ROADS AND AUTOS

The Amherst News contends that if our roads were improved so that automobile traffic would be attracted, these provinces would become a veritable Mecca for American touring parties. The News 18498:—

"If we had one broad well macadamized highway leading from the border city of St. Stephen on the state of Maine frontier and then on to Halifax it is safe to say that we would have at least five hundred motors passing through these provinces every year. "The winner in each case was a Canadian," says the Times, "and Sir Charles Ross may well be proud of his great success."
