The Reciprocity Treaty.
A despatch from Washington says that the Senate went into Executive session Friday afternoon, "when it was understood that a proposition was made to remove the injunction of secrecy on the project for a Reciprocity Treaty, that the people may learn its provisions before the meeting of the Senate in December next. The advocates of the treaty, however, oppose the publication and would like to see the project introduced at once and the treaty published by the Senate at a called session. It is hardly probable that this can be done. We should suppose that the administration would not attempt to force its treaty through the Senate, but rather favorably it may be desired by the people and the press. A Washington special to the N. Y. Journal of Commerce says:

The death of Senator Cameron's wife has called him away undoubtedly for the session, and this makes an agreement regarding the proposed treaty, which is almost impossible till December. The treaty proposed is substantially, and without any important alterations, the one indicated in your special from here. Mr. Cameron, in consequence of the agreement, will probably receive the completion of a delay of the treaty till next winter. He is expected to be chairman of the Committee on Foreign Relations, and it is proposed to accord this courtesy to Mr. Cameron under the existing circumstances.

The Journal of Commerce devotes a leading article to our objections to the canal stipulation in the treaty, arguing that Chicago and Montreal, and New York will be the greatest beneficiaries of the project. The article is a well-written, and of fair value as a set-off for the benefit of New York against the enlargement of the St. Lawrence canal, which is a heavy expenditure which neither the State of New York nor Congress is likely to consider profitable to make. The expenditure alluded to in the article is a scheme to construct a ship canal between the head waters of the Hudson and Lake Champlain. The Journal is strongly in favor of the project.

Testing Church Property.
There is a rapidly growing feeling, as taxes and religious corporations grow rich, in favor of the taxation of church property. Even in Catholic countries, where, according to the false political teaching among us, the priests are all powerful, the tax on church property is being levied with hungry eyes by the Government as soon as they grow wealthy, and houses and lands are confiscated for public purposes. In English speaking countries taxation, not confined to the clergy, but extending to all religious societies have been levied in favor of the proposition. In the District of Columbia, where the Church property is about one-fifth of the assessed valuation, much excitement has been occasioned by the proposed measure for the government of the District only providing for the exemption from taxation of property occupied by schools and for charitable purposes. The chief opposition comes from the Catholics.

Masonic Dedication.
There have been many unpublicized protests against the dedication of a building by Masonic ceremonies—protests from persons in no way opposed to Masonry in itself. Now the sentiment is given voice by the promoters of the new anti-secret society movement in the States, as will be seen by the following petition, signed by 20,000 persons from sixteen States, that has been sent to President Grant:

The undersigned citizens of the United States learning through the press that the Government is about to lay the cornerstone of the new Government building in Chicago, and that the ceremony on the 24th of June next—St. John's day, so called—respectfully request that under no circumstances should the Government, or order be entitled to official preference or precedence over any other order, sect or society, and that they therefore earnestly protest that the order to which it is thus proposed to designate a work of national interest should not be allowed such recognition either through its participation in the ceremonies, which are offensive to the great body of the American people.

Bald-headed Popularity.
The Malawaska French must be a truly Christian race, with divinely inspired manners, or else they look lightly on the sin of voting for the Common Schools Act, as they have re-elected Mr. LeVite Theriault by an overwhelming majority, notwithstanding that he has been denounced as a traitor to his religion and his race. LeVite told the people that he did wrong by voting with the Government, but that he sincerely repented and was willing to be forgiven. The people generously took the penitent legislator to their hearts again, and sent him back to the Assembly. What can be the secret of Mr. Theriault's great popularity? It is not his oratorical powers, because he has none. Perhaps the Malawaska people have great reverence for a bald head, and Mr. Theriault is the only man up there with a useful one. Should this idea take root among legislative candidates there would soon be a horde of tourists imagine that a scalping cruise had been made by neighboring Indians.

After Mr. Wilnot moved out of Government House, and before Mr. Tilley took possession, it was given up to work men for necessary repairs, being open in the day for the men to go in and out. At night it was locked and a watchman was left in charge. During this time a quantity of table linen disappeared, and there was absolutely no clue to the culprit. Not wishing to accuse parties who might be innocent, and thinking that silence would promote the ends of justice, the robbery was kept quiet with the hope that something would turn up to indicate the guilty party. Publicity is best.

What does one able and Honorable friend of the News mean by saying that the hardest political campaign ever fought in New Brunswick is drawing to a close? There has been no fight at all. What does he mean by saying that "Sumbury and Victoria have yet to fight their battle at the polls?" There is no fight in either County, except between friends of the Common Schools Act for the vacant seats in the Assembly.

Improvements to Centenary Church.
A meeting of the congregation of this church was held last evening, and the vestrymen submitted plans of the proposed alterations and improvements of their church. These plans have been prepared with a great deal of care by Mr. D. B. Durham, with a view to the best ventilation and comfort, and at the same time on an economical scale as possible. The plans provide for remodeling of the basement, putting in heating apparatus, and forming Sunday-school and class rooms. The principal floor of the church will be remodelled and entered by ascending a few steps from Princess street, through a portico to be built in front, which, continued to the roof, will form the base of the new tower. The entrance will be from each side of this portico on a level with the principal floor. Instead of those fearfully and wonderfully made stairs by which the gallery is now reached there will be a handsome and convenient stairway easy of ascent and opening directly into the gallery. This part of the building will be re-sealed and otherwise improved, and the other end of the church an addition is proposed which will contain the organ and seats for the choir, with the pulpit immediately in front. At this end it is also proposed to have a door leading into the gallery so that in case of any alarm of fire the entire building can be quickly cleared. Such a very brief outline of the plans prepared for the Centenary is submitted last evening. Those who examined expressed themselves very much pleased with the various ideas suggested. The matter was left in the hands of a Finance Committee who will do all that the congregation is willing to do in the way of raising the necessary funds. If sufficient money is forthcoming the work will be at once proceeded with, and the Centenary congregation will be able to boast of a Church equal in beauty and convenience to any in the city. The plans should be examined by every one interested. There will, no doubt, in such a liberal congregation as that of the Centenary, be no trouble in raising the required funds.
