The U.S. Attorney-General Sides With the Importers.

Decision Against the Government on the Disputed Tariff Case.

Goods Under Consular Seal From Con tiguous Countries or Upon Nontreaty Ships Are Exempt.

Washington, Sept. 20 .- Section 22 of the Dingley act does not impose dis-criminating duties upon goods brought into the United States through con tiguous countries under consular seal or upon goods imported through ocean ports in foreign vessels which are not Attorney-General McKenna is of the opinion that, accept as to goods not the product of a contiguous country which are imported into the United States directly from such contiguous country, the language of the section is not clear enough to make it certain that Congress intended to change the previously existing law. He believes that the verbiage is altogether too vague to justify an in-terpretation changing in any way the law as contained in the revised statutes as far as it affects imports through ocean ports or through contiguous countries under consular seal. 




