The chairman's calling on Mr. Sifton to reply to Sir Hibbert Tupper was the signal for a great outburst of enthusiasm. Mr. Sifton was up on the platform and he was very much pleased to see the audience.

**The Boer War Not Yet Ended**

**"Bobs" Says He Can't Be in Liverpool Before January.**

**Mahon's Mounted Troops Had a Severe Fight on Saturday—British Had 11 Killed and 28 Wounded—Enemy Still Active Over a Wide Field—Two Commandos Arrange for Surrender.**

London, Oct. 15.—The mayor of Liverpool has received a dispatch from Lord Roberts, saying that he will be unable to attend to receive the freedom of the city before January.

**A SEVERE FIGHT.**  
Lord Roberts reports from Pretoria, under date of Oct. 15, as follows: "French started from Machadodorp towards Heidelberg to clear a part of the country not yet visited by our troops. Mahon, commanding the mounted troops, successfully engaged the enemy on Oct. 13, but our losses were severe, three officers and eight men being killed, and three officers and twenty-five men wounded.

**THE CANADIANS.**  
London, Oct. 15.—The mystery as to the fate of Sergeant Dixon, of the 5th Dragoon Guards, a son of the late Lord Dixon, is cleared up. He was reported missing after the fight at Volksrust. Today his sister got a letter from him saying that he was severely wounded and taken prisoner by the Boers on Aug. 15, and released in September. He is now in an army hospital.

**THE PINO WAR**  
Shows No Signs of Termination—Natives Adopt Boer Tactics.

Manila, Oct. 15, via Hong Kong.—A detachment of twenty men of the 24th Regiment, while engaged in repairing telegraph wires Oct. 10, at a point near San Jose, Isle De Luzon, were set upon by 200 rebels and were overpowered and scattered. Seven of the Americans reached San Jose, but it is probable that the remainder were captured.
