London, April 10.—An attempt on the part of publicans and others to make an imposing public demonstration against the proposed law establishing local option and abridging the privileges of the liquor trade, ended Saturday in a scene of riot and disabridging the privileges of the discrete and disorder. The plan of the managers of the demonstration was to have processions formed in the various districts, all of them converging into Trafalgar Square, where the meeting of protest was to be held. The temperance party, however, to the number of thousands, occupied Trafalgar Square long before the arrival of the liquor party, or the "anti-vetoists." Free fights were frequent, and the police were busily employed in subduing and arresting the ringleaders in the strife. The temperance party next secured possession of the plinth of Nelson's column and proceeded to hold forth. The liquor party now became aggressive, and the first temperance speaker was knocked off and somewhat bruised in the descent. The temperance people, the descent. The temperance people, however, rallied, carrying all before them and obtaining full control.

Two Hundred Persons Speared. LONDON, April 9.—The Cape Times pub-lishes, a private letter from the Nkonde Plain, in Nyassaland, dated Nov. 25 last, Plain, in Nyassaland, dated Nov. 25 last, which states that the people of those parts are living in terror of the Arabs, and look for safety to the handful of white people, especially the African Lakes Company. The one great hindrance to all advancement is war, carried on by the native or the Arab. Of the former kind the writer describes a recent instance.

"The Angoni," he says, "are an ofishoot of Zulus, occupying the hills to our west, and are the terror of the country around.

They entered the village sliently, and each warrior took up his position at the door of a hut and ordered the inmates to come forth. Every man and boy was speared as he emerged, and every woman was captured.

"News of the disaster soon reached the three white men stationed at Karongo in the employ of the Lakes Company. One of their number set out immediately with 50 guns to recapture the women, who, to the number of 200 or 300, were being carried off. In the afternoon they met the Angoni and opened fire. Taken by surprise, the men of the spears made off, but, not being able to carry both the booty and the women, they began immediately to spear the latter, A horrible seene then ensued. In half an hour they were beaten off and the women rescued. I was at the scene of the disaster rescued. I was at the scene of the disaster three days after, and counted 47 wounded. The others had either died or been car-The others had either died or been carried off by friends. One man had fifteen spear wounds; a child of 2 years had 7. What impressed me most was the number of young firls and children (even on the breast) who were spared. The poor creatures were afraid to go to their village, and were living in the reeds lining the lake shore. As far as can be ascertained the following is the list of the dead; Men, 29; women, about 100; girls, 32; boys, 16, Angoni, about 30."

# Disastrous Fires.

**Dutton Narrowly Escapes Complete** Destruction.

Fatal and Costly Conflagration at Warsaw, Ind.

Twenty-Three Valuable Horses Burned and Chief Brown Fatally Injured

St. Thomas, April 8.—Fire broke out this morning in the Patrons of Industry store at the village of Dutton, on the Michigan Central Railroad, and in a few hours destroyed \$50,000 worth of property, including 'the Windsor Hotel, J. Price's general store, Patrons of Industry, Mc-Pherson & Drake's general store, Dutton postoffice, opera house, Mechanics' Institute, Davis' tailor shop, and F. Miller's tailor shop. A J. Leitch, who owned most of the buildings, suffers a heavy loss. Nothing was saved, as an explosion of gunpowder shortly after the fire, completely demolished the greater portion of a block. The buildings were all two-story and brick, and were erected about a year ago. But for a heavy storm which brought rain down in torrents the whole town would have been wiped out.

The village is absolutely without fire protection, and the flames spread so rapidly that not even a pail of water was wasted in an attempt to stay their progress, except when they threatened the Queen's Hotel on the south, and the Salvation Army barraaks on the north both, of which structures were saved.

Datton has been particularly unfortunate

Dutton has been particularly unfortunate in the matter of fires. In 1885 the Heckin & Pool block was destroyed, at a loss of \$75,000. In January, 1892, the fire in the Nelson block cost \$15,000. On Jan. 14, 1893, there was a fire costing \$25,000, and now this \$50,000 fire.

This is the second time Mr. Price has been burned out this year, and the third time since he lived in the village.

Mr. Leitch has opened out a postoffice in one of the sample rooms of the Queen's Hotel. The buildings were insured for \$8,000.

The Hull Dockmen Indulge in Violence.

Santa Fe Railway Machinists Go Out En Masse.

London, April 9.— The steamships Montebello and Romeo put out from the Hull docks last night and anchored in the roads so as to be able to take aboard their crews at a safe distance from the rioters. Two companies of dragoons, arred with lances, formed on both sides of the crews and escorted them to the tenders. The police tried to keep the mob back, but the strikers broke through the lines repeatedly and began stoning the soldiers and sailors. The police swung their clubs right and left, cracking heads and battering faces. When the rioters crowded up in front of the crews so as to stop their progress, the dragoons beat them back with the butts of their lances. Several policemen and dragoons were injured with stones thrown by the rioters, and about a dozen strikers were carried from the scene of conflict by their comrades. At the docks, the crews were placed on the tenders and proceeded to the Montebello and Romeo. Both steamships sailed this morning. The entire system are on strike for better wages and other demands. It is reported by the strikers that the firemen and brakemen are also out, but this lacks confirmation. The demand of the men is that the pay shall be increased 25 cents per day; that inexincreased 25 cents per day; that inex-perienced men who get less than regular perienced men who get less than regular rates shall not be required to do the work of skilled men, and that when the company deems it necessary to reduce expenses gangs of men be not discharged or laid oft, but that the hours be reduced. The pay of machinists, boiler-makers and blacksmiths is at present \$2.50 per day and of helpers \$1.50.





The Government will resist this as vigorously as it can and strive to secure a reading by Friday next. The Opposition has arranged a terrifying long string of orators, big and little, to follow one another in order to kill time. The Government is doing its beat to persuade its followers not to talk at all, inasmuch as the sole point at issue is whether the Ministry later in the seesion shall have a few days more or less in which to deal with other legislation and the Home Rule Bill has already been debated ad nauseam. This impending struggle cannot but seem to sensible observers a wanton and rather silly waste of time and ammunition. It has, however, one aspect which deserves a harsher epithet. The entire question whether the Government or the Opposition shall win next Friday rests in the hands of the Speaker. His decision whether there has been sufficient debate or not is final and not to be questioned. The Opposition are at no pains to conceal their reliance on him to play the partisan in their interest. The Gladstonians somewhat feeby profess a confidence that he is capable of taking a non-partisan view and defeating his own party's plans for the sake of his position in the eyes of posterity. Meanwhile the Speaker, like the Tar Baby in Uncle Remus' charming sketch, lies low and says nothing.

At Kearney the fire burned near enough to the town to destroy a brewery. At Duning an old lady named Bartlett was fatally burned. The region burned over is the chief grazing section of the State.

SIOUX FALLS, S. D., April 9.—Terrible prairie fires are raging near Chamberlain and a large amount of stock perished. Two persons were burned to death.

PORTSMOUTH, Ohio, April 9.—The residents of Nauvo, Union Mills and Friendship, of this county, lifted up prayers of thankfulness at 2 o'clock this morning, when a heavy April rain began to fall. For the past two weeks a very dangerous forest fire has prevailed west of the Scioto River. It originated in the Washington township lumber region Monday and has been spreading. The path rendered desolate by the fire is sixteen miles long by four miles wide, and the loss roughly estimated will exceed \$20,000 in timber, not counting scores of farm buildings swept away.

And Provide the Library Board With the Wherewithal

That the Aldermen Are So Backward in Giving.

Gusty But Inconclusive Conference The Erection of a Y. M. C. A. Building and Library Combined Proposed-The Board Opposed to Another Popu-lar Vote.

After a gusty session of two hours and ahalf on Saturday night the conference on the free library question between that board and a committee of aldermen resulted in all concerned quitting just where they began and adjourning for a week. The Free Library Board was represented by Messrs. Macklin (chairman), Cameron, Reid, Keene, Marks, and Burrell, while only three of the six of the aldermen deputed to attend were present, Ald. Coo, Stevely and Taylor. The ball was set rolling by Chairman Macklin. He said he understood that the board was properly elected to carry out the wishes of the people, expressed by a majority of over 2,000 votes at the last election. They were there as business menut there to exercise some judgment, and not as mere things, and after using their best judgment in the selection of a building and site the council were seeking to block the estimates. The architect's report about the Mechanics' Institute had been a surprise to himself. The sum of \$7,000 would be required to put it in shape—\$3,000 for the floors, \$2,000 for heating and \$2,000 for other changes. This was exclusive of \$1,000 for shelves. Then in \$3,000 for the floors, \$2,000 for heating and \$2,000 for other changes. This was exclusive of \$1,000 for shelves. Then in addition there was a mortgage of \$18,000 to be shouldered. The architects had also told them that for \$12,000 or \$15,000 at the outside a new building could be creeted, with the library on the ground floor. This they all agreed would be much more preferable than the Mechanics' Institute, even after \$7,000 had been spent in repairs, thus bringing the price up to \$25,000. The free library scheme was entitled to ½ mill on the general taxation, but in the board's entire they were only asking for § mill, on the general taxation, but in the board's estimates they were only asking for fi mill, or for a mill less the council must furnish them with if so requested. In conclusion Mr. Macklin argued that if extensive and expensive alterations and additions could be made and paid for by such small corporations as several of the city churches, then there ought to be no difficulty in a large corporation like the city of London granting the sum asked for.

Ald. Coo, while admitting the necessity of a new building that would be a credit to London, did not think that the city was at present in a position to afford it. The aldermen were endeavoring to keep the

aldermen were endeavoring to keep the taxes down, and it was just such and taxes down, and it was just such and a mills as proposed that run them up to 25 mills. If any other scheme could be devised to run the free library for a year or so without going to the expense of a new building just now, he would gladly support it. It had been said that the board was entitled to \$7,500 this year, but that was

not so.

Mr. Robt. Reid—Oh, you are falling back on the quibble that our estimates were not put in by March, are you?

Ald. Coo—I am not falling back on that quibble. The city is not bound to issue quibble. The city is not bound to issue debentures, therefore you are in the position of asking for favors. The Y. M. C. Correspondents of Mr. Dawkins, for whom he sent orders, are also complaining of the non-arrival of their copies. What is the matter with the post-office? Has the Dominion Government realized the damage this little book is doing to the protection humbug, and have they conveniently discovered some informality in the franks, or something of that kind? Mr. Johnson writes that he sent another 450 copies on March 31. As these have not arrived, the thing seems now beyond mere accident or coincidence.
