MINUTES OF THE MINISTERIAL SESSION OF THE
TORONTO CONFERENCE.

The Ministerial Session of the Toronto Conference was opened at 9 a.m., June 13th. The President, Rev. W. R. PARKER, M.A., D.D., occupied the chair.

The President announced the 753rd Hymn. The Secretary read Phil. iv., and Revs. Dr. PORRS and M. FAWCETT led the Conference in prayer.

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MINUTES OF THE ELEVENTH SESSION OF THE
TORONTO CONFERENCE OF THE
METHODIST CHURCH.

The Conference assembled in the Metropolitan Church, Toronto, Thursday, June 14th, 1894, at 9 a.m. The President, Rev. W. R. PARKER, M.A., D.D., took the chair, and led the Conference prayer-meeting, which lasted one hour, and was a season of great spiritual profit.

At 10 o'clock the President, in a brief address, introduced the General Superintendent, Rev. Dr. Carman, to the chair of Conference.

The General Superintendent called the Conference to order, announcing the 122nd Hymn. The Assistant Secretary, Rev. G. K. Adams, read the 135th Psalm, and the President led the Conference in prayer.

The General Superintendent delivered an appropriate and powerful address.

The roll was called, and 147 ministers and 95 laymen answered to their names.

On motion, the bar of Conference was fixed—the floor of the church as far as the pillar of gallery in the rear.

On the second ballot, Rev. Wm. Galbraith, M.A., LL.B., Ph.D., was elected President, and suitably addressed the Conference.

On motion, the hours of Conference were appointed as follows: 9 to 12 a.m., and 2 to 5.30 p.m.

The first draft of stations was placed on the table and taken as read.

On the second ballot, Rev. Alfred Brown was elected Secretary.

On nomination of the Secretary, Rev. George K. Adams, Rev. F. Woodger, and Dr. Sturgeon Stewart were elected Assistant Secretaries; Rev. E. Barrass, D.D., Journal Secretary; and Revs. G. M. Brown and J. F. Ockley, Conference Letter Writers.

On motion, the Chairmen of Districts were instructed to name a minister and a layman from each District to constitute a Nominating Committee to nominate the Standing Committees of Conference.

Your Committee also respectfully suggest that all claims on this Fund from circuits and districts should contain a statement giving all necessary information as to membership and salary paid so as to lessen the labor and inconvenience of the Committee.

Your Committee recommend the reappointment of Rev. T. Dunlop as treasurer for the ensuing year.

STANDING REGULATIONS OF THE SUSTENTATION FUND.

This Fund shall be called the Sustentation Fund of the Toronto Conference of the Methodist Church.

The object of the Fund is to relieve those ministers within the bounds of the Toronto Conference whose salary is inadequate to their support.

All ministers, whether laboring on circuits or missions, whose salaries are lower than the following amounts shall have their claims considered in connection with this Fund, viz., married ministers, \$500; single ordained ministers, \$300; and probationers, \$250; the amounts to embrace salary only.

The Fund shall be maintained by annual collections and subscriptions to be taken up in all our congregations in every circuit and mission throughout the Conference. Each minister and preacher shall bring the matter fairly before his people, and do his utmost to secure liberal contributions to this Fund. In case there are any delinquent circuits, the Chairman of the District, accompanied when possible by a layman, shall visit such circuits, and shall urge on the people as he may think best, a more liberal and generous support of their ministers. No minister or probationer who has not taken up the collection shall be entitled to any claim on the Fund. Every circuit claiming from this Fund must show that it has paid for ministerial support an average of \$3.00 per member for all members over sixteen years of age, and every mission that it has paid an average of \$2.00 in order to give them a legitimate claim on the Fund.

The Fund shall be under the management of a committee composed of one minister and one layman from each District appointed by the Conference, who shall have authority to distribute the funds on hand during the session of the Conference to the several claimants, according to the amounts received from all sources for ministerial support during the year.

No claim shall be considered by the Committee that has not been recommended by the District Meeting where the minister resides, immediately preceding such distribution.

A treasurer shall be appointed by the Conference, who shall take charge of all the moneys collected for this Fund, to whom the Superintendents of circuits are requested to remit all collections and subscriptions

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immediately on receipt thereof, and who shall pay the amounts allotted to the claimants on the order of the Chairman and Secretary of the Committee.

The Committee recommend that the time of making the collections shall not be later than the month of March.

exercised in the Book Room account, in connection with which we would draw attention to the item of \$58 for bound copies of the Minutes to Conference officers and Secretaries of Districts as one that might be discontinued.

REGULATIONS REGARDING THE CONTINGENT FUND.

1. The Superintendents of circuits shall pay as soon as convenient the collections taken up on their respective circuits to the Financial Secretaries, who shall remit the same to the Treasurer.
2. All applications for grants from this Fund shall be presented to the Committee by the Chairman of the District from which the claim is made, or by such other person as he may appoint.
3. No application for special claims shall be entertained by the Committee unless they have passed the fourth Quarterly Meeting, and have been signed by the Recording Steward and recommended by the District Meeting; also no special claim shall be entertained where the claimant receives \$900 or over as appropriation from his circuit.
4. All applications for expenses incurred in the service of the Church, or for claims not otherwise specified, shall be submitted in detail to the Committee for their investigation.
5. No grants shall be made for ministerial supply on account of affliction when the Circuit is deemed competent to pay for said supply, and in no case shall a grant be made for more than the salary of a single minister.
6. If grants be made to Districts to assist dependent circuits, said grants shall be fairly apportioned to the circuits claiming aid by the Financial District Meeting.
7. That \$40 be the maximum allowance for funeral expenses.

TEMPERANCE COMMITTEE.

Your Committee beg leave to submit the following:

1. We desire first to give an expression of our thankfulness to God for the great and rapid strides made during the past year in the temperance cause. Much encouragement has been given to push forward in the work with hearts full of faith and hope that He who ruleth all things for good will give us strength to battle and to conquer—the result being the total prohibition of the liquor traffic in Canada.
2. In the plebiscite vote taken last January, the people made an unmistakable demand upon the Government and Legislature of Ontario to adopt

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and carry out a policy of prohibition, so far as lies within their power, and we believe that every true Christian heart goes out in thankfulness for the overwhelming majority given by the people in their vote declaring themselves favorable to prohibition and the total annihilation of the greatest curse with which our fair land is burdened. In this connection, we must refer to the zeal and energy shown by the ladies of Ontario in their efforts in behalf of prohibition. They have this work at heart, and their quiet social influence did much to prepare the minds of the sterner sex, and to urge them to their duty. We trust that in similar contests that may arise in future the ladies will come *out* more generally, facing the work with the courage necessary for practical service in the cause they advocate. Life's realities require not only moral influence but positive action, and we can depend upon the ladies for this.

3. While we notice with pleasure the active interest shown by the people in general in this matter, we are proud of the work done by our own Church. Her people have shown loyalty to the cause, and her ministers have fought bravely for God and humanity. We here desire to commend the good work done by the Christian Churches generally, Epworth Leagues, temperance and other kindred societies, that are actively pushing forward, energetically and with determination, this glorious movement. Our Sunday Schools are doing nobly, and we feel like encouraging them to go on with their important part of the work—work done by the distribution of pledge cards among the children and their signatures secured, and by the temperance lessons that are taught—thus sowing seed upon hopeful ground, that will spring up and exhibit a growth of temperance sentiment, powerful in its influence in years to come.

4. We take occasion to refer to the Royal Commission appointed to take evidence on this matter, and we deplore the evident leaning shown by some of the members of the Commission towards the liquor traffic. We trust, however, that their report may bring out some facts that will strengthen the advocates of temperance, *in* the Government and *out*, in their endeavor to obtain legislation for the annihilation of the liquor traffic and its terrible consequences.

5. Among the communications and suggestions received by the Committee was one from the Secretary of the Dominion Alliance, asking the Conference to send four delegates, as usual, to the annual meeting of the Alliance Council, which will be held this year in Montreal on the 3rd and 4th of July next. Your Committee recommend the appointment of these delegates, and suggest the names of Revs. Charles Langford and J. W. Savage, and Messrs. Dr. A. D. Watson and H. H. Shaver, with Rev. W. Thornley and Mr. E. Savage as alternates.

6. We rejoice in the attitude taken by the Chief Magistrate of the city of Toronto, when asked to compromise his well-known temperance principles by publicly welcoming the Hotel-keepers' Association to the city, and thus to lend the weight of his official position to that part of their business which is so destructive to the best interests of our country.

7. Your Committee feel that the present is a very important time in the history of the prohibition movement, and would call upon all Christian workers, moral reformers and lovers of social purity to lend a helping

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hand to obtain the end in view. We must *work*, and let our efforts be directed in a specific and definite manner, keeping the cause of temperance above party politics, and thus act upon what your Committee deem to be a duty at this time—the making of prohibition the first plank in our individual platform, in municipal, Provincial and Dominion affairs.

8. It is cause for thanksgiving that in this Province the temperance question has reached greater prominence during the past year than heretofore, and it is to be hoped that at future elections all Methodist voters will mark their ballots only for candidates who are pledged to support a policy of prohibition. Let our franchise be used independently, deliberately and on all occasions where it will tell for prohibition, and by the help of God, we shall, we trust, soon see what we have prayed and longed for—the total prohibition of the traffic in the Dominion of Canada.

MEMORIAL COMMITTEE.

Having considered the memorial respecting the formation of new missions, we do hereby endorse the principle of establishing missions when desirable, but that such mission or missions be organized in accordance with the Constitution of our Church.

Whereas, the Prison Reform Commission in their report in 1891, recommended *inter alia*:

1. That the Dominion Government establish a reformatory for young men, where first offenders may be sent instead of to the penitentiaries of the Dominion, and where they may have every opportunity for, and every incentive to, reformation.

2. That the Ontario Government (a) establish in the Province one or more reformatories for inebriates, and (b) reorganize the Provincial Reformatory for Boys and the Refuge for Girls.

3. And that the County Councils of the Province establish poorhouses where necessary, and make more efficient provision for the better classification and employment of prisoners in the county gaols; and

Whereas, these carefully considered recommendations have been endorsed and re-endorsed by this Conference and by many other public bodies, as well as by prison wardens and other prison experts; and

Whereas, more than three years have passed since these recommendations were made public, without practical effect being given to the same; therefore

Resolved,—1. That we desire again to place on record our emphatic endorsement of these important prison reform recommendations.

2. That we also place on record our regret and disappointment that our legislators, both Dominion and Provincial, instead of taking the initiative in the introduction of necessary legislation in the direction of moral reform, seem to wait until so impelled by force of public sentiment.

3. That one copy of the above resolutions be forwarded to the Governor-General of Canada, and one copy to the Lieutenant-Governor of Ontario.

4. That a standing committee, to be known as the "Prison Reform

Committee," be appointed by this Conference to co-operate with other public bodies in the cause of prison reform.

5. That the members of the Methodist Church are hereby urged to use their influence, both with our legislators and with members of the county municipal councils, in behalf of prison reform.

5. We recommend that the General Conference so legislate that a collection be taken up annually in our Sunday Schools for the Educational Fund.

6. We recommend that the General Conference so change the Constitution of the Educational Society that its administration be more connexional, so that grants to students be equalized.

7. In view of the incompleteness of the financial returns, we recommend that the auditors' statement be submitted to a small committee of the Board for examination and insertion in the Report, viz., the Chairman, Treasurer and Secretary. All of which is respectfully submitted.

STATISTICAL COMMITTEE.

Your Committee beg leave to report as follows:

There are within the bounds of the Toronto Conference, 136 ministers and 44 probationers engaged in the active work of the ministry. The total amount raised by circuits and missions for their support during the year was \$111,141. There were deficiencies upon appropriations amounting to nearly \$4,500. We are gratified to learn, that as a result of the

year's labor, we are enabled to report an increase of 1,768 members. Our connexional funds stand as follows: Missionary, \$14.49 increase; General Conference, \$7.70; Sustentation, \$16.67. The Contingent Fund shows a decrease of \$36.08; Union Church Relief, \$33.03; Educational, \$516.33.

We have in the Toronto Conference 404 churches, and 95 other preaching places, with a seating capacity of 108,839. The attendance on worship is given as 84,003. The estimated value of our churches is \$2,104,859, upon which there is a debt of \$736,471. Of parsonages there are 116, valued at \$198,885, and furniture to the value of \$35,085. The total value of all our churches, parsonages and burial grounds is \$2,355,329. The total debt upon churches and parsonages is \$765,492, upon which there are unpaid reliable subscriptions to the amount of \$28,553.

Your Committee beg to call attention to the fact that they were delayed in their work for the want of returns, which should have been given to the District Meeting, and we earnestly request promptness in this matter on the part of those concerned.

We would also suggest that District Meetings would do well to avoid electing District Secretaries to other Conference Committees, as their work needs the undivided attention of those who have it in hand.

Little Current.—That the request of the trustees of the Green Bay Church, to make certain exchange of church property with Mr. Abraham Bryan, be granted.

COMMITTEE ON MISSIONS.

1. Your Committee recommend the Conference to forward the document without taking action.

2. A memorial from the Toronto West District on Home Missions, as follows:

"Moved by Rev. E. E. Scott, seconded by Rev. J. E. Starr,

"That we, as a District Meeting, memorialize the Annual Conference to appoint a committee to confer with other denominations concerned, seeking to secure a better readjustment of our Home Mission work in harmony with the desire of the General Missionary Secretary as expressed in the circular sent out to District Meetings. Carried."

Your Committee recommend:

That, in view of the large amount of missionary money spent in the Mission field by the various denominations, and the large amount of ground occupied, we would recommend such legislation by the General Conference as will provide for a careful consideration of this question, and for such conference with other denominations as may lead to a readjustment of our Home Mission work, and a consequent saving of missionary money.

3. A memorial from Toronto West District, as follows:

"Moved by Rev. J. A. Chapman, seconded by Mr. F. Addison,

"That this District Meeting recommend the Toronto Conference to memorialize the General Conference to the effect that a larger percentage be apportioned to the support of our Home Missions, and also further recommend that such legislation be enacted as to empower the several Conferences of the Church to appoint travelling superintendents to

devote their whole time to the care and oversight of the Home Mission fields. Carried."

Your Committee would recommend :

1. That memorial be forwarded to the General Conference without any action being taken on it by this Conference.

2. That in view of the importance of more efficient supervision of certain parts of the work, especially the Mission fields, we recommend such legislation by the General Conference that will provide for such supervision.

XI. COMMITTEE ON SABBATH OBSERVANCE.

Your Committee believe that during the past year substantial progress has been made toward a better and more Christian observance of the Lord's Day.

All who desire, not only a seventh day of rest, but the advantages of the Christian Sabbath for every class of the community, will rejoice at the result of the struggle in the outcome of the conflict at the World's Fair in Chicago against the supremacy of the almighty dollar.

While, however, we rejoice in the efforts made, we are assured that much remains to be done, and your Committee hold the opinion that as an influential section of the Christian Church, the Methodist people can do much to hasten the desired consummation.

We recommend the discontinuance of all unnecessary display upon the occasion of the assembling for Divine worship, both civil and military, of the various associations and orders of the present day.

Your Committee deplore and earnestly protest against the desecration of the Lord's Day practised by our railway companies in the running of freight trains, and more particularly the passing of empty cars from one point to another, and the returning of unattached engines; the plea of mercy to live stock, or the preservation of perishable materials, cannot in these special cases be adduced. Their running is an injustice to employees, and an annoyance to law-abiding and Sabbath-observing citizens. Powerful corporations should not be allowed to do what would not be permitted the individual citizen. We also must protest against the running of ferry boats to Hanlan's Island, or other similar places, and against the employment of bands of music at some of these places on the Lord's Day.

We earnestly request our people to take a firm stand against unnecessary Sunday visiting and travelling; to consider in the spirit of Christian self-denial their domestic servants, male and female; and to make such household arrangements as will permit all such persons to enjoy, as far as possible, the day of rest. We ask them as much as possible to abstain from the use of private or hired carriages, the employment of which so often involves labor and loss of the God-given privileges of the Christian Sabbath to so many persons, and which, during the late anti-Sunday car

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campaign, formed one of the strongest arguments with many in favor of the running of street cars on that day.

We call upon the membership of the Church to obey and strongly support all legislative enactments, having for their object the better observance and sanctity of the Lord's Day.

We regret to learn that since our first consideration of the matters submitted to us, a series of Sunday band concerts has been inaugurated at Toronto Island.

SUNDAY SCHOOL COMMITTEE.

Your Committee have great pleasure in referring to a few facts which it is thought may prove interesting to the Conference.

Every district from which we have heard reports conversions among the children. Two of the Toronto districts report 631 conversions, and in the same districts, 2,371 children are reported meeting in class.

Your Committee regret to state that there is a slight falling off in the amount of money raised for the Extension movement. This is to be regretted, inasmuch as the demands made upon the treasury are increasingly urgent, and money expended in aid of poor schools is a profitable investment.

Your Committee rejoice in the growing interest which is being taken in missionary work in our Sunday Schools, but we think that if a children's day were appointed, when scholars should prepare recitations, etc., on mission topics, and bring in their moneys collected by card or otherwise, more money would be raised, and the children would be better trained in mission work.

It is a matter of regret to your Committee, that one defect to which attention has been previously called, still remains, viz., the small number of scholars who are studying the Methodist Catechism.

Your Committee believe it is imperatively necessary that the children in our Sunday Schools should be well grounded in the truth.

Your Committee rejoice that many of those engaged in Sunday School work are becoming more efficiently equipped for duty, and we would venture to suggest that greater efficiency might be secured by means of regular daily study of the Sunday School lessons, and also the systematic study of the Bible.

Your Committee desire to express their regret that a few schools still purchase their books and papers from foreign publishing houses rather than our own, and we feel assured that no better Sunday School publications are issued than those which emanate from our own publishing house in Toronto.

Your Committee beg to recommend the reappointment of Rev. E. Barrass, D.D., to the office of Treasurer.

STATE OF THE WORK.

Your Committee beg leave to report as follows:

Last year a decrease in membership was reported, and a resolution was passed by which we were pledged to the humbling of ourselves before God and a more earnest consecration to the work of preaching Scripture holiness throughout the land. With these vows upon us we went forth everywhere preaching the Lord Jesus, and the hand of the Lord has been with us, for, with gratitude to the great Head of the Church, we record an increase in membership of 1,768. To the work of the current year we would have all the Church go forth with still greater humility and more perfect consecration; then this year will surpass all former ones and a still larger ingathering be reported.

Though the year has been one characterized by severe financial depression, we mark with great pleasure and unbounded gratitude to God, the prosperity of our Church in all its financial and material interests.

There are, however, some features of the work that call for special inquiry and amendment. A decrease in the number of catechumens is reported. This should not be. "Feed my lambs" was never a more imperative obligation. Our success mainly lies in this direction, for the Church that is most instrumental in the conversion of the children, will be the most influential of the denominations.

Evidences there are that worldly amusements hinder the power and influence of our Church. Both the Word of God and our Church, give every encouragement to all rational, physical, and intellectual recreation, but in many of the homes of our people there is a sad departure from the rule that no amusement should be indulged in, except such as can be taken in the name of the Lord Jesus. We need no new legislation in this matter, no more specific enumeration of the things that are sinful; but there is needed a true loyalty to Christ, a deeper concern for the prosperity of His work.

We call attention to the importance of the observance of the social services of the Church. Many do not esteem these as highly as they should, and among these too often are to be found the leading officers of the Church. If in all places the elder and official members be faithful to the class and prayer meetings, a very much larger representation of the young and other members would be found in regular attendance at these services.

We are of the opinion that it would be an improvement to our class meetings if the Discipline were so changed as to make the appointment of class leaders an annual one.

We would draw attention to the need of observing the Discipline in the matter of a three months' probation before members are received into full connection. We are strongly of the opinion that this matter is too frequently disregarded, often to the great provocation of the minister who may be called to succeed one thus negligent.

We would suggest that in our large town and city congregations, where the membership is too great to allow the minister in charge to maintain a thorough pastoral supervision thereof, the leaders and local preachers be formed into a body of sub-pastors—these men and women

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to have the membership apportioned among them, and to be required to report their condition to the pastor, name by name, at least once a quarter.

This Committee is of the opinion that by the formation of such boards from the ranks of existing officers of the Church, they being persons full of the Holy Ghost and wisdom, many souls will be retained to the Church that are allowed at the present time to drift away through neglect.

While we recognize and acknowledge the usefulness, under certain circumstances, of travelling evangelists, we would yet urge upon every stationed minister the wisdom and necessity of being the evangelist upon his own field of labor, and we would urge caution and carefulness in the employment of outside helpers.

SUPERANNUATION FUND.

*Report of the Board of the Superannuation Fund for the Year ending
July 31st, 1893.*

The Board is gratified in being able to report that all claims have been paid in full, leaving a balance in the hands of the Treasurer of \$1,719.47.

The balance due Permanent Fund, as per last Annual Statement (principal and interest), amounting to \$1,851.27 and \$500 on commutation, has also been paid.

The receipts are in excess of the previous year: From Circuits, \$2,092.56; from Ministerial Subscriptions, \$480; from Interest on Investments, \$617.51, and from Book Room, \$500, making a total increase for the year of \$3,689.27.

The capital account has been increased by \$2,373 from Ministerial subscriptions, and \$340 from legacies.

On account of the exceptionally large number of ministers who have been superannuated this year, the claims on the Fund for the next year will be increased by about \$3,000.

The growth of educational sentiment has been very encouraging since the union of the Methodist Churches of Canada, but it is surprising that over 900 circuits and missions have failed during the past year to report anything beyond collections, while the Constitution requires subscriptions in addition to collections. Men and brethren, help.

ALMA COLLEGE, ST. THOMAS.

To the Members of the Toronto Conference of the Methodist Church.

DEAR FATHERS AND BROTHERS,—In sending you our annual report of school work, we acknowledge with gratitude that benign Providence which has watched over the lives and preserved the health of students and teachers through the year. The attendance, notwithstanding the stringency of the times, and the financial panic in the United States, has reached 150. Of these, 80 were Methodists; 30, Episcopalians; 24, Presbyterians; 14, Baptists; 1, Friend; and 1, Roman Catholic.

In departments the enrolment was as follows: Preparatory, 18; Academic, 22; Collegiate, 43; Fine Art, 31; Elocution, 38; Commercial, 12; Music, 105.

The policy of the Board of Management has been to offer to all young women seeking the higher or secondary education the best advantages of thorough culture at a moderate cost, with home-like surroundings and safeguards, and under distinctive Christian influence and teaching. In carrying out their policy the Board of Management has asked the Church to provide buildings and furnishings only—the school being self-supporting, and receiving no aid from any church fund. That this policy has met a public demand is evinced by the large patronage bestowed upon the College from all denominations, from all parts of the Dominion and the neighboring Republic—the slight decrease in the enrolment this year being chiefly in the list of students from the United States, and accounted for by the financial depression.

The graduating class will number 16: Literary, 2; Fine Art, 3; Music, 6; Elocution, 4; Commercial Science, 1. A class has also been prepared for the examinations for public school teachers' certificates and will write in a few weeks.

You will be pleased to learn that Alma won three awards in Fine Art at the World's Fair, one in each subject in which she exhibited, viz., Oil Painting, Water Color Painting and China Painting.

The returns are in from the Provincial Art Examinations, and Alma maintains the high standard of past years in the number of certificates and honors won.

The agency, under the vigorous efforts of the Rev. J. P. Rice, has

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resulted in an increase of subscriptions to the Relief Fund of \$7,500, between the first of July, 1893, and the first of May, 1894. It is hoped that at least \$9,000 in cash or pledges will be added to the Fund this year.

With pleasure we report that the religious services, such as prayer and class meetings, Bible classes, missionary meetings, etc., have been well attended, and that the Missionary Society and Young Woman's Christian Association have been doing good and effective work. Two more of our students have this year entered the foreign missionary field—one in Japan and one in Africa in connection with Bishop Taylor's work—making six in all who are now engaged in the mission field.

We extend our hearty thanks to the Conference for its interest and co-operation in past years, and for the excellent appointments it has made from year to year of associate members of our Board of Management, and would ask for the usual appointments for the ensuing Conference year.

THE WESLEYAN LADIES' COLLEGE, HAMILTON.

To the President and Members of the Toronto Conference, greeting.

DEAR BRETHREN,—We are pleased to be with you once more and to renew old friendships. In doing so we assure you of our warmest regards and wishes for your continued peace and increasing prosperity.

Educationally, this has been a very successful year. We have had good classes, and of excellent material. On Tuesday next, the 19th, we will graduate a class of fourteen, seven of them having completed the full College course, the others the courses in music and art. The College was never more efficiently manned. Educational requirements are steadily advancing, and the College is kept fully abreast of the demands. The character of our teachers may be inferred from the fact that several times within the past few years members of our faculty have been taken to fill chairs in universities. Every teacher in our College is an honor graduate of some university or college. The character of the work done here should be well known all through the Dominion. Thousands of young ladies have been educated here, thousands of homes have been enriched and adorned by the culture received in our halls. We are proud of the fact that the Lady Principals of at least five of the ladies' colleges of Canada were educated here.

Our curriculum is very complete, as well as practical, embracing every subject taught in any ladies' college in the Dominion. We will not take your time in specifying the several departments of literature, music, art, elocution, etc. Suffice it to say, that the institution will be kept in the very front rank in every respect.

We have always kept in mind that education should be the handmaid of religion, and have emphasized the study of the sacred Scriptures, not merely by the Sunday afternoon class, but by the daily lectures of the

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Principal on the Bible. The students have regular meetings on Sundays and other days for prayer and for conversation on missions and kindred subjects.

We can assure you, dear brethren, that we are with you heartily in your sublime work. We are trying to aid you, and should you direct some of your young friends to our halls, we pledge you that we will do our utmost to return them to their homes, to the Church and to society, richer both in head and heart than when we received them.

WESLEYAN THEOLOGICAL COLLEGE, MONTREAL.

To the President and Members of the Toronto Conference.

DEAR BRETHREN :

The Executive Officers of the Wesleyan Theological College, Montreal, affiliated to the McGill University, respectfully submit to you the following brief report of the work and general interests of the institution :

The past year has been painfully eventful in the death of the late honored Principal, the Rev. George Douglas, D.D., LL.D., whose name will be perennial in the history of the institution. By the unanimous action of the Board of Governors, the Rev. Prof. Shaw, D.D., LL.D., has been called to the vacancy so created, and Rev. J. Cooper Antliff, M.A., (Edin.) D.D., has been added to the staff. The Rev. Prof. Patton, B.D., has been granted leave of absence to pursue in Germany a Post-graduate Course in Semitic Literature, and his place has been filled by the Rev. Prof. Richardson, B.A., B.D., Acting Registrar.

The institution enters upon its new phase of history with the firm determination of its authorities not only to maintain its efficiency, but also to enlarge its work for the Church, and to increase its financial strength.

The number of students registered the past year was seventy-two, including seventeen non-resident. All students in residence attend the McGill University either as undergraduates or partial students. Men whose age and circumstances prove the wisdom of such a course are induced to take the full Arts Curriculum, which requires a residence of four years. At the same time at least equal practical benefit is obtained from the Licentiate's Course, which requires three years of attendance at lectures, and which includes the most valuable part of the University Curriculum, besides a heavy course in Divinity. It has been generally recognized that the College, in carrying so large a number of men beyond the necessarily limited, if not meagre, "Course of study for Probationers," is doing a most valuable educational service for the Ministry of the Methodist Church. After the system of Yale and Drew, and several other leading colleges in America, licentiate's completing their course are admitted to the further and higher three years' course for the Degree of B.D.

Financially the condition of the institution is steadily improving. Although a small draft of \$1,600 has been made on the capital, which is

sure to be soon replaced, the College may be said to be really out of debt. The Endowment Fund, largely through the successful efforts of the Rev. W. Harris, has been raised to over \$70,000. The income on current accounts the past year was \$6,448.58, and expenditure \$6,487.33. The income and outlay of the Boarding Department are about \$4,000.

There is great need of increased accommodation in both class-rooms, dormitories and Convocation Hall, and the hope is entertained that this want may be supplied without such a delay as may permanently weaken the institution, and that the valuable land held vacant may soon thus be occupied. The real estate of the College is valued at \$70,000, and is out of debt.

EPWORTH LEAGUE COMMITTEE.

The Epworth League Committee met and organized, with the Rev. R. N. Burns as Chairman, and N. W. Rowell as Secretary, and your Committee beg leave to report as follows :

1. There have been organized during the year 29 Epworth Leagues, and there has been a total increase in League membership throughout the Conference of 819, and there are now 146 Epworth Leagues, with total membership of 7,095 within the bounds of the Toronto Conference.

2. Your Committee met with devout thankfulness to Almighty God, these signs of increasing interest among our young people in progressive Christian work ; and while much has been accomplished in the past, your Committee feels that there is a tremendous power, as yet unutilized, in the young people of our Church, who have not so far connected themselves with any young people's organizations, and would respectfully urge upon every member of the Conference the importance of organizing the young people upon their respective circuits for active Christian work.

3. As the Christian Endeavor Department is an essential part of every Epworth League, and as the main object of the League's organization is to bring the young people of our Church to Christ, your Committee would most urgently press upon all pastors and Epworth League officers the importance of magnifying this department of work, believing that, in a more complete consecration and a deeper spiritual life among the membership of our Church, young as well as old, lies the hope of Methodism in the future ; and as collateral to, and as an outgrowth of, that Christian life, should be a deeper interest in the work of foreign missions, and bringing the world to a knowledge of the Saviour ; and to help on this object, and also as a means of grace to our young people, we would recommend that every pastor should urge upon the young members of his Church the Christian duty and obligation of systematic giving.

4. Believing that it never was truer than it is to-day that knowledge is indeed a power, and that if the young people of our Church are to keep abreast of the times, and to accomplish all that God would have them do,

it can only be by the culture of the mind as well as of the heart, the intellect as well as the soul, your Committee would recommend all pastors and officers of Epworth League societies to encourage and stimulate among their young people, the study of good and wholesome literature, the reading of such books as would expand the mind and broaden the sympathies of our young people, and especially that they be urged to take up the study of the history of our own Church, its struggles and triumphs, and the lives of the noble men and women who have been its leaders, and the living exponents of its principles and doctrines, believing that by such a study not only would the spiritual life of our young people be stimulated, and their enthusiasm in the cause of God increased, but that thereby would be created a spirit of loyalty and devotion to the principles and institutions which we, as Methodists, hold most dear, and your Committee recommend that the General Conference be memorialized to outline such a course of reading.

Your Committee approve of the following recommendations of the Executive of the Methodist Young People's Association of Ontario :

1. That there be held quadrennially a Dominion Convention of the young people of our Church, preceding each General Conference.

2. That the Methodist Young People's Association be divided into associations along Conference and District lines, for the holding of conventions and the better development of the work among our young people.

3. Recognizing the importance of keeping our children within the Church, your Committee recommend that there be organized in each congregation, where practicable, a Junior Epworth League Society, believing that the organization of such a society would be a valuable help to the Church, the Sunday School and the senior society, and most cordially commend to the consideration of the pastors and Sunday School superintendents the importance of the establishment of this department of work.

4. That our young people be urged to engage in a systematic study of the Bible

5. That the General Conference be memorialized to so amend the constitution of the General Epworth League Board of the Church as to permit of the direct representation of our young people upon this Board, to the extent of, at least, one-third of its membership.

6. That the Epworth League and Sunday School Boards be similarly constituted.

7. The magnificent success which attended the recent gathering of the Methodist young people of this Province in London, calls for devout thankfulness on our part, as evidencing a drawing together of the different organizations of young people in our Church in closer bonds of union and fellowship; and while we believe that the Methodist Church is large enough to have a young people's organization distinctively its own; and while we approve of, and most strongly commend, the recommendation of the Barrie District, that all our young people's societies should be brought into union under the general organization of our own Epworth League, and that the General Conference should not make any change in the name of the authorized society of our Church, yet, with the view of a still closer union and greater harmony in the future, your Committee recommend

that the General Conference be memorialized to make easy the affiliation of local Christian Endeavor Societies with the Epworth League, and of local Epworth Leagues with the Christian Endeavor Society.

8. Your Committee desires to express its hearty approval and concurrence in the remarks of our honored General Superintendent, in reference to the organization and development of our young people's work, and especially in the importance of providing in our own country the literature which is required by our young people; and to this end your Committee desires to express its approval and thankfulness for the recent action of the editor of the *Christian Guardian*, approved of by the Book Committee of our Church, in setting apart one page of that paper for Epworth League work, and that the General Conference be memorialized to ratify the action of the editor, and to set apart for League work such further part of the *Guardian* as they in their wisdom see fit.

9. That the General Conference be memorialized to carefully consider and revise the Epworth League constitution, and especially the pledge, with a view to its simplification and more complete adaptation to the work of the League.

10. That this report be forwarded to the General Conference, as expressing the views of this Conference on Epworth League work.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

ENTERTAINMENT COMMITTEE.

Your Committee beg leave to recommend :

1. That we continue the time-honored practice of entertaining and providing for the Conference.

2. That an Entertainment Committee be appointed to make provision for the next Annual Conference, this committee to consist of the following laymen: Messrs. George A. Cox, E. Gurney, Thomas Thompson, J. W. St. John, Mayor Kennedy, R. J. Fleming, John T. Moore, E. Coatsworth, jun., Albert Ogden, W. E. H. Massey, F. W. Winter, A. Kent and Samuel Corrigan, and that Mr. John T. Moore be Treasurer of the Committee.

3. We recommend that the Preachers' Meeting be requested to appoint an equal number of ministers upon this committee, and to designate one for Secretary of the Entertainment Committee.

4. We further recommend that each member of the Conference, lay or clerical, be required to contribute the sum of \$1 per annum to the Entertainment Fund, to be paid on or before the first day of Conference each year.

COMMITTEE ON GENERAL CONFERENCE MEMORIALS.

Your Committee beg to submit their report as follows:

1. Your Committee met, and organized by electing Mayor Kennedy as Chairman and John T. Moore as Secretary.
2. A memorial (No. 1) from the Rev. H. S. Matthews as to the change of Conference boundaries, was submitted and read.

The Committee recommend that this Conference memorialize the General Conference to restore Uxbridge District to the Toronto Conference, which is agreeable to all concerned, and that beyond this no further variation in our Conference boundaries is expedient at present.

3. A memorial (No. 2) from the Bradford District to amend the law so that each congregation may elect its own steward or stewards, was considered.

*The Committee recommend that no action be taken.

4. A memorial (No. 7) from the Bradford District as to the change of Conference boundaries, was read.

The Committee refer to the action in Clause 2 of this report as their recommendation in this connection.

5. A memorial (No. 8) from the Bradford District to admit laymen to the Stationing Committee, was read.

The Committee recommend that this be not concurred in.

6. A memorial (No. 9) from the Toronto West District, asking that the Connexional Funds be more definitely defined, was presented.

The Committee consider that the Discipline is sufficiently explicit.

7. A memorial (No. 10) from the Bradford District, asking to have the Recording Steward elected by ballot, was considered.

The Committee are of the opinion that the Discipline makes sufficient provision.

8. A memorial (No. 11) from the Bradford District, protesting against being placed in the Eastern Division if changes are made in Conference boundaries.

The Committee forward the same herewith to be sent on to the General Conference.

9. A memorial (No. 12) from Centre Toronto District to do away with quarterly tickets and substitute an annual card, was read.

The Committee recommend no change.

10. A memorial (No. 13) from the Barrie District relative to the appointment of an Epworth League Secretary, and a memorial (No. 14) from the Toronto East District relative to the same matter, were read.

The Committee have no recommendation to make, the Conference having already decided against the proposition.

11. A memorial (No. 15) from the Toronto East District as to Quarterly District Meetings, was considered.

The Committee recommend no change.

12. As to certain memorials and resolutions relative to Conference boundaries—No. 1, from Rev. H. S. Matthews; No. 7, from Bradford District—and resolution (No. 19) of Douglas Simpson as to reconstruction of the Stationing Committee.

Your Committee submit that:

In regard to certain memorials touching the proposed changes in the

boundaries of Annual Conferences, your Committee recognize the fact that difficulties are often experienced in the stationing of ministers, and that in the opinion of some these difficulties would be overcome in part, at least, by reducing the number of Conferences, thereby increasing their areas. But your Committee are of opinion that a more effective remedy will be found by providing a simple and comprehensive system of transfers whereby ministers may be sent to any part of the Connexion where their services are required, and by effecting needed changes in the present method of stationing the ministers. While leaving details to the General Conference, we recommend the adoption of the following :

Resolved,—1. That it is desirable that such a system be devised as will encourage and facilitate the free transfer of ministers from conference to conference throughout the entire Connexion. That this system should be encumbered with the fewest possible restrictions, and that authority to transfer should be vested in the General Superintendent in consultation with the President of the Conference immediately concerned.

2. (a) That many of the difficulties connected with the stationing of ministers would be overcome by a return to the earlier spirit and practice of Methodism, when the people on the one hand, and the ministers on the other, tacitly agreed to leave the whole matter in the hands of the stationing authority.

(b) To secure the results aimed at, we deem it desirable and important that the Stationing Committee should be limited to a General Superintendent, the President of the Conference and the Chairmen of Districts.

(c) That all communications from quarterly boards or ministers relative to stations, should be sent to the Chairman of the District for the consideration of the Stationing Committee, at least ten days before the assembling of the Committee.

3. That while the right of petition should be recognized, in religious as well as civil affairs, yet, for the peace of the Church and the efficiency of the pastorate, there must be authority somewhere to which all parties concerned will submit. We hold, therefore, that when requests from quarterly boards or ministers have once been presented, there should be no further interference with the work of the Stationing Committee, and that, especially, no protests should be received or considered by such committee.

4. Your Committee are of the opinion that it is desirable to increase the areas of districts, and decrease their number, as tending to simplify the work of stationing, and greatly to increase the interest and profit of the Annual District Meeting.

13. A memorial (No. 16) from the Toronto West District, as to the claim of the widow of Rev. J. W. Wicher upon the Superannuation Fund, was read.

Your Committee are of opinion that as Mrs. Wicher was a permanent claimant on the Superannuation Fund previous to the General Conference of 1882, the legislation of said Conference should not deprive her of that claim, and we recommend that the memorial, with this expression of opinion, be forwarded to the General Conference for a deliverance thereon.

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14. A resolution (No. 17) from Rev. J. A. Chapman :

The first clause, as to rotation in representation at the General Conference, was read.

The Committee recommend non-concurrence.

The second clause, as to connexional officers being *ex officio* members of General Conference, and resolution (No. 18) of Rev. J. F. Ockley, upon same subject, was read.

The Committee recommend concurrence.

15. A resolution (No. 20) of Rev. J. E. Starr, as to Quarterly Boards providing funds for certain church work, was read.

The Committee recommend that this resolution be forwarded to the General Conference without comment.

16. A resolution (No. 21) of Rev. J. C. Speer, as to appointment of a musical committee, was considered.

The Committee recommend non-concurrence.

17. A resolution (No. 22) from the Board of Examiners, as to uniformity and economy in examinations by a Central Board from the various Conferences preparing the papers, was read.

The Committee recommend concurrence.

18. A resolution (No. 23) from the Board of Examiners, tending to raise the standard of preliminary examinations, was read.

The Committee recommend concurrence.

19. A resolution (No. 24) from the Board of Examiners to substitute a good standard work on Homiletics, in lieu of Greek, was read.

The Committee recommend concurrence.

20. A resolution (No. 25) from the Board of Examiners, as to adding John Hall's "God's Word through Preaching," or some similar work, to preliminary examination for graduates in Arts, was read.

The Committee recommend concurrence.

21. A resolution (No. 26) of Rev. W. P. Brown, as to supplementing the Sustentation Fund, was read.

The Committee concurred.

22. Memorials (Nos. 27, 28) from R. H. Robinson, M.D., as to class meetings, were read.

The Committee recognize the importance of the matters referred to, but deem it best to leave action with regard to these subjects to the General Conference.

23. The memorials *re* Superannuation Fund, from Brampton (No. 3), Toronto West (No. 4), Whitby (No. 5), and Barrie (No. 6) Districts, were considered, and we recommend :

That the General Conference change the basis of assessment for the Superannuation Fund, as follows :

1. Assess ministers two and a half per cent. on salaries received for the previous year as reported.

2. Assess circuits on the basis of ministerial salary only, and that the said assessment be made a charge on the income of the Quarterly Official Board, and that the Recording Steward be required to see that it is duly paid.

24. To secure equal representation in the District Meeting,

Your Committee recommend that the General Conference be asked to

provide for a lay member of the District Meeting for every ministerial member of the same.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

1. Public meetings have been held "to enlist sympathy and support," at which addresses have been given by Mrs. Lucy Rider Meyer, of Chicago; Miss Stephenson, of London, Eng.; Rev. J. E. Williams, D.D., of Buffalo; Rev. T. Bowman Stephenson, D.D., and Miss Thompson. Also, the work has been brought before the Methodists of Toronto by the distribution of a leaflet on "Deaconesses" and a circular *re* a Home in the city, and the giving of addresses in connection with the prayer-meetings of some of our churches.

2. The Toronto Deaconess Aid Society has been formed, which has undertaken to furnish and maintain a Deaconess Home as to running expenses. Any person contributing fifty cents per year may be a member of this society. Mrs. Walter Massey is treasurer.

3. Your Board was thereby only required to assume the responsibility of rent and incidental expenses in order to the opening of a Home, which, it is believed, can easily be raised by private subscription. J. W. St. John, of Parkdale, was appointed treasurer for this fund.

4. With the above assurances, your Board believed that "the finances would warrant" the securing "a house in the central part of the city," and have rented No. 28 McGill Street, of which Messrs. J. W. St. John, C. D. Massey and Robt. Awde are the lessees. The house has been fitted up as a Methodist Deaconess Home, and Miss Thompson, of the Chicago Deaconess Training School, secured as "an experienced and thoroughly competent person for the position of Superintendent." She is accompanied by a candidate, and your Board has accepted three probationers from the city, making five at present in the Home.

6. We recommend that the city pastors confer with the Board of Management for the purpose of arranging a plan of work to be carried out under the direction of the Superintendent.

REPORT OF THE STATIONING COMMITTEE.

Rev. W. R. Barker presented the following report, which was adopted by the Conference:

Toronto East District—That Kew Beach be discontinued as a Mission, and that it be attached to Queen Street East, and that we recommend a grant of seventy-five dollars from the Contingent or Sustentation Fund to aid in procuring a supply.

Toronto West District—That Centennial, Zion and Perth Avenue be made into one circuit with one minister. Circuit to be called Centennial Circuit.

Barrie District—That Holly be discontinued as a circuit and be attached to Allendale Circuit.

That Shanty Bay appointment be taken from Elizabeth Street, Barrie, and attached to Ord Station Mission.

That the Mountain appointment be taken from Penetang and attached to Midland Circuit.

Algoma District—That Sanfield Mission be divided; Sanfield and Tehkummah be attached to Manitowaning Mission, while the appointments, Silver Lake, Big Lake, Mindemoya and Providence Bay, be combined with Brittonville, Perrivale and Popular. To this end we advise the dropping of Sparrow and connecting Ten Mile Point and Little Current, the new mission to be called Manitoulin South.

That Port Findley comprise Tarbut, Laird and Zion, and that Sylvan District be formed, comprising Bethel, Coffin and Mount Pleasant. Findley proposes to raise \$175 and Sylvan \$125.

That Ophia Mission be formed, comprising Orange Hall and Dennis Valley, with other available territory.

That W. E. Egan, A. J. G. Carscadden, J. H. More, J. R. Wilkinson be ordained for special purposes.

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OBITUARIES.

WILLIAM JOHN MAXWELL

Was born in the township of Plympton, March 23rd, 1845. His parents were of U.E. Loyalist stock, and from them he had by inheritance and early training his characteristic qualities of indomitable industry, untiring energy and unswerving loyalty to his ideal of duty.

It is an evidence of his remarkable mental endowments that he was able to enter the work of teaching in the public schools at the early age of fifteen, and that from the first his career as a teacher was one of unusual success.

While engaged in this calling, chiefly through the instrumentality of that devoted servant of Christ, Joseph Little, widely known as "Uncle Joe," he was converted to God and gave his heart and life fully to the service of the Divine Master. For some years he labored under deep anxiety of mind, amounting at times even to distress. In regard to his call to the ministry, he was urged in this direction by the promptings of the Spirit, but he had a very high ideal of the sacredness and responsibilities of the ministerial office, and he shrank from undertaking it unless with the most unmistakable evidence of a divine call. This puzzling question was at length decided in an unusual manner. While visiting his brother, who was ill, he was induced to take his place in the pulpit, and in doing so got such light that henceforward the way was plain. Henry never preached again, but his mantle with a double portion of his spirit fell on the younger brother who, with an entire consecration, proceeded to make full proof of his ministry.

Perhaps no better glimpse of the character of the man and the manner in which he entered on his life-work could be given than by reading the inscription found in his study Bible and written about this time (see page 80). Those who knew him most intimately will bear witness to the fidelity with which he carried out these resolutions in after-life.

He was married on 13th August, 1879, to Miss Jennie Harvie Young, of Sarnia. His marriage was a happy one. This talented and devoted lady was thoroughly in unison with all his plans of usefulness, and a worthy helpmeet in all his ministerial work, and her name with his is held in grateful remembrance.

His fields of labor were: Watford, Parkhill, Guelph (twice), St. Catharines (twice), Brantford, Hamilton and Toronto. The fact that he held such important charges, that from first to last his acceptability never waned, but that his services were always in demand, and that at a comparatively early period of his ministry he was called to fill the important positions of Chairman of District and President of Conference, are sufficient to show that he made no mistake when he chose the ministry as the work to which he was divinely called.

In official positions our brother was conscientiously loyal to Methodist discipline and methods, without fear and without reproach. As a pastor he was sympathetic, in his intercourse with the people untiring and vigilant, fully alive to all the needs and the opportunities of his surroundings. In his general administration his methods were practical. In persons of his ardent temperament it is not unusual to find some extravagances, but Brother Maxwell's schemes were always the embodiment of sterling practical commonsense. He was never idle, never neglected a duty, never did anything by halves. In his

whole life there was a something which can be described by no other word than *intense*. He was *intense*. Why was he so intense? Was it because he knew that his day was short? Pronounced by medical examiners ineligible for life insurance, was he working under the shadow of the coming end, and was it this that made him fill in every moment with such eager tireless energy? Certain it is that few lives more fully exemplify the Master's saying: "I must work the work of him that sent me while it is day, the night cometh when no man can work."

His preaching was characterized by great originality, both of thought and method. He had many of the qualities of a great preacher. To a facile command of language, brilliant imagination, lively fancy, quaint humor and great depth of emotional feeling, he added an intense earnestness that made the hearer feel not so much as if he was making a sermon or preaching one, as if he were revealing the inner depths of his own being.

He had a good library, principally of standard works, and he carefully prepared all his sermons, writing out quite fully, generally in characters like print.

In personal character Mr. Maxwell was noted for his straightforward, manly independence of thought and action. He had an intense scorn of anything mean or unworthy. He was possessed of that personal magnetism which attracts men, and he made hosts of friends. True to all the obligations of friendship, no one was more successful than he in retaining the friendships once formed.

His end was like the rest of his life. In a long and weary struggle with death, his indomitable spirit triumphed through the abounding grace of God, always preserving its bright cheerfulness. With all his former heartiness and fervor he responded in *amens* to the petitions friends put up at his bedside, and when at last, unexpectedly, the end came, calmly, confidently he met it, and departed to be with Christ, which is far better.

He has left us for a brighter sphere and his work is done, but it will be long before the personal piety, genial companionship, generous kindness, unswerving loyalty and tireless energy of William John Maxwell will be surpassed.

W. T. HICKS.

William Thomas Hicks was born in Milford, Prince Edward County, in the year 1852, and died December 21st, 1893. He was consequently in the forty-second year of his age. Brother Hicks was in the nineteenth year of his ministry at the time of his decease, having been received on trial in 1874. The influences of a Christian home were thrown around our brother, and it is not surprising that, as a lad, he was the subject of deep religious impressions. When about nineteen he attended a series of revival meetings near his home, and there found the peace for which he had long sought in secret. So clear was his conversion that he never had any reason to doubt his acceptance with God, and though often lamenting that he was not as faithful as he should be, he could ever look up to his heavenly Father, and confidently say, "Lord thou knowest all things, thou knowest that I love thee." His call to the ministry was as clear as his conversion. Not only did the Church see in him grand possibilities and call him to labor for her, but the voice of God seemed to say, "Go work in my vineyard;" and although he felt the tremendous responsibility of the divine vocation, he also felt that he dare not refuse to listen to the divine command, and he set to work earnestly to prepare himself for the work

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of the ministry, and he became a workman that needed not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth.

Besides several other important circuits, Brother Hicks labored with marked success on the Caledon, Brampton West, Cooksville and Streetsville circuits. He had just received a call to a church in the city of Toronto, when, in obedience to the voice of the Church he went to Sault Ste. Marie, and was appointed Chairman of the Algoma District, but scarcely had five months elapsed after Brother Hicks arrived at his new field of labor when he was summoned from labor to reward. But in that short time he had so endeared himself to the people of the town that his sudden death was felt by all classes and creeds. The flags of the town were placed at half-mast, and the services of the Episcopalian, Presbyterian and Baptist churches were withdrawn Sunday, December 24th, when all that was mortal of our brother was laid in the cemetery, to await the resurrection of the just.

Brother Hicks was a man of sunny disposition, large heart and vigorous intellect, and while he did not hesitate to preach an unpopular truth, his great delight was to declare the love of God and of his Christ. Effective as his pulpit ministrations were, his strong point was perhaps pastoral visitation. His large-hearted sympathy made him the friend of all, and he always exercised a wonderful power over the young people of the congregations where he labored; he seemed to look upon them as the hope of the Church, and thought the labor expended upon them would produce the greatest results. He presented a manly type of evangelical piety, while his tenderness when seeking to comfort the sorrowful, guide the erring and strengthen the weak, made all who knew him love him.

In the year 1879, he was united in marriage to Miss Nellie Flack, which proved to be one of the happiest events of his life, and he found in her a very suitable helpmeet. This lady and two young daughters still survive him.

The loss of the Church is the gain of our brother. He has triumphed through the precious blood of Christ.

" Servant of God, well done !
Thy glorious warfare's past ;
The battle's fought, the victory's won,
And thou art crowned at last."

THOMAS WOOLSEY.

The subject of this obituary notice was born in the town of Gainsborough, Lincolnshire, England, on the 27th day of January, 1819. He had the inestimable advantages of a pious ancestry, and of growing up under the sacred influences of a Christian home. His parents were devoted members of the Methodist Church, and felt it to be their duty to bring up their children in the nurture and discipline of the Lord. It is not any wonder then that the heir of such an invaluable heritage should, at an early age, give his heart to God, and his energies and time to the services of His Church and the best interests of benighted humanity. The memory of the just is blessed, and never more so than when their children follow them as they followed their Divine Exemplar. It is thus that the stream of holy influences rolls on, gathering volume and force in its course.

When about seventeen years of age he experienced a change of heart, connected himself with the Church of his fathers, and consecrated the powers of his renewed being to the blessed work of saving souls, and of building up the

Church of Christ in the faith of the Gospel. From the beginning of his Christian life he exhibited the singleness of eye and purity of character which so eminently distinguished him as an ambassador for Christ. In these respects his path was like that of the just, shining more and more unto the perfect day.

In the year 1852, Mr. Woolsey, who, for ten years had been a member of the far-famed City Road Circuit, London, and a local preacher for fifteen years, came to Canada, and began his life-work on the Simcoe Circuit. He was received on trial for the ministry at the Conference of 1853, and stationed on the Picton Circuit under the superintendence of the Rev. W. McFadden. A very gracious and extensive revival of the work of God on that field took place during that year, and many precious souls were converted to God and united with the Church of Christ. The genuine zeal and holy fire of the young itinerant contributed largely to the promotion of this most gracious work. The year 1854 found him at Brighton, under the direction of the same chairman. The year 1855 marked a very important epoch in Mr. Woolsey's ministry. It was then that he was ordained for special purposes at the London Conference, and sent to the North-West to take charge of the work that had been vacated by the Rev. W. Rundle. The next nine years of his ministry were devoted to the difficult and onerous work of trying to evangelize the Indians of that rigorous climate. The history of the disinterested and indefatigable labors, the self-abnegation and untold hardships necessarily connected with such a charge, has never been written by the pen of man. It is devoutly hoped that a reliable and permanent record of this sainted brother's arduous and unremitting toils for the good of the Indian tribes in that most trying part of the Master's vineyard will not for ever be a desideratum in the annals of Methodism. If it is never found here, it will certainly be found among the archives of the Church of the first-born in heaven. Nothing but the presence of the Divine Master, through the Omnipotent Comforter, could sustain a man in the prime of life in such a climate and among such a people. But our departed brother was sustained and did a glorious work for God and the Church of Jesus Christ. He prayed and worked with unremitting energy, and won for himself the approbation of the Chief Shepherd, the approval of his brethren, and the title of "The Great Praying Chief" from the Indians.

In 1864, he returned to this Province and spent some time in preaching and attending missionary meetings in different parts of the country, pleading with the greatest enthusiasm the cause of Christian missions. He visited England in 1865, when his ardent advocacy of the claims of Christ upon the means of His followers for the aggressive work of the Church, and his fearless proclamation of a pure and simple Gospel, were listened to by thousands, the fruits of which will be gathered in with the harvest of the world.

It was while on this visit to his native country, the place where he first inhaled the breath of the *true life*, that he became acquainted with that most estimable lady, Miss Sarah Wolverson, whom he married on the 2nd day of June, 1866, and who, for the next eighteen years, was destined to share the joys and sorrows of her beloved husband on the missions of the Provinces of Quebec and Ontario, the greater part of the time being on Indian missions.

Brother Woolsey superannuated in 1884, and settled in Toronto, where he remained until his decease. From the time of his superannuation his health gradually declined until mortality was swallowed up of life. His demise took place on the 2nd day of May, 1894, in the seventy-sixth year of his age. His last illness was very brief, apoplexy being the immediate cause of death. His Divine Lord returned and called him, and found him ready to enter into the marriage supper of the Lamb. Thomas Woolsey walked with God fifty-eight years, and then he was not for God had taken him. The end of the perfect and upright man is peace, and death itself to such is simply landing on some peaceful shore. He rests from his labors, and his works do follow him.

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WILSON McDONALD.

Brother McDonald was of Irish parentage, and was born in the township of York, July 19th, 1853. He spent his childhood and received his early education in London, Ont. In childhood he was religiously inclined, and when he arrived at young manhood he was clearly converted in a series of revival services conducted by Rev. R. Boyle, D.D., in Elizabeth Street Church, Barrie. He sought salvation with sorrowing earnestness for some time before he received a clear assurance of his acceptance in Christ. One day he retired to a little grove near his home in order to pray for the clear light of salvation, and, having received the blessing he was seeking for, he returned to the house with his countenance illuminated with such outshining spiritual gladness that his mother afterwards said, "He looked more like an angel than one in the flesh." After his conversion he qualified himself for the teaching profession, and taught one year in the township of Innisfil, Simcoe County, during which time he labored as a local preacher. He was then received on probation for the ministry of the Primitive Methodist Church. During his probation he travelled Aurora, London and Oro circuits. Having completed his probationary term of four years, he was ordained at Aurora in the year 1882. After his ordination he married Miss Lund, of Aurora Circuit, and returned to Oro. On this field he labored very energetically and was successful in the erection of a good brick church and in otherwise strengthening the cause. His next appointment was Magnetawan, where, although he suffered much personal affliction, he was cheered by a large increase in the membership of the church. He afterwards travelled Port Carling, Caledon East, Rosemont, and Oro a second time, where he had just entered upon his third year, when God called him up higher. Brother McDonald was an unselfish, consecrated, zealous follower of Christ! He was a very devoted friend and affectionate husband. He was taken ill in Toronto during the sessions of last Conference, and had to return home before its close. After a few weeks of terrible sufferings, which were borne in a beautiful spirit of Christian resignation, patience and cheerfulness, "he was not, for God took him." As his end approached, he contemplated death without dismay. His character of his disease required that he be kept in perfect quietness, his physician told him that he was not to trouble his mind about anything. He replied, "Doctor, I am thinking of nothing but heaven." During his last hours of consciousness he said to Mrs. McDonald, "I am dying; I shall soon be at home; meet me in heaven, my dear wife." From the midst of a loving and sorrowing people,

"He passed through Glory's morning gate
And walked in Paradise."

GEORGE JACQUES

Was born in Lincolnshire, England, on December 24th, 1829, being the oldest of a family of six, of old Huguenot stock, his grandfather coming from France. When twenty years of age he came to Canada, entered the Wesleyan Methodist ministry, and at once undertook pioneer work in the counties of Bruce, Grey and Huron, travelling on horseback over the unbroken roads and through the forest, enduring hardships which few, if any, of the present generation have any idea of. During the last twelve years he had resided in Calgary, N.W.T., and although superannuated, he preached with great earnestness and acceptability upon every available occasion. He was a powerful advocate of

total abstinence, and fearless in his denunciation of all wrong-doing, yet his kind and loving nature endeared him to young and old.

In 1853, he married Sophia, second daughter of the late Joseph Hinch, of Toronto, who, with six children, survives him. A little more than a year ago, his disease assumed a more serious character, and he was advised by his physicians to return to England, hoping his native climate would prove helpful. He, however, derived no benefit from the change, and sank slowly. Rising about noon on the day of his death, he asked for pen and paper, and wrote the following testimony, with the request that it should be fastened up where he and others could see it:

"SCUNTHORP, Feb. 12th, 1894.

"I hereby state, to the glorious grace of God, that after fifty years in the service of Christ (often imperfect, yet loving it), I am found trusting alone in the merits of Jesus Christ, for whose sake I was justified by faith, and have been living by faith in His death, though imperfectly. I hereby and for fifty years declare, 'Other refuge have I none,' and that shall be all my plea in time and in eternity.

"GEORGE JACQUES."

He passed peacefully away, surrounded by his friends, his last utterance being, "Trusting in Jesus." The funeral service was held in the Wesleyan chapel, built on what had been his father's farm, and he was buried a few yards from where he was born.

STANDING RESOLUTIONS.

On motion of the Secretary of Conference, it was Resolved,—(1) That we reaffirm the principle of standing resolution, page 81, of the Minutes of Conference for 1891, and appoint the President, Secretary and Assistant Secretaries of Conference a committee to arrange and harmonize the disciplinary questions with our present Discipline.

(2) That with a view to facilitate the orderly and rapid despatch of the routine business of the Conference, the District Secretaries shall be a Tabulating and Statistical Committee, whose duty shall be to meet on the Tuesday morning previous to the meeting of Conference, at the call of the President, and

First. Tabulate the District replies to the disciplinary questions :

- (1) Are there any objections to or charges preferred against any of our Ministers and Probationers?
- (2) What Probationers for the Ministry are now received into full connection with the Conference and ordained?
- (3) What Probationers for the Ministry remain on trial?
 - (a) Who are Probationers of three years?
 - (b) Who are Probationers of two years?
 - (c) Who are Probationers of one year?
 - (d) Who are Probationers on the list of reserve?
- (4) What candidates for the ministry are now received on trial?
- (5) Who are the Superannuated Ministers?
- (6) Who are the Supernumerary Ministers?
- (7) Who are now located?
- (8) Who are the Laymen elected by the several Districts to this Conference?
- (9) Who are elected by the District Meetings to the Conference Missionary Committee?
- (10) Who are elected by the District Meetings to the Sabbath School Committee?
- (11) Who are elected by the District Meetings to the Epworth League Committee?
- (12) What representatives have been elected by the District Meetings to the Stationing Committee?
- (13) What Ministers or Probationers for the Ministry have died during the year?

Second. To classify and arrange the memorials and resolutions from the several districts in such manner that when presented to Conference they may be readily and intelligently referred to an appropriate committee or acted upon by the Conference as it may direct.

Third. Having selected a suitable secretary, shall through him be prepared to report to the Conference at the call of the chair. The report to be read from the platform, and in such manner that the pleasure of the Conference may be ascertained on every item presented.

Fourth. That, to facilitate the work, each District Secretary prepare, previous to coming to Conference, separate copies of all memorials and resolutions referred by his District to the Conference.

Fifth. That, for convenience, the Secretary of the Tabulating Committee shall be *ex officio* an Assistant Secretary of the Conference.

Sixth. Prepare and present the Report on Statistics.

Resolved,—That we have listened with peculiar pleasure to the cheering fraternal words of our beloved brother from the "land of the rising sun," Professor Henry Satoh. We reciprocate most cordially his brotherly message, we rejoice in the great work which God has wrought in Japan, and in the part which our missionaries have been honored to bear therein; and we assure Brother Satoh, and through him the Japanese Christians and people generally, that we fervently hope and pray for the hour when Japan shall be fully won to Christ, and become a centre of evangelistic light and power to all the Orient.

Resolved,—That this Conference would place upon record its hearty appreciation of the able and timely address delivered by the General Superintendent, Rev. Dr. Carman, at the opening session. It is hoped that the broad, suggestive and scriptural sentiments, so forcibly and eloquently expressed, may result, as they are eminently calculated to do, in stimulating Methodism to continue her historical vigilance in the maintenance of her doctrinal as well as her spiritual purity, in increasing her philanthropic endeavors, and, in a spirit of true catholicity, prove worthy of an old eulogy, "the friend of all—the enemy of none."

Dr. Dewart to make the *Christian Guardian*, in its weekly visits to the homes of our people throughout the country, with its strong editorials in defence of Bible truth and general church news, cheering and encouraging as it is to many Christian hearts.

Resolved,—That the thanks of the Conference are due and are hereby tendered to the members of the press for the full and impartial reports of the daily proceedings of the Conference.

Resolved,—That the thanks of this Conference be tendered to the families of this city who opened their homes and entertained the members of this Conference during its sessions.

MISCELLANEOUS RESOLUTIONS.

Resolved,—That the connexional collections be taken up during the months specified in last year's Minutes, and that the attention of the Ministers and the various Quarterly Official, and Trustee Boards be called to the importance of having these collections fully announced, their claims strongly urged, and the collections thus taken be given entirely to the respective funds without reduction.

Resolved,—That this Conference expresses its sympathy with the holding of the International Convention of Christian workers in this city next October, and rejoices that an opportunity will be afforded of attending such a large and inspiring convention of Christian workers, which in other places has been a mighty stimulus to spiritual life and all kinds of aggressive Christian work.

We would recommend all our ministers and members interested in such work to attend and profit from the meetings of the convention.

Resolved,—That we have heard with profound sorrow that our venerable but beloved brother, Rev. Resolved,—That this Conference desires to place on record its profound sense of the loss which the Methodist Church, the Protestantism of this Dominion, and the cause of truth and purity throughout the world have sustained in the lamented death of the Rev. George Douglas, LL.D., the eloquent advocate of every good cause, and to convey to Mrs. Douglas and her daughters the assurance of profound sympathy with them in their sore bereavement, and earnest prayer that the grace which sustained the husband and father during long years of severe affliction, and enabled him to triumph in the article of death, may be magnified in the consolation afforded to the wife and children in this the time of their sorrow.

Resolved,—That we have listened with great pleasure and satisfaction to the address of the Rev. Dr. Antliff, in reference to the Wesleyan Theological College, Montreal, and would place on record our appreciation of the solid and grand work done by that institution. We are delighted to learn that it is in a flourishing condition, and that both financially and in the number of students in attendance, was never in a better condition than at the present time. We desire to say that we have the fullest confidence in the intellectual, moral and religious training given in that honored institution, and pledge ourselves to give it our support.

Resolved,—That in view of the protracted affliction of our dear brother, Rev. J. C. Slater, and his consequent inability to mingle with his brethren,

we hereby desire to express our deep sympathy with him in his unusual sufferings, and we pray that the sustaining grace of God, our Father in heaven, may be afforded to him, as in the past, but in still greater proportion in the future.

Moved by Rev. G. Washington, seconded by Rev. Dr. Harper, and

Resolved,—That we desire to express our gratitude to the great Head of the Church for the manifest token of approval resting upon the faithful, zealous and self-denying work of the principal, teachers and Board of Alma College during the year. We regard the financial success of the year as remarkable, and especially desire to notice and commend the generous subscriptions and efforts of the teachers to lessen the liabilities of the institution. In view of the moral and religious aspects of the age as regards education, we are more than ever convinced of the absolute necessity of such institutions with such moral and spiritual safeguards as are found in Alma College; and we trust that our friends will not allow our young people to depend upon, or be drawn down to the institutions of Romanism for their culture or for any part of it, or any institutions that are lacking in those moral and religious influences that we regard as paramount in every case. We desire to assure the Board and the teachers of our continued sympathy and support.

RESOLUTIONS FOR GENERAL CONFERENCE.

Moved by Rev. J. C. Speer, seconded by Rev. J. Morgan, and

Resolved,—That we ask the General Conference to so legislate that it shall be impossible for trustees to block the business of the Trustee Board by persistent absence therefrom, and that when a trustee in bonds refuses to attend trustee meetings, the fixing of a quorum shall be so arranged that the name of such trustee or trustees shall not be counted in fixing the quorum for the holding of meetings.

Moved by Mr. E. Gurney, seconded by Dr. J. B. Willmott, and

Resolved,—That this Conference is of opinion that additional guarantees should be provided against the unfortunate tendency that prevails so largely to strain the law affecting the inception of new, and the enlargement of existing, church enterprises, and recommend that the General Conference be memorialized to provide legislation which will require the co-operation of the Chairman of the District with the Quarterly Board in advance of either the enlargement or rebuilding of an existing church, or the formation of a new church trust, and that a committee be appointed to make inquiry into the circumstances attaching to various churches which are heavily involved in debt, and the facts be forwarded to the General Conference as an illustration of the effects of present methods.

Moved by Rev. W. S. Blackstock, seconded by Rev. Dr. Harper, and

Resolved,—That in the opinion of this Conference, the rules and regulations made from time to time for the government of the Methodist Church and for the guidance of its executive officers in the administration of its affairs, should be expressed in the most exact language and in strictly legal form, and as this cannot be reasonably looked for so long as the legislation of the General Conference continues to take the form

chiefly of the reports of committees, expressed in loose, popular language, this mode of making laws for the Church cannot but be regarded as mischievous and dangerous.

That in view of these facts, we recommend to the General Conference that the reports of the several committees be not adopted as legislation, but that they be made to sustain the relation to the real legislative acts of that venerable body that the initiatory resolutions passed in Parliament sustain to the bills which are founded upon them, and that nothing in these reports be considered as law until they have been put in legal form, and after passing through the several readings through which the Acts of legislative bodies generally pass, and being considered clause by clause in Committee of the Whole, these Acts are finally passed and declared to be the law of the Church.

Moved by Rev. F. Langford, seconded by Prof. Wallace, and
Resolved,—That we petition the General Conference to enact that all changes made in the subjects of examination for the candidates for the ministry, do not come into force until the examinations of 1896.

Moved by Dr. A. D. Watson, seconded by Rev. James Henderson, D.D., and

Resolved,—That this Conference memorialize the General Conference to extend the ministerial term to five years, in cases where it is desired, by a three-fourths vote of a Quarterly Official Board.

CONFERENCE SERVICES.

The Conference Love-feast was held in the Metropolitan Church, at 9 a.m., Sunday, June 17th. Led by Rev. E. B. Harper, D.D., and participated in by ministers and people, it was a season of grace and sweet delight.

At 11 o'clock the Ordination Service was held. The General Superintendent, Rev. Dr. Carman, preached from Romans x. 15, urging the importance of a divine call to the ministry and the obligations involved. The following were ordained ministers: Wesley Dean, F. L. Brown, B.A., A. THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE ADDRESS.

DEARLY BELOVED IN THE LORD,—The mercies of another year lay us under renewed obligation to the Head of the Church, and call for sincerest thank-giving. We praise God who has not withdrawn His favor from us, and who has supplied all our “need according to his riches in glory by Christ Jesus.” The added experience of the year which is closing has increased our confidence that “God is able to make all grace abound towards you, that ye always, having all sufficiency in all things, may abound to every good work.”

We have been gladdened by the evidences which have come to us with delightful frequency, and which many of us have witnessed, that awakening, converting and purifying power still attend the faithful preaching of the Word. The joy of the apostles and of our sainted Methodist fathers is our joy that “our Gospel came not unto you in word only, but also in power and in the Holy Ghost, and in much assurance.”

You will rejoice to learn that, after making up all losses arising from death, removal and other causes, we are able to report an increase of 1,768 in the membership of the Church. For those tokens of divine favor we give thanks to Him who hath called us, and earnestly solicit your prayers that our spirituality and ministerial efficiency may abound more and more. We desire to remember always the words addressed by the Master to His immediate followers, “Without me ye can do nothing.” Next to His immediate presence, and the mighty power of the Holy Ghost, our strength and the success of the work so dear to all our hearts lie in your courtesy, sympathy, confidence and prayers.

The year has been one of great financial depression throughout the world. Our own country, though more highly favored than many others, has not entirely escaped, and many of our beloved people have been sorely embarrassed. With these we have deeply sympathized, and have constantly remembered them in our prayers. The hardships incident to this depression in trade and commerce, have doubtless been more apparent and trying in our cities and large centres of population. This being the case we deem it wise to discourage, to some extent, the disposition to leave the farm, and to exchange the certainties, even the small certainties, of provincial, town and rural life for the many and great uncertainties which must be encountered in all cities.

We are not yet in a position to say whether the financial contributions in aid of the different departments of our work will equal those of last year or not. Should there be any deficiency it will cause regret and embarrassment, but will neither surprise us nor cause us to lose faith in your liberality.

We are glad to learn that during the year a considerable number of

new church edifices have been erected, and debts on those previously built diminished. It is very desirable that places of worship should be sufficiently numerous and commodious to meet the necessities of the increasing numbers who desire to worship with us. At the same time we venture a word of caution against all unnecessary church extension, lest the burdens laid upon our people become greater than they can bear. An unmanageable mortgage is neither useful nor ornamental, and can only aid in defeating the great objects we have in view.

Every connexional fund, for the support of which we make appeal to you, is, in the judgment of the General Conference, important and worthy of general support, but the missionary, educational and superannuation funds are paramount. The missionary spirit has been among the chief glories of our beloved Methodism. The record of sacrifice, labor, endurance on the part of our fathers, and the glorious victories which the Head of the Church gave them on mission fields, must ever remain as an inspiration to their descendants. What the Methodist Church is throughout the world to-day is mainly the result of missionary effort. This spirit must continue to imbue and impel us. No Church can prosper without it. Its extinction would write "Ichabod" on the banners of Methodism. The doctrines we preach, the hymns we sing, and the deathless voices of our ascended Elijahs combine to enforce the Master's mandate. "Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature." We rejoice in the achievements of the past, but still the cry that turned St. Paul's steps towards Macedonia, is borne in on us from many an Indian wigwam on our own continent, and from millions of idolaters beyond the seas. Our brethren in China and Japan are calling for reinforcements. There is no lack of scholarly consecrated young men and young women ready to enter any field; on every side their voices greet us, each one saying, "Here am I, send me," but our Missionary Society cannot send them until more money is placed in the treasury. For the sake of Christ and the perishing, we appeal to you for larger gifts.

The Educational Society continues to prosecute its work with consecrated energy. The educational institutions, under the direct control of the Church and also those under the patronage of the Church, give evidence of continued efficiency, and afford to our young people of both sexes all the advantages of higher education. The increasing number who are seizing these advantages is proof of a laudable ambition and a prophecy of augmented methodistic influence in the social, commercial, political and religious development of this fair province. In carrying forward this work we know we have your sympathy. Large numbers have testified their appreciation by generous gifts. While to such we offer our sincere thanks, we do not forget the thousands whose smaller donations have gone to swell the aggregate. Comparatively few can afford to give large sums, but almost everyone can do something. In view of the importance of this department of our work, on which the higher education of our youth, and especially the efficient equipment of our rising ministry so largely depend, we commend it to your more liberal support.

Concerning the Superannuation Fund, we will only say that it is an integral part of our economy. It is so intimately linked with our itiner-

ant system that they must stand or fall together. We are persuaded that a thorough understanding of its imperative necessity is all that is necessary to warrant for it the generous support of every intelligent member of our Church. We ask you, dear brethren, to see to it that your ministers are not required, out of their own often scanty incomes, to make up the circuit deficiency on this Fund.

It always affords us pleasure to think or speak of our Church literature. The *Christian Guardian* as a church organ and family paper is without an equal in the Dominion, and for its price is perhaps unsurpassed by any religious paper published on this continent. Our Sabbath School publications are so numerous and comprehensive as to render foreign aids unnecessary, except in very special cases. We very earnestly commend to your favorable consideration the various publications issued under the auspices of our own Church. Your hearts and homes will be enriched by their perusal and study.

In the rapid growth of young people's societies, under the auspices of the Church, we recognize one of the most hopeful signs of the times. As aiding in the development of youthful talent, leading to the more thorough and systematic study of the Word of God, and the cultivation of higher literary tastes, we bid them welcome as new regiments in the army of our King. To all such societies we affectionately commend the study of the doctrines, history and economy of Methodism, assured that such a course of reading will promote their spirituality and intensify their loyalty to the Church of their choice.

Permit us to call your attention once more to the conflict which, as a Church and as Christian citizens in conjunction with other Churches and Christian citizens, we are urging against the liquor traffic. Profoundly convinced that this traffic is the most prolific source of pauperism, crime and all forms of debauchery, we appeal to every member and adherent of the Methodist Church to oppose it by voice, vote and personal abstinence.

Believing that the claims of the Christian Sabbath have neither been cancelled nor relaxed, and being fully persuaded that the highest interests of our country and the Church of Christ are promoted by the observance of these claims, as citizens and Christians, we say, "Remember the Sabbath day to keep it holy." The tendency of these times does not lie so much in the performance of unnecessary labor as in devoting the day, in whole or in part, to pleasure. Sedulously guard against injuring your influence for good by pleasure-driving, boating, bicycling or visiting. As far as your strength and opportunities will permit, make it a day of holy labor and personal growth in grace. Such an observance of the Lord's Day shall cause it to continue to you and to your children a memorial, a symbol and a benediction. As a Church we should never forget that our great mission is the spread of Scriptural holiness. To this end there must be personal holiness in heart and life. In the enjoyment of this blessed experience, and its faithful proclamation from pulpit and pew, the continued success of Methodism is assured. Such an experience is the surest safeguard against all those fashionable amusements for which

the heart hungers when spirituality is low. When Christ is enthroned in our affections there is little need to write, "Thou shalt not dance; thou shalt not play at games of chance; thou shalt not patronize the theatre or the horse-race." With sanctified disdain the pure in heart turn from these vanities to pleasures which improve the mind while resting the body, and cultivate Christian sociability without loss of spirituality.

Desiring your advancement in all that will better prepare you for usefulness in this life and triumph in death, "we commend you to God and to the word of his grace, which is able to build you up and give you an inheritance among all them which are sanctified."
