wide and important field of usefulness. Not only for religious and spiritual culture, but also by our educational institution, printing establishment, book room, and by our connexion, as members of the community, with the various moral reform movements of the day and land in which we live.

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We still feel it imperative upon as a church to wage an uncompromising warfare against vice in all its forms, and by the use of all lawful means within our reach. We give our cordial support to the Temperance cause, and especially to the question of a Prohibitory Liquor Law. Your Committee are of opinion, however, that in many localities new schools might be established, and the work greatly extended. 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REPORT NO. II.

Report of the Committee on Sabbath Observance.

Your Committee feel deeply the importance of the subject referred to them, and believe that the oft-repeated and public desecrations of God's holy day, witnessed in various parts of this Province, loudly calls for an expression of our unqualified disapproval and reproof.

Your Committee would therefore most respectfully recommend the adoption of the following resolutions:

1st. Resolved,—That we regard the appropriation of one-seventh of our time, as a day of rest, to be a wise and benevolent arrangement of the Great Creator, and intended to be exclusively devoted to His public worship; and the performance of all unnecessary worldly business, and worldly practices, such as visiting from place to place, attending places of amusement, and neglecting the public services of the sanctuary, to be a direct violation of the institution of the Sabbath, and in opposition to the intention of its Divine Author.

2nd. Resolved,—That the practice of running Rail Road Cars on the Sabbath day, by chartered companies, is in itself a serious evil, and cannot fail to exert a demoralizing influence on our Canadian public by lowering the tone of moral and religious sentiment in this country.

Whereas we have learned with deep mortification and regret that the Sabbath is shamefully violated by the Government of this Province, in allowing the Post Offices and Canals to be opened for business,

3rd, Resolved,—That we as a body of christian ministers, regard such infringements upon this divine institution as disgraceful to the nation, offensive to God, and destructive to the moral and religious interests of the country.

REPORT NO. III.

Report of the Committee on Temperance.

Your Committee on Temperance believe the crowning vice of the present day, is the use of liquid poisons as a beverage, comprised in the following, viz :- rum, gin, brandy, whiskey, wine, beer, hard cider, etc., to say nothing of their adulteration by the introduction of poisonous drugs-more particularly that of wine, which in most cases we are obliged to use on sacramental occasions, which we fear has been a temptation to some who formerly used intoxicating drinks, to return to their habits again! If a good article could be obtained for the sacrament, your committee would consider it a great boon to the christian community. Your committee are convinced that intemperance forms one of the greatest barriers against the force of gospel truth in town and country, and would recommend to this Conference active co-operation with the Temperance community, in order to destroy this monster vice, by forming temperance societies, introducing papers and tracts which have for their object the suppression of dram drinking and drunkenness.

To the Members of the Methodist Episcopal Church within the boundaries of the Bay of Quinte Annual Conference:

We hope you will therefore avail yourselves of its invaluable advantages for your sons, and daughters: by this means it will become a blessing in all time to come.

The Canada Christian Advocate, we need not say, has increasing claims upon your consideration. Its pages carefully read will make you wiser and better; we can safely recommend it as invaluable in your families. To be without it is, we think, unjust to them, unless your condition is one of extreme poverty.

We would urge upon you the importance of family religion; remember, you are to live again in your children. No exertions can be too great to secure the undying welfare of your posterity. Avail yourselves of the invaluable aid of the Sabbath School for them. Foster these nurseries of the church. God has blessed them with many living seals of his approbation, and we may not refuse to avail ourselves of them but at our peril.

We claim no-right to dictate to what particular parties, as such, you give your support, but we do wish you to remember that the elective franchise is a very solemn trust, and you are bound to exercise it for your country's good. Let no consideration, however specious, induce you to give your votes for men as legislators whose character for honesty and uprightness is not above all suspicion. Bad men legislating cannot be expected to make good laws. We press this subject upon you more particularly in view of obtaining a law for prohibiting the sale of intoxicating drinks. We should be unfaithful pastors should we fail to warn

you that you have something more to do than merely to abstain from the use of strong liquors. The traffic is increasing in a fearful ratio; young men, the hope of our country, are daily being drawn into the awful vortex of dissipation. The mighty tide, in its onward course, bears some from every rank and class in society into the fearful whirlpool; the church of God, and even the pulpit, form no exception to the awful truth. Every effort to cure the evil hitherto has proved a failure; and we fully believe must continue to do so until the people shall arise in their might and compel our legislators to sweep forever, from the Statute Book, every vestige of the license law, and place the sale of strong drink, where reason and humanity, and christianity proclaim it should be placed, in the black catalogue of crimes against our common humanity.

We would urge upon you the importance of a strict observance of the Sabbath by your families. Great dangers attend their morals from the loose notions that prevail respecting Sabbath obligation. The public disregard shown to this institution by Rail Road and other public companies, can scarcely fail to produce a deleterious effect on their minds, unless carefully counteracted by you. The Missionary enterprise demands your increased liberality. You are Methodists, and as such you recognise the obligation to be ready to every good work. Your liberality has enabled the Missionary Society to extend its operations to many destitute portions of the country; but much yet remains to be done. REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SABBATH OBSERVANCE.

Your Committee to whom was referred the subject of "Sabbath Observance" beg leave to present this

their report:

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In considering the condition of mankind in this world your Committee observes that every family, compact, corporation, or nation, in order to its correct government, must be guided by certain codes of laws, rules or regulations; and which must be obligatory upon all who profess allegiance thereto; and it is not sufficient to render an obedience to one or two but to all the parts thereof.

As Christians, or a Christian nation, our Code is the Bible, our Lawgiver the Everlasting God, and we as dutiful subjects are bound to obey in willingness and love, all the precepts contained therein, and certainly none who, neglect or refuse obedience thereto can be entitled to the appellation of subjects of heaven.

Among the various commands given by our Divine Legislator, we find one relating to "Sabbath Observance," given with the solemn caution to "Remember the Sabbath Day to keep it Holy," and the farther explanation of the duties thereof involved a fearful responsibility upon those in whose hands are placed the administration of those laws.

Hence we regard every ruler from the head of a family, to the reigning monarch, equally bound to cause this law to be observed in all departments under his

control.

Viewing the matter in this light your Committee cannot refrain from expressing their deepest regret that several of our Railway and Steamboat Companies pay no regard to the sacredness of the day, and thus not only countenance but even command this continued desecration, while our Post Offices in most of our towns and villages are open on the Sabbath day to the scandal of religion, and in defiance of our Lord's plain

Bad as this may be, a still worse scene is before us. Our present Parliament has refused to pass the "Sabbath Observance Act," lately introduced there, and has thus said unto God. "depart from us, for we desire not the knowledge of thy ways." In no case has the less the right to supersede the greater; and, therefore, a law once made must necessarily remain in force until either it is revoked by the power which made it, or that power be destroyed, or the time allotted for its continuance be expired.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON TEMPERANCE.

The Committee to whom was referred the important subject of Temperance, in connection with a memorial from the Grand Scribe of the Sons of Temperance, beg leave to report as follows:—

That the doctrine of total abstinence from all intoxicating drinks, as a beverage, has long been recognized and advocated by the members of your committee, and we are gratified to say has ever been entertained by the members of your Conference, both in its individual and collective capacity.

That the various organizations which have, from time to time, existed in this Province for the suppression of the drinking usages of society have been instrumental in accomplishing much good. Still moral suasion has proved inadequate to reach many cases, and has proved

ineffectual where it has been attempted in others, inasmuch as the diseased appetites of drunkards often overpower their best resolutions, and neutralize their most strenuous efforts to abstain. And so long as the temptation remains in the way, your Committee conceive that this state of things will continue.

Your Committee, therefore, feel anxious for the establishment of a stringent Prohibitory Law, which, by removing the temptation, may prevent the sin. We are satisfied that a little more energy and consistency on the part of temperance people would have placed this measure on the statute book several years since.

That your Committee are of the opinion that no agitation in favor of Prohibition will effect the desired object, unless the electors are more careful in selecting men to represent them properly on this question in Parliament. And while we disclaim all intention to dictate to our friends, or to influence their votes on political questions, we trust the importance of giving more practical effect to their views on this subject will engage their attention.

That whether from the construction of our extensive public works thus introducing a large number of people, many of whom were previously of intemperate habits, or from the apathy of teetotalers, drunkenness is alarmingly on the increase in this Province.

Your Committee, therefore, would recommend the members of this Annual Conference to increase their exertions in behalf of a Prohibitory Law, by bringing it frequently under the notice of those who control legislation in a free country, and by aiding in the formation of a public opinion in favor of the principle, which will bear down all opposition.
