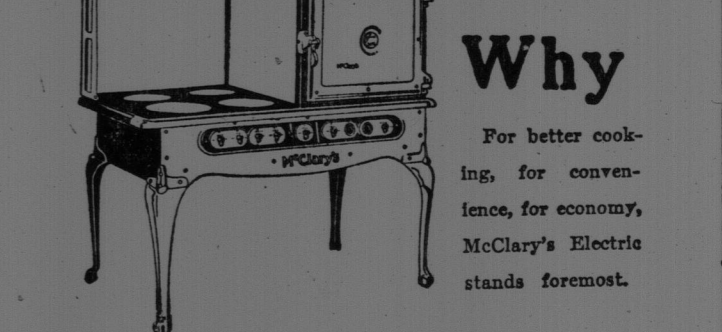

All Mothers May Be Divided Into Six Groups: The Cannibal Mother, the Doormat Mother, the Goat Mother, the Press-Agent Mother, the Vampire Mother, the Real Mother, and the Greatest of These is the Last.

NOW, roughly speaking, mothers may be divided into these classes:

First, the cannibal mother. The cannibal mother devours her children alive. She never lets them have a single thought of their own, or gratify a single personal taste or inclination, or have any individuality whatever.

WHEN they are small children she holds them by the hand whenever they go out for a walk, and she makes them sit at her knee and listen to improving stories instead of playing with other children. She makes them eat the kind of food she considers best for their little tummies. She picks out their clothes for them, and makes their friends for them, and she thinks herself grievously ill used when her in-laws emit loud shrieks of agony when they see themselves and their homes and their happiness about to be gobbled up by her.

Second, the doormat mother. The doormat mother prostrates herself before her children and begs them to walk all over her and kick her around. Before they are three weeks old her babies have got her completely under control and can make her do their bidding.

Third, the goat mother. The goat mother is the one who considers that her chief duty in life is to make a living sacrifice of herself for her children.

Fourth, the press-agent mother. The press-agent mother is one of the world's greatest bores and about as great a handicap as any boy or girl could have. For mother tries to sell her children to the general public at her own valuation, and she boasts her goods so high and so out of proportion to their real worth that she makes them ridiculous.

Fifth, the vampire mother. The vampire mother is the mother who sacrifices her children to herself.

SHE begins by giving up everything for baby as soon as baby is born. Before that world shaking event she was pretty, and intelligent, and interesting, and well dressed, and liked to go about with her husband to places of amusement. But after baby's birth she goes dowdy because baby pulls at her chiffons. She never even takes time to comb her hair decently. Her conversation dwindles to a dribble about sterilized baby foods and she never goes anywhere because she has to stay at home and hold baby's hand while it sleeps.

SIXTH, the real mother. The real mother is the mother who loves her children wisely as well as tenderly.

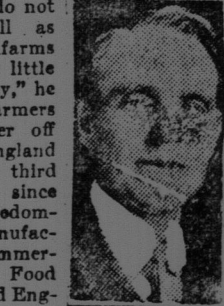
SHE teaches them to obey her. She forces them to respect her. She develops their individuality and teaches them to stand on their own feet and walk alone, metaphorically as well as physically. 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Timely Views On World Topics

I TRAVELED through English farm country for two days and saw only two motor cars on the farms," said Senator Arthur Capper, in a recent interview. "English farmers lack buying power. The young people do not dress as well as those on our farms and they have little spending money." "Farmers here are better off since in England farming is a third rate industry since England is predominantly a manufacturing and commercial country. Food is imported and English farmers are Arthur Capper forced to meet the competition as best they can. "As a result, England is an open market for the agricultural surplus



of the entire world. A vast amount of its food comes from the United States. The proportion of its imports of food, in comparison with that produced at home, is amazingly large, it seems to me. England imports, for example, 75 per cent. of its wheat and wheat flour; no wonder Liverpool is an important market! Of barley it imports 48 per cent.; oats, 19 per cent.; beef and veal, 57; mutton and lamb, 68; pork, 68; poultry, 87; eggs, 60; milk and its products, 64; wool, 88, and corn, 100—England grows no corn.

ENGLISH FARMERS CONSERVATIVE. "Apparently the British government gives little attention to agriculture, its people and its problems. Certainly the farmers of England are much behind those of America in their practical grasp of economic matters. Most English farmers belong to the Conservative group politically; few are identified with the Labor or Socialist groups. They are almost inactive politically and really have no voice in public affairs."

If you think your luck has struck absolute rock-bottom, just consult Mrs. Ruby Kelly and the 40 business girls who have been making their homes in her rooming house in Cleveland. They'll tell you just how bad luck can be.

Two years ago Mrs. Kelly put all her savings into leasing a 60-room apartment. She renovated and furnished it and let the rooms to business girls—stenographers, secretaries and the like.

It took all her money, plus several hundred dollars borrowed from friends, and for a long time it was a losing proposition. But about a month ago the house began to fill and a day of clear profits was in sight.

Then, one chilly October morning, a constable and his deputies appeared with a notice of eviction issued by the Municipal Court on the owner's plaint that the rent was overdue. Mrs. Kelly protested that she had paid the rent and that she hadn't been notified of court procedure. But in vain.

Out came every stick of furniture to the sidewalk. Up came the moving vans, and presently Mrs. Kelly was left with a bare, empty house on her hands.

In the evening Mrs. Kelly's roomers came home. In each room was a pile of clothes rumped on the middle of the floor from dresser drawers by the movers. Nothing else. The girls ate supper on the floor, sat on the floor to discuss their fate, slept on the floor.

Now they're all gone elsewhere for rooms. And to top it all, really companies with which Mrs. Kelly had invested some \$15,000 in lake front lots foreclosed their mortgages when they learned of the rooming house disaster. The mortgages had been overdue for some time, but the really companies had carried them until they learned of Mrs. Kelly's financial reverses.

"Tough luck? Say, the next fellow that writes a dictionary ought to let us get up a new definition of those words for him," says Mrs. Kelly and her erstwhile roomers.

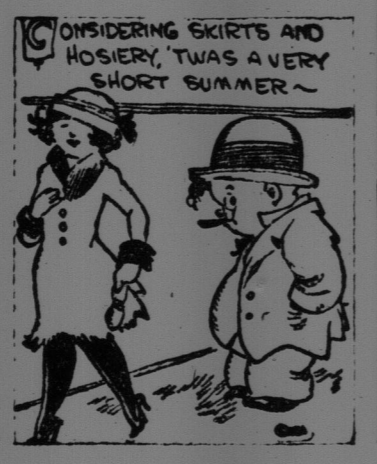

BIRKENHEAD IS TALKED OF AS NEXT PREMIER

Name Discussed in London Political Clubs as Baldwin Successor

ECONOMY URGED IN GOVERNMENT

Topics of Interest in Letter From Metropolis of Empire

Times-Star Staff Correspondence. LONDON, Oct. 15.—At West End political clubs, where an uneasy feeling of dissatisfaction with the modest achievements of so powerful a Conservative Government perhaps finds most fitting expression, some gossip is already circulating a probable successor in the event of Mr. Baldwin deciding during the next 12 months to seek a little rest from official labors. Only one "probable" seems to be mentioned, the Earl of Birkenhead.

It is interesting to know how the same fairly influential and intelligent non-party opinion regards the necessities of our present post-war situation. I find hardly a dissentient voice when the aim and object of ministerial policy at this juncture is represented as drastic national economy in every possible and even a few hardly possible ways. Business men realize that, to a large extent, the Government is up against grim circumstances. But they one and all hold, as an article of fervent faith, that the only remedy is to cut down expenditures remorselessly, and get the wheels of national life spinning again, by doing all that human endeavor can to relieve the staggering burden that now cripples industry at every turn.

ROUT OF BREAD KING The appointment of Lord Bradbury's Food Council looks like being one of the most popular things done yet by Mr. Baldwin's ministry. That Lord Bradbury and his colleagues are winning easily all along the line in their fight with profiteering bakers is now manifest. Liberated from the shackles of threatened boycott, retail bakers will soon, I am told, be selling an 8d. loaf, and the quality, as well as the size, will be up to standard. There are adequate powers to ensure that, despite the threats of the "ring."

AT WHITEHALL Although the Admiralty Building in Whitehall has reached its centenary the same as during the Great War, and is still the headquarters of the Admiralty, there can be few purely mental experiences more charged with cold excitement than to follow, almost from minute to minute the phases of a great naval action from the Admiralty's Whitehall conning-towers. "Out on blue water, the fighting ships, amid the stunning detonations of the cat's paws"—in Whitehall, only the clock ticks, and quiet men enter with quick steps, laying slips of pencilled paper before other men, who, in silent, who draw lines and scribble calculations, and point with the finger, or make brief subdued comments. Rather like a newspaper office, in fact.

CONVENTIONAL YANKEES Outside the select circles of middle-class London suburbs, American millionaires are the most conventional people alive. Look at the dead tobacco king, J. B. Duke. Started out as a penniless boy in a log cabin, and leaves \$20,000,000 to his heirs. All through thinking out those "cigarette cards!" How those "pictures" for which the juveniles still clamor outside cigar shops, did boom the sales of cigarettes! Those who are middle-aged enough to recall the pioneer cigarette pictures will remember that they were mostly of what is technically known as the "leggy" variety.

RIVAL FLUFF The big attraction now at the London Zoo, which is settling down to winter conditions, is in the Lion House. Two new babies have just made their debut, one the offspring of a fine young lioness and the other of a beautiful puma. The pride of both mamma is most palpable, and each seems to invite the admiring tribute of human visitors, but strictly from a respectful distance. Let anyone dare to step inside the barrier and get a closer view near the cage bars, and mamma hurls herself snarling against the latter like the primeval force she is. The two babies are just fascinating, convulsive balls of fluff, and the tragedy is that they cannot share a common nursery with playmates.

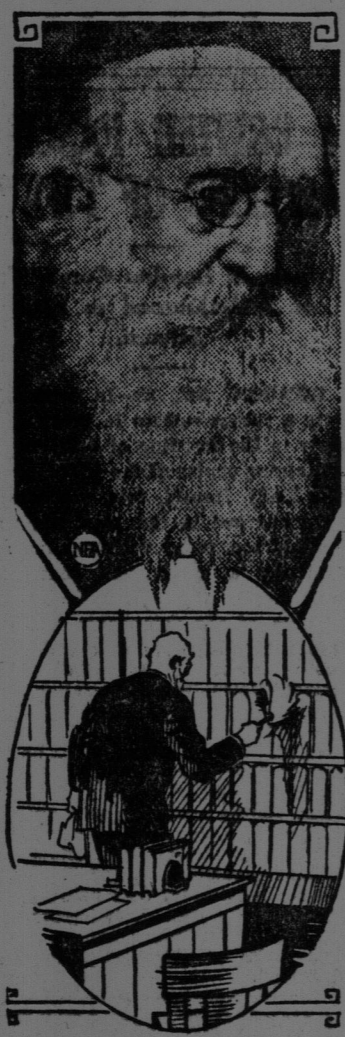
Boy Radio Expert Dead At Moncton

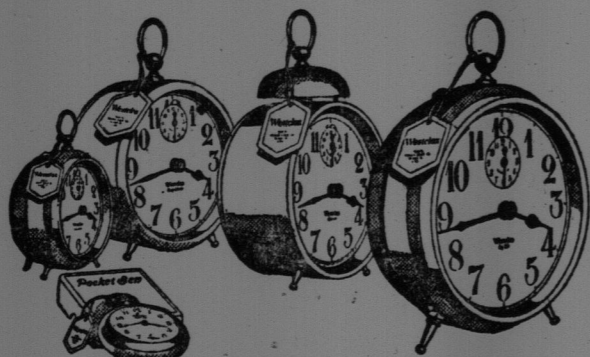

3,700 Black Foxes May Die Of Hunger If Stockholders Don't Put Up Funds for Food

BANGOR, Me., Oct. 28.—That the 3,700 silver black foxes on the several ranches of the Frank H. Gordon, Inc., worth hundreds of thousands of dollars are in danger of starving to death or eating each other up, unless the stockholders get together and provide funds to feed them was the published statement made today by Artemus Weatherbe and James H. Gillin, appointed temporary receivers of the Gordon fox business. There are ranches in Lincoln and other towns in Maine, and in other states.

The statement of the receivers is to the effect that there are no assets of any kind available for them to provide food and care for the foxes, and that they advanced \$330 of their personal funds today to provide food for them, but will not advance another cent. They call for the stockholders to get together to protect their property until further action of the court. All the foxes are said to be in good condition at present, but must be carefully fed and taken care of.

CANADA ESCAPES IN FAIR DEFICIT; LOSSES UP TO GUARANTORS

Wembley Backers Expected to Find 75 Per Cent. of Guarantees; Dominion Only Liable For Pavilion; British Government Involved

LONDON, Oct. 28.—While the guarantors of the British Empire exhibition at Wembley are expected to have to find 75 per cent. of their guaranties, that is 15 shillings for every £1 guaranteed, no liability will attach to Canada in the matter of any deficit in connection with the big show.

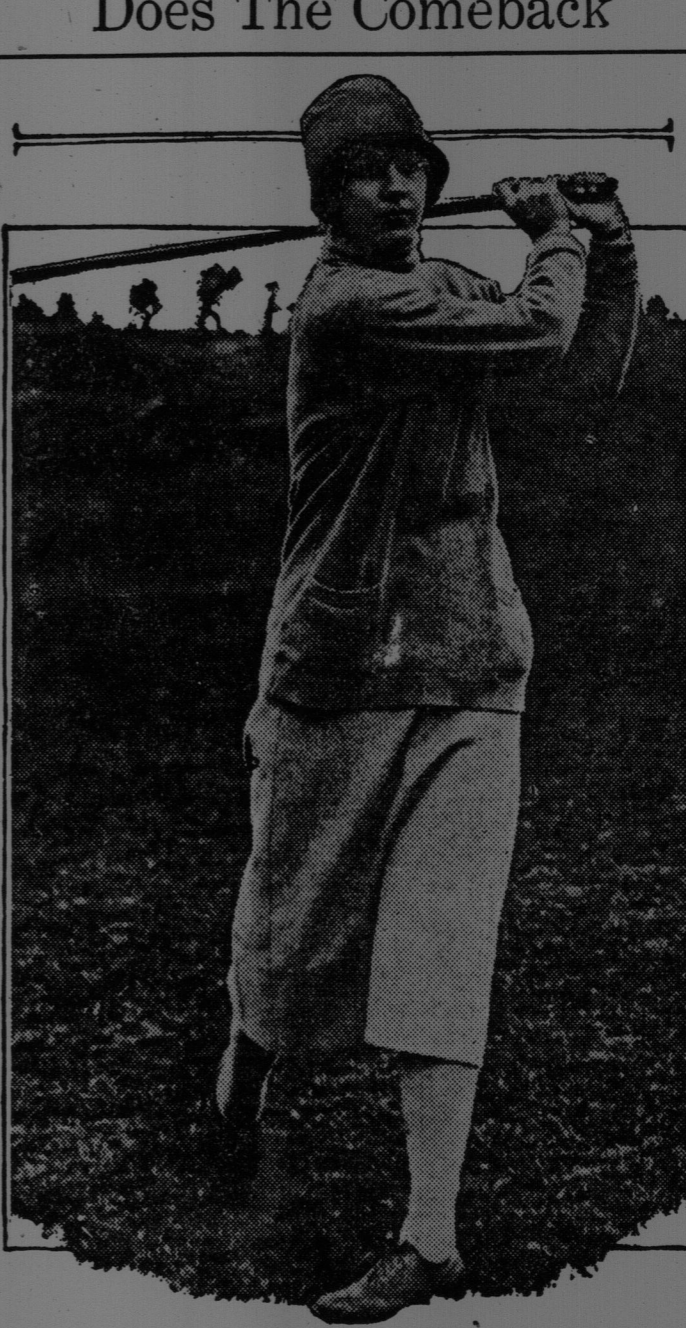
