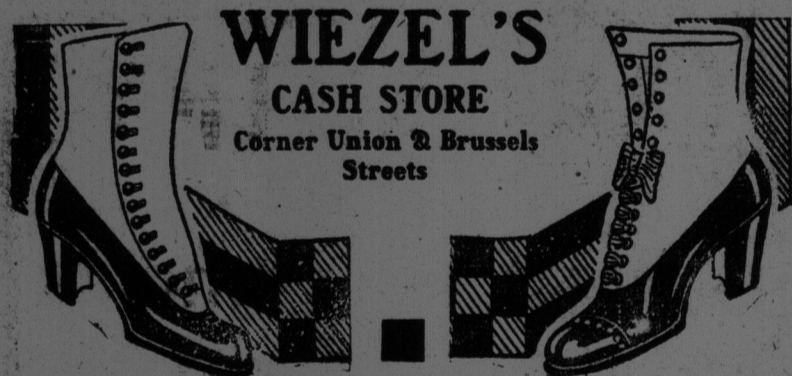

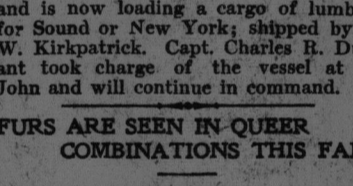

Maryland, and Miss Helen, at home. One brother, William Fletcher of Beaver Dam, also survives.

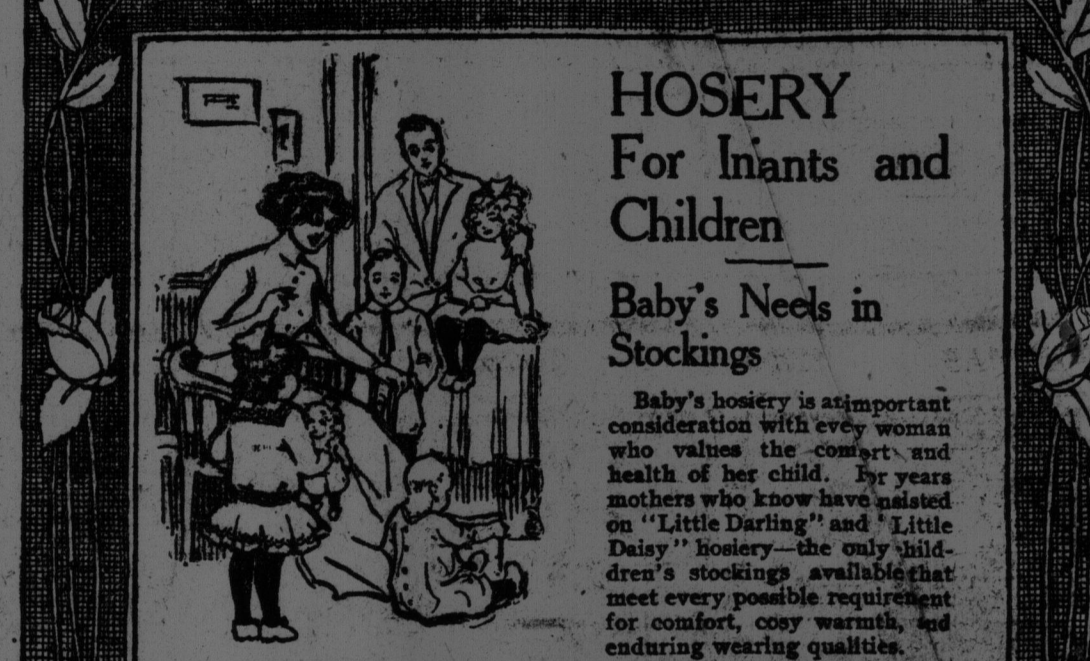

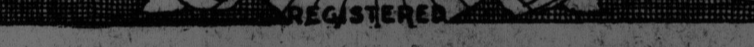

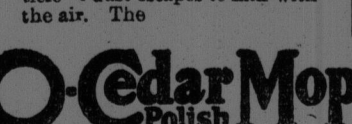

SETTING MR. HAZEN RIGHT In view of the ridiculous claims made for the Conservative party by Mr. Hazen in his tongue-in-cheek speech, it was worth while for Hon. William Pugsley to point out, as he has done in an interview in this morning's Telegraph, that Mr. Hazen and his colleagues have merely made slow progress in carrying out the great works which were planned and provided for by the Liberal government which preceded them. Dr. Pugsley says:—

"The fact is that all the important works in St. John were planned out and appropriations for them were obtained from parliament by the Liberal government. The dredging and wharf building on the west side, the development of Courtenay Bay, the magnificent armory and drill hall, the new post office, and the deepening of the channel entrance were all originated and provided for by parliament before the Conservative government came into power."

Mr. Hazen and his colleagues have merely been moving along the lines laid down for them by their predecessors, and have not yet attained the degree of speed which the nature of the work demands. With regard to the grain conveyors Mr. Hazen sought to fix the impression that the Laurier government had refused to do this work. Dr. Pugsley invites Mr. Hazen to tell when such a request was made and when it was refused. If Mr. Hazen is unable to do so, then he has been guilty of an attempt to deceive the people. Dr. Pugsley also points out that when minister of public works, he provided in the title deeds from the city to the crown for permission to the government to build such conveyors.

Dr. Pugsley very properly criticizes the attitude of the government toward the grain elevator asked for by the board of trade, and says he sees no reason why such work should not be done by the government if it is needed, since an elevator is merely a warehouse for grain and all the other warehouses are constructed by the government. It is largely because Halifax has storage capacity for upwards of forty million bushels of grain that such large quantities of Canadian grain are handled there.

Dr. Pugsley refers also to Courtenay Bay development, and the moves of the Conservatives when that work was first proposed. Now they take credit for it, although if it had waited to be initiated by a Conservative government, nothing would have been heard of it for many years to come. He asks, and it is a question which the board of trade and the city council should also ask, why if the government are opposed to the creation of terminals at Courtenay Bay by a railway company they have not taken some steps to provide the terminals themselves. They have wasted two years and are still doing nothing. Mr. Hazen has dwelt very impressively upon the largeness of the expenditure at St. John. Does he not know that an even larger expenditure has been undertaken at Halifax by the government of which he is a member?

Hon. William Pugsley may well court a comparison at any time between his second and that of the Hon. J. D. Hazen, both as a member of the government and as an alert and faithful representative of the city of St. John.

COURTENAY BAY The board of trade and city council should take immediate cognizance of the situation with regard to terminals at Courtenay Bay. Mr. Rogers and Mr. Hazen have indicated that they are in favor of having terminals provided there by any one railway company. That is not to be done, then it clearly becomes the duty of the government to see that the terminals are provided. The Grand Trunk Pacific Railway Company, beyond purchasing the site for terminals, has done nothing, and the government it now appears does not want them to do anything. But the government itself has done nothing, and is doing nothing. A great deal of work must be done if terminal facilities are to be provided at Courtenay Bay in connection with the Grand Trunk Pacific and the Valley Railways. It will call for a large expenditure. What do Mr. Hazen and his colleagues propose to do about it? They tell us that it is of the greatest importance that the national ports should be equipped to handle the business of the country. There are or should be ample funds in the treasury of the country to provide for these facilities. The board of trade and city council should give their attention to this very important matter without delay, and they should not be deterred by any fear that they will be asking too much. St. John cannot ask too much until it is placed in a position to handle the traffic which naturally belongs to it and that time will not come for many years, however earnestly the government may endeavor to provide the necessary facilities.

Halifax is to have the biggest dry dock in the British Empire. This should encourage St. John to press for the enlargement of the dock at Courtenay Bay to the length asked for in the board of trade memorial.

MORNING NEWS OVER THE WIRES

It is understood that the government at Ottawa will introduce legislation at the next session to prevent stock watering in Canada.

The handsome dwelling house of Harriet Waterhouse, who after striking her late husband, scattered the contents of a bag of flour over them. She was arrested.

Arrangements have been completed in England for the loan of the Dominion Securities Corporation acting as financial agents.

William Bell has been awarded the Hughes medal of the Royal Society for his invention of the telephone and the receiver.

Canon G. Osborne Troop, of Montreal, rector emeritus of St. Martin's Anglican church, will leave this week for England, after twenty-seven years' service in the Montreal church and will be united in marriage in the old country to a former sweetheart, Miss Uniacke of Halifax.

The subject for the intercollegiate debate at the University of New Brunswick and Mount Allison University, which will take place in Fredericton early in 1914, has been selected by the U. N. B. It is as follows: "Resolved, that an imperial parliament legislating in the interests of the British Empire would be to the interest of that empire."

MARVELS OF PLANT GROWTH

(London-Tri-Bits) Very striking are the results which have been obtained in regard to plant growth by the employment of violet rays from mercury vapor lamps.

It is proved in certain cases that seeds germinated several weeks earlier with the aid of this particular light than when grown in the natural way. The time for germination under the influence of the ultra-violet rays of the lamp was eleven days in the case of carrots, as against twenty-six days when grown naturally; while maize germinated in eight days instead of fifty-seven.

Wheat, barley, and various other seeds were tested, and in all cases a hastening of germination resulted. Strawberries cultivated in the ultra-violet light showed an increased crop of 25 per cent, while roses, carnations, and geraniums showed increased foliage and flowers of good size and color.

Equally interesting are the experiments which have been conducted with radium in this matter. This method consists of impregnating with an infinitesimal portion of radium, and in some cases an increase in the rate of growth of 300 per cent, has been brought about by this means. The presence in the soil of about one milligram of radium to twenty tons of soil produced, in the majority of cases tried, a marked effect upon the rate of germination and the growth of plants. Ryhas also been treated with success to hasten the ripening of tomatoes.

Another method of increasing the fertility of soil is that suggested by Professor Bottomley, who, by a series of experiments, has shown that he can convert barren soil into fertile land by introducing certain bacteria. He points out that a peat bog is barren solely because it is lacking in bacteria, which have been killed by want of air. The professor does not suggest that he can, as it were, sow bacteria on a peat bog and make it into cultivated soil, but he does hope that he can take supplies of peat and convert them into very rich manure, which may do permanent as well as immediate service to any soil.

COLD MAKES HAIR GROW

(Pearson's Weekly) It is a curious fact that a low temperature is the best possible tonic for the hair. No explorer has ever come home from the Arctic or Antarctic without a thick thatch. Sir Ernest Shackleton has drawn public attention to the fact that several of the men who accompanied him to the south started with thin and scanty hair and returned like testimonials of patent hair tonic. He attributed the result to the lack of germs in frozen regions, a lack which also explains why explorers in the Arctic or Antarctic do not catch colds.

Precisely the same effect has been noticed among men whose work lies in cold-storage rooms. The air they work in is always below freezing-point, and a London director of a cold-storage firm

A NEWCOMER'S VIEWS OF THINGS IN ST. JOHN

Among Other Things a Protest Against the Head Tax

225 Prince William street, St. John, Nov. 14, 1913.

To the Editor of the Times: Sir—I have read quite a lot in your paper about the good points of St. John and I like the way in which you show up the bad ones. Could you spare a little space for this letter, which may perhaps interest you readers to hear what a stranger from England thinks of your city.

The immigration shed is only fit to keep dogs in, and after a pretty bad night in it I took a walk around next day (while waiting to go on to Hamilton, Ont., to join my brother). I saw there was not one place of public convenience in the town, neither could I find a place to get a warm bath after a week on board the boat. I found board was rather high, rent for a flat very dear, and a small cottage an impossibility. Your case is not bad, why cannot the city council build some five room cottages with a strip of garden at the back, way out where land is not too dear and extend the street railway to them? Don't keep the lid on the people who are building up St. John. Give them a chance to decently inhabit and herding them together like cattle in unhealthy flats. I had a notion of settling here, for I liked the look of the place, but just as soon as I heard of that \$5 tax on every new comer, I decided to beat it at once to Hamilton, Ont., where they freely welcome a working man instead of looking him, and where the city assists some of the leading members of the council to run an immigrant's home, with a resident manager, where newcomers get free quarters for a day or two, until the immigration agent can place them in rooms or employment, or both.

After a summer in Ontario I am again passing through St. John on my way to England to fetch my wife and family to this great and grand country. You need not wonder why people pass on, and don't stay in St. John; that \$5 tax just scares them away, and I think that your board of trade, when it is blowing up the city, should be made to insert that \$5 tax in "boom literature" that it scatters around so plentifully, just to let folks know that St. John can't get along without seeking the laboring man who ventures within its borders, enticed there by the new pictures painted by the board of trade and the local immigration agent.

(Continued from page 1) The personnel of the commission, Messrs. Justice Cross, Correll and Healey—the two first named are judges of the King's Bench and the third a judge of the Superior Court—are still more expert in their work than the officers of the Quebec branch of the Anti-Alcoholic League express their confidence that the recommendations will immediately appoint a committee of the legislative council and members of the assembly to deal with the amendments to be made to the law.

It is rumored, however, that such is the difficulty of preparing so many amendments during the session that it might be found advisable to postpone the discussion of the report till the session of 1914. Such a long delay was decided upon last year when the report of the commission on the revision of the municipal code was tabled.

Open on Sundays. The evidence the commissioners have gathered in their long investigation establishes clearly that many hotel-keepers violate the law by keeping bars open on Sundays in some parts of their establishments. They recommend that a license certificate be confiscated after a second conviction for such an offence. That it be made also more difficult to obtain a license is another reform that the Anti-Alcoholic League had suggested to the commissioners, and which they have adopted.

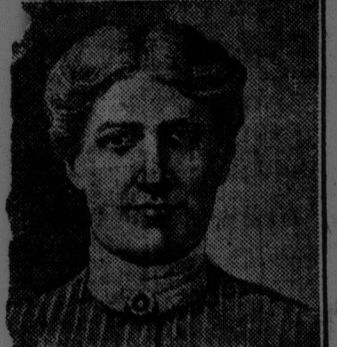



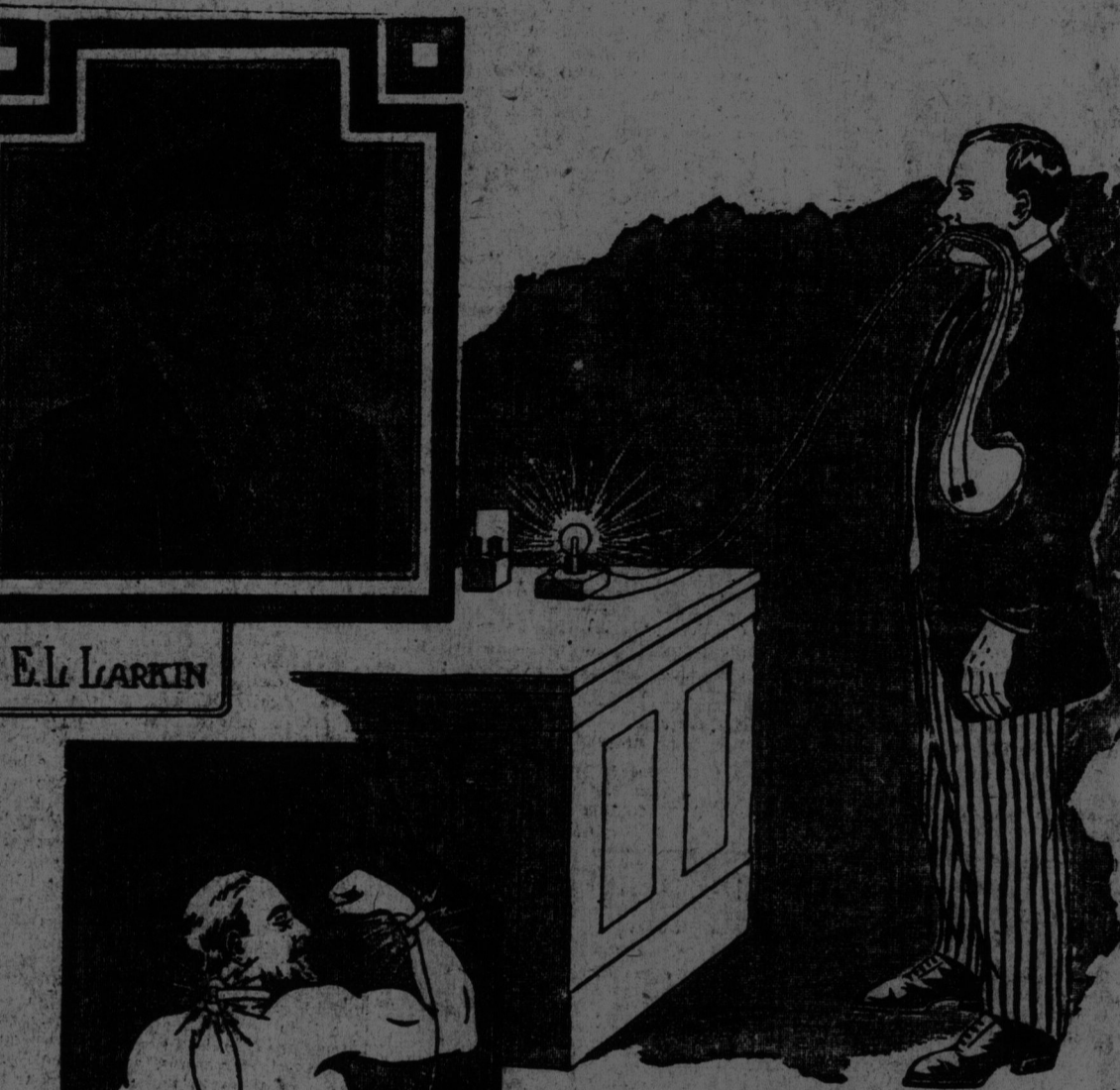

ARBITRATORS TO INTERPRET FORMER AWARD

Engineers of Eastern Railroads and Employes Differ About The Meaning

New York, Nov. 14.—The board of mediation and arbitrators charged with settling the dispute between the eastern railroads and their locomotive firemen and engineers, arising out of the interpretation of the awards made to the employes by the board last April, today heard the men's grievances and adjourned until tomorrow morning when a decision is expected.

Briefs were filed with the board by W. S. Carter, president of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Engineers, and by Elsha Lee, chairman of the conference committee for the railroads.

The members of the board are William Lee Chambers, chairman, who is the government representative; W. W. Atterbury, vice-president of the Pennsylvania Railroad, and Albert Phillips, vice-president of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Engineers. The three were the arbitrators in the original controversy decided by last April's award, differences in regard to the interpretation of which are now being threshed out.

TAMMANY HALL "BAGMAN" INDICTED

Accused of Extorting Money From New York State Contractors

New York, Nov. 14.—Everett P. Fowler, of Kingston (N. Y.), who was described by John A. Hennessy, graft investigator for former Governor Sulzer, as the Tammany "bagman" for contributions from state highway contractors, was indicted today on a charge of extortion.

He is accused of forcing Seneca Falls, a highway contractor of Cortland (N. Y.), an enrolled Republican, to give up \$250 as a Democratic campaign contribution under threat that the work on Cortland county would not be approved by the state highway inspectors and that his pay would be held up.

The indictment was the first growing out of the inquiry instituted by District Attorney Whitman into the charges of graft in the state highway department made by Hennessy during his recent election campaign against Tammany Hall. More indictments which may include conspiracy as well as extortion, are expected.

Kenyon was willing to "sign the ticket" but MacDonald was bent on having Liberal endorsement. In the end Kenyon was nominated and elected over MacDonald's head. Now the Liberals declare that at the next general election they will contest every labor seat. If they do so the labor party is doomed.

A Result

The result of it all is seen in the gains which syndicalism is making among the British workers. Labor leaders like Ber Tillet who scorn all political action and preach the strike or in the last resort, force as the workers' only weapon, are gaining more influence, and still more significant is the revolt of the rank and file against their own leaders.

Only a few weeks ago 30,000 London railwaymen met in Hyde Park and against the protests of their leader, J. H. Thomas, M.P., passed resolutions in favor of a strike. A few months ago the miners, by an overwhelming majority, stripped their officials of the power to conclude any bargain with the employers without first submitting it to a popular vote. The shipyard workmen have gone on strike twice within the last year against the direct orders of their officials.
