## LOOKS LIKE BIG **RAILWAY STRIKE** TOMORROW P.M.

Montreal, July 14.—An emergency meeting of the Canadian Rail-way War Board came to an end this afternoon in the despatch of a letter to the representatives of the railway federated trades stating that the board would not raise its offer of the McAdoo award, rejected by the men's representatives on Friday last. This is taken to mean that unless either side recedes from its position the men will walk out Tuesday. It is unofficially understood that the board bases its position chiefly upon the alleged fact that the employes threatening to strike, though constituting the entire class in Canada, are only ten per cent. of their international union, the other ninety per cent. being Americans who, it is said, are accepting what the Canadians are rejecting. According to the board the granting of the, men's demands would further mean proportionately high increases to all ranks in railway employ, and would involve "either bankruptcy for every road in Canada, including the C. P. R., or the imposition of freight rates so high that Canadian industry would be absolutely barred from any share in export business and domestic costs of living and manufacture would reach runious heights."

Montreal, July 13—Two accidents in Montreal munitions plants this morning were responsible for heavy loss of life, a dozen workmen losing their lives in the two.

At the shell plant of Lymburner, Limited, St. Paul street, the cave-in of a foor of the building under the weight of shells killed eight people. At the plant to the Metal and Munitions Products Company, Montreal & East, five workmen were electrocuted when a live wire fell upon them.

Lymburner Limited are minition manufacturers and the floor which collapsed was stored with empty shells.

The identified dead are: George Lymburner, nephew of the head of the firm, and Jos. Portugal.

The killed for the most part consist of moulders. When the upper floor gave way its tremendous weight of shells crashed through the floors underneath and fell three storeys to the cellar. The eight men killed were tangled up in the debris. Burst pipes filled up the cellar with water, drowning any who may have lived through the fall.

When the roll of employes of the plant were called after the accident seventeen were reported missing. It




