L. O. A. GRAND LODGE SESSIONS
The Provincial Grand Lodge of the L. O. A. of Newfoundland, which met on Saturday last, the attendance was the largest of record. An address of welcome was presented by Carbonell Lodge, to which Rev. R. H. Maddock and Mr. J. E. Currie replied. The Grand Master's address was then delivered. It dealt with the principal events of the year and matters of importance to the Association. It showed that 20 per cent, or one-fifth of our volunteers for active service in the Army and Navy altogether belong to the Orange Society. The total membership is now 15,500. The other reports were also encouraging.
Thursday morning the members attended the Methodist Church, Rev. F. R. Matthews being the preacher. A tea, followed by a concert was given by the Ladies' Aid the same evening.
Among the many matters considered were the questions of Sunday observance, Temperance, Permanent Disaster Fund, etc. Petitions will go to the Legislature for an extension of the Temperance laws so that each District may be able to decide by popular vote that the carriage of intoxicating liquors in its borders must cease. Rev. Squires, Morrison, Puddister and Currie were elected as delegates to the Triennial Council meeting at Winnipeg in July, and Bro. J. C. Proclamation
GEORGE the FIFTH,
by the Grace of GOD, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and of the British Dominions beyond the Seas, King, Defender of the Faith, Emperor of India.
WHEREAS We deem it expedient and necessary to appoint a Term or Session for the holding of Our Supreme Court on Circuit for the Northern District of Our Island of Newfoundland, at the time and place hereinafter mentioned:
We do, therefore, by this Our Proclamation, declare to all Our loving subjects within Our said Island that it is Our will and pleasure to direct and appoint that a term or Session of Our said Supreme Court on Circuit shall be open and holden at HARBOUR GRACE, in Our said Island, on Tuesday, the Twentieth day of April next, and continue thence until Friday, the Twenty-third day of April next, both days inclusive; and, if necessary, the presiding Judge of Our said Court shall have power to extend the time thereof for two days, or for such further period as may be necessary for the conclusion of any matter or cause then in course of trial. And of these Presents all Magistrates, the Sheriff, Officers of the Constabulary Force, Bailiffs, Constables, Keepers of Goals and other Officers in the execution of their offices about the premises, and all and singular other persons whom these Presents do, shall, or may concern, are hereby required to take due notice and govern themselves accordingly.
Given under the Great Seal of Our said Island of Newfoundland.
Witness Our trusty and well beloved Sir WALTER EDWARD DAVIDSON, Knight Commander of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the said Island of Newfoundland and its Dependencies, at St. John's, in Our said Island, this 16th day of March, A. D., 1915, and in the Fifth year of Our Reign.

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WAR NEWS
The capture of the Austrian fortress with about 120,000 men, including nine generals and 2,000 officers, is the most important war news this week. Memei, which the Russians occupied a few days ago, has been recaptured by the Germans. The German submarine U-29 has been lost with all hands.
Operations in the Dardanelles have been hampered lately owing to bad weather conditions. General Botha won a victory over the German forces recently in S. W. Africa.
German business men are growing very dependent regarding the issue of the war.
War between Italy and Austria is more than probable. Greece is also likely to join in the conflict soon. British airmen dropped bombs on German submarines being constructed near Antwerp, doing much damage.
The Allied troops in Belgium, France and Alsace have made some advance during the week. The Turks have abandoned their military offensive against Egypt.

America will, of course, protest. We shall consider her protest with all courtesy, but we shall not change our purpose. It is surely better to tell the truth."

Italian Feeling

Paris, Mar. 17.—The Havas Agency has received the following despatch from its correspondent at Milan: "There was a great demonstration here last night in favor of intervention by Italy on the side of the Allies. Crowds of manifestants marched through the streets and gathered in front of the Cathedral. The police charged and dispersed the crowds which were shouting, 'Down with Austria, down with Germany.'"

Partridge Berries on Free List

Ottawa, Mar. 17.—The House went in Committee on ways and means to-day, and took up Hon. W. T. White's resolution to increase the customs duties in accordance with the announcement made in the Budget. The Finance Minister said, that at the request of the Newfoundland Government, the Canadian Government has consented to admit, free of duty, wild edible berries, called partridge berries. The Finance Minister explained that bananas were added to that list of exemptions at the request of the Government of Jamaica.

Found Not Guilty Of Massey Murder

Carrie Davies acquitted amid the cheers of her friends.

Toronto, March 2.—Amid the cheers of hundreds of her sympathizers Carrie Davies was on Saturday acquitted by a jury in the Criminal Assizes of the charge of murdering Charles A. Massey on the 5th of February. The young girl, who had borne up so well during the different phases of her prosecution, was greatly affected by the verdict and almost collapsed. Two women supported her while the foreman of the jury announced the verdict of not guilty, and in a few moments she became more composed and was able to listen to the formal discharge of Chief Justice Sir William Mulock.

The case all through has been one of the most remarkable in the annals of Canadian courts. The trial protracted less than seven hours, and it took the jury only half an hour to reach their verdict after the girl had admitted the shooting. The scene in court was a most unusual one, the audience rising in a body and cheering the verdict of the jury. The court constables were unable to restore order for some moments and some of the more enthusiastic of the crowd were forcibly quieted down by the Chief Justice. A few words to the girl. He said that the jury had taken a view of the case which was not in conformity with strict rules, but he concurred with the verdict. He considered that she had killed her employer in a moment when she had lost her self-control and did not appreciate what she was doing and was therefore incapable of any guilty intent. She had committed the deed from her sense of duty and would no doubt regret it all her life. The young girl thanked the judge and jury between sobs and was escorted from the room by her sister.

Dr. Robinson is Acquitted of Charge

Crows in Napanee Court Cheer the Jury's Verdict of Not Guilty

Napanee, Ont., March 4.—The jury this evening returned a verdict acquitting Dr. C. K. Robinson on the charge of having murdered Blanche York, at Tamworth, and the doctor was at once given his liberty. The crowd in Court broke into cheers when the foreman made his announcement, and brought a severe rebuke from the judge. During the brief moment of the uproar, however, hats were thrown in the air and handkerchiefs waved gaily all over the hall. There was a long pause before the judge, in a concise statement, almost free from comment and without any expression of concurrence or otherwise as the verdict, told the prisoner he was free to go. Meanwhile Dr. Robinson stood erect in the dock with a smile upon his face waiting eagerly for the prized order of freedom. Another case was in progress at the time, and the jury had to occupy seats set aside for the grand jury. The foreman's words stumbled disjunctly from his mouth, and for a moment everyone thought the verdict was one of guilty.

POSTAL TELEGRAPH OFFICES are operated throughout the Colony at all the principal places. Messages of ten words, not including address or signature, are forwarded for twenty cents, and two cents for each additional word. A Government cable to Canso, Cape Breton, connects with the Commercial Cable Co.'s system to all parts of the world. There is no more efficient Telegraph Service in existence.

A ten word message to Canada, exclusive of signature and address, costs from 85 cents to \$1.00.

A ten word message to the United States, exclusive of signature and address, costs from \$1.20 to \$1.60.

To Great Britain, France or Germany—85 cents per word.

Telegrams are transmitted by means of the Wireless Service during the summer season, and all the year round to steamers equipped with the wireless apparatus, which are due to pass within the radii of the wireless stations at Cape Race and Cape Ray.

Telegraph messages may be obtained at all Post Offices and from Mail Clerks on Trains and Steamers, and if the sender wishes the messages may be left with the P. M. to be forwarded by first mail to the nearest Telegraph Office free of postage.

Public Notice

Censorship of Telegraphs, Cables, and Wireless Stations.

By direction of the Chief Censor, London, the following Regulations will be in force on and after Friday next, January 15th, namely:—

1. Cablegrams in authorized editions of A.B.C., Lieber's, Scott's and Western Union Codes only may be exchanged between British, Allied or Neutral Territory on extra European Telegraph System, on one side, and British or Allied Territory, wherever situated, on the other side.

2. The term "Extra European Telegraph System" means the places outside the Telegraph System of Europe. Besides the places in Europe proper, the following are also included as being on the European Telegraph System, namely:—Russia and Asia; the following French possessions in North and West Africa, namely:—Algeria, Mauritania, Senegal, Upper Senegal and Niger; and French Morocco. The Island of Cyprus is regarded as outside the European Telegraph System.

3. Until further notice cablegrams in the following three Codes, namely:—Meyer's Atlantic Cotton Code, Thirty ninth Edition; Bentley's Complete Phrase Code, not including separate Mining and Oil Supplements; Broomhall's Imperial Combination Code, not including Special Rubber Edition, are allowed only between United Kingdom and places in Extra European Telegraph System.

N.B.—As all messages sent under the above Regulations have to be decoded and censored the carrying out of this work will be greatly facilitated if persons sending such messages would hand in at the Telegraph Office, at the time of presenting the message, the translation of the same. From Wm. H. Bartlett, Barrowed. Liverpool, Eng., Feb. 27, 1915.

My Dear Wife,—Just a few lines to let you know I have got back safe to Liverpool after a very stormy trip. I thank God he has preserved us thus far. We have had a very hard time of it, being seven weeks since we were here last, experiencing while away almost continual gales of wind, snowstorms, etc. To-day it is summer-like. Now we have four days' leave. I hope we shall come off victorious and save the Flag we so love.

I pray that God, in His own good time, will bring us (I can't say all; I wish I could) to our loved ones again. Joseph Bradbury it in good health. I am still striving to follow in the path that will bring us all to the place where there will be no more war. I often feel glad that I stepped out on the promises of God. It keeps me through all the temptations that surround me. Whatever befalls us I pray that God will receive us everyone unto Himself. WM. H. BARTLETT.

From Isaac Snow, Coley's Point. R. N. R. Barracks, E. Mees, Portsmouth, England, Feb. 28, 1915.

Dear Father,—There has been some important happenings since I wrote you last. I have had a great experience since leaving home, from the time I entered the Clyde in Scotland and from Scotland to the barracks in Portsmouth. There is a large barracks and thousands of sailors here. No doubt you have heard of the great battle in the North Sea when the Blueher was sunk. I had the pleasure of being on a torpedo boat destroyer then. Her speed was 35 knots. We fired more than 10 torpedoes at the enemy. You have no idea what war is like. Gas rearing and shells bursting all round us. Still we sped on not thinking of danger. Such is the spirit of British and Newfoundland sailors.

There was three other of our boys on her. It was a great sight to see the giant battleship going down. The order was then given to lower the boats and save the lives. Although we put them in that condition we were just as eager to save them. We worked like trojans. The bands were playing and the sailors shouting. We enjoyed it very much. Give my love to mother, Clarence, Mary and all enquiring friends. Hoping to see you all again when the war is over. I remain, your loving son, ISAAC SNOW.

Oporto Letter

The accompanying letter was received Monday by the Board of Trade, from Lind and Couto, of Oporto:—March 6th. Since we last wrote, there has been some improvement in the demand, but the high prices necessitated by the low exchange, prevent free consumption. At the present prices, codfish is beyond the reach of the poorer classes. It was not for the low exchange, the prices now being obtained here would be fully equal to the returns from Spain and Italy. In fact the prices were never better at such a high level as now.

Przemysl Fallen

London, Mar. 22.—The Admiralty announces that damage to the Dardanelles forts is not yet ascertained, owing to unfavourable weather. No great expectations should be based on this, as the attack was not pressed to its conclusion, but the power of the fleet to dominate the fortresses by superior fire seems established.

The French Government reports progress at Epaves in the Argentine. A German counter-attack was repulsed with heavy loss. Seasons Cathedral has been bombed and seriously damaged. In the Vosges, Great and Little Reichackerkopf were captured by the enemy. Little Reichackerkopf has since been recaptured, and the battle continues.

The Russian Government reports the occupation of Memel, in East Prussia, after a short bombardment. The Germans were defeated near Myzente in North Poland. The Austrians were defeated in the Carpathians. The garrison of Przemysl attempted an unsuccessful sortie, 3,000 were taken prisoners, also 76 officers and 7 machine guns.

Przemysl has fallen. The news just received. MARCOURT.

While the prospects for the coming summer's cod-fishery yet remain to be seen, the Labrador planters of this place seem to be so encouraged that about 25,000 new boats are being built, among these being about 14 new motor trap boats. CORRESPONDENT.

Naval Reservist Snow Writes

H. M. S. Patuca, Glasgow, Scotland, Feb. 23, 1915. (Editor the Guardian).

Dear Sir,—As I was sitting all alone this evening I thought I would drop a few lines to the Guardian. I am not much of a hand for writing, but I will try and tell a little of our feelings.

Well, sir, we came across to England in November, 1914, landing at the Portsmouth Royal Naval Barracks, where we had about three weeks' drill before going to the front. The first day we tried our guns was on Christmas Day. We then did five weeks' duty in the North Sea. Then we spent five days in Liverpool coaling our ship. We then spent four weeks at sea again. About this time it was rumored that submarines were around Liverpool, so we sailed in Scotland.

We have been very successful since we started. We have captured five merchant ships, one of which had a load of cotton for Germany. We also captured two small trawlers flying the Norwegian flag, but after taking them to port we found they were German mine layers. One had 18 mines and the other 16 on board. I think we were lucky in capturing them. I will tell you more next time I write. 'God Save the King.' Wishing the Guardian every success. I remain, GEORGE SNOW.

Constantinople

The question of the occupation of Constantinople by Russia has been the cause of war between Russia and Britain in years past. Turkey was permitted to hold Constantinople in order that the answer to that question need not have to be made permanently. But now the final answer must be given, and it is an answer that necessarily affects the whole world.

There is no doubt about Russia's desire for the permanent possession of that city. That desire is deeply rooted, the reasons for which are involved in the religious, national and commercial aspirations of Russia. There is no other city in the world of more strategic importance.

Russia can hardly consent that the city become British or French. Will Britain grant Russia's request? Can the answer allow the present allies to remain friends?

We remember how during the Balkan war two years ago the Balkan allies had Constantinople almost in their possession and quarrelled near the gates. The outcome of this whole war and the future peace of the world may depend upon the question as to whether Britain and Russia, these two powers especially, can agree that one or the other shall hold the city when the war is over. But it is possible and quite probable that even before the bombardment of the Dardanelles commenced, an understanding in connection with Constantinople was arranged and agreed to by the Allies.

Constantinople is the natural capital of the religion of Russia. The pressure of many centuries makes it that. During the first Christian centuries the church developed along two lines, the doctrinal among the Greeks who were philosophical, and the governmental among the Romans who were lawmakers. The church subsequently divided into the Eastern or Greek type and the Western or Roman type. Constantinople was the capital of the Eastern church for more than a thousand years. Then it fell into the hands of the Turks. Some of the inhabitants fled to north-western Europe, and they carried the Greek or Eastern type of Christianity with them. The discovery of printing was made about this time, and the revival of learning which followed made the modern world.

The Protestant Reformation followed, and it was practically a turning from the Roman type of Christianity to the Greek type. The emphasis was placed on true doctrine rather than on church law.

The close connection between Protestantism and the religion of Russia is shown by the endeavors that have been made to unite Calvinism with the eastern or Greek church, and also the endeavors to unite the Church of England with the Eastern Church. England, Scotland and Russia have much in common in religion, and it looks now as if Constantinople will again become the religious head of the Eastern church as it was before the Turk invaded Europe.

Britain can afford to let Russia have the fulfillment of her long desire to possess Constantinople and make it her great southern door. The present war is being fought to end the idea of one nation—Germany—dominating the commercial life of the whole world. The Mother Country does not want to destroy Germany's commercial or territorial ambition and then adopt the same ambition. Britain wants to live and let live. Russia's

reward for this war must be the possession of Constantinople. A friendly federation of nations is likely to follow this war, and this federation of nations will develop the resources of the world for the good of all mankind.
