Daily Hints For the Cook

RADISH SALAD. Slice as many radishes as needed, lay them on a bed of lettuce. Place around the radishes any greens that are left over from previous salads and serve cold with a French dressing.

HOW TO PEEL ONIONS WITHOUT CUTTING. Cover the onion with cold water and hold both onion and knife under water while peeling—Woman's World. HOW TO PEEL TOMATOES QUICKLY. Have on the stove a pan of boiling water. Put ripe tomatoes into wire basket and lower them into the water. Leave them in the water one minute, remove and slice—Woman's World. WAFFLES WITH PEAS. Boil the peas until tender, or use left-over peas, and drain until very dry, then mix through a strainer. Pour a cupful of boiling milk into a cup of strained peas, adding a generous tablespoonful of butter. When the mixture gets cool, add two eggs, yolks and whites beaten separately, two tablespoonfuls of baking powder sifted with a cup of flour. If too thin, add more flour. Bake in buttered waffle iron; sprinkle with powdered sugar or serve hot with maple syrup.

MORNING LOCALS

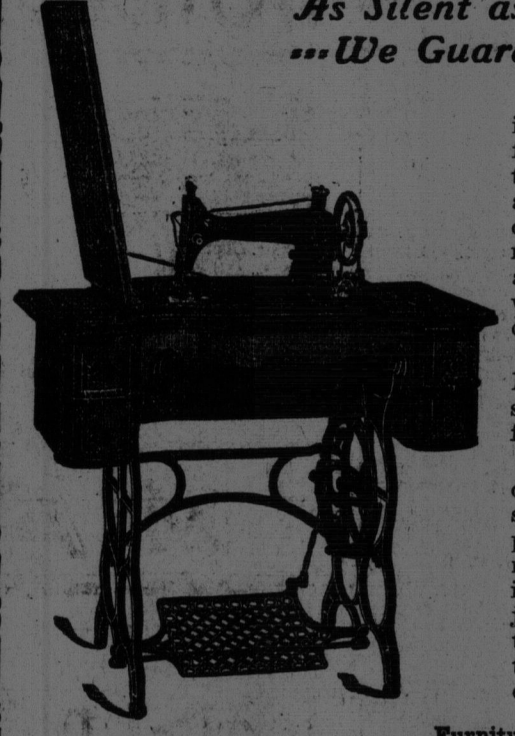

WHOLESALE ARRESTS OF DETROIT ALDERMEN ON BRIBERY CHARGES

Detroit, Mich., July 26.—Eight aldermen and the secretary of the common council committees were placed under arrest this afternoon on charges of accepting bribes and conspiracy to accept a bribe for their votes and influence in the passing of a measure affecting city property recently transferred to the Wabash railroad.

At least six other arrests of aldermen are expected at any moment and it is alleged that \$3,000 passed hands in sums of from \$100 to \$1,000. The bribery was committed under the personal supervision of Detective William J. Burns.

The aldermen arrested are: Thomas Clinch, president of the council, who is alleged to have received \$1,000; E. J. Schneider, Jr., secretary of council committees, and also secretary of the American League of Municipalities, who is charged with having received \$500; Alderman Martin A. Brennan, who received \$300; Alderman Patrick O'Brien, who received \$200; Alderman Louis T. Gray, who received \$100; Alderman Frank J. Mason, Alderman Louis Bruno, and Alderman Deibel, the last three being charged with accepting \$100 each.

Alderman Clinch has long been known in city politics as a "strong" man. He was arrested this afternoon. It is said he turned over \$1,000 and made a complete confession. Schneider, secretary of the council, who engineered the affair, was arrested in his office. He had not received any money, but the officers said that he went to the office with the detective, who seized under the guise of West Michigan lumber to examine serious and discovered the officers who had just arrested Clinch. It is said he also made a confession.

The detectives claim that they have caught these men with the marked money. The investigation, which culminated in the arrests today, has been going on since February, when rumors of graft in the municipal office began to become serious. Mayor William B. Thompson sought the services of detectives and Arthur Green, a prominent manufacturer, agreed to finance the probe.

THAW REFUSED HIS LIBERTY

White Plains, N. Y., July 26.—Harry K. Thaw, in the eyes of the law is still sane and must remain in the asylum where he was placed on Feb. 1st, 1908, after he had killed Stanford White. Justice Koogh of the Supreme Court today denied Thaw's application for freedom. The court took the ground that Thaw's release would be dangerous to public safety. This is the third attempt made by Harry K. Thaw to gain his liberty from Matteawan Asylum for the Criminal Insane on a writ of habeas corpus. The sole question tried before Justice Koogh without a jury was whether Thaw is now sane.

During the present trial which began on June 17 and was much briefer than the previous habeas corpus proceedings, Mrs. Evelyn Nesbit Thaw took the witness stand and Thaw himself was called to testify to the authenticity of several letters written by him. LUNCHES FOR SCHOOL CHILDREN

The intimate connection between hungry bodies and hungry minds is receiving particular attention in European cities. In Berlin 7,000 pupils in one year had school lunches furnished them; in Hamburg 3,000 while in Leipzig the number thus aided amounted to 2,200, according to information received at the United States Bureau of Education. In Munich and Nuremberg both breakfast and lunch are furnished to needy pupils. In Ludwigshafen bread and milk are given each morning to the children who have reached school without having been fed. In Belgium soup and bread are given to the impoverished pupils; in Lecce alone in 1910, 384,287 rations were supplied. In Italy it is considered part of the duty of the authorities to be on the lookout for people who seem not to be properly nourished, and to provide them with food. In Norway substantial lunches are furnished by the city authorities, a central kitchen being used for this purpose.

Thaw has been living at the local jail in charge of the sheriff since his case opened early in June.

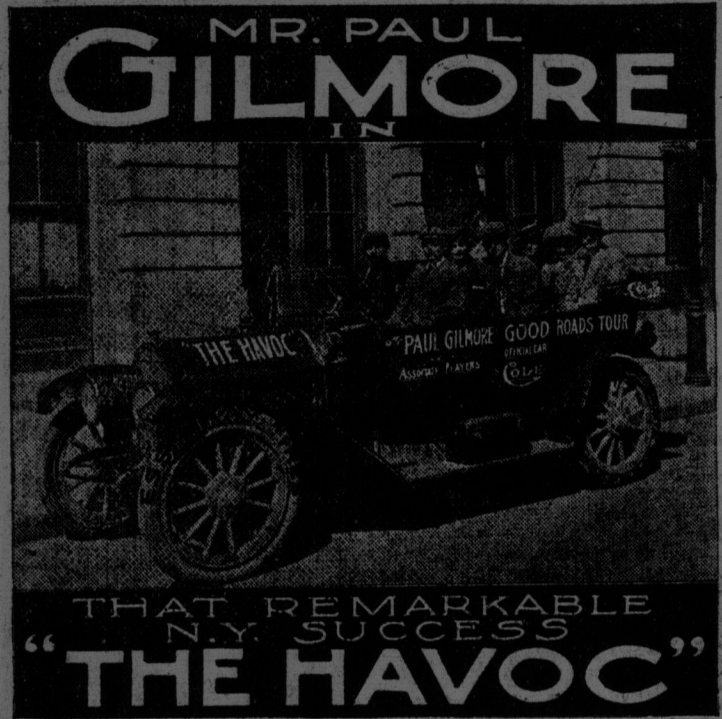

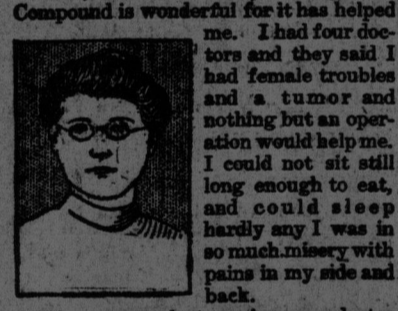

BIG CHANGES EFFECTED AT COURTENAY BAY

Rapidly Removing Hill—Breakwater Foundation Arising—Site of the Dry Dock

For any who might still hold in doubt the tangibility of the Courtenay Bay development and its connection with the future of St. John, a visit to that quarter is prescribed.

Already it has become the objective for those who frequent once a week for their Sunday constitutional, but a great many have not visited the works. To do so will mean a most interesting half-hour's diversion necessary to get there.

Very concrete evidence of the gigantic works planned are visible on every hand and yawning cavities in the hillside testify to the enormous quantities of soil and rock that have already been removed.

While the work is yet without much form the visitor can still get some idea of the breakwater to be built, which the present activities of the contractors and engineers are concentrated.

Effective Assaults on the Hill

The hill between the powerhouse and the works of the Provincial Chemical Fertilizer Company forms the base of operations. This face Courtenay Bay and it shows the most striking results of the work so far. As a result of the few weeks of operations the face of it has been blasted away and down the slope towards the sea lies in shattered fragments the once solid rock.

Already a large portion of the debris has been carted away by team work to that part of the shore adjoining where the breaker starts. A long pile of broken rock, ample evidence of the labor output, stretches from the harbor out to the rocks a couple of hundred yards of more distant from high tide. This broken rock is being utilized by the contractors as ballast for the 4,750 foot breakwater which will run far into the bay. The work of removing the rock has been done by team work but this is expensive and slow and it is anticipated that within a fortnight or so a railway line will have been run in round the face of the hill and the broken rock will then be transferred direct by the dump cars to a treatment railway which runs out along the edge of the breaker, and from which the cars will dump the material which is to be used as ballast.

The Dry Dock

It is the intention to use a certain portion of the hill as a wall for the dry dock and consequently excavating operations are at present being carried on there and to that part of the hill lying inland. An immense steam shovel of the most modern type, weighing in the neighborhood of eighty tons is delving away at the heart of the hill inland, which is largely composed of soft shale. This shovel will dig up about eight tons and dumps and draws and lifts with one of the most powerful cranes of the world. It is being immediately into one of the waiting cars which are run along another spur line to form a bank on which is laid the line to be used in conveying the rock from the hillside to the breaker.

By the present method of carrying the rock about 600 tons a day are handled but with the railway line in operation the work will be greatly facilitated.

Much inconvenience is experienced because of the state of the ground, which is saturated with water and a soft and workable condition, making it a matter of difficulty to lay solid foundations for the various pieces of machinery. It was because of this condition that the locomotive was used a few days ago. This will be the case until the ground is being ripped up and in a day or two it will be hoisted from its ignominious position.

About 175 men are being employed just now. They are of all nationalities and a well set up body of men. No difficulty is experienced in getting labor. Through the number employed appears to be smaller than many thought, with the modern and powerful machinery in use a very much greater force is represented and what a few years ago would have been done by painful and costly manual labor is now performed with economy in all directions by this powerful machinery.

The operations are, of course, not in full blast as a considerable amount of the plant has yet to be assembled.

The first track election took place on the morning of the 26th, and the work was carried on by the contractors, Messrs. Cartier, Pa. William Smith and Harry Gibb, local policemen, have taken the Wilson and the sides respectively. The loss will play a hard-gurdy in every town between Cartier and Washington, D. C., except with a concert from the White House, the trip to last fifteen days.

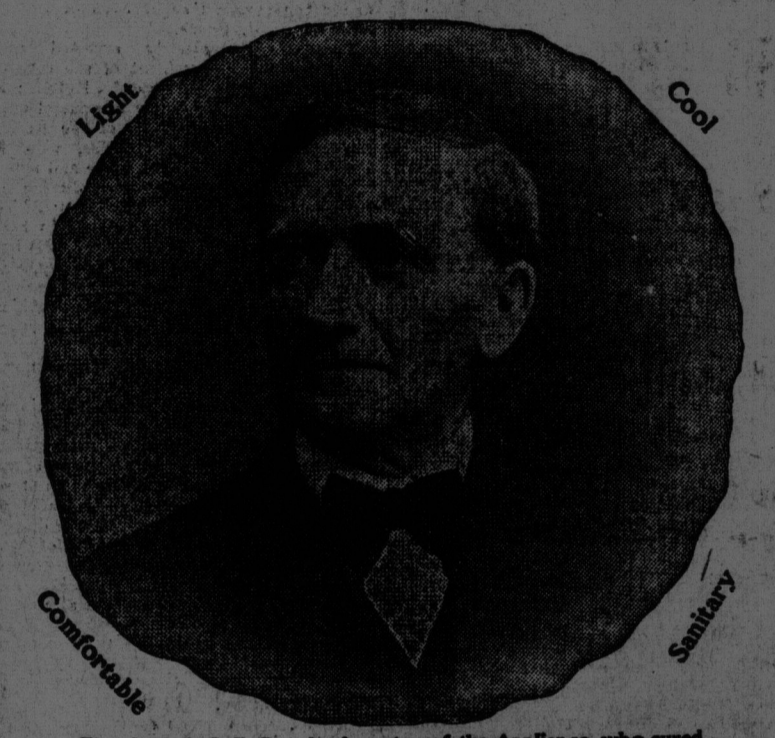

Return-Visit by British Ministers

London Times suggests that Premier Asquith and Colleagues Should Visit Canada

London, July 26—An interesting suggestion made by the Times in an editorial today.

It would be unbecoming," it says, "for Mr. Asquith to announce his policy on so large and momentous a matter as Canada's contribution to the navy anywhere but in the Canadian parliament. There are few things we can suppose which would more surely deepen the effect of his statements, when it comes, and do more to knit yet more closely the ties which his visit here, and his conference with ministers here, has done so much to strengthen, than on his return to the dominion for two or three statesmen with whom he has taken counsel in Whitehall to accompany him."

"The prime minister and the first lord have been to see with their own eyes the position in the Mediterranean, and we doubt not they have learned much by their visit. Could not Mr. Asquith and Mr. Churchill, during part of the coming recess to visit Canada? We are confident that such a step would be taken by all wise statesmen, marking a new date in the annals of the empire."

The Standard's Paris correspondent, noting the arrival of Mr. Pelletier there, announces that Premier Poincaré will preside at a luncheon given in honor of the Canadians by the Franco-American committee on Tuesday. The correspondent also sends the views published in "England," it says, "cannot do otherwise than foster the Franco-Canadian sympathies, which is an excellent speculation for her. The more love Canada bears towards France the more ironclad England can ask, if she says that British ships will help to defend France, whilst some day the united forces will join in battle against a common foe."

"When that day comes, and British Dreadnaughts, presented by Canada, thunder in the North Sea, it will not only be for the honor and interest of old England but for the glory and safety of our own country. In building battleships for the United Kingdom, Canadians will prove faithful sons of both their fatherland, England, and of their first mother, France."

The Fall Mall Gazette tonight says: "There probably exists in the mind of many people the idea that to welcome the desire of the dominions to join in the work of naval defence, relieves us from the need to make supreme efforts, which the political situation, so obviously demands. In this matter judicious reticence is of the highest importance, a fact hinted at yesterday by Mr. Hazen in a most delicate way. We warmly appreciate the repeated manifestations of solidarity which naval armaments the past few years have called forth but it is not for us to discuss what the dominions will or will not do, or take their good intentions into account in estimating our duty. There is too much to be said and to be done by the dominions, and it is too helpful to them or agreeable to Canadian people."

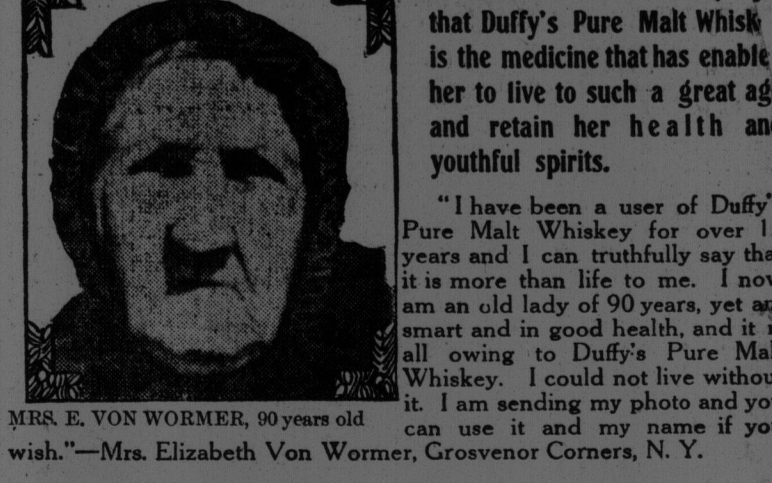

GAMBLING THE LIFE BLOOD OF NEW YORK GANG SYSTEM

Gunmen as Protectors—A Glimpse Into The Situation Which Led to Rosenthal Murder

Their Apaches go to war when the two great gambling factions of New York fall out. Last week Herman Rosenthal was shot to death at the very doors of the Metropole hotel because he was furnishing testimony to the district attorney which would result in the closing of numerous gaming houses.

Rosenthal was dangerous to the interests of the "profession," but he was only a pawn in the great game of chess the gamblers play, with "protection" for the prize. He was growing powerful, he became a menace, his enemies called upon the "emergency allies" of the gamblers and he was done to death.

The shooting shocked New York, as it shocked the city, yet one who is thoroughly familiar with the workings of the underworld declares it was merely an incident in the squabbling of two sets of gamblers over protection from the police which they said they had paid for.

There are two "trusts" of gamblers known to a certain type of policeman as "legitimate gamblers" and those who are "not dependable." The "legitimate" are those who pay for protection and do not "squabble" when the police occasionally raid them in order to square themselves with the heads of the department.

The men are, paradoxical as it may seem, honest in their dealings with the police. For instance, if a crooked police official promises to protect one of these gamblers for a certain sum of money monthly, that police official may be absolutely certain the money will be paid with regularity.

Rosenthal crosses 5th Ave. The "not dependables" are the men who do not deal squarely with the police who do not pay to protect them. This is the class of gamblers who were protected. Their efforts to do so under the wing of dishonest policemen and the natural enemy they bore the more affluent protected gentry are responsible for the bad display of manhood.

Herman Rosenthal, formerly president of the Hepler club, a famous gambling resort of the lower east side, was so successful in his profession that he aspired to bigger things. He transferred his activities to West Forty-fifth street, where some of the bigger gamblers operated establishments.

A man who knows all the ins and outs of the underworld told me that Rosenthal was one of the class of gamblers known as "not dependables" who migrated west of Fifth avenue. But he had a friend on the police force who was in sad need of money.

This friend, according to Rosenthal's own statements, offered his police protection and gave it to him. Rosenthal was a good payer, and the officials who were giving him protection were inclined to extend their benevolence to other gamblers of his class.

Protectors Powerless The extension of protection to the men who had hitherto been outcasts angers the "legitimate," for it detracted from their business. They complained about it to policemen who were protecting them. The police, those of them who were in the crooked game, saw their monopoly of this kind of craft being dissolved, but they dared not interfere in the territory which was newly protected, for they knew that those interested in Rosenthal and his associates would retaliate by invading their realms and making raids there.

Just such a situation has caused more than one hand fight, for, as will be shown here, the gamblers have at their back and call hands of thugs who will assault or "beat up" any person desired if only they receive their price.

There is no romance in the make-up of the gun men of New York, despite frequent tales to the opposite. They are men for money, and it is the vision of dollars that steadies their aim.

Forced to Raid Through underground channels the story reached honest officials higher up than certain members of the force were protecting Rosenthal and his associates. News of the leak reached Rosenthal and then the men who were protecting him began the "squaring process" and to apparently disprove the stories of protection Rosenthal's place was repeatedly "squared."

That is, it was broken into and closed up. He moved, and was "squared" again. So it went until the gambler began to get nettled.

Other protected gamblers, he said, were not being "squared" and why should he bear the brunt and the expense of all the squaring process. It was explained to him that his protection had been given to men on the force was casting suspicion on them and that he was the logical one to "squad."

This seemed like good logic to the police involved, to the other gamblers of Rosenthal's "trust," and, in fact, to every one except Rosenthal, who was no logician.

"Emergency Allies" Then he did what no "legitimate" has ever done. He did what crooked policemen old in the game expected of his class, the very thing which has always prevented his "trust" from getting protection. He made public charges against Lieut. Becker and alleged that Becker had an interest in his gambling business.

Becker was not the only man to suffer for this. All the gamblers of Rosenthal's set were affected. Their business fell off. They did not dare to operate because the police had been spurred to activity and would be willingly obliged to clean up the district.

Rosenthal also furnished the names of many men whom he said had paid the police for protection and had not received it. The gambling situation was in a future. The only ones pleased were the "legitimate," who would now receive the patronage of men who could no longer gamble in the smaller establishments.

Even their pleasure was a little dubious for the outcome of the whole thing might be a cleanup on the entire town. When Rosenthal left the Lower East Side he retained all his old affiliations and enemies. There were many of his former pals who had repudiated him and his last more made enemies not only of his gambling associates but of his former protectors. An iron clad law of the gambling community in New York is that no matter how hard it pinches the victim, there is no quarrel when the "squaring" show is fitted to his foot. There were therefore many men to

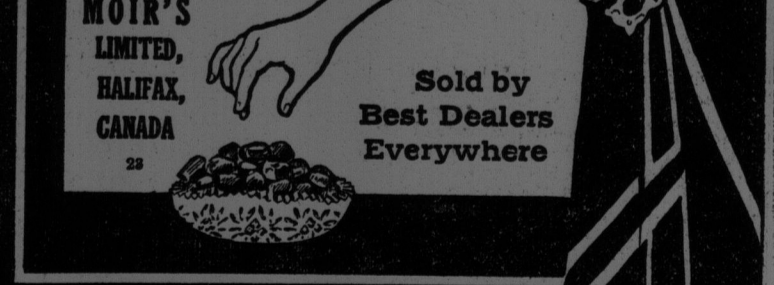

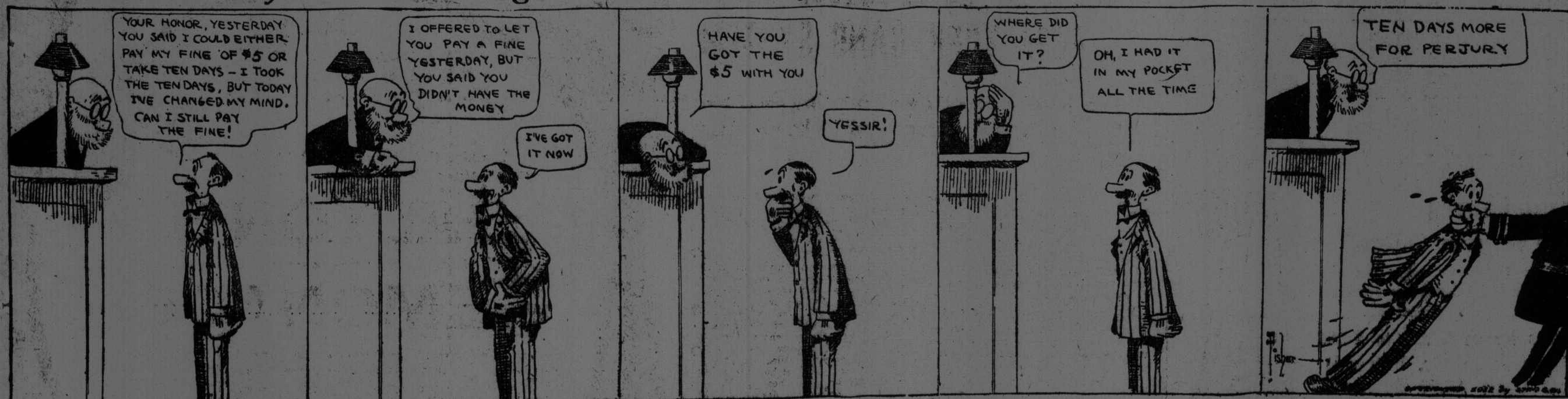

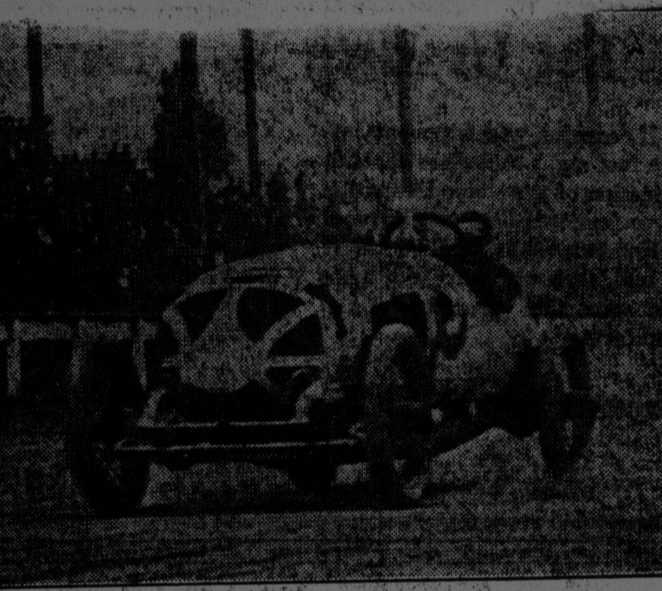

DEAL SHIPMENTS FROM ST. JOHN AT LOW EBB THIS YEAR

Prevailing Freight Too High For Profitable Trans-Atlantic Business—American Market Affords Chief Relief

With practically nothing being shipped from this port to the English market, it is years since conditions have reached the present low ebb in the deal business, and the shipments as a consequence will show a big falling off. The almost prohibitive ocean freights are largely responsible for the situation as it is.

Worst of all, as one large dealer said yesterday, there is no immediate promise of relief as freights remain decidedly firm. The general reason given for the present condition of affairs is the business the world over is buoyant and tonnage as a result for all lines of trade is in great demand.

Shipments from up the bay will, however, show little or no decrease, as ships from there are compelled to meet the high rates by lower prices for their deals and the prediction was made yesterday that the North Shore shippers would make little money this season. The one relief St. John lumbermen have is that their close proximity to the American market enables them to divert a portion of the trade means to send all their products in that direction and much stock is being manufactured and held awaiting a change of conditions.

The English dealers however are not suffering, that is to say there has been no shortage felt as there is always considerable of a supply ahead.

Farmers in the wood circular for the present month says of the New Brunswick and Nova Scotia market: The import to the Mersey (including Manchester) amounted to 21,070 standards, compared with 12,380 standards during the corresponding period last year; the greater portion on this occasion arriving in Liverpool district. Deliveries have fallen considerably short of this large import, and the stock is correspondingly increased, being about equally divided between Liverpool and Manchester; values are practically unchanged. Pine deals have arrived more freely and are in fair request.

POWER BOAT CLUB NEEDS MORE ROOM

Extension to Club-House and Berth Room Planned—Stringent Rules For Traffic in the Cove

Although in existence as an organized body for just a little more than two years, the St. John Power Boat Club has gone ahead with encouraging and remarkable strides, and its membership which has increased until the names of 600 have been inscribed thereon, the necessity for larger quarters is being felt.

Of these six hundred names, two hundred are the owners of boats, which tends to show to what extent the popularity of the power launch has advanced in local waters, and also to give emphasis to the fact that the fleet is steadily increasing.

Naturally, with such a large fleet, it is absolutely necessary that the utmost precautions be exercised in the matter of slipping in and out of the snug little harbor at Marble Cove, where the clubhouse is established, and in order to prevent accidents stringent rules have recently been posted warning the members against speeding. These regulations were adopted some time ago and while they were on the statute books of the club, they were not adhered to as rigidly as many of the members would like, so that at a recent meeting it was decided to enforce their rules vigorously and to advise all to this effect.

Notices have been sent to every member of the club this week. The letter to be attended to as rigidly as possible, setting forth clearly and distinctly the necessity of being careful in proceeding in and out of the cove, and warning him that no boat is to come in or go out at more than the lowest rate of speed possible. Coming into the cove, low speed must be immediately established on entering what is known as the "dredged track," and this policy is to be attended to on going out when no speed is to be gotten on until safely outside the slip.

Disobedience of these ordinances is threatened with official public lecture, for the first offence suspension and fine on the second. It is really remarkable that with so many boats using the narrow water in the cove there have been no accidents of any consequence. True it is that one or other of the boats has run against another, but this is liable to happen anywhere, and it speaks well for the manipulators of the "chug-chugs" that there have been no damaging collisions. This year there is a marked improvement in the matters of berths which ensures greater safety and also makes for convenience, through the systematic way in which they are arranged.

But the number of boats in the fleet is steadily being augmented, and with these signs of prosperity is felt the necessity of making provisions for the newcomers and late-comers. A scheme is now under consideration whereby the cove will be dredged about twenty feet wider, which will add materially to the harbor space and make way for better and greater accommodation, providing a large number of new berths. The clubhouse will also be enlarged upon and the proposal is to extend it back about twenty feet, allowing much larger quarters and preparing to cope with the increasing roll, and the anticipated future prosperity.

PROSPECTS FOR SEASON'S CROPS IN THIS PROVINCE

Wet Weather Had Serious Effect in Earlier Part of Summer, But Indications Are Now More Promising

Divided opinions are entertained by the farmers throughout the surrounding country concerning the effects of the heavy rain of the past few days. While it is admitted that in many sections of the Province it was ruinous to a portion of the crops, it is also conceded that it did a vast amount of good in other districts where the ground was higher and where the prolonged dry spell of the previous few weeks had caused the ground to be heated and in need of water. The early spring was backward; consequently there was a delayed growth on the part of most vegetables, and produce which should have found its way to market weeks ago, is just now being offered for sale and prices which would have seemed fairly reasonable a month ago, are comparing in strong contrast as regards advancement, with those of this time last year.

There came a long period of warmth and dryness and under the welcoming rays of bright June sun, vegetation materially advanced, the crops bounded into healthy life and there was every promise of a beautiful harvest. But too much heat or too much rain is not encouraging to farm life, and so it is that when farmers are asked as to prospects and present conditions they are uncertain as to whether or not the continuation of either a wet or a dry spell of the weather will be beneficial or not. As a matter of fact the rain did effect the berry crop. Under the first day's rain there was an unexpected increase in the berry harvest, but with the prolongation of the downfall the berries have become soft and watery and practically unfit for market.

Just as to cereals, potatoes, beets, carrots, turnips, cabbage, etc. the rain is expected to be effective for their betterment in some sections too much of it has caused a slight rust to be manifest on pears and beans, but this is not general and they will be marketed in abundant quantities in the next week or so. Regarding potatoes it is difficult as yet to estimate the harvest, but reports are to the effect that the growth has been steady though slow, and under favorable weather conditions, the crop will be well up to the standard. Expectations were that it would have been much better than last year, when a record was established this being thought because more attention was paid to potatoe vegetation, larger stocks being planted and with wide markets holding out, there was every reason to believe that this year would show a vast increase in the harvest of this greatly used vegetable. It is still hoped that such will be the case despite discouraging reports from many sections, but it will be some few weeks before anything definite can be known.

Haying was started in some parts of the country and many of the farmers have expected that if they had mowed and cocked, but the wiser ones are they who still have their crop untouched because the rain has had a tendency to blacken and damage what has been cut. On the lowlands where floods were prevalent this year, particularly in the potatoe growing stacks were in this way damaged. Indications are that the hay crop this year will be generally good, and what is now hoped for is a stretch of warm sunny weather to help in the putting and harvesting.

"HAPPY DAYS" END ON SUNDAY WITH ANNUAL SERVICE

Plans of Yachtmen For Close of Cruise—Divine Service at Carter's Point—Spots Yesterday
