

FOR AERIAL FLEET

One at Every Frontier and Coast Fortress First Race - Experimenting With Shells.

LONDON, April 9—Germany's plan for an aerial fleet includes, according to the Berlin correspondent of the Daily Mail, the construction of enough Zeppelin, Gross and Parseval airships to enable the stationing of at least one at every frontier and coast fortress, in addition to those built for service with the field armies. The Ministry of War is experimenting with the view to using aerial cruisers for offensive purposes, and is testing different types of shells to be dropped from airships. 



BODY OF YOUNG MAN

Believed to Have Been Victim of Russian Revolution-

ary Society.

FOUND IN A TRUNK

Story of a Supper - Victim Poisoned b Prussic Acid, is the Opinion of an Expert.

ROME, April 10—The discovery of the body of a young Russian in a trunk left in a garret of the Via Frattina has created the deepest excitement. The body lay undiscovered from February 28 until this week.

It is considered certain that it is a case of vengeance by Russian revolutionaries on a traitor or a spy, but the suggestion that the corpse is that of Azeff, the notorious "revolutionary" agent of the Russian secret police, is discredited, since the body is that of a young man, while Azeff is middle aged.

NAMED ROMANOFF.

Later details show that the lodger's name was Romanoff. On February 24 he called at the boarding house in the Via Fraitina which is almost exclusively frequented by Germans. On the morning of February 26 he sent for a trunk. Toward noon on the same day he was visited by two friends. On the evening of the following day he ordered a supper, consisting of ham, cheese and wine. At 8 o'clock he returned with a friend. The latter left shortly afterward to fetch another young man.

At 9 o'clock Romanoff again went out with another young man, some 30 years of age, dark haired and with a black moustache. The landlady declares that she did not notice that three arrived and only two left. On deaving, Romanoff gave up the key of his room, saying that he was going to spend a few days with his friend at Fiumicino.



Organized Attempt Being Made to Bring in More Celestials

From Canadian Points--Big Price is Paid to Men Who Bring in Chinamen

The man who successfully smuggles a Celestial into the United States receives anywhere from \$100 to \$600 for the job, according to the desire of the Oriental to enter this country. While the risks are great, it can be seen that the long price offers a bait which many men are willing to take.

It is rare that the smuggled Chinaman pays the price for his safe larding in this country, because few of them have the money to do so. However, there are Chinese companies who put up the necessary funds to get their put up the necessary funds to get their countrymen into the United States and then after the Celestial is safely established in busines, he repays to the company as he is able, the amount it costs to get him in, plus a high rate of interest

interest.

Once in one of the large cities of this country, it is comparatively easy for a Chinaman to live undetected, although he has to keep a close look-out for Chinese inspectors. Every Chinaman who lawfully enters this country has papers which entitle him to esidemce in this country. If he does not possess them he is liable to deportation.


