

SMASH RUBRICS OF IN THE WAY OF CHURCH UNITY

"Co-operation More Essential Than Ancient Rules"

REV. MR. SHATFORD

Montreal Clergyman's Views on Present Day Question — He Would Like to Welcome Missionary Leader to His Pulpit

(Montreal Herald) "I do not believe any rubric of the prayer book will be violated if we admit members of other churches to occasional communion in the Church of England, but, if they were, I would be willing to smash a rubric or two to give a place at the Lord's Table to some needy soul. These rubrics are very odd. Are we not big and brave enough to make our own laws, to decide, for instance, such matters as how long a cassock will be or how short a surplice?"

"I don't know, and I don't care, to what religious faith John R. Mott belongs, but I had permission to ask him to come to my church on his return from China and India and tell of the great work he is doing there. If Jesus were here He would recognize these other men, and what He would do surely I am not afraid to do."

"It would seem that the heart of Christ Himself would be broken by the pathos of our unreasonableness in maintaining in small and scattered communities in our own country five or six weak churches where one would serve the people."

"We should unite so that we can build up a national Christianity. There is a Latin Christianity, we know what that is a Scotch Christianity, and thank God for it; an English Christianity, which finds expression in the Church of England, but we have no Canadian Christianity to give to our world our own character in the essentials of solid truth."

His voice vibrating with earnestness and speaking with such emotion that the closing benediction was scarcely audible, the pastor of St. James' the Apostle, made a plea for church unity last evening which deeply stirred his congregation.

As he preached the gospel of tolerance and of a universal brotherhood his hearers sat spellbound, and at the close they seemed loath to go, but gathered in little groups discussing the pastor's message and the evident feeling that he put into it.

A reporter sat beside an elderly couple, evidently strangers to the church, and, possibly of some other denomination. As the speaker laid down his belief that the lack of confirmation was no bar to the occasional communion of strangers with the Church of England, a significant look passed between the couple and the look of the man's hand rested lightly for a moment upon that of his companion as much as to say, "Here we are welcome to matter how unfriendly the rest of the world may be."

Names a Sacrilege In beginning Rev. Mr. Shatford said one of the saddest things he had ever read was the list of religious bodies in Canada, seventy-nine in number, including the larger denominations and ending up with a few Homeless, Holy Rollers and all the other names which were almost a sacrilege.

"There has been much talk of union," he said, "but these bodies are engaged in uncharitable undertakings, one against the other seeking to proselytize Christians. While all the time professing love for Jesus and to see such a fuss made over the turning of one head, the Christian into another kind while there are still a thousand million heathens left in the world."

Rev. Mr. Shatford spoke of the necessity of unity from three standpoints—the economic, the social and the national. The economic need was for the present the prevention of overlapping both in the foreign field and in our own country, the social need was to meet the fact that outside organizations had to carry on the

salvage work of the church and that education was non-religious if not irreligious.

Loyal to Church

Speaking of the movement in the Church of England and the now famous circular sent out by himself as secretary of a historic episcopate and the importance of confirmation but that no man was narrow or stupid enough to believe that a preacher not ordained by a bishop was not a minister of Jesus Christ. "I will stake my ministry for the Church of England never did refuse the communion to an outsider simply because he was not confirmed. Easter tide and at Christmas there are 800 communicants at our table and who am I that I am to deny it to a Presbyterian or a Methodist approaching the altar to say, 'Go back, go back.' This is the Lord's table and not the Church of England's."

Waterloo Street Church

The annual meeting of the Waterloo street Baptist church was held last night and was largely attended. Reports were received from the various officers and all were encouraging. The report of the treasurer showed that the church is at present in a splendid financial condition and that besides defraying expenses, the collections from the various sources were sufficient to leave a large credit balance.

SOME QUESTIONS In an effort to do justice to Hon. William Pugsley, the Standard this morning pours forth the following stream of interrogations: "Who is the man who advanced from his position in the House on the right of the Leader of the Opposition and shook his clenched fist in the face of Mr. Robidoux, a young member from this province? Who is the man who persisted for days and days in holding up public business in order that the Government might be embarrassed to such an extent that there should be an appeal to the country? What manner of man is he who has been publicly snubbed by some of the principal members of his own party in the House of Commons? What man is it whose appearance upon the floor of the House in a public debate is nearly always the signal for laughs and sneers from his opponents who know that he will indulge in the most bizarre reasons and quixotic notions in an attempt to gain party capital?"

GET THE FACILITIES The St. John board of trade would make a serious mistake if it failed to press the claims of this port at Ottawa through any fear that the government would lose its respect for the citizens of St. John because they showed an interest in the affairs of this national port. The gentlemen at Ottawa find it necessary to keep themselves more or less informed about conditions in this province, and to meet delegations and receive representations from many parts of the country. Despite what may be said about their anxiety to do everything for the port of St. John, it is extremely doubtful if any action would have been taken at all farther than had been taken, to provide additional facilities at West St. John for next winter if the city council and board of trade had not very pointedly called attention to the actual conditions existing here from the middle of March to the end of April. There is no disposition whatever on the part of those who are pressing the claims of this port to make capital against the government, and there is therefore not the slightest excuse for any display of super-sensitiveness on the part of any supporter of the government. If the citizens should allow themselves to be lulled into a false security in regard to the provision of additional accommodations at West St. John, and should next winter find greater congestion than has been complained of this year, it would not need matters for them at that stage to complain of those who may now insist that the government know everything and will do everything, without any suggestion or manifestation of interest on the part of the city council and board of trade. Nobody has yet positively declared that the Connolly wharf with tracks and warehouses will be ready for next winter's business. Several persons who ought to know have declared their conviction that it cannot be made available in time. This is not a matter concerning which there should be any doubt at all. If that wharf cannot be completed in time, other provision must be made, and whatever can be done to expedite, not only the completion of that wharf, but of the new one, which tenders are to be called, should be urged upon the government in the strongest manner possible; and the supporters of the government should be the most active in the matter, for purely political reasons if for no other.

IMMIGRATION The policy of uniting the various boards of trade of the province to co-operate with the provincial government in the matter of immigration is a good one, and ought to produce good results. This is a matter concerning which politics may well be set aside, and all parties unite to strengthen the hands of the government in its efforts to secure more immigrants of a desirable class for this province. The cities and towns have a great deal to gain from having the rural districts more thickly peopled with thrifty farmers, and the work of bringing in such people can best be carried on through one central agency, such as the provincial department of immigration. It is generally felt that the government was pursuing a wise policy to make a much larger expenditure in this direction than has ever been made in the past. There can be no doubt that the co-operation of the boards of trade would be of great benefit, and it would encourage the government to adopt a more vigorous policy, and one that would be worthy of a province which has so much to offer. There has never been as favorable a

times as the present to press the claims of New Brunswick upon the small farmers of the mother country. The general spirit of optimism which prevails among our own people, and which is growing from year to year, would have a much more inspiring influence upon new settlers than that which in former years rather tended to make the newcomer pity himself for having landed in a community whose people were never weary of telling how much greater the opportunities were in Western Canada than in their own neighborhood. By all means let the boards of trade and the municipal authorities as well be encouraged to co-operate with the government in this great work.

Mr. Goutelin was given a cordial welcome to St. John by representative business men yesterday, and will always find them ready to co-operate with him in making the International Railway more useful to this part of Canada.

GERMAN COLONY FOR WEST Party of 250 Have Acquired 12,000 Acres of C. P. R. Land Montreal, May 14—Early this summer 250 well-to-do German farmers, who have acquired 12,000 acres of C. P. R. land in the Dawson Lake district, north of Saskatoon, will arrive in Montreal, and proceed west, where they will engage extensively in mixed farming. Each one of these farmers will have about half a section of land, but the entire colony will farm on the basis of stock in common, after they reach Canada. The land is all raw prairie. Already the little colony have bought four complete steam ploughing outfits, and as much land as possible will be broken this season. All these Germans are prosperous, and have had experience in farming in the old land, many of them having sold fertile farms in Germany with the idea of putting capital in farming and other Canadian enterprises. Stock raising will be one of the chief branches of agriculture in which the new settlers will engage, and they will make a specialty in breeding thoroughbred animals.

OPTION AT HALF OF FORMER FIGURE

County Council Ties up Municipal Home at \$75,000

A STIRRING SESSION

Four City Men Oppose and One Favors Transaction - Modern Buildings For Public Hospital - Other Important Matters Taken Up

The meeting of the municipal council yesterday afternoon proved particularly interesting and at times the session was more than usually lively. The most important business was the decision to give an option on the Municipal Home to the Eastern Trust Company for \$75,000.

The report of the committee on finance and accounts was first considered, and Councillor McLellan introduced a resolution calling for the erection of a new building for hospital purposes.

The Lanceter sewerage district was enlarged to include all that territory in which sewerage work is to be done and the boundaries were defined.

Pal detailed plans are to be prepared and the committee is to have expert advice in regard to the building and cost of maintenance.

The assessment committee reported that real and personal property is to be rated at full value, as in the case of other cities.

The Lancaster Sewerage Board submitted a report on the proposed extension in Lancaster Heights and Lancaster avenues at a cost of \$32,000.

On resuming business, David Harrover was reappointed commissioner of the Municipal Home.

William McAfee was selected to succeed the late Andrew Gibson on the main board.

The vacancy in the board of health caused by the death of James Beatty was filled by the appointment of George Blake.

The Tuberculosis Board. Nominations for commissioners for the new St. John Tuberculosis Hospital, which is to be erected near Douglas avenue, were sent out by Mr. Agar's own action.

Not He Owned It. Councillor Agar thought the present site was favorable and if he owned it he would not wish to sell it at that price.

Councillor McLellan - "As far as the amount of sentiment is concerned I think I represent as much as Mr. Agar does. I do not feel uneasy about what will appear in the morning papers either.

Option on Municipal. The request of the Eastern Trust Company for an option on the Municipal Home until November 1, 1913 for \$75,000, which is to be paid in three instalments, the last in November, 1914, was next taken up.

Councillor Agar moved that the letter be acknowledged and that the applicants be told that the property was not for sale.

Councillor McLellan reviewed the history of the recent offer of \$200,000 from the same company for the Municipal Home property.

Councillor Dean thought that the firm in connection with the home should be small. "If the home goes to St. Martin's it can be secured at low cost, the whole building can be got cheap," he added.

Cheering reports are coming from the campaign in Sydney (N. S.), where it was announced today that John and James Burchell each donated \$1,000.

Two great hotels, one for "down-and-out" men, where lodgings will cost but 5 cents a night and the other for working girls, where rooms may be had for a similar price, will be opened in Chicago before next winter.

The motion to give the Eastern Trust Company an option on the Municipal Home property for \$75,000 to run till November, 1913, and allow the company to pay for the property in three instalments, the last to be paid in November, 1914, was then passed, the members voting as follows:

Yes: McLellan, Smith, Shillington, Long, Dean, Bryant, Stephenson, Howard, Black, Cameron, Nay, Agar, Schofield, Wigmore.

that the property has depreciated in value. The offer of \$75,000 may look ridiculous but there has been a falling off of values in the vicinity of the home.

Councillor Schofield - "I am still of the opinion that it was when the other offer was made and I see no reason why we should accept this offer. The city, of course, is feeling some effects of the blasting operations at Courtenay Bay, but we must consider it as an adjunct of commercial property."

Councillor Frink pointed out the importance of the property under discussion. It was situated on the Little River and the land was very valuable. He did not think that the present offer was enough.

The motion was then put and lost with only Councillors Agar, Frink, Wigmore and Schofield supporting it.

Councillor McLellan then moved that the offer be accepted, and that the necessary papers be drawn up at once. The motion was seconded by Councillor Howard.

Major Frink - "It is evident that the old machine methods of politics are at an end, and that the city is not being considered on its merits."

Councillor McLellan - "I will not stand for any such statements. I challenge any man in the room to say that I influenced him in any way."

Councillor Frink - "Not one man from the county has taken part in this discussion. I think they should tell where they stand and their reasons."

Councillor Shillington thought the price offered was the outside value of the property.

Councillor Black said that he was never in any ring, but when he voted he voted intelligently. He thought that the price offered was all the property was worth.

Councillor Howard said there was no frame-up on the matter and he was not known of the price offered until yesterday.

Councillor Schofield pointed out the need of getting as much as possible for the property in order to have something to secure a new home with \$80,000 was the estimate for the new building alone and the land was to be secured besides.

WHITEWASH BLONDIS. Ottawa, May 13 - The imperialistic government of Canada loudly rallied behind the Nationalist Deputy Speaker, Blondin tonight, who has been interpreting rules for them.

In the morning E. M. MacDonald, by motion, had impeached Deputy Speaker Blondin. At midnight the Conservatives gave their votes to clear Mr. Blondin's name.

At midnight the house divided and the Conservatives by a majority of fifty-four defeated the M. Blondin impeached property.

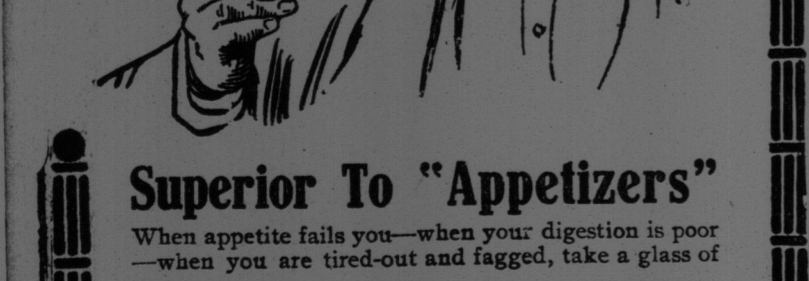

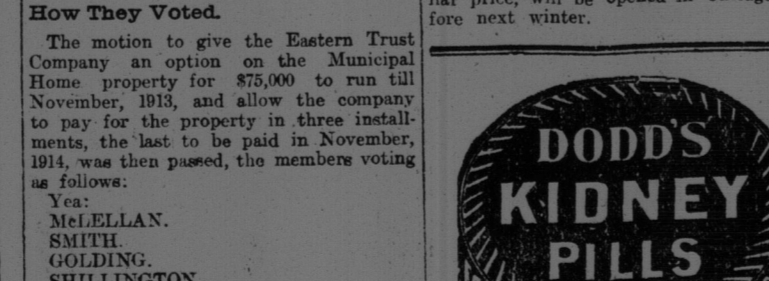

Rigo is beset by many legal troubles at present. His first wife has served upon him a citation in an action for divorce. It came the same day that the papers in the suit of the princess were served. Rigo believes the princess and his first wife have joined hands in a campaign to make him miserable. To the first wife he says he gave 5000 francs three years ago to bring her suit.

Just as all this was not enough, Rigo himself is suing for \$800 which, he says, is due him for a ten days' engagement at Miller's, the old Hot Metropole, which has gone into bankruptcy.

GOOD WORK DONE FOR THE SEAMEN

Annual Meeting of Society—Mr. Smith President—More Than 19,000 Seamen Visitors in 1912-13

The annual meeting of the Seamen's Mission Society was held last evening in the Seamen's Institute and the following officers were elected: President, R. M. Smith; vice-president, L. P. D. Tilley, M. L. A.; secretary, J. N. Rogers; treasurer, R. J. Evans; manager, Hew Walker.

The report of the president showed that during the year just closed more than 19,000 seamen visited the institution, an increase of about 3,000 over the year 1911-12, and he made a special appeal to the members and their friends that, in view of the possible further increase in the number next year, they should so generously assist in the work in the past, as well as many others, would still feel that the mission was worthy of their financial aid.

Mr. Smith spoke feelingly of the loss sustained by the death of William J. Parks, who had been a regular attendant at the meetings and who was always ready to assist in the work of the society by word and deed.

He also touched on the excellent work accomplished by the British and Foreign Seafarers' Society since its inception in 1818, and the words of appreciation received from the president, Lord Strathcona, which, he said, should awaken an added interest in this great national work. He spoke of the attention that had been paid this year to the sick and injured seamen in the General Public Hospital, and in conclusion thanked the pastors of the churches who had given their services on Saturday and Sunday evenings, Miss Thompson and Miss Comben, who took charge of the piano at the meetings and on other occasions, the officers and men from the steamships who had aided in making the season a success, and the Ladies' Auxiliary for their generous contribution and their assistance at the Christmas festival, and he hoped that the coming year would be one of blessing to the seamen who entered this port and to the members of the society, upon whom rested the responsibility of a great and noble work.
