Speaking of the movement in the Church of England and the now famous circular sent out by himself as secretary the speaker said he was loyal to the principle of a historic episcopate and the importance of confirmation but that no man was narrow or stupid enough to believe that a preacher not ordained by a bishop was not a minister of Jesus Christ. "I will stake my ministry that the Church of England never did refuse the communion to an outsider simply because he was not confirmed. This is the Lord's table and not the Church of England's.'
