



COTTON REPP FROCK



The continued liking for dark blue is emphasized in this frock of checked cotton repp, the color scheme combining blue and white. It is trimmed with blue ruffles or any rough finish goods, but tulle or satin may be substituted if desired. The materials required are 5 yards of 44-inch repp, 3 yards of 36-inch tulle or 1 1/2 yard of 48-inch tulle and 1/4 yard of all-over lace for the vest. Repp at about 40 cents a yard is excellent in quality. The skirt commands particular attention because it is an unusually fashionable model. The material is first folded smoothly before cutting out. As the rough finished fabric "creeps" quickly, care should be taken to see that they are smooth before the tissue pattern is arranged upon them. Now, from the fold of the goods there may be cut the founce (C) and the tunic (D). The two pieces are placed on a lengthwise thread of the material. The length of the tunic may be regulated by cutting off at the bottom just the number of inches desired. One and three-eighths yards of lining material 36 inches wide are needed for the foundation, which is made by first taking up a dart in the back gore as perforated, then joining gores as notched. Close the back seam and finish edges above for opening. The right back edge of the founce should first be turned back on a flat perforation; lay on left back. For the tunic, close back seam from large "O" perforation to lower edge. Very fine cross barred muslin is used for the yokes of summer dresses, and it may be employed in this instance in place of lace or net. Plain silk combined with dark satin may be employed for this model, especially if it is to be used for early fall wear.

ADJ. CUMMINGS HOME Was in Attendance at Great Salvation Army Congress in London Adjutant Cummings of the Salvation Army returned to the city on Tuesday after an absence of six weeks. He had been attending the international congress of the army in London. Representatives attended from all parts of the world, he said, and great throngs of people witnessed the demonstrations and on one day alone it is estimated that 180,000 people were present at their meetings. The officers were royally entertained; about 800 of them attended a garden party given by Mrs. Astor, who is much interested in the army work. Adjutant Cummings and other Canadian officers were received by the acting major commissioner. Major Taylor and his wife who also went from St. John, are expected home next week. Adjutant Cummings said that a general gloom was cast over the congress on account of the loss of the Empress of Ireland, which so many Canadian army people lost their lives. In speaking of the disaster, the adjutant said the divers were going down to the lost Empress as the party sailed up the St. Lawrence on Monday and eight coffins were being taken out to the scene of the disaster to remove the bodies as they are still being recovered. Julius Frankel of Chicago owner of considerable real estate, had complained to the police department that thieves had stolen the lawn from his lots. One hundred loads of sods and loam were taken, the booty having a ready sale among those living on sand-covered lots.

SIGN ON FOR A VOYAGE OF SEVEN YEARS

Seven Seas To Be Traveled By This Expedition

PLAN ACCURATE CHARTING

Many Doubtful Islands and Sunk Rocks - New Routes to Be Opened By Panama Canal to Be Given Attention

London, July 15—Six years at sea and a voyage of 210,000 miles to hunt and chart islands, reefs and banks of doubtful location is what the British Antarctic and Oceanographic Expedition now proposes to do for the benefit of the world's merchant marine. Originally Sir Ernest Shackleton and J. Foster Stackhouse intended only to survey and chart the coast of the Antarctic continent, looking for such menaces to shipping as might lie on their voyage down and back. But the explorers have decided two and a half years to their projected voyage, which will start next December the "Discovery."

The seven seas have never been accurately charted because, says Mr. Stackhouse, "being everybody's business it was nobody's business to do it." Even the north Atlantic has its doubtful islands and sunken rocks. Four mariners, previous to the Titanic disaster, reported seeing rocks near the point where the ship went down, and this one of the first things to be investigated by the Discovery, Polynesia, Melanesia and Malaysia are notorious for volcanic and coral obstructions, and the Panama Canal will open new routes through these dangerous seas. The South American and African coasts have their doubtful rocks. Mr. Stackhouse considers it just as important to find out that a menace does not exist as that it does.

The new sea charting expedition is financed by public contributions. Its fifteen officers and scientists have given their work for next year as their only expenses besides the equipment are those incidental to running the ship and the pay of the crew of 100 men. The foremost hydrographer and chart maker of Great Britain, Capt. J. A. Rupert-Jones, will have charge of the expedition. Lieutenant Humphreys will do the land surveying. Various other kinds of scientific work are planned including observations as to the magnetic pole.

Existing charts disclose facts which have a disturbing influence on traffic, such as the presence of shallow surroundings in areas of deep water. Such places will be carefully searched for submerged rocks. All corners of the world will be visited and studied by the expedition. The Discovery is a wooden ship with steam auxiliary, especially designed for work in icy waters, and she will carry the latest sounding machinery. While the voyage is planned to last six years, the officers and crew are signed on for seven in event of delays.

RECENT DEATHS George G. Drake who for fifty years was a member of the city fire department, died at his home in Pine street about six o'clock last evening. The daughters are Mrs. DeWitt, Mrs. Scott of this city, and Mrs. N. DeWitt of Tracy Station. The funeral will take place Saturday afternoon at 3 o'clock, from his late residence, 13 Pine street. A. Frederick Hardwick, of Lynn (Mass.), who came here on his honeymoon, July 6, died Tuesday evening at the hospital, following a violent attack of sea sickness on the journey. The body was taken to his father's home at 100 St. John street. The bride of three weeks survives. The death occurred at the General Public Hospital yesterday of Frank B. Winter, after a short illness. The deceased was in his 37th year, and leaves, besides his wife, three children, his father, mother and six brothers to mourn. Mr. Winter was employed with Ungar's Laundry and was a general favorite. The funeral will take place this afternoon at 2:30, from the residence of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. William Winter, 11 Brunswick street. Mrs. Margaret Ann Brown, mother of Mrs. J. B. Tombs of Moncton, is dead in Hamilton, Ontario. Directors Elected. SAY HE HAS STOLEN \$10,000

Rev. W. H. Barradough visited this morning at Brunswick street last evening at 9 o'clock, at the close of their regular meeting, and explained the aims of the "How movement." LOTTERY SWINDLE

\$250,000 in Prizes Offered as Against Many Millions in Tickets.

London, June 15.—A curious lottery case was heard before Mr. Justice Coleridge two days ago at the Devon Assizes.

Henry James Houston, William Taylor Dixon, and Charles Henry Towler, advertising agents, were indicted for conspiring to publish a scheme for the sale of tickets in a lottery called the "John Bull Derby Sweepstake, 1914," between January 1, 1913, and April 20, 1914. They pleaded guilty to distributing circulars and tickets, but not to originating the scheme.

Mr. Foote, K. C., for the crown, said he did not allege that the defendants originated the scheme, but that they conspired to carry it through. If the tickets printed by one firm alone had been sold, the sum of \$7,500,000 would have been realized. The prizes to be distributed totalled only \$250,000, about 3 per cent of the total.

Lord Coleridge said the unsatisfactory part of the case was that he had not before him the real culprits. The object of the prosecution was to stop this gross and palpable swindle. "He thought justice would be met by binding over Dixon and Towler in £500 on their own recognizances, Houston, who was nearer the actual swindlers, and employed other men, would be fined £200 and would have to pay the costs of the prosecution, both here and in the lower courts.



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



EVANGELISTIC CAMPAIGN AT ST. PHILLIP'S PLANNED

St. John, N. B., July 16.

St. Phillip's church has a membership of 400. We want to be the instrument through which souls are saved and to add to the membership of the said church as well.

We have communicated with Miss M. G. Evans of Indianapolis, Indiana, whom we think can do much good in the city and help us increase the membership of St. Phillip's church. The remaining five-sixths are non-professing. If the white and colored people, who are willing and able to help struggling humanity, would only contribute an annual sum, many Lord. Reader! would you not give a few cents to help save a soul? Miss M. G. Evans will be here on or about August 16. We are trying to raise funds to pay the expenses of those meetings. This will not cost less than \$75 nor more than \$100. We will acknowledge through the daily papers your contributions and thank you for the same.

There has been deception by some of the past ministers in raising funds but my stay here (one year) has been a demonstration of what our race can do by its own efforts. Personally I have solicited \$24. No previous pastor in the history of the church has solicited so much money. The church has been to a great extent self-supporting this year, but, like all other institutions, and churches, it needs more. We have raised \$1,000 through concerts, entertainments and Sunday collections, the Lord willing, and for which I give Christ, the Head of the Church, praise. I shall gladly receive any contribution on the campaign fund.

I am going to conference the last of this month and would like to have the greater part of the coming evangelistic funds in hand. Hoping to return in time to begin the spiritual work that is so much needed to build up a permanent citizenship as well as membership.

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

FUNDS TRACED TO FLEMMING

Witness Tells Why He Gave Cash To Premier

E. R. TEED'S STORY

First Payment For Stock in Gould Railway Company — Second Was as Loan — When Sick Witness Passed Over Control of Fund to Premier Fleming

Not only did Premier Fleming arrange for a treasurer for the grant fund from the crown limit holders, but he actually received for use at least part of the fund in the same bank notes in which it came from the hands of the contributors.

E. R. Teed continued his story at the inquiry into the Dugal charges yesterday afternoon, and told of making the payments to the premier, one alleged to be in payment for stock in one of the Gould railway companies, and another as a loan to Mr. Fleming's lumber company.

Whom he considered responsible for the fund was shown by Mr. Teed's evidence that when he was seriously ill he turned over the keys of the safety deposit box, in which the funds were held, to Premier Fleming.

The witness swears that the fund is still intact except for a portion of the earnings which were used to pay party bills.

As a mark of respect to the late Policeman O'Leary the court adjourned for twenty minutes while the funeral was passing the court house.

When the afternoon session opened E. R. Teed again took the stand and, examined by Mr. Stevens, continued the absorbing story which he commenced at the morning session.

Q.—You were introduced by W. H. Berry to Mr. Jones of the Partington Co. A.—On the second visit.

Q.—What reason did Berry give for Jones' not paying up?

A.—My recollection is that on the first occasion Mr. Berry did not see Mr. Jones. Afterwards it was my impression that Mr. Jones wanted to arrange for the payment and that there were some things to be cleared up.

Q.—And in the meantime you told Mr. Fleming about the progress being made?

A.—Yes, I might have mentioned. Q.—You told him the amounts received?

A.—No. Q.—And he did not know the amounts paid?

A.—Mr. Fleming never knew the amounts, at least, not from me. Q.—Did you not have a conversation in Bathurst with Mr. McLean of the Bathurst Lumber Co., in the residence of the manager of the Bank of Montreal?

Witness—It was in connection with Mr. McLean's proposed building of a pulp mill. At that time I had no knowledge of a change in the regulations. Mr. McLean pointed out that there would have to be a change in the arrangement to justify a large investment on a pulp mill. He asked me to take it up with the proper authorities to see if it could be arranged.

Q.—Do you know if Mr. McLean of the Bathurst Lumber Company paid any other money than the bonus besides the \$15,000.

A.—I don't know of any. Q.—Mr. Beattie gave evidence of a payment of \$5,000 in February, 1914. Did you get that?

A.—No. I went to bed with typhoid fever in January, 1914, and did not get out until March. Q.—Did you have any conversation with Mr. Berry since.

A.—Yes. Last Sunday night I was in bed and the telephone rang. I went down and long distance said I was wanted. I answered and it was Mr. Berry. He said he was at Calais and wanted me to come down and see him. I said I could not and he said that he had heard only one side of the story and wanted to talk to me. I told him that I would not go as it would be misconstrued.

Q.—Have you had any conversation with Mr. Fleming since these charges were made?

A.—No. Q.—What was the substance of the conversation?

A.—That is a large order. I probably saw him fifty times. He discussed the matter as it came out in the papers. Q.—Let us drop that for a while and tell me how much money you received altogether.

A.—\$28,165. Q.—How long did this remain in the safety deposit box in the Royal Bank at St. John.

A.—I took some of it out from time to time to invest in securities. Q.—I want to know what you did with it as it was taken out.

A.—I cannot tell that exactly. I can say that the full amount was always intact in one form or another. I bought stocks and had them in my own name. I did this through J. M. Robinson & Sons, St. John.

Witness—It was my desire to get the money in one fund. I bought from Robinson's 50 shares of Southern Pacific, 40 shares of Brazilian, 50 shares of Detroit United. That is all I bought from Robinson's. I think I bought 88 shares of Maine & N. B. Electrical Ry. stock from the Eastern Securities people.

Mr. Carvell—There were certificates for 50 shares, 12, 1, 5 and 5, a total of 73. These were all new certificates issued by the company in accordance with

instructions contained in a letter from A. R. Gould?

Witness—I bought these shares from the Eastern Securities Company. I understood that Mr. Fleming had 88 shares also and I told him if the Eastern Securities man came to see him to tell him that I wanted to see him, too. Mr. Fleming said that he could not pay for the 28 shares of the new issue to which he was entitled, and asked if I would take them. I said yes, and took the 88 shares at about 110 and got the dividend.

Q.—You had the registry changed? A.—No. I put them in the deposit box and afterwards sold them.

Q.—After you deposited this money in the bank deposit box you took enough out, within a month, to pay Mr. Fleming for 88 shares of this stock? A.—Yes.

Q.—They remained in Mr. Fleming's name on the books of the company? A.—I never changed them.

Q.—Then how did you get the dividends? A.—The dividends and the bonus went to him and he transferred them to me.

Q.—You still have them? A.—No. I sold them about two weeks ago. It was to a man who asked me about the stock some time ago. It was rumored around Woodstock that I had some and he wanted it. It was not Mr. Fleming or any member of the government.

Q.—Did anyone else have access to the safety deposit box? A.—No, except the when I was taken ill I told my wife that I had these keys and that in case of anything happening to me Mr. Fleming would arrange about the contents of the box which also contained some personal effects of my own. Mr. Fleming would arrange and as soon as I got better I took them.

Q.—Then why did you give Mr. Fleming the keys? A.—Because he knew of the contents of the box and I thought that he was the proper man in the interests of the party. If anything happened to me he would have him back the stock and he would have both the stock and the cash if you so wished?

A.—I would have given the whole amount if I wished. Q.—But you did not dispose of the stock until after the Dugal charges were made?

A.—No. Q.—Those were the only purchases and sales. I was in Mr. Fleming's office one day and in discussing his lumber business he said that the banks were insisting on more insurance on the lumber and he did not want to pay it. I said I am pretty well fixed for cash and have only limited opportunities to use it. If you can use it you might as well do so that it would be earning something. The upshot of it was that I loaned the Fleming, Gibson Company \$15,000.

Q.—Who composed this company? A.—J. K. Fleming, John Gibson, Charles Rogers and possibly the Demings boys.

Q.—What security did you get? A.—The note of the Fleming, Gibson Company, Limited.

Q.—Who signed it? A.—The company.

Q.—For whom? A.—I do not know.

Q.—Was the note ever paid? A.—Yes, in several payments.

Q.—How much was still due on the note when these charges were laid? A.—I cannot tell. I got the one payment about March 17 and I do not think that I would get more than one other payment before April 7. I knew I got one sum of \$3,000 and my impression is that another one of at least the same amount or \$4,000 was made soon after.

Q.—What did you do with the earnings? A.—Deposited them in an account in my own name in the Bank of Nova Scotia, Woodstock. It was a special account to take care of the earnings of the fund. When the charges were made, I supposed that everything was liable to come out, so I asked the bank for a special deposit receipt for everything I had there and any additional amounts came in they were credited to that account. If I had any balance of my own there I withdrew it and started new.

Q.—Then any earnings would go in the same way? A.—No.

Q.—Then how? A.—That is where I must ask to be excused. I kept the fund intact but there were some earnings. Regarding that I can say that no member of the government profited by them. I paid some small party bills out of the earnings, but the balance is on hand.

Q.—Was that done with Mr. Fleming's approval? A.—Yes, if I told him. I did not tell him of every transaction.

Premier Subpoenaed. Premier Fleming and E. R. Teed were served with subpoenas yesterday at the Victoria Hotel here calling upon them to give evidence in the Valley railway hearing when it is resumed probably this afternoon or tomorrow morning. A. G. Gould was an interested spectator in the court room at yesterday's hearing of the crown land charges, and it is assumed will be on hand for the Valley railway hearing when it is resumed.


