ROSE FROM SLAVERY TO SULTAN'S CHIEF ADVISER

Nadir Pasha Hanged at Dawn from a Bridge in Constantinople—He Was the Chief Instigator of the Mutiny of the Troops on April 13th.

Constantinople, April 29.—Nadir Pasha, the second eunuch of the palace under the regime of Abdul Hamid, was hanged at dawn today from the Bala bridge, the great thoroughfare that connects Stamboul with the quarters of Galata and Pera. The body was allowed to swing until 8 o'clock in the morning and thousands of the people stopped to look at the man whose name was a terror under Abdul Hamid. The dead man's face showed an underhand jaw and thick heavy lips. In life he had been fully six feet four inches tall.

HAS HAZE SURROUNDING STEPPING STONE RAILWAY QUESTION

It is Rumored About the Assembly Corridors This Morning That No Guarantee for the St. John Valley Railway Will be Made or Promised This Season—Contingencies and Accounts Committees Met This Morning to Wind up Their Business

Fredericton, N. B., April 29.—(Special)—The final meetings of the Contingencies and Accounts Committees were held this morning. Both committees met in executive session to prepare their reports for submission to the house later in the day. Last night, while the want of confidence motion was engrossing the attention of the house, the government met another delegation from Woodstock, who had reached the capital earlier in the evening. The delegation has come to get the answer of the government as to the nature of the assistance, the government will grant to the Valley railway company. The bill to incorporate the St. John Valley Railway Company to amend the act incorporating the Aluminum Production Company, and to amend the act incorporating the Canadian Terminal Railway Company were considered in committee of the whole, and agreed to with amendments.

CHICAGO HAS LIGHTNING; NEW YORK HAS COOL WAVE

Unseasonable Weather Conditions in Big American Cities—Terrific Electric Storm and Tornado Does Much Damage—Elevator Burned and Fireman Killed

Chicago, April 29.—One fireman was killed, another is missing, and eight were seriously injured in a fire which destroyed elevator B of the Illinois Central Railroad, here, early today. The conflagration which was discovered in the height of a violent electric storm, completely consumed the elevator and its contents. The loss is estimated at \$1,000,000. The blaze, fanned by a gale which swept in from the Lake, spread to the Illinois Central Dock, to train sheds and freight cars, and it was with great difficulty that the firemen checked the fire from a general spread over the lake front yards of the railroad company. The structure, its bins choked with wheat, corn, oats and rye, was a mass of flames by the time the first company reached the scene. Though a heavy rain was falling, the building burned like a tinderbox and firemen of truck 3 were caught under a falling wall, which burst out without warning. Lieut. Patrick McElligott, was killed beneath the debris, and instantly killed. The fire is believed to have been caused by lightning. For hours the electric storm which burst over the city shortly past midnight, created havoc in several sections of the city, and in the suburbs. A tornado was reported as falling over a portion of the city, and it was just after a bombardment of lightning that the elevator was discovered on fire. The sky for miles around was illuminated, and huge burning embers spread over the city driven by high wind. Many times freight sheds of the Illinois Central and Wisconsin Central were on fire, and to save them from destruction necessitated a heroic and stubborn battle on the part of the firemen.

SERIOUS FIRE IN C. S. EVERETT'S STORE

A fire in the furniture store of Charles S. Everett, Charlotte street, about midday did about \$2,000 damage before it was subdued. The fire broke out at 1:20 o'clock and for a time it looked as if it would develop into a serious conflagration, as dense volumes of smoke poured from the windows and doors of the building, but prompt work by the firemen soon brought the flames under control and by 2 o'clock it was reported "all out."

Northampton, Mass., April 29.—Enraged because she had broken her engagement with him and refused to renew it, Porter Smith, who was graduated from Dartmouth College last year, today shot and fatally wounded Miss Helen Ayer Marden, a senior at Smith College, and then, turning the revolver on himself, committed suicide. Miss Marden was taken to the Dickinson Hospital, where the physicians stated that there was no hope for her recovery.

JUDGMENT IN AN IMPORTANT PROBATE COURT CASE TODAY

In the probate court today in the estate of James Murphy, victualer, being obtained by the executor might recover the rents and profits of the real estate accruing from the death of the deceased. Perhaps, on the whole, the finest place to get absolutely lost in the interior of South America, where 200,000 square miles or so are still waiting for the first white man's foot to intrude on any of them. Most of this lies around the watershed of the Upper Amazon and its tributaries. Many of the names applied to mountains here are efforts of imagination. Only a small number have really been reached or surveyed.

Occasionally of the whole region is impenetrable forest, it is not a place to take casual strolls in, and more than a dozen expeditions have either failed, been lost completely or wiped out by accidents of travel in the last forty years.

The primary aim of the most recent expeditions are fever of a very malignant sort, armies of ants that can decimate a baggage train and even devour the men and animals. The latter commodity cannot be equalled anywhere else—there is no place on the globe where deadly snakes swarm to such an extent, and hardly any of them permit the least hope of life after a bite. The fer-de-lance, water moccasin, and a dozen others are particularly plentiful, and, by way of variety, the anaconda, which is the largest snake in the world, and one of the most terrifying of the world, is abundant in the forests. Even the natives—many of whom are of the most primitive type of the way about, but all places are alike to them. They have been known to bring gold dust down from places which they cannot, or do not want to, describe.

It is curious to think that in the Himalayas themselves, the anaconda, which is a district across the border that is still unexplored, though as large as any of the world's snakes, and nothing is known of the hill tribes that inhabit it except by rumor.

According to native accounts it is a country of snuffragettes, for the hill women rule entirely, and each lady with her proper dignities has at least one or five husbands, who do all the house and farm work and have no voice in affairs. This is not unknown among Himpayan hill men, but no regular tribe has yet been found that makes a regular trade of it. It should be a good country to keep away from, but Dr. Longstaff, a well known explorer, does not think so, for he is moving in that direction.

THE DEVIL TREE OF OLD MEXICO

It is the Most Fearsome Plant of the Vegetable Kingdom and Devours Birds and Animals Like a Wild Beast

Wonderful indeed are the things of nature which scientific research and exploration are bringing to light. One of the most wonderful, and undoubtedly the most terrible of all the things which have been discovered, at least so far as the vegetable kingdom is concerned, is a tree which is commonly known among botanists as the "devil tree."

Strange though it may seem, this tree devours living creatures, such as birds, small wild animals and in a few instances, it reports of explorers who have seen the tree, but have not been able to get near it. From these reports it is known that the tree is a few inches in diameter, and is shaped like a huge pineapple, is about 12 feet in circumference at its base. The leaves, which are from 15 to 18 inches wide and nearly 20 inches thick, are of a dark greenish color and hang from the top of the tree, their tips touching the ground, giving the whole tree the appearance of a closed umbrella.

Just above the portion of the trunk where the leaves shoot out are two round disks growing one over the other. From these disks a sweet juice is constantly exuding. It is this juice that lures the victims to the tree. One drop is said to be sufficient to cause immediate intoxication.

Around these plates, or disks, are set long green tendrils, resembling the arms of a giant, and which are always as they are unless disturbed by the touch of a foreign body, when they cling to the victim. They are very sticky, and when a bird or animal comes in contact with them, it is instantly held fast. The bird or animal is then drawn up to the top of the tree, where it is crushed and devoured. The juice of the tree is also used by the natives as a powerful narcotic.

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WE REBATE THE LOCAL HOUSE WESTERDAY

Hon. Mr. Hazen Promises to Announce Government's Policy on St. John Valley Road Before Prorogation - Mr. Burchell Threatens to Line Up in Opposition to Government - Mr. Murray Applies the Whitewash Brush and Copp's Resolution is Defeated

Fredericton, N. B., April 28.—Hon. Mr. Hazen made the important announcement in the house today, in answer to an inquiry by Mr. Robinson, that the policy of the government regarding the aid to be given the St. John Valley Railway would be announced before prorogation.

This statement was made while the bill incorporating this railway was passing through the committee. There is much speculation around the house as to what the government contemplates doing in this important matter. They are being urged very strongly to guarantee the bonds of the company to the extent of \$25,000 mile for the whole length of the railway.

On the other hand there are influences at work to prevent any guarantee being made at the present session. To put it plainly the government is between two fires. If they do not meet the wishes of the river countries they will lose support in the country, and if they do they will alienate a powerful opposition.

Mr. Hazen promised to announce the government's policy on the St. John Valley Road before prorogation. Mr. Burchell threatened to line up in opposition to the government. Mr. Murray applied the whitewash brush, and Copp's resolution was defeated.

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BUILDING AIRSHIPS TO SELL TO DOMINION GOVERNMENT

J. A. D. McCurdy Who Spent the Winter with the Silver Dart at Baddeck Expects to Build Aerodromes to Sell to Canada

(Toronto News). "If any one spoke of a flying machine a few years ago it was thought he was a little wrong in his head."

Mr. McCurdy, who is now visiting in the Alpha Kappa fraternity, and Mr. McCurdy should know of what he is speaking, for all winter he has been making aerodromes.

Mr. McCurdy is a graduate of the School of Practical Science with the class of '07, joined the experimental Society almost immediately after leaving the school.

Mr. McCurdy's aerodrome is a simple machine known as a glider, was made in the middle of the winter, and it was on one occasion that the party would give the machine a push off from the top of a hill, and it would rise to the bottom, carrying the man safely with it.

Seeing how well this simple device worked, one of the members of the party conceived the idea of placing the machine in such a framework, that was tried, and although some difficulties were encountered, it was at last seen that the idea was feasible.

The way the idea of this machine was conceived is simple and the actual flight, but it has been found possible to have the machine start from a standing position, and for this reason it is mounted on three wheels, the front one of which acts as the steering apparatus when the machine is upon the ground, being so adjusted as to move when the rudder is turned.

Mr. McCurdy explained, he meant the wind was not noticeable to the man in the machine, yet it has an effect. "If, for instance, there is a strong wind blowing, and the aerodrome is making forty miles an hour going into the wind, it will make ten miles an hour, and if it is with the wind it will go much faster than ordinarily."

The wind, Mr. McCurdy stated, is not an insurmountable difficulty, yet it makes a landing, for it is necessary that the machine alight, either running exactly with the wind or running against it.

Mr. McCurdy said he had a number of aerodromes made, and he was looking for a suitable engine. "Where do you expect to sell such machines?" Mr. McCurdy was asked.

"To the government," he replied. "All the governments are recognizing the need of these machines to aid their military forces, and Canada is sure to use the machines for this purpose."

"By the way," said Mr. McCurdy, "some reports have been made of a man who has been flying over the ocean, and it is very probable that he is using an aerodrome. Some people refer to them as an aeroplane, but the other term is more correct, and the word 'aerodrome' is continually speaking of going out 'droming.'"

When he came into office he found that the whole appropriation for public works department for that year was already spent and he was face to face with the necessity of carrying on the service of that department as best he could until the end of the year.

He believed that if all expenditures contracted by the government previous to Oct. 31 last were known to be a deficit of many thousands.

Mr. Robinson obtained leave of absence until Friday for Mr. McKewen, and Mr. Currie for Mr. LaBilios.

ther all the meat, and practically all the vegetables--on a somewhat liberal scale used by the brother were got from deceased's shop, and no account thereof kept or payment made. The value of the supplies is now placed at \$3 a week, which is ordered to be deducted from the claim of \$808, reducing the claim to \$216.50.

6. The claim of Teresa Elizabeth Murphy, a sister-in-law for \$80.18.

This arose out of nursing in the last illness of the deceased at the time being in inmate of his brother's house. It was contended that it should be treated as a preferred claim under the "Wages Act." The claim was allowed in full, but not as a preferred claim, there being no contract and the claimant not being in deceased's employ.

7. The claim of John Murphy, the brother for \$60.

This is a claim for nursing and lost time in last illness, the deceased at the time being in inmate of his brother's house. The brother is employed in the I. C. R. He lost a few days time, but his position was not in anyway imperilled thereby. He did some nursing. The court thought this was only what might be expected of a brother, and accordingly disallowed the claim.

8. The claim of Frank Spittel, Jr., for \$82.10.

This was for work and material and money lent, and was allowed in full. The balance available for distribution was settled, and the same ordered to be paid, as a first and final dividend to the creditors.

**IN CITY COURT**

**Judgement in Case of Coughlan vs Flood & Bates--Jas. Brennan Sues for Board Bill**

In the city court this morning judgment was rendered in the case of Coughlan against Flood & Bates and the King for the defendant and \$17.54 was granted to the defendants in their set-off. Flood & Bates sub-let a plumbing contract in the military stores building to the plaintiff for \$800 on the ground that the specifications had not been adhered to with respect to the installation of six hose connections whilst he installed only two, the contractors withheld \$84.17 of the contract price and he instituted civil proceedings to recover \$80, above which it was impossible to sue in the city court. The plaintiff's contention was that the specifications should have mentioned that hose connections were to be effected with the two stand-pipes on each of the three floors of the structure. The defendants claimed that the contract was incomplete as the specifications called for two stand-pipes on each floor with hose connections. The plaintiff installed the pipes but placed two hose racks on the ground floor. The defendants claimed that the contractors should have been referred to Chief Architect Ewart for adjustment. Mr. Ewart said it was imperative that the four remaining hose racks be installed and the public works department would pay \$100 of the contractor's original price until they fulfilled the requirements. In complying they expended \$101.20.

In announcing the verdict the court said it was doubtful if the defendants would have won the action if the chief architect's strong statements had not been taken into consideration. The architect said the installation of two connections was entirely inadequate and in the event of fire the stand-pipes would be valueless without the hose connections on the upper floors. From the evidence it was also gleaned that in removing one connection from one of the two pipes on the lower floor and replacing it the plaintiff must have considered it necessary to connect with at least one pipe on one of the upper floors. The conclusion was therefore reached that four additional racks were necessary and as the plaintiff waived the right to enter the case in the county court by dropping \$4.17, that amount was deducted from \$21.70, the difference between \$80 the plaintiff's claim and \$101.70 the set-off filed by the contractors, and the defendants were allowed \$17.54 with the judgment. Full costs and fee was allowed. The plaintiffs will appeal from the decision.

James Brennan sued an Englishman named Bearwood for \$14 alleged to be due for board. Brennan in his testimony said Bearwood became one of his boarders on October 28 last. When he departed in February he was \$19 in arrears. He paid \$5 shortly afterwards. Bearwood, who is in custody, in his evidence, asserted that November 10 was the date of his debut at Brennan's hostelry. When he separated from Brennan in February the plaintiff struck him over the eye with a club and threatened to "brain" him if he ever returned. In the melee he lost his hat, which Brennan retained. Since the estrangement, he claimed that Brennan has harassed him and prevented him from obtaining his former board if one "Spud" Murphy did not become responsible for any indebtedness. Brennan was ordered adjournment until 2 o'clock. Brennan said he had brought his books to court to substantiate his contention, but was unable to produce them.

**TREATED THE LADIES WITH DISCOURTESY**

St. John, N. B., April 29 '09.

To the Editor of the Evening Times,

Dear Sir--As a member of the delegation of ladies, who went to Fredericton in connection with the Women's Suffrage Bill just disposed of in the provincial legislature, permit me to thank you for your editorial of last night, in which you so well sum up the treatment by the majority of the legislature of the women of New Brunswick. As you will say: "The women of the province have been mocked and belittled by twenty-four members of the legislature. Had you yourself been present, sir, at most of the interviews between the delegates and these members, as well as at the debate on the bill, you could not better have characterized that treatment than in the above terms. I think you would have used stronger language if you could have been made aware of all the questionable facetiousness that was indulged in by numbers of these legislators, whose chief aim seemed to be to heap ridicule upon those ladies, who had gone up to the capital to present their claim in the matter of certain franchise rights."

Now, waiving entirely the question of the merits of our aim, I would like to ask you, sir, if ever a distinguished class, in making an appeal to the legislative body by whose laws it is obliged to be governed, though having no legal political rights, has not the right to something better than a questionably facetious consideration of their appeal. I refrain from giving examples and quoting expressions in corroboration of what I have said, though I could well do so. Perhaps you, sir, could explain to me the attitude of the masculine mind which at this late date can find it so droll that a woman should vote. To work and strike and do some good with it, and think we could do more good with it if we had the ballot, has not the foundation of all efforts, and when we go to the only source whence it can be obtained, namely the legislature, we are laughed at and kicked about, and an Honorable member moved an indefinite postponement of our bill, and the rest of the twenty-four members gave resounding emphasis to the applause which the motion excites, and when the vote against the bill is finally taken, the speaker of the house with a smile of satisfaction, passes it over to the oblivion of the waste-paper basket!

Now, sir, as you say I was to see this passage into oblivion, my disappointment on that score was overshadowed by the feeling of regret that the legislative body chosen to represent the interests of this province should be composed of men who have so slight an opinion of the intelligence of women.
