

Unification of Australian Railway

BY A. M. BELDING

MONTREAL, Jan. 18-"I am sure your mission will have a good effect. I may tell you that the people of Ontario have been thinking a great deal more about the Maritime Provinces and their problems in the last year than ever before, and I am sure you will find them sympathetic."

The above comment was made by a Toronto business man on the train for Montreal, Saturday night, when the purpose of the tour on which the writer has been sent by The Telegraph-Journal and Times-Star was explained to him. He is well acquainted with New Brunswick and has motored through parts of it. He declared that for pure delight in motoring he has seen nothing to equal it, not only because of the varied and lovely scenery but the splendid roads.

"We have nothing in Ontario," he said, "that I have found as charming-and your provinces ought to be filled with tourists in summer."

MATHEW Lodge and R. H. McKay, of New Glasgow, C. N. R. directors, accompanied me yesterday morning to the C. N. R. general offices. Sir Henry Thornton had left Friday night for New York, but R. P. Ormsby, General Secretary of the C. N. R. board, H. C. Martin, General Freight Traffic Manager; C. J. Smith, Assistant to the President, and W. S. Thompson, Director of Publicity, received the visitor most cordially and as an expression of Sir Henry's views regarding the national ports quoted what he said to The Times-Star on Nov. 27 as follows: "If the commission after consideration of what is needed in the Maritimes thinks that it is necessary for the Canadian ports to be used entirely in preference to American ports, their recommendation would go a long way.

Messrs. Smith and Martin gave a great deal of valuable information about the grain trade and its distribution through different ports, pointing out that some of the shippers are among those who must be converted to the national port idea. They offered the fullest co-operation with these newspapers in regard to this mission.

PRESIDENT Beatty of the C. P. R. kindly gave up half an hour to a frank and sympathetic discussion of Maritime problems. The C. P. R., he said, had made St. John its port and he endorsed Sir Thomas Shaughnessy's declaration years ago that his line would handle import and export freight through St. John in winter at as low a rate and give as satisfactory delivery as any other port offered.

Mr. Beatty believes there are brighter days coming for the Maritimes. He offered, when the newspaper man had returned from the west, to arrange a conference in Montreal and go over the whole situation in the light of information and impressions received on the tour.

ANOTHER Montreal man keenly interested in the writer's mission, and in the Maritime situation was R. S. White, editor-in-chief of the Gazette. Mr. White was formerly a member of Parliament and then for 19 years collector of the port of Montreal. He is a son of a member of the Government of Sir John A. MacDonald, and particularly well versed in public affairs.

Mr. White declared Canadian money should not be spent to provide terminal facilities in future at Portland as against St. John. Regarding the general situation in the Maritime Provinces, he said the rest of the country should consider whether it would not be a good national investment to lend such aid as would place those provinces in the path of progress, make their people contented and so strengthen the Dominion.

After spending Monday in Montreal the writer will talk to Brantford business men on Tuesday, Toronto on Wednesday, Hamilton Thursday, and London Friday.

Professor A. F. Baird Says Otherwise Only Place For One Is Underground If There Is To Be Security

ADVISES GET-TOGETHER COMMITTEE

Power Distribution Systems in St. John Are Given Searching Investigation-Says Danger to Life In Some Instances, Including Fire Alarms, Exists

**Prof. A. F. Baird professor of electrical engineering at the University** of New Brunswick, engaged by the New Brunswick Board of Public Utili-ties to investigate alleged interferences between the distribution systems of the New Brunswick Power Company and the Civic Power Commission In St. John, finds hazardous conditions and recommends changes.

### Suggests Committee.

His report was given out at the Utilities Board office this morning. After giving out in detail the result of his study of conditions, he recommends

the chief engineer or other representative of the New Brunswick Power Company, the chief engineer or other representative of the St. John Power Commission, the chief engineer of the New Brúnswick Telephone Company, the engineer in charge of construction of the Western Union Telegraph Company, and the engineer in charge of construction of the Canadian Pacific Railway Telegraph Company, and also city electrician Says City Bear Cost.

3. That this committee follow as 3. That this committee follow as standards of construction and adopt wherever practicable the specifications of the Bell Telephone Company of Can-ada, before referred to in this report, the drawings of which are attached, and the publication of the Public Utili-ties Commission of the State of Con-necticut, Bocket No. 1447, a copy of which I presume is in your files. Both of these publications adhere in all es-sentials to the National Electric Safety sentials to the National Electric Safety Code and provide all that is necessary for safe attachments. It would seem only reasonable to as

sume that the expense of making all the changes or additions in construc-tion recommended be borne by the City

tion recommended be borne by the City of Saint John, since the New Bruns-wick Power Company were first on the ground. Trained in Art.


