The French Journalist Recently Ex-pelled from Bulgaria,

There is at length a prospect of an ami-sable settlement of the Franco-Bulgarian cable settlement of the Franco-Bulgarian complication growing out of the expulsion from the principality of the French journalist, M. Gaston Chadouine, by the Bulgarian Premier, M. Stambouloff. The offense charged against him was the writing after official admonition of abusive articles against the Sofia Government. The cable announces that the powers now support the demands of M. Ribet, the French Minister of Foreign Affairs, who merely desired to insure respect for the capitulation and to prevent a recurrence of the affair. The dispute, it is further declared, lacks the gravity which has been attributed to it. the gravity which has been attributed to it by the foreign press, and a speedy and satisfactory settlement of the difficulty be-tween France and Bulgaria is confidently expected.

BRAVE CONVICT WOMEN

Rewarded by the Indian Government for Their Heroism.

LONDON, Jan. 12.—It will be remembered that during a cyclone which passed over the Andaman Islands on Nov. 2 the steamer Enterprise, which was lying off Port Blair, became a total wreck. The Andaman Islands are the East Indian penal settlement, and the Enterprise was used for conveying prisoners and provisions and supplies to the islands. The Enterprise was caught by the cyclone with her anchors down and no steam on. She had a crew of 83 officers and men, and all were swept into the sea. There and all were swept into the sea. There were no life saving appliances at Port Blair, and it looked to be impossible to save Blair, and it looked to be impossible to save the unfortunates from the wreck. Among those who were watching were a number of female convicts who had huddled under the lee of their prison walls to escape the fury of the gale. While the men stood silently by watching the struggles of the drowning men one of the women proposed to form a human life line from the beach out into the sea. The seas were thundering upon the rocky shore with a violence that seemed to shake the earth, but nothing daunted the female conearth, but nothing daunted the female con viets reached the shore, linked hands, and their lender, following by her equally brave sisters, plunged into the sea to save a man who could be seen struggling helplessly in the water. The women were dashed from their feet at their first attempt and hurled violently upon the shore. Again they clasped each other's hand, again they sprang undauntedly into the raging waters, and the leader grasped the drowning man, who was carried safely to the shore. In this way they rescued six men. The remainder of the crew perished.

Charles Marvin, the celebrated driver, formerly at Palo Alto, but now with Miller & Sibley, at Franklin, Pa., is noted for his improved methods of training, developing and caring for a horse. His new ideas are innumerable and breeders and trainers who are electrified at his success follow his methods as nearly as they can. At Miller & Sibley's a good many Palo Alto, or Marvin ideas are already in vogue. The most marked one is the attempt to strengthen the legs of I and 2-year-old colts and fillies by painting them with tincture of iodine. This is one of Marvin's inventions, and, it is said, is his custom when he takes up a yearling to begin "painting him," as it is called. The iodine is put on a cloth and applied to the leg, which is then vigorously rubbed. Naturally it produces a blister and the colt is very sore, but he soon gets used to that and a it produces a blister and the colt is very sore, but he soon gets used to that and a callous forms on the leg. Is it possible to transmit a photograph by electricity? Yes, replied Mr. Arstutz, of Cleveland. The design must be first photographed on a gelatine bichromate of potassium film, after which it is washed of potassium film, after which it is washed in warm water to remove the softer parts, leaving the portions hardened by the action of light as a relief, high or low, according to the depth of tone in the original. A stylus is then made to travel all over the surface of this dissected photograph and made to rise and fail according to the relief, and by means of a multiplying lever is made to depress a number of keys, by which an electric current is admitted into the line. The number of keys thus closed is in proportion to the rise and fall of the stylus, and so the strength of current in the line is varied according to the intensity of light. proportion the tax and and so the strength of current in the line is varied according to the intensity of light and shade in the design. The next process is to send it through an electro-magnet bearing on a graving tool, which travels over a surface of wax in a path corresponding to that traced by the stylus on the gelatine bichromate of potassium film. The result is a copy of the relief made from the latter, which by stereotyping, etc., can be made into a printing surface. In this way portraits have been transmitted over twenty miles of wire. This method follows accessfully in the line of the discoveries made by Mr. Townley, Mr. Shelford Bidwell, and Messrs. Ayrton and Perry.







Since he went to Winnipeg he has been over a good deal of ground, and has been able to look a little into its resources and possibilities. Writing to a member of the Advertiser staff, he says: "Winnipeg people talk of running out to Brandon much as a Londoner would speak of going to Ingersoll, and yet Brandon is 133 miles distant. In fact, one of the chief troubles of the country is its size. Its first needs are more people and continued branch and railway extension, though wonders have been accomplished in the direction of providing railway facilities." As to the population, Mr. Thompson thinks that the big crops of this year will stimulate immigration from other countries. The aggregate wheat yield this year will scarcely be less than 24,000,000 bushels—an average of 26 to 27 bushels an acre. One can understand what the yield means, says Mr. Thompson, when he remembers that it represents an average of over 1,300 bushels for every farmer in the Province, besides vast quantities of oats, and in some cases barley as well! It would paralyze the average Ontario farmer if he had 1,300 bushels of wheat to handle in addition to coarse grains. It is estimated that 40 or 50 per cent. of the wheat was more or less touched with frost, but Mr. Thompson argues, with the characteristic of a Northwestern philosopher, that frost is not an unmixed evil. Were it not for some such check wheat growing would besome like the old California gold fever, and people might lose their heads. The manager of the great Lake of the Woods Milling Company told Mr. Thompson shales yet in steck, and the threshing machines will be kept busy running all winter; and if there are not some stacks left after next seeding it will be a wonder.
