BRIAND TELLS DIFFERENT STORY

Says He Did Not Beat Foreigner Only Struck Him One Blow.

Briand the Douglastown, P. Q. resident who was shot four times by a foreigner, a storekeeper at Douglastown, was discharged from the Hotel Dieu hospital Tuesday and to a Graphic reporter related the particulars of what led up to the shooting as published in the Graphic last week.

Briand said that he went into the store to buy a heavy mackinaw coat. He looked at one and asked the price and was told \$18.75. He said he would not pay that price, that the storekeeper was robbing the poor fishermen by asking such a price.

The storekeeper took offence at being called a robber, and ordered Briand out and he said he would go. The foreigner followed him towards the door and Briand fearing an attack wheeled around and gave him a back-handed blow in the face, knocking him sitting down on the floor. He did not offer to hit or kick him, but started towards the door when he heard a shot, quickly followed by four others. The first two hit him in the right and left shoulders, the next hit him on the side of the head, while just as he was running out the door the fourth hit him on the arm breaking it. When the fifth shot came he was well outside.

The man who did the shooting has been arrested and awaits trial.

DIVIDE PROVINCE INTO AREAS

Chief Inspector Wilson Suggests Appointments of Assistant Chiefs.

In order to do away with a great deal of overlapping in the administration of the prohibition act in the province and to make the act more easily and more satisfactorily carried out, Rev. W. D. Wilson, chief inspector, has suggested to the provincial government that the province be divided into sub-districts, each under an assistant chief inspector who would be directly responsible to the chief inspector. Each of these assistants would look after the various inspectors in his own district, allowing to each the area in which he would function and generally supervising the work.

At the present time all the inspectors, even in the most outlying and inaccessible districts, are directly responsible to the chief and he is called upon at times to visit these places when necessity demands. The new plan suggested is intended to have the assistants carry out this work, except where the presence of the chief inspector is desirable.

MILK SCARCE IN CAMPBELLTON

Children Actually Suffering for Want of This Necessary Food.

Whether the unusual dry spell has anything to do with this matter, there is certainly a great shortage of milk in Campbellton at the present time. Something should be done to relieve the situation. It does not seem right that the well-to-do can buy all the cream they want, that ice cream is being sold in abundance, but citizens, particularly young children cannot get a sufficient supply of milk even though they are willing to pay the price, 14 cents per quart for same.

We do not know what steps are necessary to correct this matter, but something should be done at once.

MUST PAY FOR SINKING

INTERNED FLEET.

According to a Paris despatch, the Supreme Council has decided to force Germany to sign a protocol guaranteeing she will carry out the terms of the armistice. This will be attached to the original treaty as soon as it can be executed. The council also asked inter-Allied naval experts to prepare a plan by which Germany shall reimburse the Allies for sinking the interned German fleet at Scapa Flow.

DISOBEYED HIS INSTRUCTIONS

Did Not Run at Full Speed As Ordered by Admiralty Board.

London, Nov. 4.—A parliamentary paper made public to-day, containing secret evidence in the inquiry into the sinking of the Cunard liner Lusitania, shows that Captain W. T. Turner, of the Lusitania, admitted that he disobeyed the instructions of the Admiralty in steaming only at the rate of 18 knots an hour.

The captain testified, however, that had he gone faster the Lusitania would have reached the bar at Liverpool before the vessel could cross it, owing to tidal conditions.

Captain Turner also testified that he had not steered a zig-zag course at full speed as the Admiralty had ordered because he thought this order applied only when a submarine had been sighted.

It was contended by Captain Turner that, although he had been warned by the Admiralty to avoid the Scilly Islands, he was justified in coming within ten miles of Old Head of Kinsale, near where the Lusitania was torpedoed, in order to find this position. If he had remained longer out of sight of land, he declared, the weather might have become foggy, and he would have been unable to off.

Captain Turner claimed that the course he steered was far enough from land, if he was not exactly in mid-channel. He was trying his best, he said, to follow the Admiralty's instructions, but his aim was to find land. Had he run into a fog without doing this, he asserted, he might have run ashore.

THE PRINCE AT MONTREAL CITY

Speakes to Large Gathering of Prominent Citizens—Toast by Hon. Chas. Marcell.

The Prince of Wales spent the week beginning 27th October in the City of Montreal where he was the leading figure in many large gatherings of a military and social nature. Among the latter the luncheon tendered at Place Viger Hotel by the City of Montreal was one of the most striking and successful in the history of the city.

Mayor Martin presided at the luncheon, and on his right sat the Prince of Wales, while on the left of the Prince sat the Right Rev. Bishop Paré, then the Hon. C. J. Doherty, Minister of Justice; Lord Atholstan, Sir Alexandre Lacoste, Senator J. P. E. Casgrain, and the Hon. G. G. Foster.

After the toast of His Majesty the King had been honored with the National Anthem, the Mayor made a brief introductory speech. He said: "Your Royal Highness, I am rejoicing in having you for my guest. Last September you honored us with a short visit to our city, a visit which undoubtedly allowed us to meet more intimately the visit which you are paying us to-day."

"We are profoundly grateful to Your Royal Highness for the opportunity which you have given us to become closely acquainted with the heir to the British throne, so illustrious through your noble ancestors."

"I beg the Honorable Mr. Charles Marcell, municipal commissioner, to propose the health of our Royal visitor."

Health of Prince is Proposed. The Hon. Charles Marcell, P.C., M.B. for Bonaventure County, member of the Administrative Commission, in proposing the toast of His Royal Highness said:

"May it please Your Royal Highness: I have conferred upon me in asking me to offer a toast to Your Royal Highness in this auspicious occasion. I do so with all the more pleasure that I am convinced that in no place in Canada has Your Royal Highness met with more loyal and enthusiastic welcome than here, in this great city, on the occasion of your first and second visit. Numerous as have been the salutes made upon your time, you have gratified us with a second visit which we greatly appreciate. You have done so to become better acquainted with the people of this Metropolitan City and all that it stands for in the life of Canada."

"Your visit to Canada, as it emerges from the world struggle for democratic rule, has enabled you to see this country in its reconstructive period. The spirit which animates all our people now is the same which stimulated the energies, devotion and sacrifice of the men and women of Canada whom you have had many opportunities of seeing at work beyond the seas doing their share to achieve the great victory which came to Canada and the Allies. The memory of your visit will remain graven in the annals of this city as are those of your grandfather and father."


"We have honored in you the personification of all that is noble and inspiring. We pray Divine Providence to vouchsafe to you a long and happy life to enable you to carry out to its full fruition the great mission entrusted to you."

"Mr. Mayor and gentlemen, I now invite you to fill your glasses and drink 'the toast' of His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales. The Prince's Address. His Royal Highness expressed his thanks for the luncheon at which he had been entertained and for the cordial way in which his health had been drunk."

"I should like to say, Mr. Mayor, that I was particularly touched by one passage in the address with which you welcomed me to Montreal yesterday—I mean the passage in which you referred to the mutual understanding between the English-speaking and the French-speaking sections of the Canadian nation as a matter which I had very much at heart. You described very truly my feelings in that respect. I had it much at heart when I landed and I have it now, even more so. At heart now that I have traversed Canada from coast to coast, the union of the two races in Canada was never a matter of mere political convenience. On the contrary, it was, and will always remain, of the highest political wisdom, for which the empire owes an inestimable debt to Cartier, Macdonald and the other statesmen of both races who brought it about."

"Much has been written and said about the success of the British Empire in establishing political union between peoples of different race, language and history. But when you come to think of it, the political union established in Canada and South Africa, were only later examples of the political union between England and Scotland which brought Great Britain itself into existence as a political union two centuries ago. Till that time England and Scotland had been constantly and bitterly at war; since that time they have grown so close that we have all forgotten they were ever separate peoples."

The union of England and Scotland has been in existence for two centuries; the union of British and French Canada has been in existence for little more than half a century—but who can doubt that the union in Canada will produce as great, as powerful, and as united a nation as the British nation itself? No one can read Canadian history—much less can anyone travel in Canada as I have done in the last three months—without realizing that the spirit and genius of both races is closely interwoven throughout the great Dominion, not only in the East but in the West, where both races share in honors of the early explorers and pioneers."

"That which is the secret of British policy in this respect? I can say that the secret in Canada is just the same as in Great Britain. It lies in freedom of speech, freedom of language, and mutual respect. Montreal, gentlemen, have many claims to admiration as the largest centre of business and population in Canada. I am deeply impressed by all I have seen here, and I have been touched to the heart by the wonderful welcome Montreal has given me. But what I valued most in that welcome is that it has been given with equal warmth by citizens of both the great races which are united in Montreal. Your city has the great distinction of being in this respect typical of the union of races in the Dominion as a whole. I therefore value its welcome in a very special sense, and I thank all its citizens, British and French, rich and poor, young and old, from the bottom of my heart."

He concluded by repeating in the French language the closing sentences of his address.

HUNT KANGAROO WITH AUTOMOBILE

Australian Ranchers Can Now Protect their Crops With Ease.

Three sturdy automobiles, each bearing several men armed with heavy rifles, sped through the Australian landscape. They came from Adelaide, South Australia, and headed northward toward the heart of the plain which extends in unbroken dreariness for hundreds of miles in that direction. The lookout in the leading car scans the horizon with a field glass.

"There they are!" he calls out, pointing to a slight rise. The heads of a few kangaroos are plainly visible above the salt brush, which grows beyond Barra Barra, the jumping-off place of civilization.

The whirr of the engines must reach the animals' sensitive ears; for they take to flight with tremendous bounds. At a distance 300 yards they stop.

The automobiles continue in their wild rush over the rough ground, and now the hunters let their rifles speak. One of the animals is wounded. The remainder of the herd, keeping well together, leap away in one direction, while the wounded animal hops with terrific speed in the opposite direction.

The nearest car takes up the pursuit, and for three miles continues in its course, parallel to that taken by the wounded kangaroo. The brush becomes thinner and the hunters head their car in a straight line for the animal, which shifts its course to an angle that brings it directly across the path of the oncoming car. A well aimed shot ends the flight.

Now back to the pursuit of the rest of the herd. After a drive of a few miles the animals are sighted. At a distance of fifty or sixty yards the hunters open fire, killing four of the animals. The fifth, a young kangaroo, takes to the open country. The hunters have decided to catch it alive. As they approach their prey, one of the hunters creeps forward on the runningboard, seizes the kangaroo by the tail, and manages to hold on to both car and animal until the car is stopped.

Each year, during the prolonged drought in the Australian bush sections, the kangaroo becomes a pest in the farming sections, great numbers invading the ranches and destroying the crops. Before automobiles were pressed into service, kangaroo hunting was almost a hopeless job.



DAMMING THE FAMED STRAITS OF BELLEISLE

Latest Development in a Much Discussed Suggestion as to Changing the Climate

Halifax, N. S. Oct. 28.—Dr. Pelletier, the agent general of the Province of Quebec in London, and Mr. L. A. Cannon, of Quebec, have been in Ottawa discussing with Government officials the recently resurrected project of damming the Straits of Belle Isle. It is announced that, as a result of representations made, a concrete proposition will shortly be placed before the Government. Dr. Pelletier and Mr. Cannon assert that they are making the move at the instance of English capitalists who are prepared to go on with the project as soon as the consent of the Government immediately concerned is secured. They are asking for no Government assistance. They claim that the water which flows out of the Gulf of St. Lawrence now is of about the same or lighter gravity than the Arctic Current so that the Arctic Current courses along the Labrador and Newfoundland shores, whereas the water of the Gulf Stream flows so much more saline and heavier would press the Arctic water away from these shores. Just why the Gulf Stream should work its way inside, instead of outside, the Arctic Current is not explained, but the promoters claim it will and that in doing so it will revolutionize the climate of North America, so modifying it that bananas may be grown in Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island, oranges in Newfoundland, and the Arctic and Gulf of St. Lawrence remain ice-free the year round. It is further stated that the proposed dam can be constructed for ten million dollars.

HYDRO-ELECTRIC POWER

His Worship Mayor Murray certainly voiced the sentiments of a large majority of the citizens of Campbellton when he said the time had arrived when the matter of water power for the generating of electric current should be gone into at once.

If Campbellton is to keep pace with Bathurst, Moncton and other growing towns and cities, it must have cheap power and with the number of rapid rivers within a reasonable distance of our town there should be no difficulty in discovering a suitable site for such development.

The fact that a private corporation is offering to supply hydro-electric power for 1 1/2 cents per K. W. hour and current for lighting for 3 cents per K. W. hour should be an incentive to the town council to get after this matter in earnest.

It has been stated by the electric light department that it costs the town at present four and seven eighths cents per K. W. hour to generate electricity at our present plant.

The cost of labor and coal and supplies is increasing and it is necessary that something should be done.

One of the difficulties we have to contend with here is the fact that Americans have leased the fishing rights to such streams as the Upsal-quitch and will put up a strong fight against such development. But surely the progress of Campbellton is not to be blocked by such selfish interests and the town and county should stand for their rights in this matter.

At the last session of the New Brunswick legislature a bill relating to the development of water powers was introduced by the government but was not finally dealt with by the house.

Premier Foster announces that at the next session a new bill, with much broader provisions, will be introduced, and no doubt it will be brought down early and either as introduced or in an amended form placed upon the statute books of the province.

On every hand we are told that one reason this province cannot compete more successfully in manufacturing is that power costs so much more than elsewhere. To provide cheaper power is therefore one of the first essentials to industrial expansion.

CANADA'S TRADE STABILITY.

Statistics furnished by the Finance Department, at Ottawa for the six months ending Sept. 30th, 1919 show a most encouraging state of affairs, even though there has been a decrease in Canada's total trade as compared with the same six months of 1918. The total value of Canadian trade, export and import from April 1st to Sept. 30th, 1918 was \$1,087,232,880; and for the same period in the present year \$1,054,557,462 or \$32,575,418, less. But the chief drop in the value of imports, exports fell only \$11,329,805 as compared with the 1918 totals. When it is remembered that last year the war was still in progress and Canada was exporting munitions that ceased to be made so soon as the armistice was signed, the decrease in exports is surprisingly low. It is clear that our exports of a permanent character, both agricultural and of manufactured commodities, must have risen above even those of the war period.

Canada therefore has maintained a great overseas market for something more than war supplies, which she has an opportunity of permanently holding. But this market was only rendered possible by the credits furnished to Great Britain and European countries. Unless the Canadian people by a generous oversubscription to the 1919 Victory Loan, furnish the capital whereby these credits and this vast export trade can be maintained, the same period of 1920 will show a shrinkage that cannot be restored.



SMALLPOX CASES

AT EDMUNDSTON

FREDERICTON, Nov. 5.—It has been reported to the Department of Health that the two cases of smallpox at Edmundston were caught from an unrecognized source, according to the report of A. G. Turvey, Provincial Horticulturist, who has been in Montreal to see the condition of the New Brunswick apples on arriving there. The apples, shipped by the New Brunswick Fruit Growers' Association have been arriving in excellent condition and one shipment of Golden Russets from the province were claimed to be the best car of apples that had ever arrived for the Montreal market.

DEMONSTRATION PLOTS.

Demonstration farms in different parts of the province, are to be established and put in operation next summer by the Federal Government, according to an announcement. A man will be selected to take charge of the work in the province and the farms upon which the demonstration areas will be placed will be selected by the representative of the Federal Department of Agriculture in consultation with officials of the provincial department.

SEIZURE OF HIDES.

Warden Joseph Grogan, of Chatham, made a seizure on Friday of moose and deer hides at M. Arlansky's. It is claimed by the warden that the animals were killed during the close season. The accused was brought before the Police Magistrate. The case is still pending. Two barrels and two sacks of hides, shipped to Quebec by Mr. Arlansky, are held by the Quebec warden for investigation. It is reported that the warden has a case against another local hayer of hides and that proceedings will be commenced in a few days.—Chatham Gazette.
