Minutes of the Annual Meeting.

The Annual Meeting was held on Friday, Dec. 15th, inst., at 4 p.m., in the Board Room of the "Home."

Mr. Warring Kennedy occupied the chair.

The meeting was opened with prayer by Rev. Dr. Thomas, after which the hymn "All hail the power of Jesus' Name" was sung.

The children occupied seats in the background and added much to the interest of the meeting. They showed by their happy faces and neat appearance that much time had been bestowed upon them, and they were well cared for.

The different reports were read by their respective Secretaries.

The adoption of these reports was proposed by Rev. Dr. Thomas, who paid a high tribute to the services of Mrs. Scott and Mrs. Carlyle, the retiring officers, and also spoke of the good work which had been accomplished. Such good work, he said, offered a magnificent opportunity to give service of the highest order to God and humanity.

Mr. J. K. Macdonald seconded this resolution with congratulatory remarks on the excellence of the reports presented.

The children then sang sweetly "The Flowers' Lullaby."

The Officers and Managers for the ensuing year were proposed by Dr. Wishart, and seconded by Mr. J. K. Macdonald.

A vote of thanks to the subscribers was proposed by Mr. J. K. Macdonald, who said he thought it should rather be a vote of thanks to the collectors. This resolution was seconded by all present rising to their feet.

The children then sang a very pretty Thanksgiving hymn.

A resolution regretting the resignation from their respective offices of Mrs. Scott and Mrs. Carlyle was proposed by Rev. Dr. Thomas, and seconded by Dr. Wishart.

The Chairman spoke feelingly of the sad sorrow our Patroness, Lady Kirkpatrick, had so lately been called upon to pass through. A resolution of sympathy with Lady Kirkpatrick in her sad bereavement was proposed by Mrs. Carlyle, and seconded by Mrs. Beatty.

A vote of thanks to the Chairman was proposed by Mrs. Walker, and seconded by Mrs. Davidson.

An invitation was given to all present to visit the Home and see the children at tea in the dining room. A patriotic march song was given by the children, after which all joined in singing "God Save the Queen."

The guests and speakers partook of 5 o'clock tea, and the Annual Meeting was closed, every one feeling that in every way it had been most interesting.

REPORT OF SECRETARY.

KIND FRIENDS—

It is the same old story we meet you with. Another year of opportunities for helping our less fortunate fellow-beings. Opportunities for doing good which we hope have been taken advantage of wisely. Another year of hopes and anticipations, many have been realized, encouraging us to perseverance, and helping us to bear the disappointments of others.

The changes in life bring to many sorrow and need. It is with feelings of gratitude that in this humble home the Directorate has been enabled during the year to shelter and provide for 161 girls, who by the death of parents or other adverse circumstances needed care and protection. Of these 95 were sent out to new homes or taken by relatives, beginning the New Year with 66 on the roll call.

In several instances this year we departed from the plan of "Indenture" and "adopted" our larger girls, each adoption application having been discussed on its peculiar merits, the decision arrived at deemed better for the girl and her future prospects, than by going out under "Indenture."

It is a happy thought that there are *now* no Incorrigibles in the Home. Those who had earned the character having been placed with much prayer and hope, with Christian people, who undertook the charge of extra supervision, looking to the Master for special guidance in the training. We have been already much encouraged by the reports re-

ceived. God in His mercy has shown them the folly of their waywardness, and they are trying to keep in the narrow path. (See Cor. Sec.'s Report).

Every girl at eighteen years of age is free to choose her own home. Those under Indenture receive their dowry, which had annually been deposited by the foster-parents with the Home. They are encouraged to habits of thrift, by opening a bank account to which from time to time they can add their savings, and on which Bank deposit interest will be added.

The total cost of maintenance for these girls was \$5,768.59, or 18 2-5ths cents per day for each child.

You will see by the Treasurer's statement that there was an improvement in the collectors' returns. We thank our subscribers for their kind support, but there is still necessity for greater effort. We also acknowledge, with much gratitude, the bequest from the estate of the late Mr. Neil Currie. These, with good management, maintained the Home, and left a balance on which to start the New Year. You will also see that a new drain has been laid and paid for ; this drain was an absolute necessity from a sanitary standpoint, even the up-turning of the earth causing many to suffer from sore throat, every precaution was taken so there were no serious results. New plumbing is needed in some parts of the building, the present being old-fashioned and unable to stand the smoke test. There are several other needs and necessary repairs required, but these must be left to the future, trusting to the liberality of friends to have them accomplished.

We began the year with two vacancies on our Board, that of Treasurer and Corresponding Secretary. Miss Violet Elliot, in October, most kindly yielded to the unanimous wish that she would undertake the difficult task of keeping accounts for so large a family. It has been most gratifying to receive her monthly statements and her yearly reports of expenditures, etc. Mrs. A. E. Kemp very graciously undertook the the duties of Corresponding Secretary until April, when Mrs. Beatty assumed the responsibility. She has become very much interested in the details of that branch of the work and her efforts and zeal are inspiring.

In December Mrs. Bright, who had been our faithful Matron for fourteen years, decided to leave us to enjoy a well-earned rest. The lady Managers desire to record their appreciation of her devotion ; their regret at parting with one who had become so identified with this Home, and whose aim had been to make each child value its advantages and to profit by them. The Board deems itself fortunate in having secured in her place the services of Mrs. Duncan, who has proved a woman capable and practical, well suited for the important duties which devolve upon her. The hope is that she may be long spared to the Board.

We regret that our much loved President, Mrs. J. G. Scott, has resigned from the honored position, owing to an indefinite absence from the City, and feeling that the one who performed the duties should enjoy the honor.

The Sunday School is still most successfully carried on by kind friends, but with regret we are looking for a Superintendent. The elder girls gain much help and encouragement from the faithful teaching of the Ven. Archdeacon

Boddy, who has for many years devoted Thursday afternoons to Bible reading and instruction.

The day school, under the Public School Board, and taught by the Misses McKee and McMaster, gives the children all the advantages of a thorough plain education, and while there show daily improvement to the satisfaction of the Board. Apart from their regular school drill the children have had the advantage of receiving extra lessons from Miss Sternberg in physical culture, who most kindly and gratuitously gave two hours of instruction every Saturday morning. In the afternoons these same little girls may be seen learning to overcome the trials of button-hole making, top seaming, etc., and judging from the Matron's report of the work done great credit is due the teacher and the industry of the children

The Medical Staff deserve most grateful mention, as also Dr. Adams, for unwearying services most freely rendered.

We are indebted to Mr. Fred. Roper for giving of his resting hours the time to audit the Treasurer's books.

To Mr. Neville for his self-denial of time and valuable advice.

To the Government and City Council for their annual grants. To the City press for their kind notices, and to all others who have by sympathy or kind deeds, helped us in our work, we take this opportunity of thanking.

Among the many entertainments that helped to brighten the long winter evenings was that one arranged by Mrs. Moore, and presided over by Mr. Sherwood in his cheerful, happy manner. It was an evening of songs and recitations

as well as the wonderful gramophone, which greatly delighted all present. The presentation to each child of the the newly minted ten cent piece, the gift of E. B. Osler, Esq., M.P., and the large box of sugar-stick candy sent by Mr. R. S. Williams were fully appreciated by the recipients, all combined to make this the gala evening of the year.

The Board desires to thank the Morris Bros. for giving the children such a delightful and instructive morning's outing in watching their well-trained animals.

The Board also desires to thank the President of the Dog Show and the Directorate of the Horse Show for their kindness in brightening the lives of our little ones.

To the Minister of Education the children feel indebted for an afternoon in the gallery of art, which, as they were accompanied by their teachers, was one of pleasure and profit.

"The poor ye have always with you," has been decreed. As Christian people we cannot look upon these unhappy or neglected children without feeling our responsibility to God for them. Let us remember that they have the same need of kind and good influences and the same immortality as the dear ones in our own home, and as in a building "stone rests upon stone," and wanting the foundation, all would be wanting, so in human life each action rests on the foregoing event that made it possible. Much of the future of these children under our care depends upon the foundation stones of instruction and the influences by which they are surrounded while here.

Corresponding Secretary's Report.

It affords me great pleasure to submit the following Annual Report of our work among the children of this institution.

We have 28 out under indenture, 15 of whom have been placed during the last year, nine have served their time, and only two of these are remaining with those to whom they were indentured. Eight are earning wages, five have been adopted into good homes, where they are either the only girl or only child in the family.

Though some of our girls are a little more difficult to train than others, I am happy to state that at present we have no incorrigibles. This very satisfactory result is largely attributable to the very careful training and unselfish devotion of our efficient Matron, Mrs. Duncan, who has proved herself in deed and word a loving mother to the children of our Home.

One of our poor girls had tried us so often with evidences of her tendency to evil that, as a last resort, we decided to place her in the Mercer Reformatory. But surely "in ways we have not known, God leads his own," for just as our decision was about to be carried into action, a Christian gentleman came to the Home, saw her, and in spite of her bad record, faithfully represented to him by the Secretary and

Matron, took her into his home, and through its Christian influence, she has been enabled to "touch the hem of his garment and been made whole," as the following letter will testify :—

DEAR AUNT —

I hope you are all well. I am in a nice place. There are three children, two boys and a girl. I am getting along very well and hope I may keep my place. Mr. F. got a letter from the Home asking how I was getting on ; he wrote back saying he could honestly say he was well pleased with me. I hope he will always be able to say it. I intend leading a new life. I am getting on better than ever before. When I get into trouble I ask God to help me and give me strength to do His will. I do hope I may be led in the right way the rest of my life. My birthday was June 12th, and from that time I made up my mind to be one of God's servants. I was up in E— for two weeks. Mr. and Mrs. J— gave me a blouse and pair of gloves, and Mr. F— a black dress. How is grandma. Is she better? Tell her I saw in the paper about her "golden wedding." She will be pleased to hear that I am taking God as my Master. I would like to be more interested in Christian work. I was so happy on Sunday when I came home from Church I received the Lord God as my Saviour. I mean to keep it up if I can. I must close now, with love to all. Answer soon.

A short time ago one of our little ones was adopted by a gentleman from the North-West. He and the Matron went to town to purchase such clothing as he thought the child would require. And he bought so much that the little girl was quite overcome with gratitude and burst out into tears. "What's the matter, Maggie?" he said, "don't you want to come with me? Don't cry ; you may keep what I have bought for you and remain with Mrs. Duncan." "Oh, don't leave me now," she said, with outstretched hands ; "but you are the first person that ever loved me for myself, and I can't help crying a little." With such evidences of gratitude as these surely we should consider it a privilege to have the time and strength to work in this fold of the Good Sheppard, who says to each member of our Board, "Feed my lambs."

Medical Report of Girls' Home, 1899.

The Medical Staff are pleased to be able to report that the children are in first-class health, and the Home is perfectly free from those parasitic diseases which it is so difficult to eradicate completely in an institution where neglected children are being constantly admitted.

Those microbes, audacious enough to enter during the past year, found the soil so uncongenial and the attendants so watchful that life became a burden and was dropped altogether.

Only one accident has occurred and that not of a very serious nature. Twelve children have been sent to the General Hospital and the Hospital for Sick Children for special treatment, which in all cases has been beneficial.

The children's health has been as carefully attended as in most private families. Nothing seems to escape the keen eye of the Matron.

Two talks were given on "Hygiene" to the older girls.

Eleven were successfully vaccinated.

The directions of the physicians have been ably carried out by the Matron and nurses, and we would acknowledge our indebtedness to the Public Health Department for vaccine points and disinfectants.

Constitution of the Girls' Home.

1. This Institution shall be called the "GIRLS' HOME," and have for its object the rescue from vice of young girls, and the bestowal of careful attention to their religious, moral and temporal welfare; also the maintenance and support of girls from two to fourteen years of age.
2. Children are given out to parties furnishing suitable references, on payment of five dollars in advance, which goes to the general funds of the Institution, and five dollars per annum till the child is fifteen, then ten, fifteen and twenty dollars for the next three years respectively; these sums, except the first, are deposited for the said child's benefit and given to her at the expiration of her term of service.
3. The Management shall be trusted to a Committee of not more than forty-five ladies, chosen at the Annual Meeting, out of which shall be elected by ballot Directresses, Treasurer, Secretary, Corresponding Secretary, and Superintendent of Districts. All vacancies shall be filled by ballot, on a majority vote at a monthly meeting after at least one week's notice. Should it happen at any meeting that no directress be present, then the ladies in attendance, if sufficient to form a quorum, may elect some one of their number to take the chair, the lady so appointed to have, for the time being, the same authority in all respects as Directress.
4. No alteration shall be made in this Constitution, except at the Annual Meeting; and notice of any proposed alterations must always be given to the Board at least one month previous to such Annual Meeting.

Rules for the Board of Management of the Girls' Home.

1. Regular meetings of the Board of Managers shall be held every Tuesday at 10.30 a.m., the first Tuesday in the month being the day of the Monthly Meeting, for which all important business shall be deferred. Special meetings may be called by the Secretary, upon an order from the First Directress, or, in her absence, at the request of any three members.
2. All meetings shall be opened and closed with prayer, and be opened as soon after the appointed hour as a quorum shall be present, which shall consist of five members at a Monthly and three at a Weekly Meeting, being conducted in the following order :

(1st) The Secretary shall read the minutes of the preceding meeting, which shall be signed, or in case of a Monthly Meeting, the minutes of all the meetings during the last month; inform the meeting of any correspondence that has taken place, and read the general Reports of the condition of the Institution.

(2nd) The presiding lady shall place all resolutions before the meeting, declare the decision to the Secretary, and if an equality of votes occur, give the casting one, in addition to her vote as a member of the Board.

3. As soon as the meeting is opened (when a quorum is formed) all conversation not addressed to the presiding lady shall be pronounced by her to be out of order, and stopped.

4. Any lady allowing three months to pass without being present, or notifying her inability to attend to the Secretary, shall have her name struck off the list of the Managing Committee.

5. The Treasurer shall receive and take charge of all moneys belonging to the Institution, as well as the children's fees, keeping account of the same. **All accounts shall be brought by her before the meeting of the Managers every month.**

6. The Corresponding Secretary shall keep account of all children given out from the Home, and correspond with them at least once a year, and shall keep account of, and read all correspondence respecting them at the Board Meetings.

7. The Secretary of Districts shall arrange with the collectors all details of the districts to be visited, and take charge of the lists of subscription for the Annual Report.

8. The Secretary shall direct all the correspondence, keep account, as far as practicable, of all children in the Institution, giving a general report thereof at the Monthly Meeting, at which she shall regularly attend, but never be called upon to preside, minute the proceedings, and take the names of the ladies present.

9. Two members of the Committee shall be appointed by the Secretary to **visit the Home** daily each week, ascertain from the Matron the behaviour of the children, as well as whatever may be requisite for them and for the house, and report the same at the Regular Weekly Meetings. The First Directress, Treasurer, Corresponding Secretary and Secretary shall not be of the number of Daily Visitors.

10. Any three Managers, including a Directress, may admit applicants up to the age of fourteen, with a doctor's certificate insuring them to be free from disease.

Rules and Regulations for the Matron and Children of the Girls' Home.

1. The Matron shall be competent to take charge of all the children, as well as to conduct the household affairs generally, and also to instruct the girls between the ages of five and fourteen in sewing, knitting and household work.
2. She shall admit any applicant not younger than two years, or older than fourteen, upon a doctor's certificate—subject always to the approval of the Board.
3. The charge for each child of such parents or friends who are able to pay, shall be five dollars per month, unless an exceptional case should occur. If more than one child of the same parent or friend gain admittance, a reduction may be made, as approved by the ladies of the Weekly Committee.
4. The Matron shall daily inspect the cleanliness of the children, see that they attend the day school punctually and regularly, and every morning and evening conduct family prayers.
5. The children shall rise at 6 a. m. from May 1st, to October 31st, and at 7 a. m. from November 1st, to April 30th. The time for going to rest to be from 5 to 8 p. m.
Children under fourteen are not allowed to wash or scrub more than three hours a day.
6. Meals to be at regular hours. Breakfast at 8 a. m.; dinner at 12; tea at 5 p. m. Grace to be said before and after meals by the elder children. The Matron and one servant to be present.
7. All children of age to do so, shall regularly attend Sunday School, and also Divine Service once every Sunday, in charge of the Matron, or some other competent person, and in the afternoon attend the Sunday School in the Institution.
8. Parents or friends of the children shall be admitted to visit them on Wednesday afternoon from 3 until 5 o'clock. Persons wishing to come on other days must obtain a permit from the Board.
9. The Home shall be open to the public any afternoon during the week.

Terms of Indenture of the Girls' Home.

Parties taking a child from the Home are required to provide the said child, during the whole period of service—viz., till the child is eighteen years of age—with all necessary and proper food, clothing, lodging, medicine, and medical attendance, to bring her up in the principles of the Protestant religion, to pay due attention to her moral and spiritual culture, and to allow her to attend Sunday-School, and place of worship regularly, to instruct the child in reading, writing and plain needle-work, and in general household duties, to pay into the Home, in advance, the sum of five dollars, which goes to the general funds of the Institution; and at the end of the first, and each year of service until the child attains the age of fourteen, the sum of five dollars; when fifteen, ten dollars; when sixteen, fifteen dollars; when seventeen, twenty dollars; which money is deposited by the Board for the child's benefit; and further, to provide the said child at the expiration of her term of service with a good new suit of clothes. In case, through protracted illness or death, or any other cause, the parties fail to carry out their various obligations, the Management reserves to itself the right of resuming their control over the child, or of taking such measures to secure her rights as they may deem necessary.

In case the parties taking a child shall not be satisfied with her, they have the power of returning her to the Home, after satisfying the Board that such action would be to the interest of all concerned.
